Gray County 4-H Rodeo Date Given

The Gray County 4-H Youth Rodeo will be held August 18 & 19 at the Top O' Texas Rodeo Arena in Pampa at 7:30 p.m. each evening. The rodeo is for all youth age 9-18. For ages 9-11, the entry fee is \$6.00 per event. The 12-14 year old age group will have an entry fee of \$8.00 per event. The older age group of 15-18 will have \$12.00 entry fee per event. State producer for the rodeo is James Martin, Spearman while B Bar K belt buckles will be awarded the top three winners in each event. The events include a heading & healing to be held Saturday, August 19 at 2:00 p.m. with an entry fee of \$12.00 per team. Other events include pole bending, barrel racing and goat tying for all ages of girls. In addition, the older age girls, age 15-18 will have steer riding. A prize of \$200.00 will be presented to the top cowboy and top cowgirl. To be eligible for the \$200 prize, contestants must have entered both rodeo's and compete in at least 3 events in each rodeo. All age groups, except pre-school will be competing for the prize which will be awarded on the basis of total points earned. Bill Hext, Canadian, Texas, will furnish the stock. EDITORIAL

Wheeler needs some help and the young people of our community can solve one problem in particular. The adults and parents can ask for cooperation and "crack down" but the young people will have to make the decision. Our young people have cars and they like to ride around, visit the neighboring towns and visit with the other young people who happen to be "out". All of this is fine, except for the litter which remains after the socializing is over. Litter is the problem! Even I know some of you can't go home with a load of empty beer cans. However, there are a number of trash cans setting around town that could be used. Wheeler received a lot of publicity last year after having won the State Championship in football. People who pass through Wheeler now are curious to see what kind of town can

produce a state champion football team. Most people new to Wheeler compliment us on what a nice town we have and how "clean" it is. But imagine their comment if they happened to pass through town early Saturday or Sunday morning when all the beer cans and broken beer bottles cover the streets. The County Sheriff and his deputies have been working overtime this week to try and correct this problem which has "gotten out of hand" lately. Sheriff Ramsey met with the council at their last meeting and explained the situation. He has the full cooperation of the council to take whatever steps necessary to end the problem. Five citations were given to young people Saturday evening and early Sunday morning. Most young people are given the opportunity to pick-up their mess and go home with no action being taken; if they choose not to cooperate and stronger measures are taken. I know and you know that the sheriff's department can not continue to patrol the streets as they have been this past week. And we also know that you can find a way to do whatever you decide to do; even if you do get caught. So the sheriff and deputies will become less lenient if some cooperation is not shown, more citations given, more fines paid, and a few more parents called. So, young people, may we have your cooperation—it is your town also.



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LEARN NOT TO BURN

By Ken Daughtry—Fire Marshall

CLOTHING FIRES STALK CHILDREN, ELDERLY

A little girl was seriously burned when her dress caught fire because she was too close to an electric heater... An elderly woman dressing robe was ignited when the loose sleeves brushed the burner of a kitchen range... A small boy playing with other children was fatally burned when he fell or was accidentally pushed into a bonfire.

These are typical cases from the files of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Clothing fires are a major cause of fire deaths, as well as many thousands of painful, times disfiguring injuries. The most frequent victims are children and elderly persons.

The trouble starts, NDPA studies show, when people fail to keep a respectful distance from flames, sparks and other sources of intense heat. Among the dangers are matches, smoking materials, stoves, heaters of many types, fireplaces and outdoor fires.

Some types of clothing and fabrics are more prone to catch fire than others, NFPA warns. Be careful of lightweight, loose-fitting clothes, ruffles, flounces, long and loose sleeves, filmy nets and gauzes. Some sweaters with


brushed long fibers ignite easily. Little girls' flared and fancy party dresses are risky, as are many improvised children's costumes.

If clothing does catch fire, the first and life-saving rule is this: don't run! Roll on the ground or floor. Smother the fire with a coat or blanket if one is handy.

Fire claimed an estimated 11,900 lives in this country last year. Of these, about one-third were children. Many hundreds of fire victims are still recovering from serious, often disfiguring injuries.

Countless thousands of Americans had payless paydays when fire interrupted their jobs, and other thousands saw jobs permanently gone when fire wiped out their employers' businesses. Still others will never recover fully from the financial disaster of a home or business fire.

These are heavy cost to pay for an act of negligence or ignorance. Through knowledge and care, destructive fires can be virtually eliminated.

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
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

SMALL REPAIRS AT HOME

Learn to do small repairs and maintenance jobs at home to help cut high service cost. With a set of instructions including pictures and step-by-step procedures, the average consumer can keep the cost of repairs from going out of sight.

The do-it-yourself procedures, the average consumer can keep the cost of repairs from going out of sight.

For example, she might replace a broken drive belt herself for about \$10, whereas the repair company would charge an initial \$19 just to visit the house.

Also, with the dryer open, check for lint-clogged exhaust ducts, even though the lint trap is clean, lint still accumulates in ducts.

Clean ducts mean a more efficient dryer.

In order to help in making

repairs, save all owners manuals and keep them in a file.

When the appliance fails, follow these basic principles:

Take precautions before working on anything—shut off water or electricity, or both.

Look for the simple solution. Many machine failures result from nothing more serious than a loose plug, a blown fuse or a broken cord.

Many others are caused by doors that have not been fully closed, so that safety switches

prevent them from operating—appliances with safety switches are driers, dishwashers, clothes washers and microwave ovens.

It never hurts to jiggle a plug or a door, or to nudge a dial

forward a fraction of a turn—but only a fraction, timing controls are easily damaged by manual turning when the power is on.

Cultivate patience and try a systematic approach. Do not

hurry. Keep track of parts. Memorize or write down the sequence in order which they come out of the machine, and put them down in the same order.

Know personal limitations. Learn everything about the machine's insides before beginning to disassemble it. Keep all papers. Sales slips, warranties, manuals and bills from previous repairs are potentially valuable solutions for future problems.

The local Extensions agent's office has many publications on how to make small repairs around the house.

There are also several books on the market that describe step-by-step how to perform minor repairs in and around the home.



OUTDOOR ALERTNESS NECESSARY

The extreme hot weather has made outdoor activities difficult and most individuals are waiting till twilight or dark to camp, fish, hike, or relax, however, wildlife, including snakes, are doing the same thing.
A small percent of these snakes are potentially dangerous to the outdoor person and preparations to handle a snake bite should be in the planning of any camping trip.

Although all four types of poisonous snakes including the rattlesnake, coral, copperhead, and cottonmouth moccasin are found naturally in Texas, the most abundant species and the one that is involved in most snake bites in northwest Texas is the rattlesnake.

Persons intending to go outdoors should first make sure they are wearing the proper clothing and shoes for protection from plants as well as snakes.

It is best to expect snakes in Texas and while walking along trails at night, the hiker should wear high boots and keep the pant cuffs on the outside of the boot. A bite from a rattler or other non-poisonous snake, spider, or other night wildlife can be potentially dangerous when the skin is broken.

Identification of a poisonous snake is necessary to either treat for the poison or only a bite. Many persons bit by a non-poisonous snake have undergone needless pain and anguish because the snake was not identified at the time of the bite. The treatment for venom poison is drastic compared to a non-poisonous bite.

The general health of a person will determine how the body systems handle the injected venom from the snake. Many poisonous snake bites are near misses or the snake has recently bitten something else and the person does not receive a full dose until the doctor prescribes different treatment.

Normally, first aid for poisonous snake bites includes reducing circulation near the snake bite with a constricting band or ice-pack. The size of the snake

and victim will determine the period of safety before the venom takes full effect. Since victims normally do not die instantly from the venom, the delay gives the victim and doctor a chance to treat the bite. No matter how close or how far the victim is from medical treatment, transport the victim as fast and as safe as possible.

Many people are afraid of snakes and injury is possible as the person tries to get away from the snake. If you hear a snake, try to locate the snake before moving as the snake might be behind you.

Very few people succumb to poisonous snake bite in the United States, however, many more die from shock or side effects such as heart attacks or improper treatment.

Turtles In Farm Ponds Beneficial

Most anglers believe that turtles eat fish in farm ponds, but recent studies indicate that only five percent of the turtle's diet is fish and they are beneficial if the population is kept at the pond's carrying capacity.

Actually, turtles are a scavenger and most of the fish eaten are dead at the time the turtle finds them. Like the vulture, the turtle is nature's way of keeping the pond clean.

Although turtles do not harm the fish population, they are often a nuisance to fishermen and sometimes need to be controlled. At the present time, there is no known method of completely eradicating turtles from a pond.

There are several methods of reducing the number of turtles including the use of rifles, underwater or submerged traps and surface traps.

Shooting is effective, but can be dangerous because ricochets may strike livestock or humans in the area.

Trapping is the most effective method of removing turtles from a pond. Submerged traps are needed for snapper and soft-shelled turtles. Wire basket traps similar to fish baskets can be built. The opening should be large enough to permit a large turtle to pass through. The basket should be three or four feet in length and two feet in diameter. Heavy gauge welded wire is a good material to use and the mesh size varies depending on the size of the turtles in the pond.

A door 12 to 18 inches square should be cut in the end of the trap opposite the funnel to help in the removal of the turtles.

Surface traps include log and tiltboard mechanisms. Log traps are made to furnish a turtle a place to sun itself and many of the turtles will slide off into the box. Nails driven into the logs on the inside of the trap will prevent the turtles from crawling back out of the trap. Bait can be suspended in the middle of the trap to increase the catch.

Surface traps are most effective in ponds with few floating logs, stumps, or islands. All surface traps should be removed from the water during the winter and stored, as turtles are not very active during the cold months.

Many Texans rate the turtle as a really fine meat for soups and if the turtles are to be eaten, the traps should be run daily. There are many ways to prepare turtle meat such as boiled in a stew with vegetables, fried or the most common method—soup.

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
