Extension Update

The aging process affects vision, health, mobility and other factors, which may leave elder Texans unable physically to drive to the grocery store, shop for food, cook and feed themselves. With these physical barriers, it is no surprise that these elders or their family members find them undernourished and unable to maintain their normal weight.

Help is available for those who want to help their parents remain healthy and independent as long as possible. Older adults can start taking advantage of the local community services such as congregating meals at the senior citizens feeding sites, local services providing meals on wheels or other available services for the elderly. These programs for which many may be eligible are designed to give you the boost individuals need to stay independent and living on their own as long as possible.

Some helpful eating hints for seniors, which also should be encouraged by family members who may be assisting their loved ones, are listed below:

- * Eat a healthful diet chosen from a wide variety of foods such as those recommended by the USDA Food Guide Pyramid.
- * Know and maintain a normal weight.
- * Eat plenty of complex carbohydrates found in fruit, vegetable and whole grain products.
- * Eat less fried foods, gravy and other foods higher in fat, saturated fatty acids and cholesterol.
- * Limit salt, salty foods and other highly processed foods containing sodium.
- * Include fiber rich food (20 to 30 grams of fiber daily such as whole grains, bran and pectin in your diet. These are excellent choices for seniors.
- * Drink at least a quart of water daily—whether or not you are thirsty.
- * If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation.

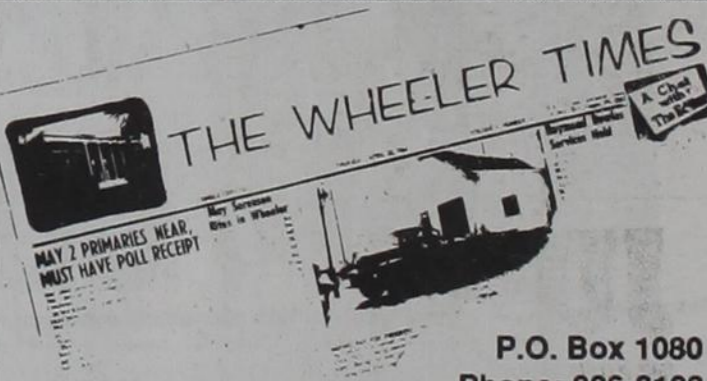

Pine Tree Moth Serious Pest In Tex. Panhandle

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners in the Texas Panhandle. Right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Don King, County Extension Agent for agriculture.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The pine tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured twig terminals of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lays eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from the pupal cases, and a new cycle of generation begins.

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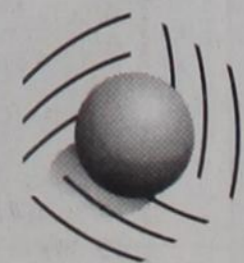

From The Minister's Desk:

Do you remember the trial in a small West Texas community of a volunteer fireman who was charged with arson? At his trial this volunteer fireman pled guilty to setting three vacant houses ablaze. His explanation for setting these fires was that fire had become an obsession with him since he had seen the movie, "Backdraft".

After the presiding judge ordered him to serve a six-year sentence, to pay a thousand dollar fine, and to make restitution to the property owners, he said: "Sir, responsible firemen prevent fires. They do not start them."

In my opinion, a similar rebuke could be directed at the parents of some young people. For the last several years, it has been apparent that alcohol abuse has increased among young people. One of the reasons for this increase has been that some of their parents have permitted or encouraged the abuse of alcohol. These parents must not be aware that medical and health authorities are now warning that the abuse of alcohol poses a heightened danger to young people. For example, Dr. Larry D'Angelo, the chairman of the Department of Adolescent and Young Adult Medicine at Children's Hospital in Washington, D. C. has said: "Metabolic and neurologic immaturity makes young people more vulnerable than adults to toxicity and dependence—and the younger the young person, the greater the risk. "When this warning

is coupled with the fact that alcohol is the third leading cause of death in this nation, it is inconceivable to me that parents would encourage alcohol abuse by their children. And it is totally inconceivable to me that parents would encourage alcohol abuse by the children of other parents.

I hope that these parents never have an experience like the parents whose eighteen year old daughter was killed in a car accident last spring. On the night of their daughter's graduation from high school, she and her boyfriend were killed in a car accident. When these parents were informed by the police of the accident and the death of their daughter, they were told that several bottles of beer had been found in the car. These parents were outraged, vowing to file charges against those people who supplied their daughter and her boyfriend with the beer. But their outrage soon turned into guilt when they found a note on the door of the refrigerator which said: "Mom and Dad, I took some of your beer so Tom and I could celebrate. I knew that you would not care. Love, Betty."

I wonder if these parents still did not care. I also wonder what they said to the parents of the boyfriend who was killed with the daughter. Such parents should be told that responsible parents discourage alcohol abuse. They do not encourage it."

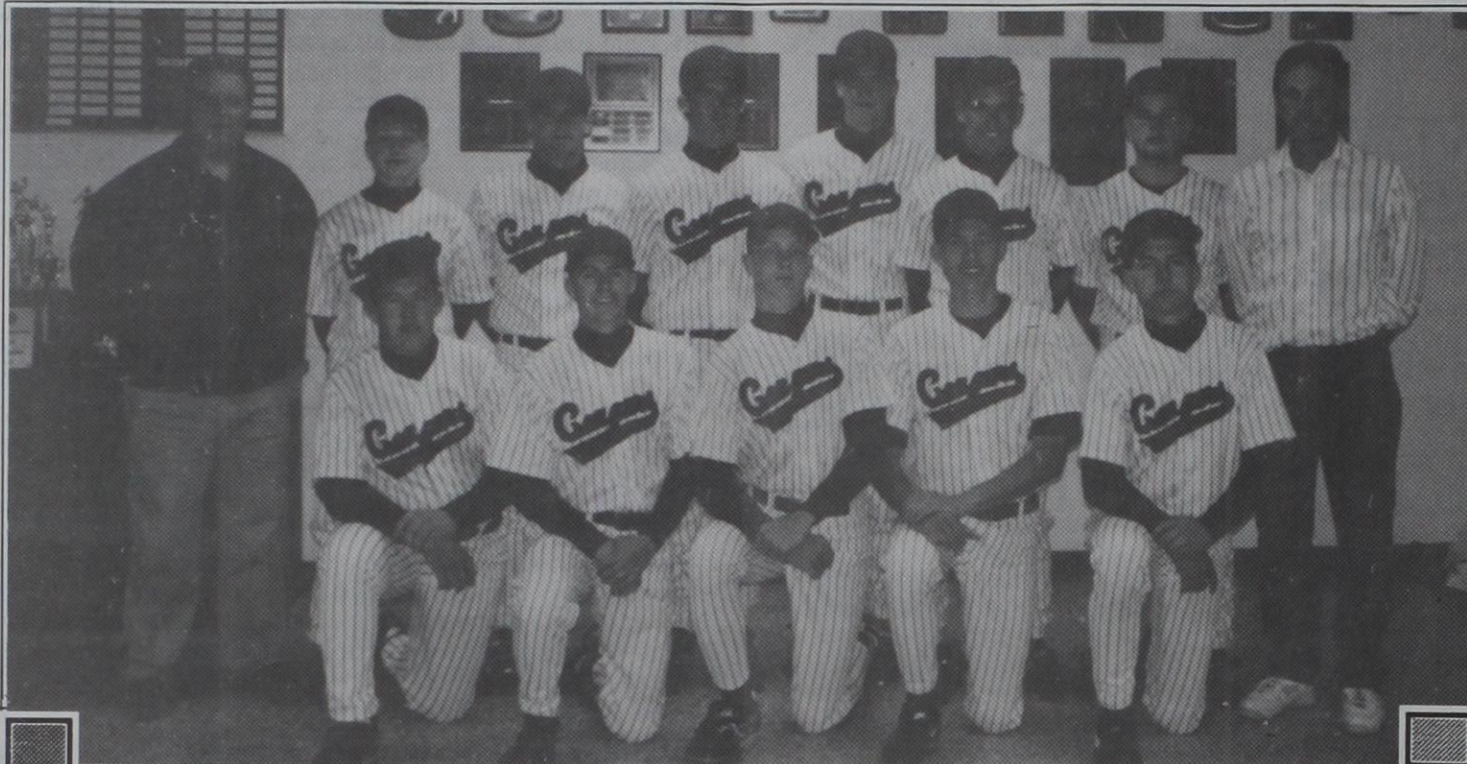
