



# MUSTANGS ROLL ON 15-8

## WINDTHORST FALLS AND MUSTANGS ADVANCE TO STATE FINALS SATURDAY

A dusty haze hung over Fair Park Stadium in Childress last Sat. night but the lights were bright on the scoreboard and it showed the Wheeler Mustangs had 15 and the Windthorst Trojans 8 as the gun sounded on one of the real classics in Panhandle football and the Wheeler Mustangs were on their way to the state finals in Class B.

If the final game against Lone Oak this week comes close in excitement or intensity as the Mustangs and Trojans game, then fans will need the next nine months to get ready for another football campaign.

Twice in the final 4 minutes the Trojans were deep in Mustang country but came up with nothing as the never say quit Mustangs rose to the occasion and sent the Trojans packing their football togs for another year.

Appearing to have the game salted away when they held the Trojans on downs at their 29 with just 2:03 to play, the Mustangs saw the super quick Trojans recover a bad handoff on first down at the 25 and the Trojans had 1:57 to get points on the board.

A tie was all Windthorst needed as they led the Mustangs in penetrations at that point 4 to 3 but a tie they couldn't get as Jeff Davis threw Darren Meurer for a yard loss on first down and the Trojans chose the airways the last three plays they had the ball but the Mustangs secondary blanketed the Trojan receivers and Kent Vise joyfully batted away the desperation fourth down pass by Randy Wolff as he

was being hounded by Tom Christner and Jeff Davis.

Wheeler ran the clock out and the semi-final victory was theirs over the best and certainly the quickest football the team the Mustangs have faced in a long time.

Credit needs to be given to the Mustangs as they fell behind in the first quarter 8-0 but blanked the Trojans from that point and were able to scratch out 15 big points for themselves.

The Mustangs never lost their poise and stayed with their game plan of putting the big hit on the Trojans both offensively and defensively throughout the game. The hard hitting Mustangs defense bent but broke just one and it paid off in the final minutes.

A high snap over Myron Jolly's head, which he recovered in the end zone, gave the Trojans an early 2-0 lead on the Mustangs first possession and this came after the Trojans had relentlessly moved 59 yards to the Wheeler 13 with the opening kickoff where Buddy Whitely knocked down Frank Wolff five yards short of the needed first down.

The Mustangs had put the ball in play just four downs and were behind by 8 as the Trojans took the ball following Jolly's free kick after the safety and marched 61 yards for their only touchdown.

Utilizing their quickness to the fullest, the Trojans stayed on the ground all the way and Meurer raced through his right guard like a bullet and was in the end zone standing up from 16 yards out. Meurer attempted to run the two

pointer but Vise stopped him short.

Undaunted, the Mustangs took the following kickoff and used power inside to get to the Windthorst 42 where Jolly booted the ball away on fourth down. Bob Steinberger made a poor choice and attempted to field the punt on his 8. Steinberger fumbled the catch and Duane Childress recovered the ball there for the Mustangs.

The Mustangs were guilty of holding on first down and were shoved back to the 21 where Childress got the Mustangs started with 3 tough yards around left end. Bobby Guthrie passed incomplete but Tommy Vieth was flagged for pass interference and the horses had a first down at the Trojan 9.

Marvin Grimes, the Mustangs workhorse with 34 trips into the trenches for the night, carved out 7 yards in two carries and the Mustangs got another yard to the 1 on a personal foul fine against the Trojans. Grimes nudged across at right tackle and appeared to have the extra two points at the other tackle slot but the referee signalled no and the Mustangs trailed by 8-6. 7:01 remained in the first half when the Mustangs scored.

The aroused Mustangs jarred the ball loose two plays later and Mike Lee recovered at the Trojan 36. Grimes went up the gut for 10 on first down but the drive bogged down at the 17 and the Mustangs called on Tim Patterson and the big tackle booted a 33 yard field goal to put Wheeler ahead by a slim 9-8 margin.

There was no giving up on either teams part at any time and here came the Trojans again using quick openers to quickly drive to the Mustangs 14 where Steinberger coughed up the ball once more and Bret Mosley pounced on it to kill the threat.

Wheeler took the second half kickoff and padded their lead in eight plays and it proved to be the only scoring of the second half but not all of the excitement that was to be unreled.

The Mustangs used the eight plays to go 91 yards with Grimes and Childress hitting inside to the 41 where Grimes lost a couple on a sweep at left end on the seventh play. Going to their seldom used bag of plays, the

## MUSTANGS IN STATE FINALS AGAINST LONE OAK BUFFALOES

A team that a lot of folks predicted would be there, the Wheeler Mustangs, and a team that wasn't even picked to win their district, the Lone Oak Buffaloes, will clash at Iowa Park Saturday night at 8 P.M. and

from that battle will emerge the state champion in football in Texas in Class B for 1977. The two major polls in the state, the AP and the Harris poll, have not given the Buffaloes a tumble all year but eyebrows were raised last week when they whipped the Harris' poll number one ranked team, Valley Mills, to propel them into the coveted finals against the Wheeler Mustangs, the reigning number one team in the state all year according to the AP. Wheeler advanced to number one and Lone Oak to number two in this weeks Harris poll. The Mustangs are favored by two points this week.

Nearly four months ago the Wheeler Mustangs started workouts with the goal of a state championship and now they are only one step away and have already accomplished what no other football team in the history of Wheeler High School has done.

One other team has a longer winning streak, at least to this date, but by winning the semi-final game last week, this year Mustangs have advanced farther in the state playoffs than any other gridiron team wearing the black and gold of Wheeler.

The Lone Oak Buffaloes are a team that is in direct contrast to the Windthorst Trojans, the semi-final foe the 12-0 Mustangs overcame last week in a titanic battle.

Where Windthorst relied on quickness and speed, Lone Oak uses size and power and has

fashioned a 14-0 record that makes people wonder why they haven't been given much notice to date.

Lone Oak won their zone playoff with the district favorite, Anna, falling to the Buffaloes 41-14. Union Hill was Lone Oak's bi-district foe and was defeated by the Buffaloes 21-14 and Wortham was whipped in the quarterfinals, 14-7. Lone Oak scored twice in the fourth quarter last week to defeat Valley Mills 25-14.

The Buffaloes run from both a tandem set and an I slot formation on offense under the very able operation by Lee Henderson, a 150 lb. Jr. quarterback.

Two other juniors man the running back slots and they will be the biggest running backs the Mustangs have faced this year in the same backfield. Jeff House is a 204 lb. tailback and Walter Crow is a 185 lb. fullback and the Buffaloes have had great success running these two backs inside.

Coupled with the running of House and Crow, Lone Oak has the good quarterback in Henderson who runs the option real well and can hurt you with his passing and the Buffaloes use the pass frequently and not just in obvious passing downs.

Defensively the Buffaloes use a basic 6-1 on defense with a four deep secondary and have proved to be hard to consistently move against. Joe Stemmoms, 180 lb. Jr. and Tra Williams, 203 lb. Sr. anchor the Buffaloes line.

The Mustangs came out of the

aggressive Windthorst game with no new injuries and should be in pretty good shape for the championship game.

"I couldn't be prouder of a bunch of young men than I was of our Mustangs last week; they sucked it up and did it when they had to and that is how champions play and these kids are champions," Coach Preston Smith said this week. "Windthorst has a great Class B football team and we are tickled to death that they are behind us." "Our defense really came through and Mike Lee and Dell Ford had great defensive games".

"This Saturday is for all the marbles and the Mustangs are ready and want that championship real badly but they know that Lone Oak is in the same boat, so it all boils down to who wants it the most and I think that our bunch does."

With Childress playing in Wichita falls at 7:30, traffic to Iowa Park will undoubtedly be heavy so fans are urged to leave in plenty of time.

The stadium in Iowa Park is located on the west side of town and just off to the right of Highway 287 on the route into town. In normal traffic, it is approximately a 3 to 3 1/2 hour drive from Wheeler to Iowa Park.

The Wheeler Mustangs can also add to history with a victory Saturday as it has been 15 years since a Panhandle team has won a football championship on the 11 man level.

# Wheeler County's Share of Tourist Dollar

AUSTIN—Wheeler County received \$5,616,600 of the State's \$6,075,952,000 travel receipts in 1976, a national study commis-

sioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed. The 1976 figures reflect an

increase of 15 percent in travel receipts over 1975 when Wheeler County's travel business accounted for \$4,867,000.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Wheeler County in 1976 had 223 of the state's 277,258 travel-related jobs with an annual payroll of \$1,144,700.

It also estimated \$223,300 in state and \$46,700 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1976.

The study was done by the U. S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D. C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away

from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. This includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U. S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1976 figures, however, show Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county-by-county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."



Both B teams and the Boys A team showed lots of hustle and improvement but all three were defeated.



## Residue Stops Wind Erosion

Wind erosion is just as damaging this time of year as it is during the spring. It is important to leave crop residues standing in the field for soil protection. Cotton fields are very susceptible to blowing because of the lack of residues. On these fields emergency tillage should be used to help control blowing.

"Emergency tillage will temporarily reduce wind erosion by trapping soil particles," according to Charles Coffman, with the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

The tillage operation should be in a manner that will add adequate cloddiness or roughness while maintaining most of the residue on the soil surface. Some good operations are sweeps, chisels or even listing old middles out. These operations generally should be at right angles to the damaging wind.

Care should be exercised on wheat land in case of blow out areas. These areas can ruin an entire crop if not treated. If possible these areas should be reseeded as soon as possible to reduce damage.

The personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District will be glad to assist in any wind erosion problems. Please call or come by the office in Wheeler. The SCS will have a new phone number as of January the third 1978. The new number will be 826-5640.

## Interstate 40 Project Continued

AMARILLO—The Federal Highway Administration has approved 12 miles of Interstate Highway 40 in Gray County, announced A. L. McKee, Amarillo District Engineer of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

Consequently DHT is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed plans and construction of IH 40 from the Wheeler County line west to .25 of a mile west of the west city limits of Alanreed.

McKee said the state agency will begin work on the next phase of the engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The project will involve construction of 12 miles of controlled-access, four-lane divided highway requiring approximately 460 acres of additional right of way.

Frontage roads will be built where required to provide adequate access to adjoining property. Interchange and grade separations will be constructed at major highways, crossroads and railroads, McKee said.

Some persons, businesses and families will have to be relocated. The DHT's right of way division furnishes relocation assistance and payments to displacees, and maintains records on land costs and other items necessary to support reimbursement claims to the Federal Highway Administration.

# KING'S KOMMENTS

## Marketing Alternatives

I want to remind all Wheeler County producers of the meeting on marketing alternatives at the Texas A&M University Research & Extension Center in Amarillo, December 14-15.

The meeting will begin at 1:00 P.M. on December 14. Dr. Ron Knutson, Economist-Marketing & Policy, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss the farm bill at 7:00 P.M., December 14.

Dr. Knutson and Dr. Bill Black, Economist-Marketing and Policy will have the program both days. They will discuss different ways to consider marketing your grain crop.

Those of you using the M-4 Cyanide device for coyote control will be required to receive training in the use before you will be able to buy the cyanide capsules. A training meeting will be held at the Gray County Courthouse Annex in Pampa at 7:00 P.M., December 8. This will be one of the few such meetings held in this part of the state.

## Protect Peach Trees from Disease

Last year several homeowners, especially in the Shamrock area, had bacterial leaf spot damage in their peach trees. The leaves first show light green spots. These spots then turn brown and fallout, giving the leaf a "shot hole" appearance. In the case of advanced infection, the limbs are affected and the leaves fall off.

Usually one spraying with Kocide 101 used as a dormant spray is effective in controlling bacterial leaf spot. If you had a severe infection it may be beneficial to spray now and again before the peach tree resumes growth in the spring. The Kocide 101 should be mixed at the rate of 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water.

One sure way to cut winter feed costs and generate income is to cull and sell cows that will not calve and that wean lightweight calves.

Winter feed costs, depending on management, are generally between \$50 to \$100 per cow, and accurate culling based on an individual cow's performance can

cut these costs and improve profits."

Maintaining accurate performance records on each cow is the key to accurately determining reproductive efficiency. These should include the cow's lifetime production in the herd, age, conception data, calving dates and weaning weights of calves as

well as calving intervals.

Without cow identification and performance records, culling is limited to a pregnancy determination and visual inspection which are important and should be practiced by all beef producers whether they have performance records or not. A veterinarian should check cows for pregnancy and soundness and remove open or defected cows.

Month of birth and age of calves are two important factors affecting differences in weaning weights within a herd. Older

calves will weight more than younger calves, and research results show that calves born in winter and early spring weigh from 35 to 80 pounds heavier at weaning compared to summer and fall calves. Calving dates are helpful in culling and can also help detect cows with breeding problems.

Weaning weights can be used more accurately in culling if they are adjusted to a common age such as 205 days. Cows can be compared and culled on the basis of their milking ability.

Producers will have to decide how extensive a record system they need. However, when it comes down to culling cows, there is no substitute for good records. Good cow performance records not only can save money but can be used to increase the production level of the herd by selecting top heifers for herd replacements and identifying high performing individuals for sale.

Herd forms can be obtained from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service through the local county Extension office.

**Microwave cooking**  
Now that you—and eight million other people in the world—are the proud owners of a microwave oven, maybe you're wondering how to use a conventional cookbook for this new, fast "miracle" cookery.

Microwave ovens are more popular due to changing lifestyles, the energy crisis, public education and awareness.

Manufacturers continually are improving the microwave oven so it will perform a greater variety of jobs.

"Time" is the major factor in adjusting to microwave cooking, but there are several other techniques that will make the "change" easier.

Microwaves are produced in the magnetron of the oven. They are directed into the oven cavity by a stirrer, rotating blade or fan.

It's difficult to distribute the microwaves evenly into all parts of the oven, so the cook must do one of two things: place the food in a round container rather than a square one, because the food cooks from the outside toward the center and foods cooked in square dishes tend to become overdone at the corners. Or, the cook can use the "rotation technique"—in which the dish is rotated one-fourth turn about halfway through the cooking time.

Another adaptation is necessary because microwaves cause carryover cooking to occur. That means after the food is cooked in the oven, and removed from it, it continues to cook.

To allow for this, closely follow recommended cooking times—and remember it may be necessary to stop the oven a few minutes before the food looks done. After the food has rested for several minutes, and it still doesn't look done, then extra cooking time can be added as needed.

Still one other adaptation is reducing conventional—recipe liquids by at least one-fourth—to keep the food from being too soupy.

Browning or "crisping" breads or crusts require another special, but easy, step.

Microwave ovens normally don't brown food, nor does moisture evaporate. So microwave cooking alone will not make a pie crust or loaf of bread crisp. However, good results are possible with a combination of microwave and conventional methods. For instance, when baking bread, you could cook it for eight minutes in the microwave and then 10 to 12 minutes in a conventional oven. This same loaf of bread would take about an hour to bake in a conventional oven—compared to 18 minutes with a combination of methods. Pie crust baked by a combination of methods would take half as much time as one baked in the conventional oven alone.

It only takes a little practice for most homemakers to adapt the family's favorite recipes to microwave cooking. But first, it's easier to use the manufacturer's cookbook provided with the new oven.

Vegetables cooked by microwave are a real success story. Use just a minimum of water and maximum speed so that the vegetables stay bright in color, ripe and crisp.

Here are some tasty recipes for use in a microwave oven.

**Stuffed Winter Squash**  
Squash:  
1 winter squash (one pound)  
Cook 8 minutes per pound.

Remove from oven, wrap in foil, let stand 7 to 10 minutes.

**Filling:**  
1 1/2 cup basic rice pilaf  
1/2 cup cottage cheese of Ricotta Cheese  
1 egg  
4 cheddar cheese strips

Cut squash in half lengthwise, remove seeds. Fill each half with rice, cottage cheese and egg mixture. Return to oven 3 minutes (cook). Place 2 cheese strips on each half; return to oven 1 minute.

**Basic Rice Pilaf:**  
1 cup water  
1 tablespoon butter  
2 teaspoons chicken bouillon  
1 teaspoon minced onions  
1 cup minute rice  
1 teaspoon sweet basil

Combine water, butter, bouillon, parsley, and onion in casserole. Cover. Cook 3 minutes (or until boil). Remove from oven. Add rice. Stir together. Cover 7-10 minutes. Serves 2.

**Stuffed Eggplant**  
1 eggplant  
1 pound ground round  
1/2 cup wheat germ  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 cup milk  
1 cup diced eggplant center  
1 cup diced fresh mushrooms  
1/2 cup minced onions  
1 package meatloaf seasoning mix  
Dash salt  
Sprinkle paprika  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley  
1 cup Longhorn cheddar cheese grated

Cut eggplant in half, remove center. Mix in bowl: ground round, wheat germ, eggs, milk, diced eggplant center, diced mushrooms, minced onions, meatloaf seasoning, and salt. Stuff mixture in both halves of eggplant—put in glass baking dish. Mix in china bowl cheese sauce mix and 1 cup milk. Cook regular cook cycle until it boils, turn to defrost until thick. Stir 2 or 3 times. Sprinkle cheese over top of meat in eggplant. Sprinkle with paprika. Cook 20 minutes on regular cook cycle. Let stand 2 minutes. When done sprinkle with parsley and serve. Serves 4.

**Wine Braised Celery, Water Chestnuts and Mushrooms**  
1 pound fresh mushrooms, cut in thick slices  
4 cups diagonally sliced celery, 1 to 1 1/2 inches thick  
1 can water chestnuts, drained  
1/2 cup Burgundy

1 teaspoon instant beef bouillon  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 tablespoon parsley flakes




The best way to avoid such accidents is to "go with





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
