Starting slowly and playing like they had their minds a week ahead, the Wheeler Mustangs finally got uncranked and blasted a game, but outmanned Lefors Pirates crew 56-0 last Friday night in Lefors.

Holding only a 7-0 margin at the end of the first period, the Mustangs widened that lead to 35-0 at halftime and coach Preston Smith started clearing his bench.

Lefors, in an effort to halt the Mustang machine, changed defensive alignments throughout the game and this did prove to be a deterrent in the early going for the Mustangs until adjustments were made.

Duane Childress and Dell Ford continued their long range punishment of opposition and were the leading ground gainers for Wheeler. Childress had 70 yards in just three rushes with the pigskin and Ford picked up 69

steps in a couple of trips into the Pirate defense and both of his runs resulted in touchdowns.

A little over two minutes remained in the opening quarter when Childress broke loose on a sweep at tight end and scooted 72 yards to paydirt to break the scoreless duel and Tim Patterson made it 7-0 with 2:22 to play with a successful point after kick.

The Mustangs had the ball on four possessions in the second quarter and put points on the board each time for the 35-0 halftime bulge.

Ford got the first of his 2 TD's for the game four plays deep into the second quarter when he sped 39 yards for six points to culminate a 51 yard, 4 play drive. Patterson was good on his second conversion kick and it was quickly coming to the point of just how much the Mustangs wanted to score.

A 49 yard punt return by Childress to the Pirate 26 gave the Mustangs great field position to go in for their third touch-

Ford popped through from the 30 and there was no catching the senior fullback as he romped untouched into the end zone.

Just 8 seconds remained in the first half when Wheeler held on fourth down at the Pirate 47.

Going to the air, Bo Guthrie, who played an outstanding game from his quarterback slot, hit split end Myron Jolly with a perfect toss and the pass and run netted the entire 47 yards needed and Patterson's kick sent the teams to the dressing room with the Mustangs holding the commanding 35-0 margin.

Using the second team on nearly every offensive down in the second half, the Mustangs put 21 more points on the scoreboard and thoughts were already turning toward the Groom Tigers.

Benny Baker, the talented Mustang freshman fullback, plunged over from 1 yard out at 5:57 of the third period to cap a 36 yard drive that was set up by a 24 yard punt return by the ever dangerous Duane Childress.

A 17 yard sweep around the left side by Kent Vise, who coach Smith calls his most improved player, ran the Mustangs margin to 48-0 after the two point try failed.

### Punt, Pass And Kick October 8

Registration for the area's 17th annual Punt, Pass & Kick competition for youngsters 8 through 13 years of age will remain open through October 8.

Nationally, more than 1,300,000 youngsters are expected to take part in this year's program sponsored by the Ford Dealers of America in cooperation with the National Football League. Registration blanks and local competition details are available at all participating Ford dealerships.

Punt, Pass & Kick has attracted more than 14 million participants since its inception in 1961, in addition to the enthusiastic support of high school, college and professional football coaches across the country.

**CHIMNEY/FIREPLACE REPAIR**  
Chimneys and fireplaces need early fall attention. Inspect now to help prevent winter problems. If the chimney top is accessible, look down it with the aid of a flashlight, or reflect sunlight down into it with a mirror—or use mirror and flashlight from the fireplace, or form the clean-out at the chimney base. Chimney Cleaning . . . is seldom necessary unless thick deposits of soot are present. The chimney can be vacuumed by a commercial firm or homeowners can do it themselves. First, close fireplace damper and seal opening to keep soot out of the room. If there is not too great an offset in the chimney, dislodge soot with a weighted bag filled with straw, paper or cloth—and tied with nylon rope. Lower the bag into the chimney and move it up and down until dirt and soot are forced down the flue. CHECKING FOR DEFECTS—Inspect for cracks in flue lining and for leaks around other connections. If fireplace and chimney show deterioration, try the smoke test to locate possible leaks. Build a fire in the fireplace. When it is burning well, put paper or damp straw into the fire to create profuse smoke. Cover chimney with heavy cloth to force smoke out through any deteriorated mortar joints or other areas. Open windows and doors for smoke to escape. Normally, the smoke would be drawn up past the joints in the flue lining, but this test will force it through these joints IF there are leaks. Smoke will also leak through any cracks in chimney stack joints. REPAIRING DEFECTS—If there are only a few small leaks, repair the brickwork joints. Minor crumbling of the mortar should be repaired to prevent water penetration. Clean out at least one-half inch of the mortar and loose dust. Dampen joints and fill with new mortar. Consult a chimney expert if there are many leaks in the stack, or if they are large. NEVER use a chimney until all defects are corrected. INSPECTING FLASHING—Flashing joints—on the flashing around the chimney—are usually sealed with roofing cement, and after many years of weathering there may be small breaks in the cement. If so, repair with asphalt roof paint or roofing cement. Fill larger gaps with roof felt and cover with cement. Occasionally chimney flashing separates from the mortar it is imbedded in. Repair this immediately, since separated flashing acts as a scoop for any rainwater. REPAIRING FLASHING—To repair separated flashing: Remove old mortar along the break line, clean the channel, and reposition the flashing. Finally, attach the flashing with a fresh mix of patching mortar.

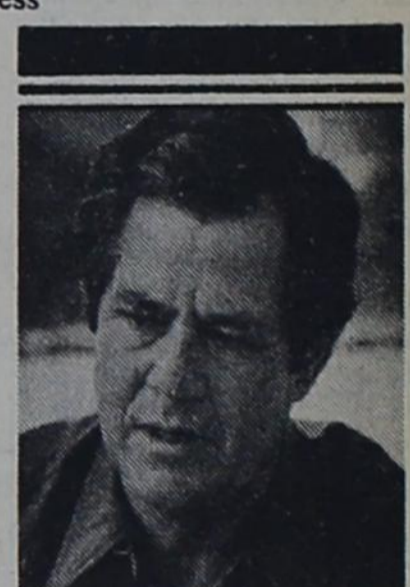
### Briscoe H. D. Club Meeting

They are wondering, too, why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleaguered farms and ranches.

"I fully agree with the people's assessment; that's why I'm seeking the office of Governor.

"I'm proud of my record as Attorney General and Secretary of State. It shows that I'm not afraid to roll up my sleeves and work hard. It indicates that I have the ability to assemble a capable staff, that I prefer to work closely with people, and that I'm not reluctant to make changes when they can benefit the state. I'll be this kind of governor, given the job."

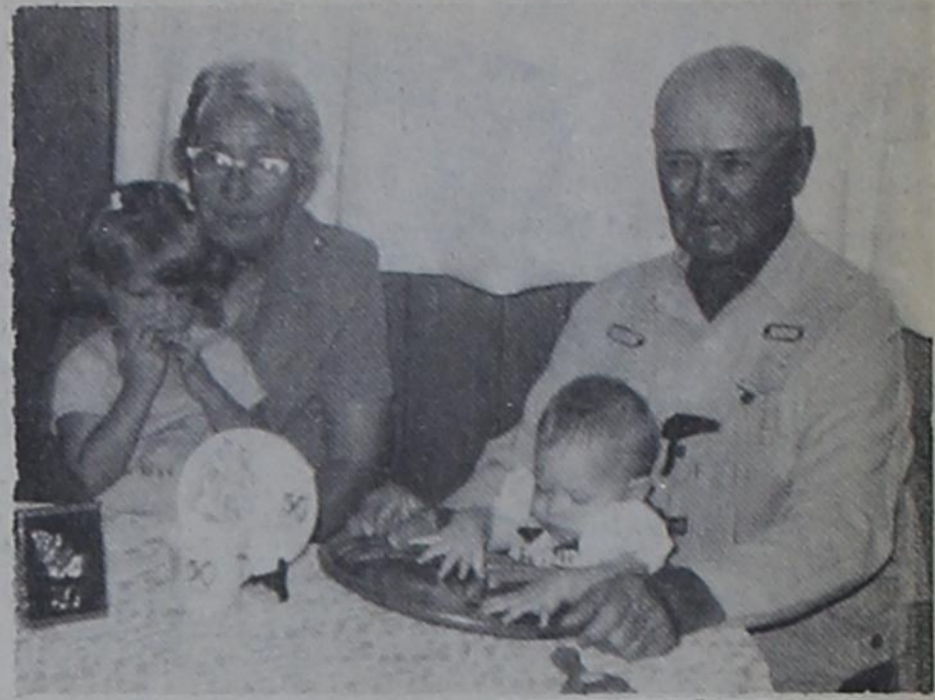

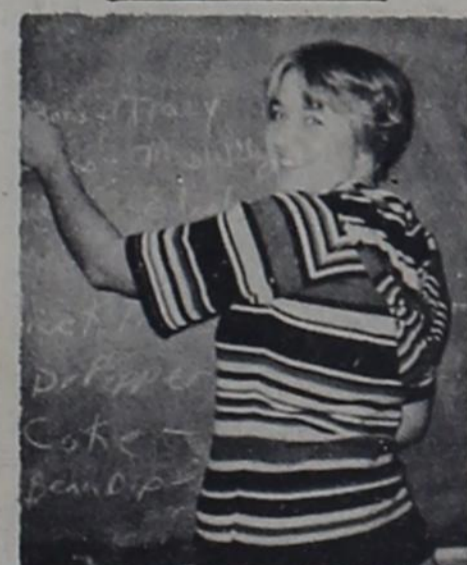
