

NO. 1 RANKED MUSTANGS START SEASON FRIDAY

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP ON LINE WITH BATTLE AGAINST IRISH

Having accepted the challenge one Class B team in the state in of being ranked as the number pre-season, the 1977 edition of

the Wheeler Mustangs start down that long road of backing up the rankings when they toe it up with arch rival Shamrock Friday night.

It makes no difference the classification or record when the

Mustangs and Irish get together and this year will certainly be no exception and a capacity crowd is expected at Shamrock Friday night for the 8 p.m. kickoff.

Enthusiasm has been high on the Mustang squad this year with

high hopes of improving on their fine 9-1 record and co-championship in '76.

Coach Preston Smith has been quick to point out that all rankings are chosen by sportswriters and that the decision has to be made on the playing field.

The Irish game will be the only non district game the Mustangs play this year but the game could have an important bearing on the rest of the season.

Shamrock will be playing for a new head coach, Ed Cruzan, this season and will employ a wing T on offense and a split 6 defensive alignment.

"Shamrock executes real well on offense and they have a lot of enthusiasm this year and we will have to really get our motors running because they want to beat us", Coach Smith said this week.

The head mentor of the Mustangs went on to add, "Our kids are ready to hill it up and we are real excited about the season."

In addition to Bill Wiggins and Jim Hester, two new coaches have been added to the Mustangs football staff headed by Preston Smith. Charles Carter and Mike Mock will assist with the variety and do the scouting and have charge of the Jr. High Colt program.

After three spirited weeks of practice and scrimmages against White Deer and Wellington, the Mustangs have pretty well settled on an offensive lineup for the Irish battle.

Bo Guthrie will once more man the quarterback spot with Brett Mosley at fullback and hard running Marvin Grimes in the tailback slot. Dell Ford will be at split back for the Mustangs against the Irish.

Doing the dirty work up front, the Mustangs will have Myron Jolly at split end and Sam Schaffer at tight end. At tackle, Tim Patterson and Jeff Davis hold fort and Mike Lee and Buddy Whitely will be the two guards. Kevin Lasley has been moved to the center position.

Defensively, the Mustangs will make several changes in positions but won't do much platooning.

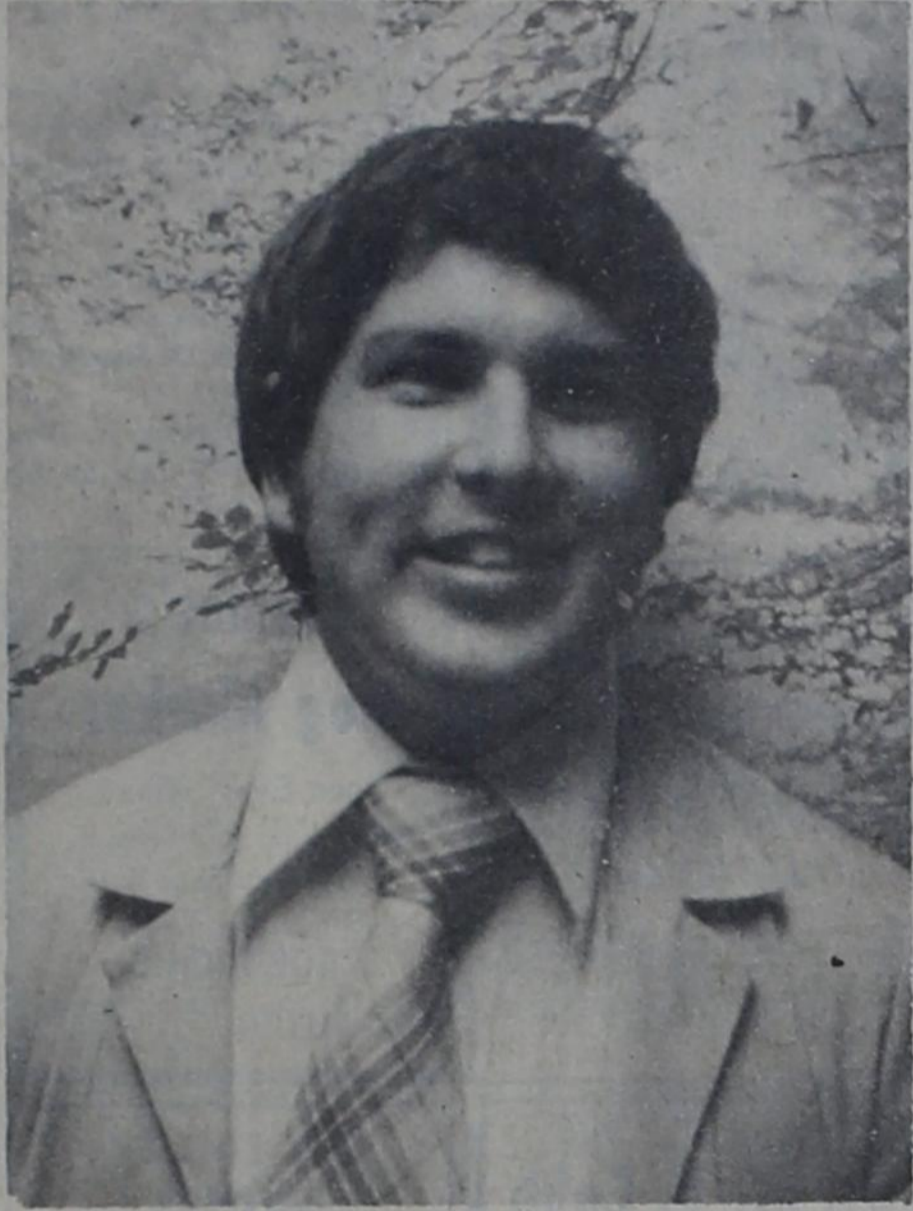
Dr. Robert Galutia Begins Practice

SPS PLANS COAL-FIRED ELECTRIC PLANT

A new 30 megawatt coal-fired electrical cogeneration plant which will save up to 50 per cent of the normal energy requirements for a power-generating facility, was announced here today by Southwestern Public Service Company and Celanese Chemical Company.

One of the U. S. industries' first affirmative responses to the proposed national energy program calling for cogeneration ventures, the plant will be built at the Celanese Pampa location where Celanese already has committed more than \$50 million on a project that will replace natural gas-fired boilers with coal-fired boilers. Estimated cost of the new cogeneration plant is approximately \$15 million.

High pressure steam from two new 650,000 pounds per hour coal-fired boilers will supply the 30 megawatt single train steam turbine generator unit that will supply all the electrical requirements of the Pampa plant.

The Pampa unit will be linked with Southwestern's integrated electric generation and transmission system, providing standby electric power should the new unit be temporarily closed down for maintenance or repairs.

"Back in late 1964, Southwestern and Celanese joined forces in a then-pioneering effort to conserve the Panhandle's natural gas resources by utilizing the Pampa plant's by-product hot pressurized gases to drive Southwestern's turbine generator located at the Celanese plant site," Mr. Mlinar explained.

Gene Steel, manager of the Celanese Pampa plant, said, "Our new joint conservation efforts fully support the nation's energy goals which, among other recommended actions, urges the replacement of gas-fired boilers with coal-fired boilers and the cogeneration of electric power."

Mr. Steel said the Southwestern-Celanese project and the replacement of the Pampa plant's existing gas-fired boilers with coal-fired boilers will save

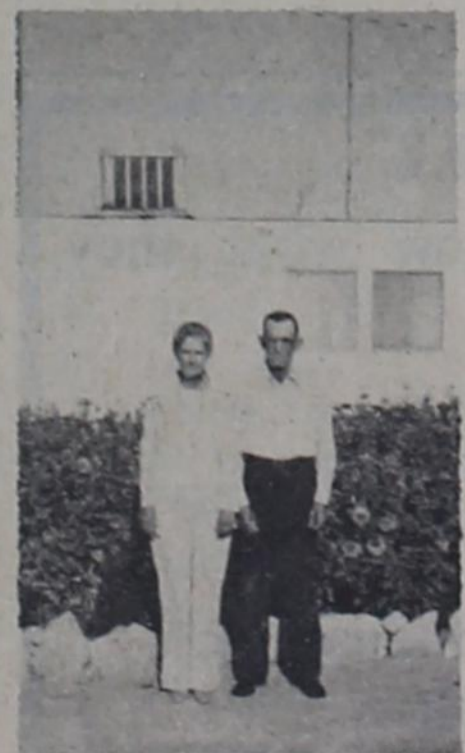

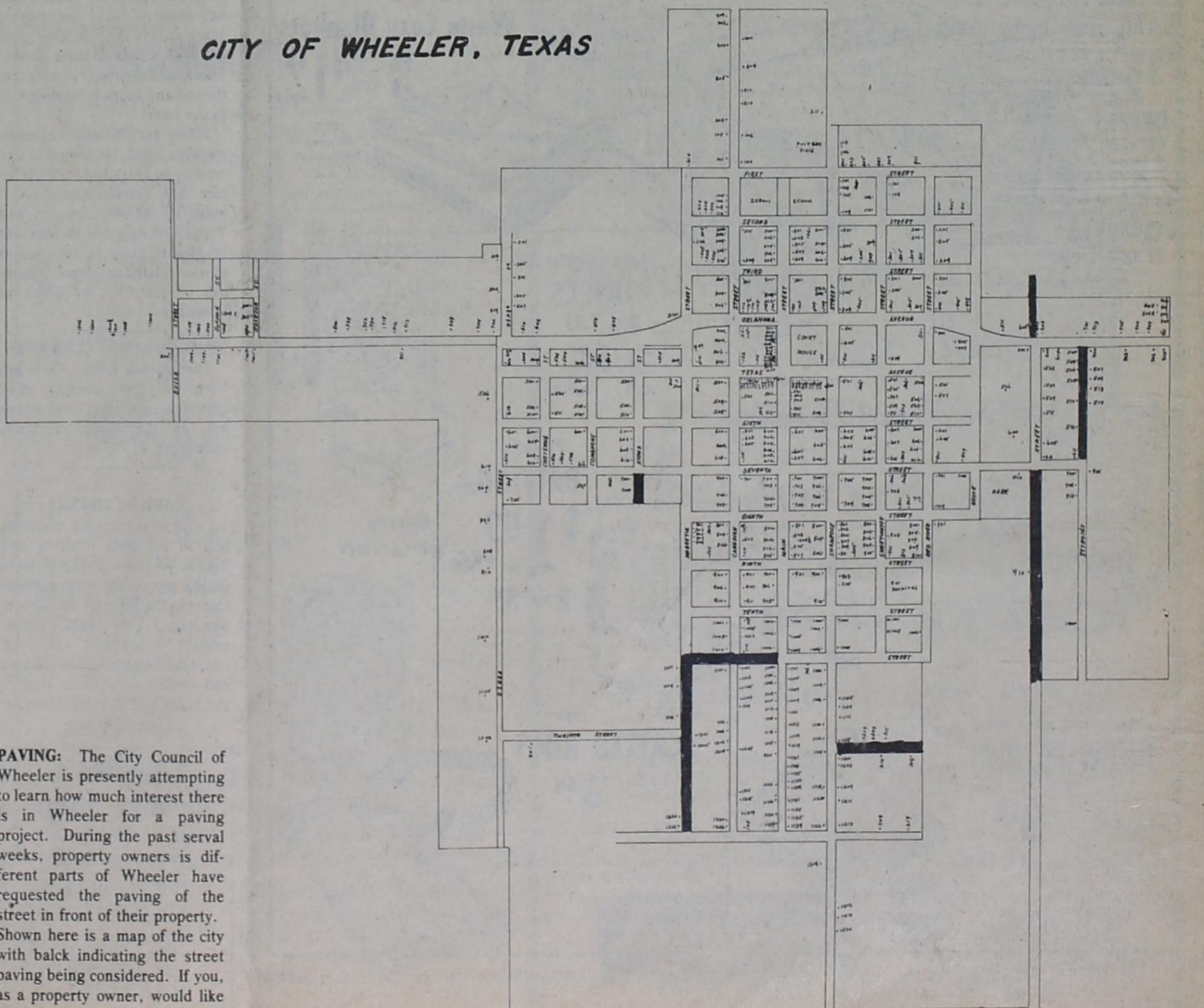

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WATER EROSION
Heavy rains this year caused many scenes like this in Wheeler County. Water erosion has been a major problem in Wheeler County this year. Ponds and terraces have been washed out and there are gullies where they had been filled in or had never been. This is a good time to look at some measures to control water erosion on grassland. Some of our rains were of such intensity that structures were not designed to hold that amount of water. These type rains come so infrequent that they can not be feasibly planned for.

On grassland most rains can be controlled by basin terraces. These are designed to go at the head of a gully and hold the water. After shaping they allow grass to become established before being washed out. Also they will control the erosion and keep the gully from starting again.

If the drainage is to large for a basin terrace a farm pond or a erosion control structure may be needed. A erosion control structure is basically a pond with a pipe through the dam. They allow the water to move at a safe rate out the pipe and control its velocity.

Another good method is proper grass management. Grass which has about 50% of the current years growth left will do a good job of slowing the water down. This allows the water to soak into the soil and keeps it for the grass to use later.

These are the most common methods used to control water erosion on grassland. The Wheeler Soil Conservation Service assisting the Wheeler Soil and Water Conservation District will be glad to assist in any area of erosion related problems. Please call or come by the office in Wheeler.

BOLLWORM SITUATION

Cotton producers in Wheeler County should be checking their fields for the presence of bollworms.

Treatment is considered economical when 8-10% of the green

squares show evidence of bollworm damage. After the first spraying this drops to 4-5% damage. Therefore, a producer should be certain he has enough bollworm damage to warrant spraying.

Fields should be checked twice weekly for the next few weeks. Peak bollworm numbers are expected late this week and next week.

WHITEGRUBS IN LAWNS

Homeowners should watch for whitegrub infestations in their lawns. The whitegrub, larval stage of the May or June beetle, causes damage by feeding on the grass roots.

Feeding of large numbers of grubs causes lawns to turn yellow in the affected sites. Positive identification of the damage is possible when the yellowed grass can be lifted easily by hand from the ground.

To determine whether grubs are present before such serious damage occurs, lawns can be checked by cutting then digging up 1-square-foot section of sod

and examining all of the roots and sod should be put back in place, pressed down and watered. Treatment is usually justified when more than four grubs per square foot are found.

Diazinon, in either granular or liquid form will control the grubs. The granular form may be easier to apply.

PESTICIDE APPLICATOR CERTIFICATION

Farmers and ranchers should remember that as of October 21, 1977, they will be required to show proof that they are certified, pesticide applicators to be able to purchase certain pesti-

cides, including some insecticides and herbicides.

Certification came by obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture in two ways. To qualify by the self-study method, producers can contact me for the study materials and test. After the producer reviews the study material, he completes the test and sends it to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

If there is enough interest, a meeting will be scheduled in which the material is presented in slide-tape sets. Those attending complete the test and then receive their certification

through the Texas Department of Agriculture.

SCREWWORM OUTLOOK

Only 35 causes of screwworms have been reported in Texas this year. With such few cases, Mission 77: Stamp Out Screwworms, has an excellent opportunity of achieving its goal. Ranches must continue their cooperation with the eradication program by following these 8 steps as outlined by USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service:

1. INSPECT animals regularly for cuts, scratches, and wounds.
2. MANAGE livestock to re-

duce injuries. Avoid surgery in warm seasons.

3. COLLECT larvae and egg masses for identification. Search deep in wounds for screwworms. In Texas send samples to: Screwworm Eradication Program, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. In other States send to appropriate State animal health laboratory.

4. TREAT wounds with an approved preparation labeled for this purpose. Reinspect wounds until healed.

5. SPRAY OR DIP herds with approved pesticides. Follow directions on the label.

6. OBSERVE restrictions on livestock shipments.

7. KNOW for sure that purchased animals are screwworm-free at point of origin.

8. TELL your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow these precautions.

Last year a number of screwworm cases from the Texas Panhandle occurred in pets. Pet owners should also send in eggs or maggots of suspected screwworm cases.

KING'S KOMMENTS

By Joe Don King, County Agent

SLEEPING SICKNESS
The following information comes from Dr. Gene Cope, Area Extension Veterinarian in his August Newsletter.

Sleeping sickness in horses is a disease that has been around for a long time. It occurs every summer; therefore, it is easy to become complacent and forget to vaccinate against it.

There have been 30 cases confirmed by the Amarillo Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory this year. Since every owner that has a horse die from sleeping sickness does not call a veterinarian and when a veterinarian is called he will not send in a sample on very animal with the disease, there are a lot more cases of sleeping sickness in the area than just these 30 reported cases.

The disease is caused by a virus. Antibiotics are not effective against this virus. Consequently, the response to treatment is not good. Approximately 50 percent of the horses infected with the western strain of virus die. Mortality with the eastern strain is 90 percent.

can occur from direct contact with an infected animal as well as blood sucking insects. Preventative vaccination is the best way to control these diseases. Vaccines are available now that contain eastern, western and Venezuelan strains in the same shot. It requires a series of two injections to produce good immunity. Animal vaccination is necessary to keep the animal protected adequately. The best time to vaccinate is in early spring before mosquitoes become active but if you have not vaccinated this year, I would suggest you do so since it will be another 2 to 3 months before a killing freeze.

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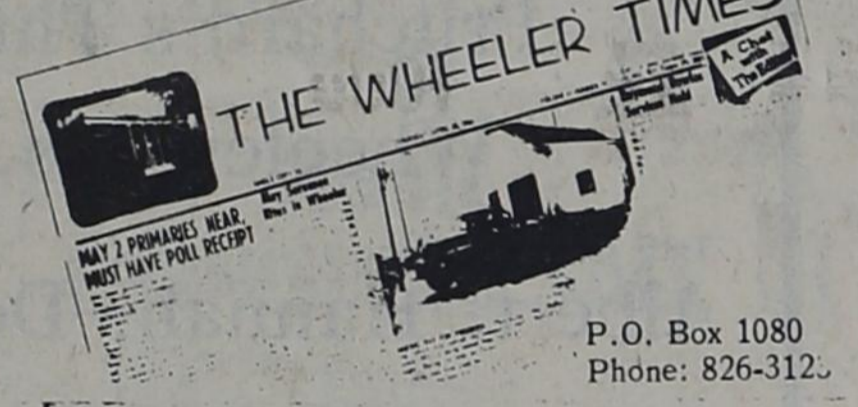

approximately 10 billion cubic feet of natural gas per year, making the gas available for higher priority uses.

The Pampa plant's boiler fuel coal will be shipped in from Western states, via Santa Fe Railroad, arriving every four days by unit trains of 75-100 cars, to meet the plant's 2,000 ton-per-day demand.

Mr. Steel said the new boiler facilities at Pampa will meet or exceed all state and federal environmental standards. All necessary permits and approvals have been obtained.

New boilers for the Celanese Pampa project will be supplied by Combustion Engineering, Brown & Root, the prime contractor, plans to have 300 contract workers engaged in construction by the end of 1977, with up to 500 expected at peak periods next year. When completed, the project will add some 30 to 40 permanent employees to the Pampa plant's current total of 325.

Mr. Steel said the Celanese Pampa plant will continue to purchase natural gas for non-substitutable uses, such as process gas and feedstock, from Pioneer Natural Gas Company, of Amarillo, its current supplier.

The Celanese Pampa plant, in operation since 1952, is the world's largest producer of acetic acid with an annual volume in excess of 500 million pounds per year. Celanese Chemical Company, an operating division of

Celanese Corporation, has three other plants in Texas—at Bishop, Bay City and Clear Lake.

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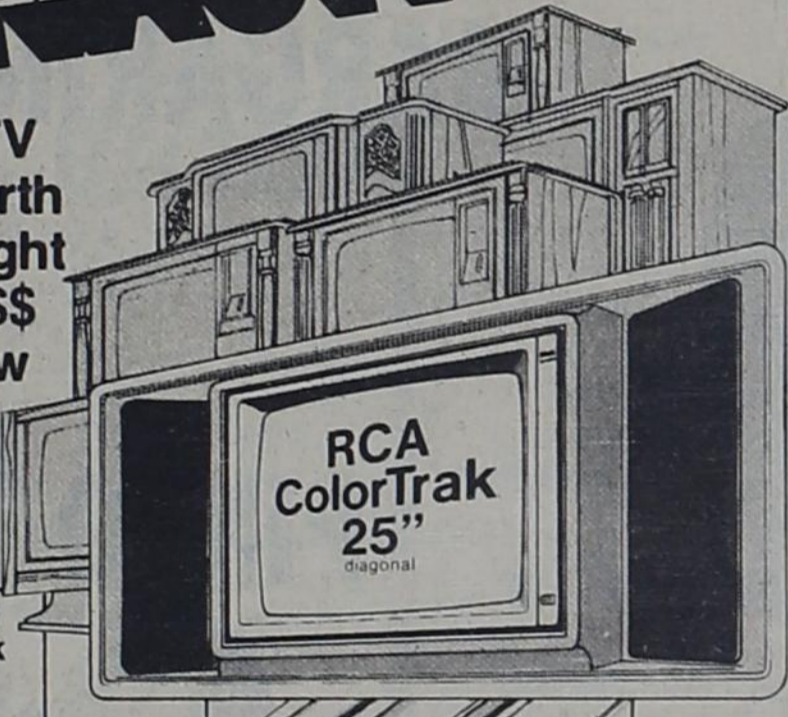

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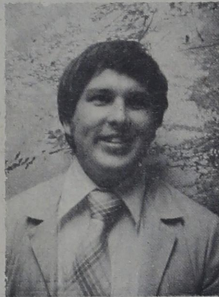
