



feasibly planned for. controlled by basin terraces. These are designed to go at the head of a gully and hold the water. After shaping they allow grass to become established before being washed out. Also they will controle the erosion and keep the gully from starting again.

If the drainage is to large for a basin terrace a farm pond or a erosion control structure may be needed. A erosion control structure is basically a pond with a pipe through the dam. They rate out the pipe and control its velocity.




