

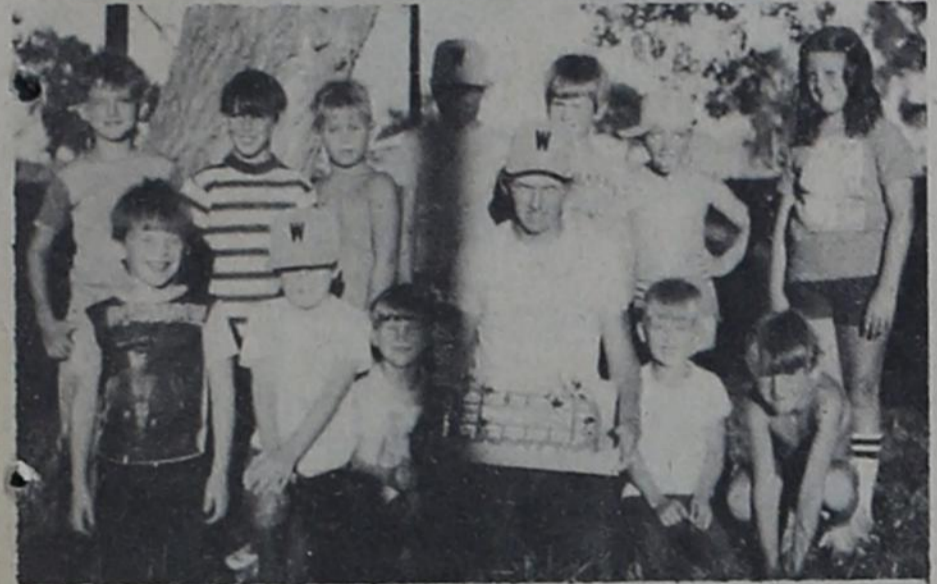

WHEELER RODEO BEGINS THURS.

FREE BARBEQUE WILL BE SERVED AT THE FIRST PERFORMANCE OF THE RODEO

The old west will come to life in Wheeler at the 22nd Annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo as it gets underway Thursday, July 21. Each night's performance of the Rodeo begins at 8:30 p.m. The rodeo is staged at the Rodeo Arena northeast of town. The annual barbecue will start the three days of festivities. The serving lines will be manned by members of the local Kiwanis Club. The feed is scheduled to begin at 6:00.

A crowd of 1500 is expected to be on hand to hold out their plates as they go through the 'chow line'. The menu for the evening will be barbecue beef, sauce, brown beans, onions, pickles, peaches, bread, and iced tea. The meal is free to each person buying a ticket to the first night's performance of the rodeo. Approximately 1500 lbs. of beef is being prepared to feed the crowd Thursday evening. 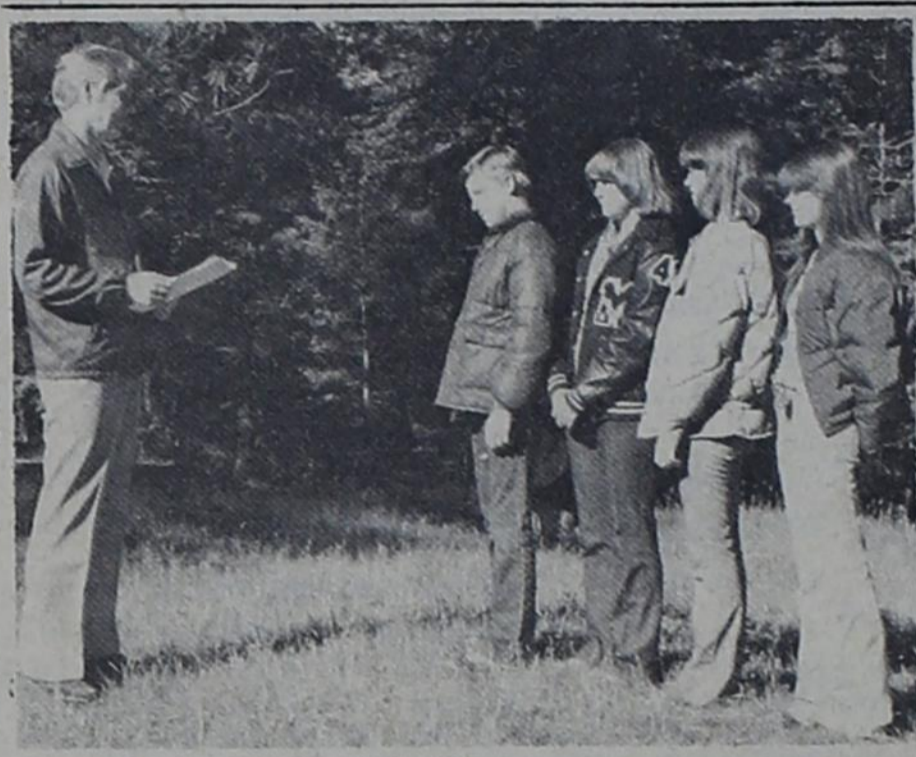

Seven Accidents In County In June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of June, 1977 according to Sergeant James Powell, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1977 shows a total of 33 accidents resulting in one persons killed and 20 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety: Region for June, 1977 shows a total of 558 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 355 persons injured as compared to June, 1976, with 560 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 338 persons injured. This was two less accidents, five more killed, and 17 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

The 15 traffic deaths for the month of June, 1977 occurred in the following counties: Six each in Wise; one each in Bailey, Hale, Lubbock, Parker, Young, Nickell, Lefors, Texas; John and Fackie Harris, Julie and John Paul, Ackley, Texas; Larry and Niona Turney, Amarillo, Texas; Kenneth and Mary K. Nickel, Melanie and Rodney, Lefors, Texas; Coley and Jeanna Sims, Roswell, New Mexico; Graham and Nina McLerran, Cameron, Texas.

LETTER to the EDITOR

What value do we place on our family and home? I ask the question in regard to the effect the Volunteer Fire Department has on the City of Wheeler. In a recent City Council meeting the members voted down the minimum water bill for firemen. As it was stated in a recent article from The Wheeler Times on the council meeting, "Recognizing the time spent and effort put forth by the firemen, the council voted down the request."

What about the time and effort put forth by the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department—is it myth or fact? Each volunteer fireman puts in an average of 132 hours per year not including Fire Schools at Texas A&M University, Pampa, Canyon and various other schools. These schools train firemen through an Extracurricular Course, 15 hrs.; Arson Course, 9 hrs.; and actual on the job training. Of the 22 paid firemen now on the department, over half do not receive their pay. Rather they return the money to the Fire Department General Fund to cover repair costs and buy equipment.

However, looking at the 3-4 hours spent at meetings each month by approximately 6 council members and comparing that with the 2-3 hours spent by 22 volunteer firemen at fire drills twice a month there seems to be some question as to the priorities set by the city council.

Another matter to consider in the responsibilities of the firemen is the constant danger of injury or loss of life in the line of duty. Can the same be said of city council members? Why after all the time and effort that has been put forth do the firemen not receive the backing of the city council? Re-membering that the city fire department is a volunteer organization it is amazing they do not have the moral support and backing of more of the citizens of Wheeler. After all it is our families and homes they are protecting.

Burglars Enter Shamrock Business

Three Shamrock men were charged and placed in the Wheeler County Jail in connection with the burglary of Whites Auto Store in Shamrock on July 8, 1977. Two remain in jail at this time while one has been released on bond according to the sheriffs office officials.

The men charged are Robert Moon, Lewis Moon, Jr., and David Palacio. The three were arrested late Friday night of July 8, 1977.

Taken from the store were two revolving watch cases containing between 25 to 30 watches each. Entry was gained to the store by breaking out the window on the north side.

Officers were notified of the burglary at 6:40 a.m. July 8, 1977. At 4:00 p.m. 2 Shamrock men found the empty display cases and the individual watch cases in a creek bed east of Shamrock. Later that afternoon an informant told local officers where the watches were located which led to the arrest of the three shamrock residents.

After obtaining a search warrant for a 1970 Pontiac Lemans, in the possession of Robert Moon, 48 Timex Watches were recovered.

The burglary was investigated by Sheriff Deputies, David Johnson and Art Taylor, constable, Jerry Bob Jernigan, Shamrock Patrolman, Kelly Locke, and DPS Troopers, Don Copeland and L. B. Snider.

APPLIANCE INSTALLATION COSTS

A consumer "checkout" on appliance installation costs—or non-costs—can add more realism to buying decisions.

Following is an appliance installation checklist:

Cooking Appliances

Gas Range—"piped" natural gas or LP delivery service plus a gas line to the kitchen. Natural gas installation may be least costly if you already have gas heating or gas water heating.

Electric range—220 volt service from your electric service "box" to the range site. Built-in ovens, countertop units and "set-in" ranges will also require cabinet work, of course.

Microwave ovens—no special installation for portable types.

Portable cooking appliance—normally no special installation.

Indoor Comfort Appliances

Room Air conditioner—no special wiring needed for small units, but separate 110-volt circuit or 220-volt service will be required for units with "BTU" cooling output higher than 7,000 and "amp" ratings higher than 7.5.

Humidifiers and dehumidifiers—no special wiring requirements, but location of humidifier is important for best performance. A dehumidifier should be placed where excess humidity problem is greatest, such as in basement.

Food Preservation Appliances

Refrigerator and freezer—no special wiring requirements. But be sure doors and stairways are wide enough and floors strong enough for larger appliances. Also be sure door can be fully opened.

Kitchen Cleanup Appliances

Dishwasher—no special wiring or plumbing required for portable type, but be sure it has a storage place when not in use. Built-in units require special wiring and plumbing. This work should be done professionally.

Disposer—special wiring and plumbing are required.

Compactors—portable type

requires no special installation. Wiring and cabinet work probably will be needed for built-in models.

Home Laundry Appliances

Washer—requires no special wiring but a separate 15-amp circuit is desirable—and hot and cold water and drain facilities are essential.

Electric Dryer—all but smallest types will need 220-volt electric service.

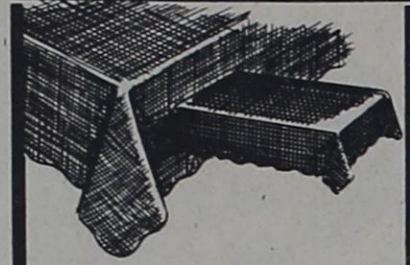

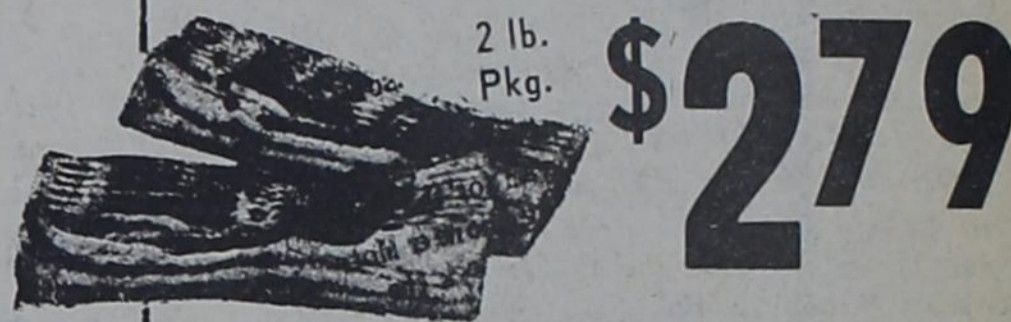

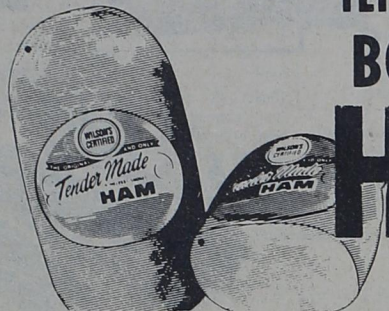
