'Tex. Folk Songs' New at Library

The Wheeler Public Library announces today the receipt of "Texas Folk Songs by William A. Owens, a gift of Southern Methodist University Press and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities. "Texas Folk Songs includes 135 songs, a number of them in versions by more than one singer. The book is divided into nine chapters containing British popular ballads, Anglo-American ballads, Anglo-American love songs, Anglo-American comic songs, songs and games for children, play-party songs and games, Anglo-American spirituals, and Afro-American secular songs.

The British ballads were brought to America in the seventeenth century and later carried westward to Texas by the adventurous pioneers who settled the state. The later American love ballads are mournful and plaintive songs, while the Anglo-American comic songs are full of raw, rugged and raucous humor exemplifying the pioneer west.

New music transcriptions of the melodies have been provided by musicologist Jessie Ann Owens from the original recordings. Although bibliographical source notes are included, "Texas Folk Songs" is not a book just for scholars. These songs have been collected, as Owens has written, "for those who love to sing them as well as for those who have an interest in the past".

Drouth Loans Are Available at FmHA

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will receive applications until September 30, 1977, under special loan programs initiated by President Jimmy Carter to assist farms and improve community water systems affected by prolonged drought.

FmHA County Supervisor, Barry D. Altman, said the application deadline was designated by a federal interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Committee in naming areas eligible for benefits of the special programs. Wheeler County is among the areas designated.

FmHA farm emergency loans covering losses from drought and providing additional credit needed to restore production are available to farmers who lack other sources of credit. Loans, which may be supplemented by grants, are available for emergency measures such as deepening or drilling new wells to improve community water systems adversely affected by drought.

Another deadline applies to emergency water system projects: they must be completed by November 30, 1977.

Altman said the FmHA office for Wheeler County at 110 West Oklahoma in Wheeler, can supply further information on terms of the special drought emergency programs.

PRITCHARD'S BURGLARIZED

TOTAL LOSS, DAMAGES ESTIMATED AT \$1500

Pritchard's Thriftway in Wheeler was burglarized early Monday morning, July 4. Entry was gained through the front door with damage estimated at \$450. \$1,000 in merchandise, food stamps and silver were taken.

The burglary was discovered around 8:00 A.M. County Sheriff Doyle Ramsey was called. Ramsey reported \$153.91 in silver, \$577 in food stamps and other merchandise were taken. Four to five persons are believed to be involved in the incident.

The burglary in Wheeler is believed to be connected to an earlier burglary Monday in Cantrell's Farm Center was entered and the knob was knocked off the safe, but access to the contents of the safe was not gained.

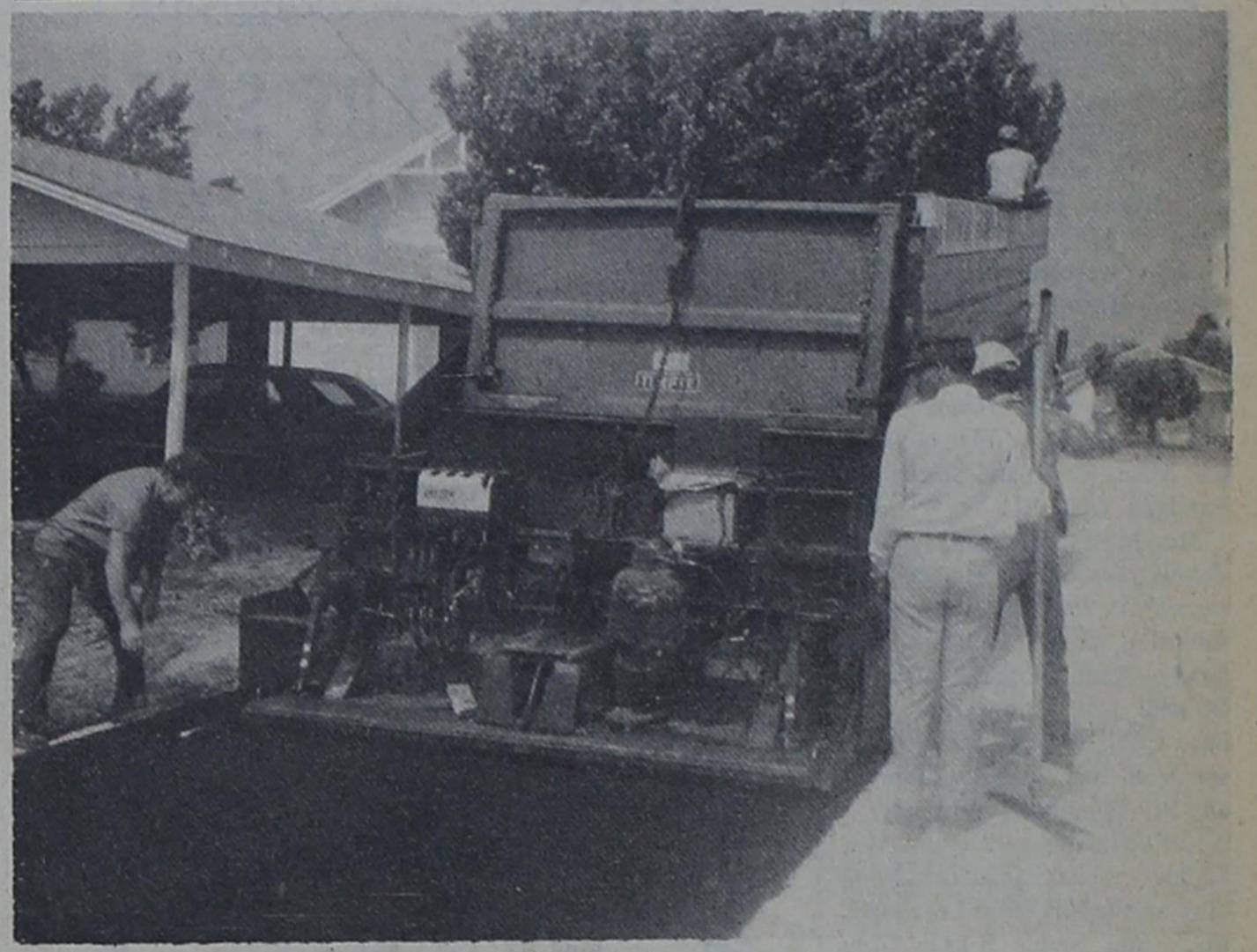

GLENN TAYLOR RECEIVES VIKING AWARD

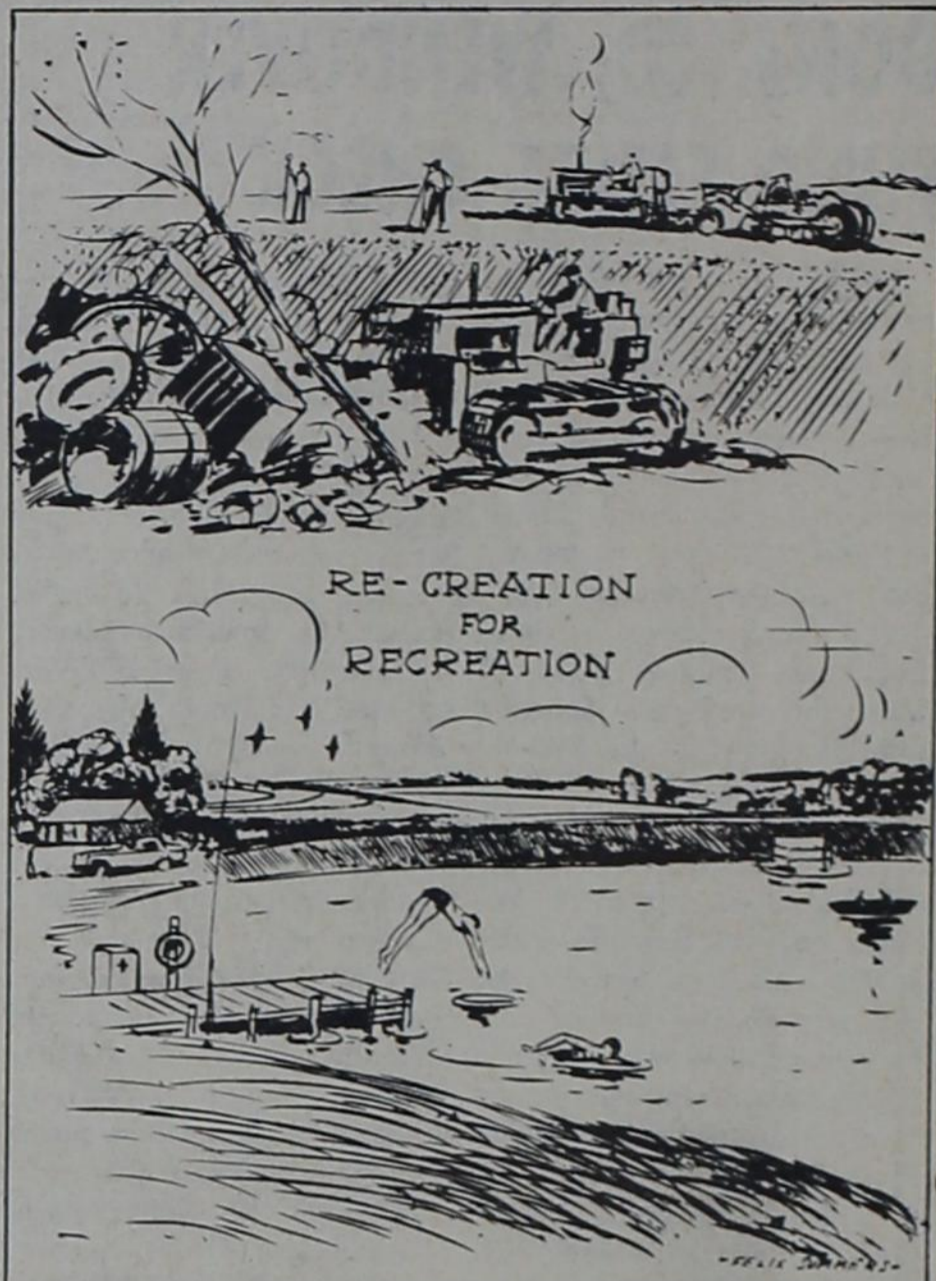
A special Viking Project Awards Ceremony, held recently at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California, saw the presentation by retiring NASA Administrator James C. Fletcher of a number of special achievement awards to group and individuals who made special contributions to the success of last year's explorations of Mars by the Viking landers and orbiters. Among the NASA medals pre-

sent were the Exceptional Scientific Achievement Medal, award for "...unusually significant scientific accomplishments which contribute to the programs of NASA. This award may be given to an individual whose creative efforts are of high order and who has made important contributions to science and related technology, either as a scientist or as a member of a team." A recipient of the Exceptional Scientific Achievement Medal at this ceremony was Glenn R. Taylor, a native of Reydon, Oklahoma. He is the son of Lila Taylor and the late Wayne Taylor of Reydon and the grandson of the late Hank and May Miller. He was a graduate of Reydon High School and Southwestern State College. Since then he has been employed by the NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia. Taylor, his wife Sandy, the former Sandra Morris of Wakefield, Virginia, and their two children are currently residing in La Canada, California, near the location of Viking Mission Control. Taylor was cited for "In recognition of his exceptional contributions to the design, development and operations of the Viking Lander Cameras. His achievements as Lander Camera Manager and as a leader of the Imaging Team assured the spectacular photography that vastly increased our scientific knowledge of Mars."

been on the surface of Mars since July 20 and September 3, 1976, respectively. Both the Viking landers and the two Viking orbiters continue today returning data about Mars. The Viking missions were hailed by the retiring Administrator as "...the most advanced technical enterprise ever attempted by Man so far...". The Viking missions are planned to continue through May 1978. Viking is managed by NASA by the NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia. Mission operations are conducted from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. JPL was also responsible for the design and manufacture of the Viking orbiters.

STRUCTURE OF TEXAS BANKING SHIFTS FOR GROWTH

Although gains in deposits at Texas banks have been coming nearly twice as fast as gains in deposits nationwide, deposit growth is only part of the change going on in Texas banking.

Through expansion of multi-bank holding companies, the state has more big banking organizations than a few years ago. And through these organizations, banks can do more for some customers than they once could.

There has long been concern that banks in Texas were not large enough to meet the needs of the big corporations headquartered here.

Because Texas bars branch banking, it has always had a lot

of banks. For years, the number has been around 1,300, which is nearly a tenth of all banks in the United States.

And because growth in demand for bank services has always prompted the starting of new banks, many have been small.

But some of the constraints on growth of banking organizations has been overcome through formation of multibank holding companies. Through this device, consolidation of bank resources has been underway for several years. By late last year, 34 of these companies had been formed in Texas. Together, they had 231 bank subsidiaries.

That was less than a fourth of the banks in the state. But they accounted for well over half the deposits.

Only New York and California have more banks in that category. California has five of the 30 biggest. New York has nine.

These four biggest Texas Banks belong to companies that hold four out of ten of the subsidiary banks in the state. Between them, the four parent companies have a deposit base of \$13.3 billion. That is a fourth of the deposits.

And yet, for all this consolidation, with the growth of business in Texas, the number of banks has increased. At the beginning of the year, the state had 1,363, compared with 1,266 three years before.

And the average deposit size of banks increased from \$31 million in late 1973 to \$39 million in late 1976.

Included among these subsidiaries are most of the big banks in the state. The lead banks of the holding companies, for example, account for a third of the deposits in the state, which means the other 197 subsidiaries account for about a sixth.

There are now 78 banks in Texas with deposits over \$100 million. Just three years ago, there were only 51 banks that big.

Inflation has contributed to the expansion, boosting deposits at nearly all banks. But with the backing of large banking organizations, some have grown more than others.

Texas has 36 banks with deposits over \$200 million, nearly half again more than three years ago. And that includes six with deposits over \$1 billion.

Four Texas banks rank among the 30 biggest in the country.

Safe Boating Week, July 3-9
LUBBOCK—Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed July 3-9 as "Safe Boating Week." In the proclamation, the governor cited the importance of boating safety as individuals head for the many lakes and streams across Texas. Figures compiled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the water safety regulating agency, show over 498,889 boats registered by April 1977 in Texas. With this number of boats ready to hit the water over the 4th of July holiday weekend, the P&WD predicts 25 individuals will lose their lives from water-related mishaps. The increase in the number of water fatalities is climbing at a faster rate than the number of registered boats and PW&D wardens will be out in full force during the holiday period. The most flagrant violation noted by the wardens has been the insufficient number or entire lack of Coast Guard-approved life vests for each person on board. State laws require these CG-approved vests on all public waters and persons 12 years of age and younger are required to wear the CG-approved vest at all times while underway. Local lakes might have more restrictive rules concerning life vests and boaters are reminded to check these local regulations before putting afloat. Boating regulations concerning proper equipment and safe operation of your boat can be found in the "Digest of the Texas Water Safety Act" available at most boat marinas, boat dealers and all P&WD offices.

Summer 'Kitchen Escape' Plan
Summertime "Kitchen escape" tactics are easy—and still allow for nutritious menus. Following is a 10-point "kitchen escape" plan:

1. Prepare gelatin desserts—they're easy to prepare and to eat.
2. Use the outdoor grill for the entire meal including vegetables and breads.
3. Serve one-dish meals such as casseroles—and round out the menu with a cool salad and

packaged bread.
4. Plan menus that cook in the oven at one temperature—this eliminates the extra heat of surface burners.
5. If you have a microwave oven—use it!
6. Prepared your main dish in a slow cooker. Serve vegetables and salads that don't require cooking and last minute preparations.
7. Serve cold meat salads as a main dish for a change.
8. Do baking in the early part

of the day while temperatures are still relatively cool.
9. Serve fresh fruits in season for dessert.
10. Eat out—you deserve a break!

Outdoor Cookery

I. Why Cook Outdoors?
A. A form of family recreation
B. A pleasant way to entertain
C. Provides variety-spices up ordinary meals
D. All members of the family can share in cooking and clean-up
E. It taste so good
II. Keys to Successful Outdoor Cooking:
A. Plan your meal around the meat to be cooked
B. Remember outdoor appetites call for extra servings, so allow more food than for indoor meals
C. Plan outdoor meals as carefully as other meals. Use Food for Fitness, a Daily Food Guide, when planning. This publication is available from your county Agricultural Extension Service Office.
D. Serve grilled meat with a cooked vegetable, crisp relishes or salad, bread, dessert and a beverage.
E. Use charcoal or a hardwood like hickory for fuel. Avoid the use of wood that will give food an objectional odor or flavor.
F. A fire is ready when the charcoal is covered with gray ash or when the flames of a hardwood fire have died down. A good bed of coals cooks food evenly.

G. As your meat cooks control flames from coals by sprinkling with water.
H. A successful outdoor meal should be simple and easy to prepare.
Barbecue Sauces and Marinades
1 Medium size onion, chopped
2 T. butter
2 T. vinegar
2 T. sugar
4 T. lemon juice
1 c. tomato catsup
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 t. ground mustard
½ c. finely cut celery
½ c. water
salt and pepper
Brown onion in butter. Then add remaining ingredients and cook until flavors are well blended. Use for basting and serve with meat.

Sauce For Chicken

1 onion grated
3 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 T. mustard
1 c. catsup
salt
2 T. vinegar
1½ T. tabasco sauce
4 T. Lemon juice
1 c. water
¼ lb. butter
Melt butter and add other ingredients. Heat until boiling.

Pineapple Mint Barbecue Lamb Chops

1 can (8¾ ounces) crushed pineapple
¼ c. hones
½ t. salt
2 T. finely chopped mint
2 T. butter
4 shoulder lamb chops
Combine undrained pineapple, mint, honey, butter, and salt. Cook over low heat, stirring frequently, to boiling point. Brush lamb with mixture.

Texas Barbecue Sauces

¼ c. sugar
2 T. prepared mustard
1 c. catsup or tomato past
2 t. paprika
2 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
¼ c. worcestshire sauce
1 ½ c. vinegar
2 t. salt
¼ t. pepper
2 medium onions, chopped
Combine ingredients and heat for 30 minutes slowly.
1 t. sugar
¼ t. dry mustard
2 t. salt
½ t. black pepper
2 T. worcestshire sauce
2 c. tomato juice
½ c. lemon juice or vinegar
¼ c. margarine or salad oil
Mix sugar, mustard, salt, pepper in sauce pan. Add Worcestershire sauce, tomato juice, lemon juice and butter. Heat to boiling.

Sauce for Spare Ribs

½ c. tomato catsup
2 or 3 dashes Tabasco sauce
¼ c. vinegar
1 t. salt
½ c. chili sauce
1 c. water
1 T. sugar
1 t. celery seed
Combine all ingredients, heat to boiling, and then simmer 30 minutes.

Smoky Barbecue Sauce

¼ c. brown sugar
¼ c. vinegar
½ c. catsup
½ c. water
2 T. Soy Sauce
2 T. Worcestershire
1 T. prepared mustard
1 medium onion, chopped
¼ c. salad oil
2 T. liquid smoke
¼ t. coarsely ground pepper
¼ t. cayenne pepper
1½ t. salt
Mix all ingredients in sauce pan and simmer slowly for 30 minutes.

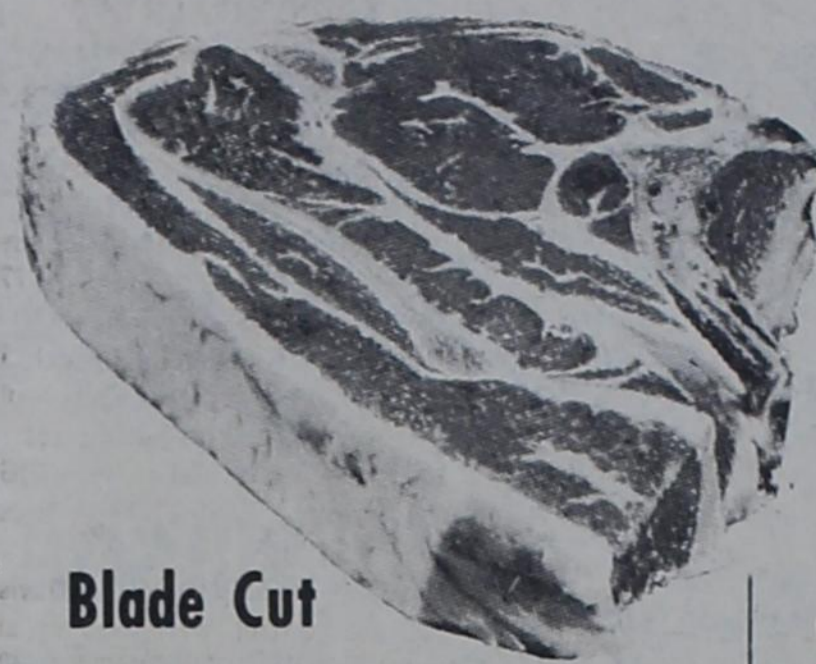

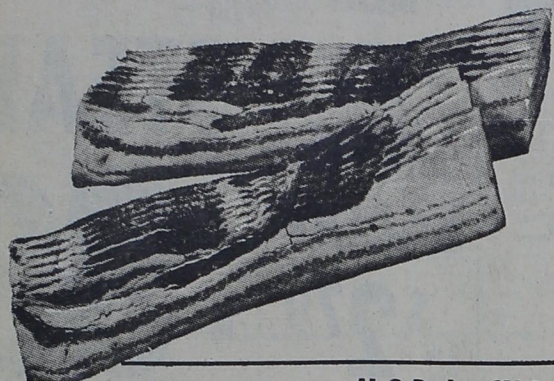
