OLD GLORY

To the Editor:
According to School Law 18A—36-3, the Pledge of Allegiance and the Flag Salute should be carried out every school day. Students should stand at attention and salute the flag during the pledge. A revision was made in 1966 to permit those whose religious or political beliefs, if I recall correctly, to omit the flag salute.

Before World War II, I permitted this exception to religious groups while I was serving as principal of a small rural school, while other schools in Texas were suspending students who failed to render the flag salute. I am sure all of your readers know that it takes more than the flag salute to be a good citizen, yet I cannot condone those who show disrespect for our flag.

I recall teaching with an ex-basketball player from West Texas State back in the days they were known as the "tallest team in America". He was almost blind, suffering from a wound during WW II. He gave so much for his country, and yet so many students, today, won't give 60 seconds of their time. What is equally as bad, if not worse, parents—at least some—will back their children. What is worse, in my opinion, is that free legal counsel using the name "America," is given. If this kind of philosophy continues to grow, the United States will never see a Tri-Centennial.

I have always shown respect to foreign governments' flags in countries in which I visited as a

service man, assuming we were on friendly terms, even religious flags. My old ship, the USS Patoka (AO9), flew the flag, day or night, while underway. During five typhoons off Okinawa and Japan in 1945, we used a lot of flags. To see "Old-Glory" flying overhead when the sun came up was a beautiful sight. In those days many service men did not live through the night to see the flag.

To bring charges against a principal and/or a teacher for trying to uphold the laws of this state is one of the more ridiculous things the American Civil Liberties Union has done. I cannot think of any action this group has done in which I am in full accord.

SENIOR CITIZENS To Meet

The Senior Citizens of Wheeler will meet with a covered dish meal at 6:30 July 4th, 1977 in the Senior Citizens home with the Baptist hosting the evening entertainment.

North Wheeler County Hospital District is in the process of improving facilities at Parkview Hospital and Clinic with no increase in taxes for the citizens of the district. Office space is being added to both the hospital and clinic and additional parking is being provided at the facilities.

Highest on the list of priorities is the completion of the offices for Dr. Robert C. Galutia. The present clinic will be extended 14 feet to the west with the addition going the full 56 foot length of the building. This will provide office space, a larger waiting area and restroom facilities adjacent to the waiting room. Workmen were well on the way to completing the laying of blocks Tuesday afternoon.

The additional space at Parkview will provide additional office space for bookkeeping and storage for files. This addition will be at the front of the hospital.

Patrons or visitors at the hospital and clinic will find additional parking space. Sidewalks have been run and space provided for the parking of 26 more cars at the northwest corner of the block. The parking area can be used even though the blacktop has not been laid.

The contracts for the projects at the hospital were awarded to Big B Builders of Wheeler.

ROGUE THEATRE SOLD, WILL RE-OPEN SOON

Rogue Theatre, the building and fixtures, has been sold by the Guthries to Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Nall of Oklahoma City. The sale was completed the latter part of last week and it is planned to open the theatre in the near future.

This week sees the beginning of the rebuilding of a business that has been in Wheeler a number of years, but has been closed for a few years. The Nalls have begun working on the remodeling of the building, but no date has been set for the opening of the business.

In comments about the sale, Mrs. Laura Guthrie, stated she had no idea when the movie business began in Wheeler. The Guthries bought the theatre in

1930 and installed the equipment for the first talking pictures in Wheeler; they operated the theatre until 1964 when they ceased operation. The facilities were leased and the theatre operated for a number of years after 1964.

Mr. and Mrs. Nall are teachers by profession, and plan to continue as such. They have two sons attending Oklahoma State University at Stillwater; one of the sons, Richard, will be manager of the Theatre.

Mr. Nall is not altogether a stranger to the movie business; he has previously been associated with film companies in Oklahoma City.

Mrs. Nall is the daughter of Ray Brown, former postmaster at Allison, and the late Mrs. Brown.

Charles Hix Named Chairman

Charles Hix has accepted the position of Easter Seal Treatment and Service Chairman for Wheeler County. The appointment was announced by Irving A. Baker, Dallas, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Last year, the Society aided 10,768 Texans through an information, referral and follow-up program; physical, speech and hearing therapies; orthopedic equipment purchase and loan; and related aids. The 46-year old non-profit health agency is active year-round in all 254 counties in Texas in attempting to reach all physically disabled Texans who need information and/or assistance. The Easter Seal program helps every disabled Texas child and adult have an equal opportunity at an independent and normal way of life.

Mr. Hix can be contacted by a disabled person or the person's family for the required, simple and confidential patient referral form. The forms are available at Parkview Hospital.

There are no fees for these services and persons needing assistance are urged to apply.

The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 11 treatment or rehabilitation centers which treat physically handicapped children and adults who cannot pay the costs of their disabilities and who are not eligible for help for any other source. The Society has provided care and treatment in the state since 1929 and is the oldest voluntary health agency serving physically disabled Texans. The program is supported by the traditional Spring Easter Seal Appeal and an annual Fall Membership drive.

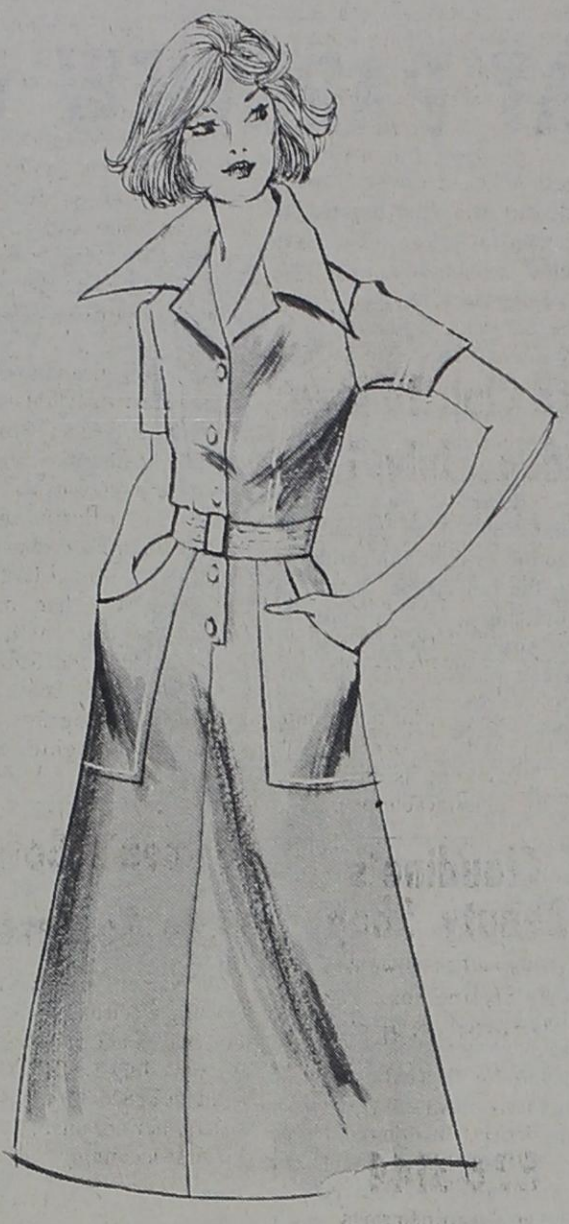

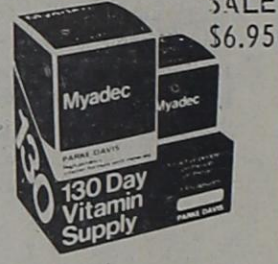

Home Improvements

To make home improvements be "just that," consumers should follow some simple precautions.

--Before calling a contractor, know what you need done.

This will help identify the work you believe most important--and it will help make sure you don't "get talked into" additional jobs.

--Get at least three estimates on any job.

Be sure the estimates are comparable, that each contains what will be done, and that each says exactly how much the entire job will cost.

--Before deciding on a contractor, check out the firm's reputation.

Check that the company has a permanent place of business in the community--an itinerant contractor will not be around later to handle complaints.

Request references from the company--and check them out. Ask other customers if they were satisfied with that company's work.

--After deciding on a contractor, carefully read the contract that is drawn up.

Don't sign a contract with any blank spaces--and do not sign a contract before reading it.

Be sure the contract spells out what is to be done, the starting and completion dates, types of materials, the total cost, and has a provision outlining who is responsible in case of an accident by an employee or damage to your property.

--Never hand over payment for the entire job in advance.

Pay at the end of the job--or make only a small down payment in advance, if necessary. Another alternative is paying in portions--as the job is completed.

WEATHER STRIPPING

Worn weather stripping on doors and windows is easy to detect and replace--to prevent air seepage and cut cooling costs.

A few simple tests point out weather stripping needs.

First, look around--one quick signal of a problem is dust accumulation around door openings--and on window sills and sashes.

Next, test for worn weather stripping by slowly moving a single tissue around doors and windows on a windy day, checking both the top and bottom window sash. If the tissue flutters, seepage is almost certain.

Another test lets light detect seepage. Shine a flashlight outside window and door edges on a dark night, and someone inside the house can spot areas the light penetrates.

Only after the worn part is located, can homeowners select and effectively use new weather stripping material.

Select weather stripping according to its exact use for saving energy.

Materials for weather stripping are available as a roll or in kits complete with fasteners.

Four basic types of weather stripping currently on the market

are pliable gaskets, rigid strip gaskets, spring metal strips, and threshold weather stripping for doors. Some are concealed--and others, mounted on window and door surfaces, are visible.

Pliable gaskets such as adhesive-backed foam, felt, and vinyl are available in rolls--and attach with brads, staples, or by their

own adhesion. These flexible gaskets are highly visible. If painted, the gaskets may harden and become ineffective.

Pliable gaskets are more effective on doors than on windows--and although they are inexpensive, they lack durability.

Most rigid strip gaskets are rolled vinyl with an aluminum strip backing or a non-absorbent sponge attached to wood. Both types are durable, easy to install and are visible. It is "okay" to paint the wood or metal--but not the gasket.

Spring metal strips of bronze, aluminum, or copper are easily attached to doors or window frames with brads. This type of metal weather stripping provides good draft control and is extremely durable--although it may make doors difficult to open and close.

Threshold weather stripping eliminates drafts at the bottom of the outside doors. Three types are available and come in ready-to-install kits. The most inexpensive and easy to install are metal and have felt strips which drape a flexible edge against the existing threshold.

Another type is the complete metal threshold--use it to replace a worn threshold. Some have a raised vinyl inset which forms a seal when the door closes.

The most expensive threshold weather stripping is the automatic door bottom. This mechanism allows a metal strip to spring upward and clear carpeting. These units are more difficult to install.

In general, remember that unless doors and windows fit properly, weather stripping will not effectively stop air leakage

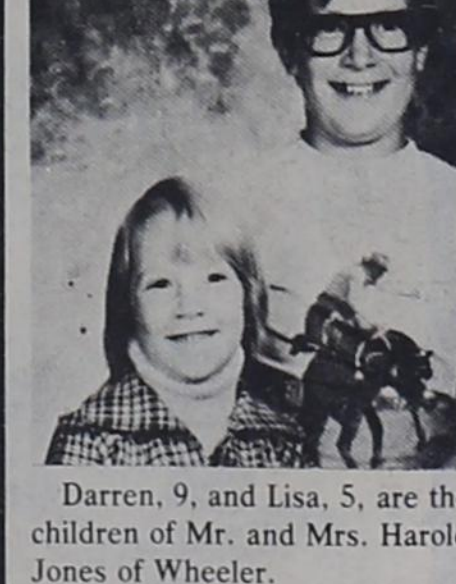

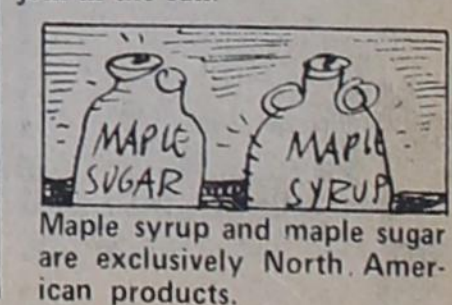

EASTER SEAL REPORT

The Texas Easter Seal Society with its network of affiliate treatment centers and volunteer chapters and representatives provided, in the year ending August 31, 1976, some 485,215 units of appropriate therapies to 11,726 handicapped children and adults of Texas. This is an increase of 958 disabled citizens served in 1976.

This growth in needed services requires a concurrent growth in public support. Total income to the Texas Easter Seal Society and its affiliates increased by \$668,581. This represented an increase of 25% over the previous year. It is this measure of support, reflecting as it does public confidence in the programs of the Easter Seal Society, which made it possible for handicapped Texans children and adults to receive needed therapies, equipment and services.

The Easter Seal Action Line program initiated in June of 1976, and provides information, referral, and follow-up services to the disabled of the state has proven to be a much needed and very successful service. Beginning last June with only 22 calls a month, the Action Line is receiving an average of 225 calls today. This service is designed to serve as a link between the handicapped and those services needed. With just a call, persons can receive assistance in locating services they need, where it can be obtained and who can provide it for them.

"Actually, the need to spend additional money in establishing new service programs is not as important as we would suspect," stated William E. Russell, Executive Director of the Texas Easter Seal Society, "but a more effective use of current budgeted programs is needed through a referral service such as the "Easter Seal Action Line."

The fact of such increase prompts the Easter Seal Society of Texas to constantly evaluate the needs of the handicapped; to strive not to duplicate existing resources; to advocate for the needs of the disabled; and, to identify unmet needs.

Easter Seal Action Line, a 24 hour, toll-free number (1-800-492-5555), can be used by any disabled person and their families to obtain information regarding help they may need. The public is reminded that if they are handicapped, or if they know of anyone who is handicapped and is in need of help in locating a needed service, call the Easter Seal Action Line's toll-free number 1-800-492-5555, night or day, seven days a week.

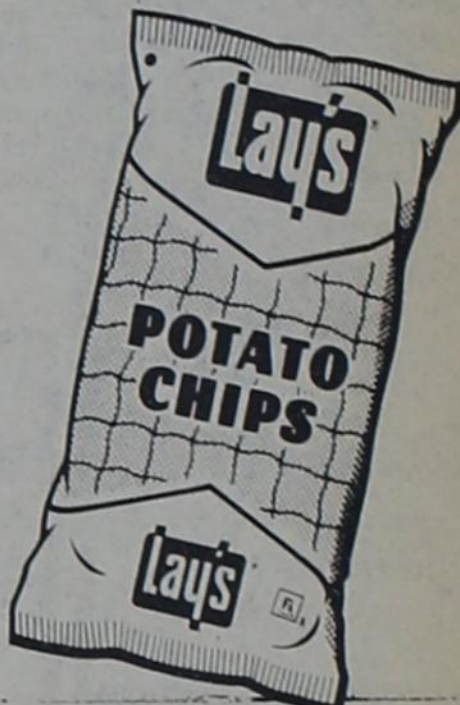

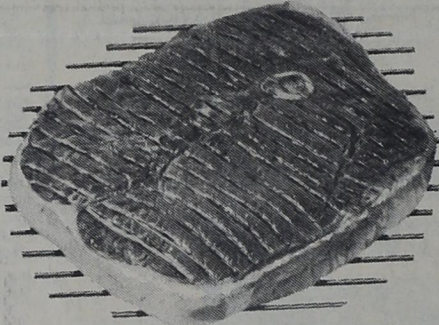
