Father's Day: A Special Time

On one day each year—Father's Day—we pause to honor the man who spends every day working tirelessly for his family. Dad, Pop, Papa—no matter what we call him, we owe him a lot. "For this reason," say Shirley Green, president, Top O'Texas CowBelles, "June 19 is that special day dedicated to that special someone—Dad." This year marks the 68th official celebration of Father's Day. The first time it was celebrated was in 1910, largely through the efforts of the woman who first conceived a special day for father, Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Washington. The idea grew (although it did not become an official holiday until 1972) because honoring father was another way of honoring the family itself. "It was only natural that Beef—America's

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new home of the First National Bank in Wheeler were held Tuesday, June 14, 1977. The 4:00 p.m. ceremony was on the site of the new building at 405 Alan L. Bean Blvd.

Miss Esther Sorensen, a Wheeler County Pioneer, had the honor of turning the first shovel of dirt. Charles R. Brown, president of the Bank, was in charge of the ceremony and took his turn at the shovel with the other members of the board.

Construction of the Bank will begin within two weeks. The contract was let last week with High Plains Builders of Amarillo being selected to build the structure. Total expenditure by the local bank will be \$775,000 when the building is completed, landscaped and furnished.

In her short talk, Miss Sorensen reminisced attending school in Wheeler when Sweetwater Creek wasn't too high to cross. She expressed thanks to the directors of the First National Bank in Wheeler for their confidence in the future growth and development of Wheeler and the Wheeler area.

Charles R. Brown gave a brief history of the First National Bank in Wheeler. The Citizens State Bank was organized in 1908 with John Holt, Britt Lee, Bronson Holt, Sam Holt, Judge Reynolds, J. E. Stanley, Green Porter, Jim Porter and E. E. Holt on the Board of Directors.

The First National Bank in Wheeler came into being in April 1950. The Bank changed ownership in 1970 and Brown was

named President. In 1970, the decision was made to build new facilities when deposits reached \$10 million. At the time, resources stood at \$3.5 million and have since climbed to 11.5 million. The directors began looking at property for the new building in January, 1976; the decision was made, land pur-

For the actual ground breaking, each member of the board was handed an initialed, gold shovel by Mrs. Charles R. Brown.

Most of the original directors were represented by members of their family.
