OLDER TEXANS MONTH

Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe has designated the month of May, 1977, as Older Texans Month. He urges all citizens of the State of Texas to "honor their fellow citizens who have contributed so much to building our society, and to provide opportunities for older Texans to give of their time and talents to participate actively in the decision-making process, and to remain in the main stream of life."

When thinking of retirement there are five tasks for adjusting to later years in life that may be the key to creating a more satisfying retirement.

Margaret Clark and Barbara Anderson in their book "Culture and Aging" describe a model for adjusting to age—in which they suggest five tasks to be accomplished in order to create a satisfying period of life in the later years.

1) Admit that aging involves limitations. When a person makes this admission

he gives up some activities of earlier years and conserves his energies for well-chosen satisfying activities that are right for him.

2) Change physical activities and social roles. Once the older person accepts the realities of age, he can adjust his world to match the facts. This could mean changes in personal goals, money spending and social relationships.

3) Find new ways to fulfill one's needs. When the older person admits the limitations of age he must not stop there. He will be happier to find new ways to fill his time and to satisfy his needs. Volunteer work that is fulfilling might replace the regular job, or new friends might expand relationships.

4) Develop new criteria for self-evaluation. When the person was working full time, he judged himself according to the work he did. Because he is no longer doing that work, he must not judge himself by those old standards. Self-worth must be estimated in a new way.

5) Establish new values and goals for life. The older person must find a place for himself in his new situation. He must find a positive acceptance of new directions and new purposes. A new role can be acceptable and satisfying even though less competitive.

KING'S KOMMENTS

There will be a wheat production meeting Tuesday, May 17 at 8:00 P.M. in the District Courtroom in Wheeler.

Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Amarillo, will discuss the wheat and oat varieties for this area, the timing and amount of irrigation for maximum profit and the possibility of growing oat rather than wheat.

Dr. Carl Patrick, Area Entomologist, will discuss insect control programs for wheat and oats.

This meeting should prove to be very helpful to Wheeler County farmers and all interested persons are urged to attend.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Crops Subcommittee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Make your plans to attend this meeting and bring a friend.

TREES REQUIRE INFREQUENT FERTILIZATION

College Station—Elegant shade trees that enhance many yards are often overlooked at fertilizing time. However, a landscape specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that most trees can tolerate the neglect and only require fertilizer every few years.

"Most trees need to be fertilized only about once every three years", says Everett Janne. "However, trees that have their roots confined by streets, curbs or other structures should be fertilized more often."

He cautions against over-fertilization as it may cause excessive top growth, making the tree vulnerable to storm damage.

Janne recommends fertilizing a tree on the basis of its branch spread. For every 1,000 square feet of branches, apply about six pounds of

actual nitrogen. This would mean 5.0 pounds of a fertilizer with an analysis of 12-12-12 (.12 x 50 = 6).

"Regular lawn fertilizer is fine for your shade trees," says Janne, "but the applications are the most beneficial when applied in three separate doses."

He recommends the first application in late fall, the second in spring just before

new growth begins, and the last feeding in the summer.

"To assure that the tree gets the complete value from the nutrients, apply the fertilizer evenly beneath branch spread and then water the soil thoroughly," Jane advises.

A fact sheet on "Fertilizing Woody Ornamentals" provides detailed information for interested gardeners.

A copy may be obtained from any county Extension office, adds the horticulturist.

Caprock Park Offers Fishing

QUITAUQUE—Caprock Canyons State Park located just north of Quitauque is one of the newest parks in the Texas system and the clean, cool waters of Lake Theo are drawing many visitors.

Although the 15,000-plus acre park is not developed for overnight camping or extended backpacking, day-use picnickers, anglers and sightseers are enjoying the scenic caprock country.

"Fishing has been good for crappie with a few largemouth bass being caught this spring," said Marquis Robertson, park superintendent.

"There is no day-use or entrance fee since the park is not fully developed," Robertson continued.

The present day-use hours are from 8 to 5 daily but, the summer hours from 8 to 9 will go into affect on May 28.

Boaters are restricted to out-board motors under 12 horsepower and boats under 19 feet in length. All Texas water safety rules and regulations apply on the lake and are enforced by both parks personnell and Texas game wardens.

All persons requiring A Texas fishing license are asked to buy one before entering the park to fish as none are available at the headquarters office.

Smallmouth Bass Put In Area Lakes

LUBBOCK—Bass fishing received a shot in the arm last week as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked 350,000 smallmouth bass in two area lakes.

The inch-long bass were transported from the state fish hatchery at San Marcos and 40,000 were put in Mackenzie lake near Silverton and 310,000 were stocked in Lake Meredith near Fritch.

The trip from central Texas was made without incident and very few bass were lost from the shock of transporting over the long distance. Agitators and bottled oxygen were used during the trip to keep the young fighters healthy.

These smallmouths are the offspring to Tennessee smallmouth brought to Texas two years ago. Several Texas lakes now have a catchable population of smallmouth bass including lake Meredith where anglers are catching some nice one-pound fish.

Both Meredith and Mackenzie lakes have the required habitat that smallmouth bass prefer which includes rocky points, and deep, cool water.

Anglers are finding that the new import prefers about the same lures and bait as the native largemouth bass of the Panhandle and South Plains reservoirs.

More fish stockings in public waters are planned by the fishery division of the P&WD which is just one of the many benefits Texas anglers enjoy when they buy a Texas fishing license for \$4.25.

Mobeetie Is Enjoying Growth

The town of Mobeetie is definitely on the up-growth, according to the City Mayor, Glen Sherrell.

During the last year an Indoor Roping Arena was built just south of the signal light on highway 152. Last winter the First State Bank in Mobeetie decided to expand, so increased their working space to just double, including a hospitality room, which the public is already taking advantage of.

Carrol Langley purchased the Conoco Service Station and Auto Repair from Lester Leonard and has expanded his business to the Mobeetie Feed and Seed Supply, selling Acco Feeds and Seeds and stocking Greenbrier mowers and tillers. During the last year Leon Anglin, owner of the Mobeetie Drug, has added short order meals and expanded to family fashions in the building adjoining the drug store. Also during the last year the Bill Rains Pumping Service and the Chuck Hogan Well Servicing Companies have come into being. Nearly one year ago the B and H Ranch Kitchen opened for business on highway 152 with Freda Boyd and Leona House as Co-owners. Last winter a new Fire Truck was added, following a successful drive for funds.

One new house has been built, others have been remodeled and several mobile-homes have been moved into Mobeetie. Interest has been expressed by people in surrounding towns in becoming Mobeetie Citizens and the Mayor urges anyone who has vacant lots or land in either New or Old Mobeetie to please contact him or some member of the City Council.

The Old Mobeetie Association has been active in repairing the Oldest Jail in the Panhandle and have placed a mobilehome on the grounds with Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Bright as care-takers of the jail and grounds. Also the Mobeetie Little Theatre was instrumental in putting in the concrete slab with a metal awning and the metal covered platform for the Little Theatre to perform and other gatherings. There are three churches in the community and at this time the Mobeetie Community Church is adding a fellowship hall to their sanctuary with an invitation for any public organizations or private group to use it.

At the last City Council Meeting they voted to use the last Revenue Sharing fund check to install eight street lights and also to place street signs. In the job of setting the street signs, volunteers are going to be needed to help with the setting.

Mayor Sherrell says the City needs to set a time for clean-up of the town—beginning with his own property. Mr. Sherrell says he is very happy that the city has a working Council, interested in the betterment of the City.

Leonard Family Reunion May 8

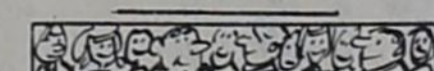
