



THE CONTROVERSY WHAT CONSUMERS CAN DO

Clothing experts have pinpointed-and are answeringmajor questions posed by consumers about the now-banned TRIS finish (a flame-retardant fabric finish).

Since the April 7 ban of TRIS from the U.S. market by the Consumer Products Safety Commission, consumers are asking how to make garments safe that were purchased before that date.

Consumers can follow a specific procedure to wash the excess TRIS finish from fabric surfaces -or they can return unused merchandise still in original packages and receive a refund. Also, of they choose, they may discard these garments without fear of environmental damage.

Many consumers ask if they can remove the finish with soap and chlorine bleach-and the answer is "NO".

To make a garment safeaccording to the Commissionconsumers should wash the garment three or more times according to the recommended care instructions on the label, using DETERGENT-NOT SOAP.

This removes much of the chemical from the fabric surface -and it removes the risk of illness, but it still allows the flame-retardant protection to remain, Commission experts say.

Also, consumers ask how they will know if a garment is finished with Tris.

TRIS is sometimes used on 100 per cent polyester-and always on acetate, triacetate and blends of these fibers.

Consumers may find out about polyester garments by asking at the store in which they purchased the garment-because only the manufacturer of a polyester garment knows if it is TRIS-finished.

Many other consumers want to know if it is "okay" to buy new sleepwear for children at this time-and the answer is "ves." if they purchase flame-retardent garments of 100 per cent cotton or nylon or certain polyesters or inherently flame-retardant fabrics, such as modacrylic, vinyon and Cordelan.

These fabrics, all used for children's sleepwear, are not TRIS-finished. They have other flame-retardant finishes that have not been proven harmful.

Still other consumers ask if there is a difference between flame-resistant and flameretardant-and the answer is "no." They both refer to fabrics that will not support a flame after the source of fire is removed.

Also, there are exact requirements for returning TRIS-finished merchandise and receiving a refund. Only garments that are in the originally purchased condition may be returned to the store where purchased.



APPLICATOR CERTIFICATION

The Texas Pesticide Control Act establishes an additional category of pesticide applicator, the noncommercial applicator, and requires certificiation and licensing of each as a requisite to the use or supervision of use of restricted-use as well as statecommercial applicator as defined by the TPCA means "a person who owns or manages a pesticide application business engaged in the application of restricted-use or state-limitied-use pesticides to the land of another." The noncommercial applicator as defined by the TPCA means "a person or government agency or department which wants to use restricted-use or state-limited use pesticides or the authority to demonstrate restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides and does not qualify as a private applicator and is not required to have a commercial applicator's license." Certification is granted by the state regulatory agencies

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

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

Control Aphid In **Home Garden**

So your spring garden is doing well and everything looks rosy. Well, don't overlook the common problem of tiny insect pests called aphids.

Aphids are only a 1/16 to 1/4 of an inch long and are commonly a pale green but come in an assortment of colors.

The disaster this tiny pest brings can ruin any garden with any plant at any time of the year. They attack young plants as well as mature ones.

To spot an aphid, look for two tube-like structures at the posterior end of the insect that look like a "dual exhaust system." Aphids can be winged or wingless, so check all suspicious insects. The pests are often found on the back side of plant leaves or on the flowering parts

or other young tender growth. Because these pests have a piercing-sucking mouth similar to the mosquito, it is easy for them to transmit diseases from one plant to another, as well as to suck juices from plants.

Signs of an aphid infestation in your garden may be wilted plants and plants with leaves that curl up or turn a sick yellow.

Two common, effective insecficides for controlling aphids are malathion and diazinon. Both of these materials may be used on cabbage, cauliflower, collards, Brussel sprouts, squash, cucumbers, pumpkins, tomatoes, corn, potatoes, mustard, turnips and radishes. Dizainon alone is recommended for peper while only malathion is cleared for use on beans, peas, eggplant, lettuce, okra, cantaloupes and watermelons.

For precise mixtures consult the product label. More detailed information, including additional insecticides for vegetable insect control, is available in the publication "Vegetable Garden Insects and Their Control" which may be obtained at the county Extension office.


