Keynote speaker at the luncheon will be Francine Neff, former treasurer of the United States. Tickets are \$4 to the luncheon, which will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the WTSU Dining Hall. Ticket sales will be limited to 500.

The luncheon theme is "The Expanding World of Women." A special souvenir of the luncheon will be \$2 bills personally signed by Mrs. Neff which will be sold at cost.

In addition to Mrs. Neff's address, the program will include a musical presentation by the cast of the current WTSU musical production, "The Music Man," and displays from the various schools of WTSU depicting luncheon's theme. Campus tours will be available afterwards.

Mrs. Neff resigned her position as treasurer and national director of the US Savings Bond Division Jan. 19 and returned to her native Albuquerque, N.M.

Active in the Republican National Committee and party, she became the 35th US treasurer and later the national director of the US Savings Bond Division in 1974. She was the first woman and the first treasurer to become national director of the bond division. Mrs. Neff also received the Exceptional Service Award from the Treasury Department in 1976.

Production Credit Annual Meeting

Officers and directors of Canadian Production Credit Association gather in Dallas Apr. 14-16 with other agricultural specialists from throughout Texas for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston's annual meeting of stockholders.

Representing Canadian PCA are board members Wallace N. Hamker, Booker, chairman; James D. Skaggs, Pampa, vice chairman; Lloyd R. Buzzard, Spearman; C. B. Henderson, Wheeler; and Don W. Morrison, Pampa. Larry E. Albin, Canadian, PCA president, also will attend.

According to Albin, "About 500 Texas farmers and ranchers are expected to attend the meeting." They include some of the most prominent agri-producers throughout the state.

Keynote speakers at the session are newly-elected Governor Donald Wilkinson, head of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C., and President Jack Barton, the Houston bank's top executive officer.

Wilkinson, a former administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, heads the agency which supervises the \$37 billion national Farm Credit System. He speaks on "Agriculture - Building for Tomorrow."

Barton will report on last year's highlights, financial and otherwise, to the stockholders. The Houston Credit Bank, principal source of funds for 32 Production Credit Associations and seven agricultural credit corporations, last year loaned more than \$1.5 billion through its agricultural credit outlets. It is a member-bank of the Farm Credit System.

Indictments For Drip-Gas Sales

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced today that the Travis County Grand Jury has returned indictments against three Panhandle-area residents as result of his department's probe into illicit drip-gas operations.

Named individually and jointly in the seven indictments were Pressley Ashton of Cactus; Elmer Cross, Dumas; and H. E. Davis of McLean.

The indictments charge the men with various violations of the Texas Motor Fuel Tax Act.

Bullock launched the probe which is still under way—last October in the wake of a rash of complaints from motorists indicating that some service stations were selling inferior gasoline without identifying it as such.

Bullock praised former Travis County Dist. Atty. Robert O. Smith and Ronnie Earle, the present district attorney, for their assistance.

"We're particularly grateful for Mr. Earle's assistance, cooperation and the professional manner in which the case was prepared and presented to the grand jury," Bullock said.

"We don't like having to take such drastic action, but our job is to enforce the tax laws of this state and that is exactly what we intend to do," Bullock added.

TRACK GIRLS QUALIFY FOR REGIONAL IN 2 EVENTS

The Wheeler Girls Track Team competed in the District meet at Groom Wednesday, April 6 and place third. The girls qualified for Regional in two events.

The Mile Relay team and Darla Moore will compete at Regional April 22 and 23 at South Plains College in Levelland. Darla will run the 80 yard hurdle in the prelims at 5:30 p.m. Friday, April 22. The mile relay team, Anne McIlhenny, Barbara Kreyling, Teresa Hefley, and Darla Moore will compete in the prelims Friday at 6:30 p.m. Denise Westmoreland is the alternate on

the relay team. The finals will be held Saturday, April 23.

In the district competition Wheeler followed Groom and McLean.

In winning first place in the Mile Relay, the Wheeler girls set a new district record and local record with a time of 4:24.9. The old district record was 4:34.4 set by Miami and Groom.

Other school records were set at the meet. In winning third place at the district competition, Denise Westmoreland set a school record of 2:41.4 in the 880 yd run. Jana Johnson ran the mile in 6:35.4 for third in district. The 80 yd hurdles were run in 12.1 to make Darla Moore the school record holder; she placed second in the meet with a time of 12.2. The shot put record for Wheeler is now held by Beth Willis; her distance of 32' 41/8" earned her a third place in district. Beth also now holds the record for the Discus with a distance of 89' 1 1/2"; a third place throw in district. A fourth place tie in district was Lynette Gaines placing when she set a new school record with a 4'2" high jump. Teresa Hefley triple jumped a distance of 31'4" for the school record.

Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) for issuance of certification. As an alternative to participation in a training program, an individual may qualify for certification as a private applicator by submitting a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following a review of self-study materials. The self-study materials may be obtained at the county Extension office.

CONSUMER NOTES

Consumers can guard against unscrupulous telephone solicitors with a little knowledge of how they operate.

Many types of goods and services are sold by telephone—magazines, kitchenware, insurance and land sales—but some dealers may try to trick con-

sumers into a purchase or contributing to a phony charity.

Never agree to buy a product, let a salesperson come to your home, or make a charitable contribution during the first call. Tell the salesperson you'll call him back if you decide to buy or let someone come to your home.

Call the Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce to check on the company, then call the salesperson back if you really need what he's selling.

If it's a charitable organization, ask them to send you information about the charity.

If the company represents itself as helping the handicapped, ask if handicapped are employed by the company and how much money goes to the handicapped.

If you are told that you've won a free prize or gift, find out what you have to do. Often the prize is only given if you buy something, and frequently you will be overcharged for the item you are required to buy.

Be sure to ask if you have to listen to a sales pitch for a product or service. Generally, you can bet the sales pitch will be high pressured and intense.

confusion reigns in interpreting these dates.

A national survey conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service of more than 1,400 food shoppers last spring indicates that although there is extensive awareness and use of open dates on food packages, shoppers are confused by the several kinds of dates used.

Some respondents assume that the "open dates" are throwaway dates.

Actually an "open date" is defined as an easily read and understand calendar date on a food package to indicate freshness. It tells either when a product was packaged or processed, when the store should sell the product, or by what date the consumer should use the product.

However, in some instances, a suggested date for removing an item from the counter the "pull" date may be prefixed by the words "sell by" or "exp"—and consumers sometimes mistake "exp" as a throwaway date.

A national survey conducted Four different date prefixes were considered in the recent study.

1. "Packed on"—the date of manufacturing, processing, or final packaging.

2. "Sell by"—the last day a retail store may offer the food for sale. This date, however, leaves time for the purchaser to use the product in the home, even if bought on the "pull date" (date on which an item should be removed from the counter).

3. "Use by" or quality assurance date—refers to the peak quality of the food product.

4. "exp" or expiration date—marks the end to the product's useful life or the last day it should be used. It, however, is used interchangeably with the "pull" date, as mentioned above.

The terms "open date", "packed on" and "sell by" were correctly interpreted by a majority of the food shoppers. Consumers who most often misinterpret this type of information were over 35 years of age and with incomes under \$10,000 a year.

In another similar survey of 1,400 shoppers throughout the United States, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service found that 90 per cent of the shoppers believe freshness indicated by open dates on food packages is useful. Less than five percent regarded them as of little or no use.

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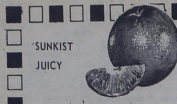
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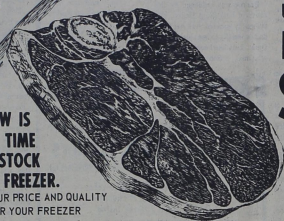
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
