mean a greater reliance on marketing by grazing rather than by combining. We feel that more silage will be put down both by farmers and feedyards, and that there will be a greater reliance on growing cattle as well as feeding high grain rations that were feasible in previous years.

"Present market conditions make it very difficult for farmers to make a profit producing grain. Integrating into the livestock industry is one way they can improve their profit picture," Thomas continues. "This will not hamper the big commercial feedlots, but we do believe that the cattle expertise and financial

ability in the commercial yards is an essential part of the future of farming."

Thomas concluded by saying that the fed cattle output from theyards should increase as a greater number of feeder cattle become eligible for a grain finish. "This will not be a permanent change, but as the cattle cycle bottoms out and the supply of calves and grain come into balance with the market demand, then we should see a reoccurrence of high grain feeding."

"There is very little that is new in the livestock industry, other than the people in it. At the present time, about 7 million cattle can be produced in this area. But when we learn to feed 'stalk and all', we will produce about 12 million."

HORSE SHORT COURSE

The Texas A&M University Horse Short Course will be held on the T. A. M. U. campus in College Station, April 4 and 5. The theme for this year's horse short course is "Modern Horse Production Techniques", according to Don King, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Tuesday's topics will be Horse Breeding on the King Ranch, Artificial Lighting Regimes for Horses, Current Concepts in Horse Nutrition and an Update on Horse Health. Speakers will be Department of Animal Science and college of Veterinary Medicine staff members. Featured speaker will be Dr. Jerry Morrow,

ranch veterinarian, King Ranch, Kingsville, Texas. "Mare Breeding and Teasing Procedures" and "Birth of a Foal" films will also be shown Monday. These presentations will set the stage for Tuesday's horse farm tour, points out King.

Tuesday horsemen will board buses and will tour four unique horse ranches in the Houston area. Modern production practices will be seen in operation at Keefer Race Training Stable, J3 Ranch, Gleannloch Arabian Stud and Wilson Ranch. Stops will include looking at horses; touring facilities; owner/manager live demonstrations of modern production, conditioning and train-

ing practices and question-answer sessions.

The horse short course will be an educational and entertaining experience for any horseman, states King. PREREGISTRATION DEADLINE IS MARCH 28.
