## Anne McIlhany Named Winner

Anne McIlhany has been named Wheeler High School's 1977 General Mills Family Leader of Tomorrow. Anne, a Senior, won the honor by competing with other Seniors here in a written knowledge and attitude examination on December 7. She will receive a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual educational scholarship program, and becomes eligible for state and national honors.

The State Family Leader of Tomorrow, to be chosen through judging centered on performance in the December 7 test, will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, with the second-ranking participant in the state receiving a \$500 grant. The state winner will also earn for his or her school a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America", from Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

In April, the 51 winners representing every state and the District of Columbia will be the guests of General Mills on an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D.C. During the tour, personal observations and interviews will be conducted to select the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, whose scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place winners will receive scholarships increasing to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

Jimmy Selby is the incumbent mayor and Aaron Laverty and Flea Sherrill are occupying the council position to be voted on.

Rev. Hagemeyer and his wife Shirley have ministered in Tanzania for 9 years. During their recent missionary term, they were involved in evangelism, youth work, Bible school classes, church building, and conducting Bible training seminars. Mrs. Hagemeyer directed the work of Women's Ministries groups.

Before entering missionary service, the Hagemeyers served as associate pastors in West Columbia, Texas, and pastored a church in Anton, Texas. Both Rev. and Mrs. Hagemeyer are graduates of Southwestern Assemblies of God College in Waxahachie, Texas. They have two daughters, Stephanie, 14 and Melody, 12.

During their next term of missionary work, the Hagemeyers are planning to establish church buildings in six different cities of Tanzania. They will also build a church training center on already purchased property, participate in cassette ministry, and do translation work. Rev. Hagemeyer says, "The doors are open in Tanzania and hearts are receptive to the gospel."

During the special missions service on Thursday evening, Rev. Hagemeyer will share reports and illustrations of their ministry in Tanzania. The public is invited to attend.





That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are appointed officers for said election.  
At Agriculture Building, in Allison, Texas, in said School District with George Parker as Presiding Judge and Carl Giddens as Clerks.  
George Parker is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for designated election shall be held at Allison Butane & Ept Co. within the boundaries of the above named District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.  
The manner of holding said election shall be governed as near as may be by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of this School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.  
Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the County Clerk and return the ballot boxes and other supplies of said election to the County Judge for safekeeping, and the Commissioners' Court shall canvass the returns of said election and notify the candidates and this Board of Trustees of the results thereof.  
A copy of this order shall serve as notice of said election, and be posted in three different places in said School District, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall also cause a notice by publication of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located, which publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before said election.  
It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.  
It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Wheeler County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.  
The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. 



## Grazing Management

Mother nature had a great system to control grazing by the buffalo and kept grass healthy. We can use some of her ideas today in cattle management. Remember that buffalo were migratory in their habits. They would graze in large herds but they kept on the move to new areas. After they went through an area all the plants had a period to renew growth and remain healthy and vigorous. Ranchers today are getting grazing management plans simulating this natural process. Basically the idea is to allow rest periods for the grass plants. These rest periods must be during the growing season of the grasses. It is best to have these rest periods at different times each year. The grasses will have responded to these rest periods by increasing the leaf and root production. This means greater production and usually more cattle than before. These grazing management plans depend on other things, such as number and size of pastures, kind of grasses and water. These things must be looked at and some times adjusted before the program can be started. The Wheeler Soil Conservation Service assisting the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District are willing to assist in any problems related to grass management. 


