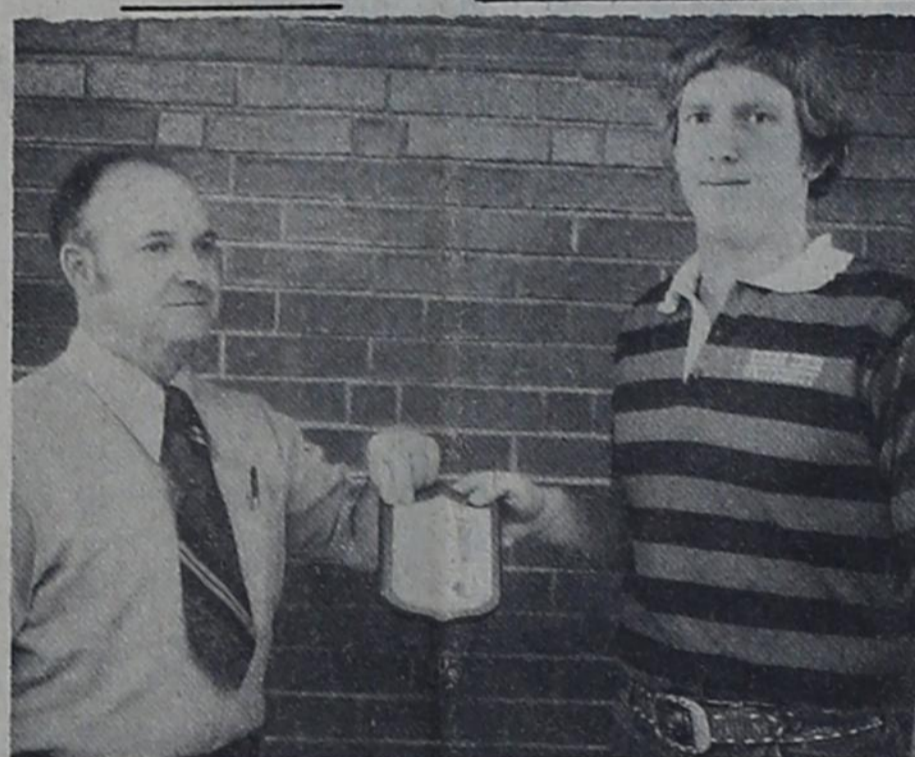

The Wheeler Mustangs and the Mobeetie Hornets will decide the District 3-B championship next Tuesday night in the Shamrock gym. The 8 P.M. tipoff will mark the fifth time this season that the Mustangs and Hornets have played with each team winning two times. Coach Bill Wiggins' Mustangs won the second half of the championship with an unblemished record to match the Hornets first half performance and Tuesday night's encounter has all the ingredients for a real barn burner between these rivals. Losing to the Hornets in Mobeetie and at the Canadian tournament and winning in Wheeler, the Mustangs will have to be at their best to defeat the talented Hornets. No more than six points have separated the two clubs in their four games to date and a closer game than that is anticipated Tuesday night. Wheeler's strength has been their inside game and rebounding with the size they possess but a marked improvement has been shown of late in Mustangs outside attack. "We have got to stop their fine outside shooting and have to control the boards if we expect to win", Coach Wiggins said this week after his club trounced the Groom Tigers to wrap up the last half title.

\$3000 Is Goal Of 1977 County Heart Fund

The Wheeler County Heart Association have a goal of \$3,000 in the 1977 Heart Campaign set for February. To reach that goal, door-to-door canvassers will sweep the county on "Heart Sunday" February 20th distributing life-saving information and collecting money.

"The money goes to educational and community programs in Wheeler County, and to research, our prime function," said Martha Williams, Chairman of the Heart Association campaign this year.

"There are over two million volunteers nationally, said Mrs. Williams, "and that sounds like a lot. But you must remember, heart and blood vessel diseases afflict one out of seven Americans, killing one out of every two Americans who die. Against that, we need all the volunteers and money we can get." Williams said in-hospital heart deaths have gone down by 30% since the 1960's, "But the fight has just begun. We're fighting for your life and we ask you to please give generously to that cause when the volunteer calls on you."

LIBRARY PROJECT PROGRESS CONTINUES

The Library Board should like to thank the Progressive Club for their contribution to the regular Library operating Funds. We hope the few remaining clubs and organization will get their contributions in. Without our local clubs yearly donations our library and would have closed years ago. We should also like to thank: the Wheeler Gas Co. for donating the Material, equipment and Mr. Jim Montgomery's time in laying a gas line from the building to the meter; Mr. Benny Reeves of Reeves Electric who donated \$200 worth of his labor; Mr. Wayne Edwards of the Wheeler Lumber Yard for making the paneling available at a price we could afford; and, Mr. Carroll Adams for his untiring effort in coordinating all this work.

If you have not made your donation yet please do so immediately. We still do not have quite enough money for carpet. To purchase new free standing, adjusting, metal shelves to be used on the juvenile and adult side will cost us \$6,000. If we only purchase them for the adult side it will run \$4,000. The wooden shelving that is presently in the old library will supply the shelving to go around the walls. This shelving is already inadequate and will not be sufficient for more than the childrens books. Man power must either be hired or donated to move these shelves. Filing Deadline Date Corrected

The deadline for filing for a position on the Wheeler City Council is March 3. The times mistakenly reported March 12 as the deadline. A citizen wishing to place his or her name on the April 2 ballot must file with the City secretary before 5 p.m. on that date.

Voters will elect a mayor and fill three places on the city council Saturday, April 2.

The term of office for the mayor will be 1 year. The present mayor is serving an unexpired term and was elected in a special election; his term was only until the next regular election at which time another mayor is to be elected to serve the remainder of the term.

Three places are to be filled on the council; these places are 1, 3, and 5. Place 1 is presently vacant due to the resignation of Charlie Wagner; no one was appointed to fill this place. Place 3 and 5 are presently occupied by Bill Owen and Delbert Thomas respectively.

Those wishing to have their names placed on the ballot may file with the City Secretary on or before Thursday, March 3.

TABLE SETTINGS
"Mixing" is the latest trend for attractive informal table settings.

Patterns mixed with solids or other patterns allow unique expressions of personality and denote seasonal changes.

But be careful to give tables and buffets an "altogether" appearance. The personalized, or electric, look should control the mix and match look—not create clutter.

Before beginning combinations, ask yourself these questions: Do dinner ware, glassware and linens complement each other? Do selected mixables fit into the overall decorating color scheme and desired mood? Is there a good balance between selected table patterns and patterns of the floors, walls and windows?

Mixing coordinated patterns of dinnerware or a pattern with a solid will increase numbers—and show the hostess' innovative spirit. If unsure about mixing patterns, alternate favorite patterned plates with solid white ones.

A striped yellow placemat put next to or overlapping with a white and brown polka-dotted one can add special interest.

Playing deep colors against beige or white can be a subtle way of introducing fall to the family and guests. Use mirror placemats for an extra treat.

For a different look, cover a table with cloths that reach to the floor, or make table runners that match a hostess dress.

If a family member collects sea shells, rocks or jade, select a few prize possessions to mix in with

the tables setting. In this manner, children might enjoy this opportunity to show off their latest treasures to guests.

Be creative, resourceful and sensible when creating a personalized table. But do not use all possible "mixables" at one meal. An attractive table set in good taste will enhance the food's good taste.

BREAKFAST IDEAS

Break the "breakfast blahs" with tasty, exciting new menu

ideas. Breakfast can be low cost and still interesting, varied and quick. And studies show children do better in school if they've eaten a good breakfast.

Breakfast should provide one-third of the day's protein, vitamin and mineral requirements. And it's the easiest time to satisfy the Vitamin C requirement—a citrus fruit or juice, or tomato juice is just right.

For a nutritious—and fun—morning starter, THE AGENT SAID, add berries or ice cream to plain milk.

For variety, try topping a favorite hot cereal with apple sauce, jelly, jam or marmalade.

Service fresh fruit kabobs using apple, pear or peach wedges and strawberries or banana chunks.

Toast sliced pound cake and spread with margarine, cinnamon and sugar.

Try eggs any way—with cheese, mushrooms or just sunny side up.

A cup of creamed tomato soup may just hit the spot. And young children will enjoy dry cereal topped with their favorite flavor of ice cream.

MEAL PLANNING EASY WITH METRICS

Metric measurements on foods may confuse consumers trying to plan proper serving sizes for

good health. Healthful meals may be planned with foods labeled with grams by selecting the suggested servings from the four food groups.

The milk group contains milk, cheese, ice cream and yogurt. Three servings are suggested for daily eating by children. A serving is eight ounces, or one cup, in the English system of measuring. It is 250 milliliters in the metric system.

Another group is the meat group. It includes meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dried beans, peas and nuts. Two or more two-to-three ounces servings of the meat group are recommended for daily eating. An ounce equals about 30 grams. A metric serving would be about 60-90 grams.

The vegetable and fruit group is the third group, and at least four servings are advised for daily eating. Every other day one serving should be an orange or dark green leafy vegetable or other rich sources of Vitamins A

and C. In the English system, a serving is one-half cup or one whole fruit. A metric serving would be one whole fruit or vegetable, but 125 milliliters.

Bread and cereal make up the fourth food group. This group contains products from cereal and grain. Bread, tortillas and pancakes are a few examples. At least four servings of this group should be eaten daily. A serving may be one slice of bread or one roll. A serving may also be about 30 grams—or a little over one ounce—of ready-to-eat cereal.

By eating the suggested number and size of servings, the body will get needed nutrients. They help a person grow and have energy. Energy is measured in calories and show how much energy is stored in foods. Calories will be changed to joules in the metric system. To make the change, multiply the number of calories by 4.2 joules.

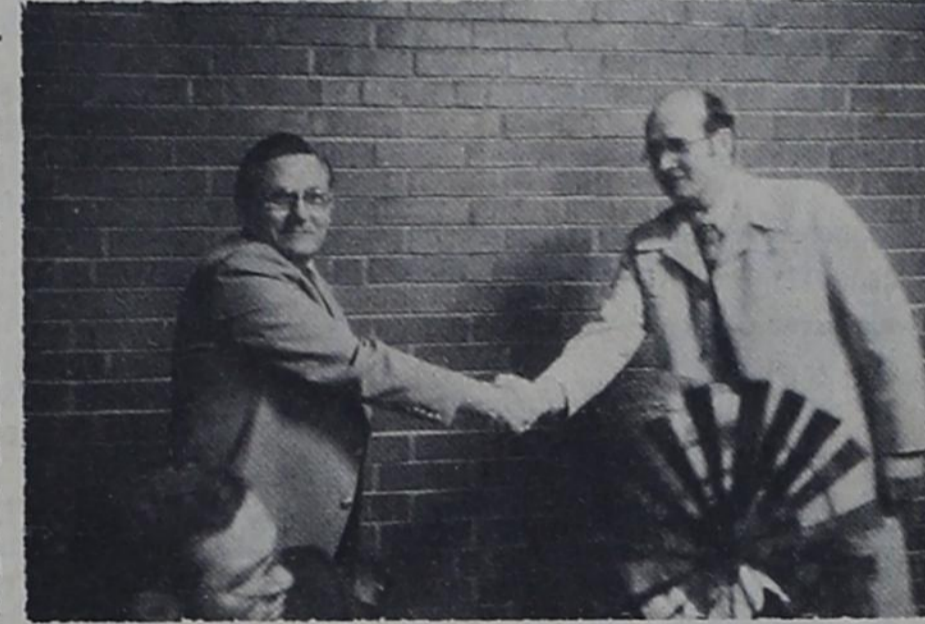

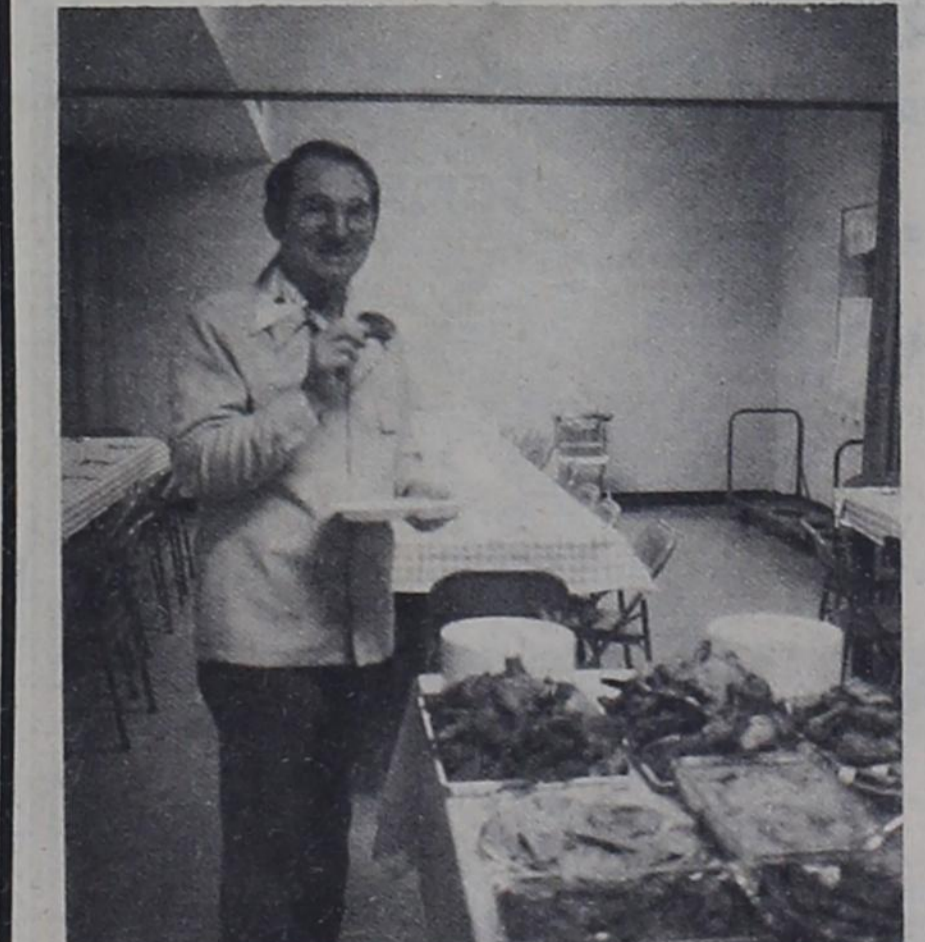
