



'in the feedlot, we would provide all five points of the program, at all times, on a free choice basis. The animals would normally limit themselves to about 60 to 65 percent grain. Since this is physically difficult for most feedlots, a mixed ration of about this ratio is normally provided. We prefer that silage, hav or even straw be also available so the animals may have additional roughage if needed. We emphasize that low protein roughage must be provided; alfalfa or other legumes are generally too high in protein, calcium and

of the roughage. "Minerals should be individually self fed, as on the range. If addequate roughage is present, consumption will not be excessive from a cost view point. If the feeder cannot supply adequate roughage, special precautions can be taken to increase the ash consumption to a level where mineral intake is normal."




