Cold & Snow Hit Wheeler Area

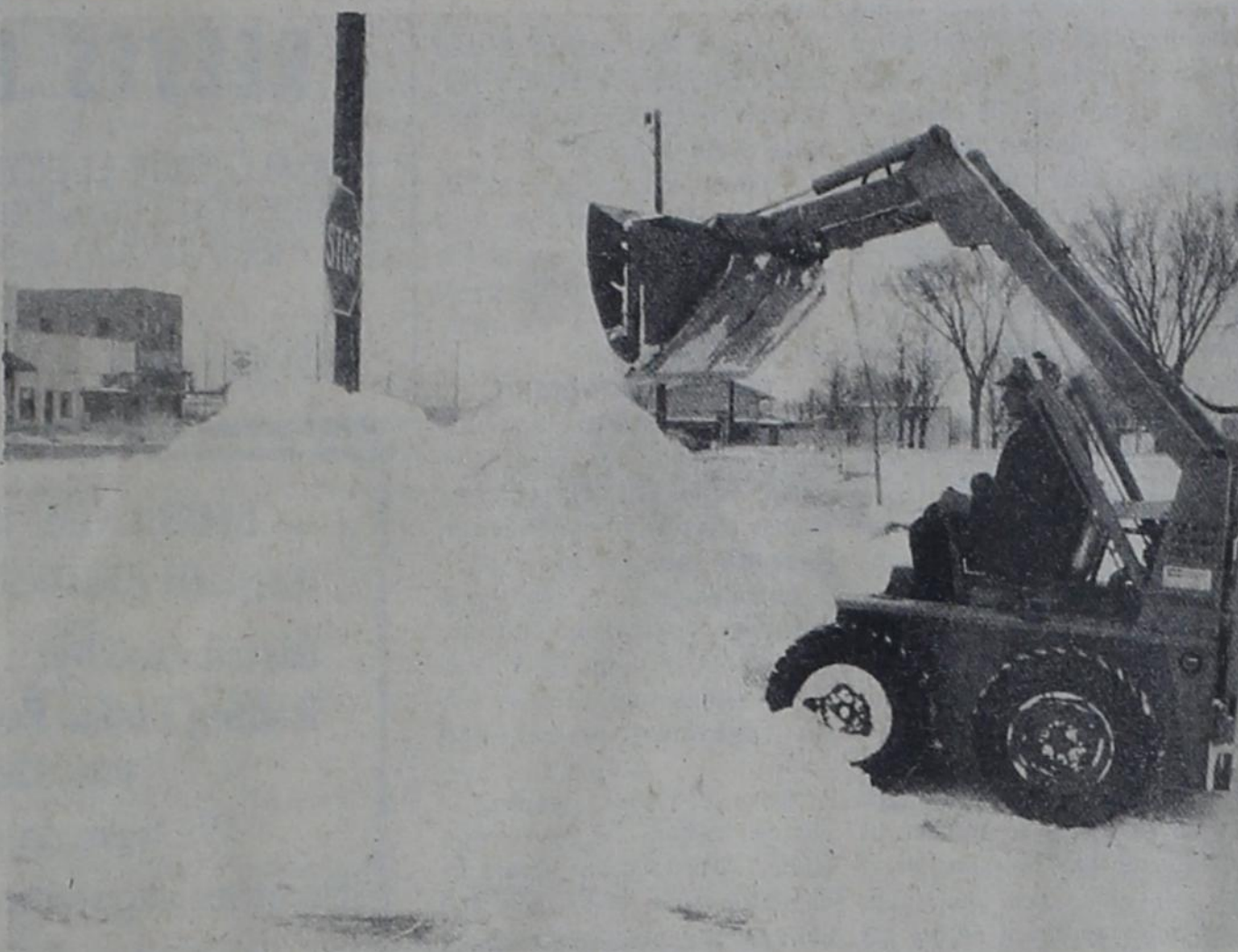
Wheeler received their second snow of the new year Saturday night and Sunday. A total of 4" fell with winds from 20 to 30 miles per hour. The snow was left in drifts of 18 to 24".

The temperatures ranged from -5 to 4 degrees during the worst part of the spell. The high temperature through Tuesday was the lower twenties.

The moisture content of the snow was reported by Joe Rogers to be .32".

With very little melting taking place, the side streets are very dangerous with the snow packed and frozen. The local area was very fortunate with no major accidents caused by the snow; but caution still needs to be taken until the streets are completely cleared.

Wheeler closed the year with a total of 23.72" moisture in 1976; this is 6" below normal for Wheeler.

ECA CLASS TO BEGIN MONDAY AT SHAMROCK

An emergency Care Attendant class will be offered at Shamrock. The class will be open to anyone who wished to take the course. The first meeting for enrollment will be Monday, January 17, in the Shamrock High School at 7 p.m.

The course will offer classes on care of heart and stroke patients; treatment of victims of poisoning, drug overdose, diabetic coma or insulin shock and bandaging and splinting.

It is hoped the citizens in the communities surrounding Wheeler and Shamrock will take the course; by doing so, they could render aid while the local ambulances were enroute to the scene.

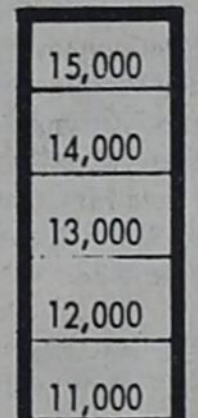

Approval Given Highway Project

Approval has been received from the Federal Highway Administration for highway improvements on U. S. Highway 83 in the northern part of Wheeler County announced Childress District Engineer, Lewis H. White of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Included in the approval was the planned relocation of the intersection of U. S. Highway 83 and Farm to Market Road 1046.

"We hope to have the work under contract in March or April if the necessary funds are available", said White.

Construction on U. S. 83 will consist of widening and reconstruction of a 3.5 mile section extending from the Hemphill County Line, South to F. M. 1046.

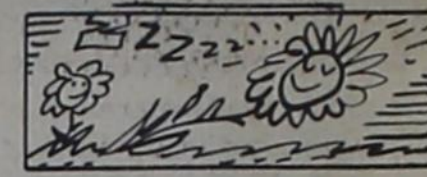

CONSUMER INFORMATION

Consumers can be better buyers by learning to identify examples of "puffery" in advertising. Some ads play on an emotional appeal or make confusing claims that may not be useful when trying to make a rational purchase. It may be hard to distinguish "puffery" from hard facts necessary for informed purchase decisions.

First, look for qualifiers—phrases like 'up to' or 'can be' are typical of advertising that almost promises big things and always leaves an out for the manufacturer. Listen carefully to what advertising is actually saying.

Try to find examples of ads that appeal to the consumer's attitudes and beliefs. The transfer technique works by associating a product with something commonly held as good or popular, such as motherhood, picnics, helping your neighbor or the America way. The bandwagon appeal promotes a product by advertising that 'everyone wants one, and don't you too.' The plain folks approach allows the buyer to identify with the common, everyday people in the commercial.

Watch for words like "comparable value" or "compare at". Products may be compared with similar but not identical items sold in other stores. Before buying, check the real price and quality of a comparable item.

Beware of "buy three-get one free" or "two for the price of one." The honest dealer offers a legitimate deal, but the unfair seller may raise the regular price of the item, eliminating or reducing any savings on the free item.

Special offers are another way consumers can be misled by advertising. One technique is the 'bait and switch' game. The dishonest seller will offer a popular item at a very low price to get shoppers into the store. Once the consumer has taken the 'bait' and is inside the store, the seller informs him that the advertised item is all sold or not really what the consumer wants.

The switch comes in trying to persuade the consumer to buy a higher priced item—the one the store really wanted to sell in the first place. Merchants can legally call attention to a more expensive item, as long as they give the choice of buying the advertised special. It is illegal, however, for a store to advertise an item if it is not intended to be sold.

When listening to and reading advertising, take time to be aware of what it is saying or implying. Learn to shop around and compare before buying.

If you do suspect that some advertising is misleading or false, report it to the Attorney General's Office, Consumer Protection Division, Capital Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

MAIL ORDERS

Consumers now have help getting mail order merchandise from "slow deliveries."

The Federal Trade Commission has issued trade regulation rule for the mail order industry that went into effect this past February 2.

It requires that when a mail order seller is unable to ship merchandise within the stated time, or if no time is stated, within 30 days after receiving an order. The seller must notify the buyer of the delay and give him an option to cancel his order.

Also, for this purpose, the buyer must be furnished an adequate cost-free means to notify the seller, such as a postage-paid card. Then if the buyer requests cancellation, the seller must cancel the order and refund the money.

Buyer's failure to respond to a seller's notice of delayed delivery

and option to cancel will be construed as consent to a 30-day delay. But for delays beyond this extra 30 days, the buyer must expressly consent to the delay.

Other major provisions in the rule: —require that sellers of mail order merchandise have a reasonable basis for claims they make about shipping time.

—allow sellers one billing cycle to adjust a charge to a credit account, and seven days to provide a refund where the buyer has made payment by cash, check or money order.

CREDIT FOR WOMEN

Opening a checking and savings account "in your own name" is one of the first steps a woman can take in the establishment of a good credit rating.

Although these accounts will not appear on your credit history, they will be a means for borrowing or using credit, because it is the repayment pattern that counts.

Next, consider opening a charge account "in your own name." This account should be based on your own credit and ability to pay, not that of husband or parents. A retail credit card is one of the least expensive ways to start a credit history.

A bank credit card can also give a live of credit, meaning there is a ceiling on the dollar amount to be used, generally ranging from \$300 to \$1,000. This ceiling can be increased as income increases, if requested.

To speed up the process of

establishing a credit history, apply for a small loan. Consider putting the money borrowed into a savings account and using it to repay the loan. A good repayment pattern is important on this loan, since it is the beginning of a credit history. Basically, all lenders are interested in the borrower's ability to repay a debt and his willingness to repay. And by following these steps, a woman can begin to establish herself as a credit-worthy individual.
