DATES ARE AUGUST 13-14 4-H JUNIOR RODEO

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, August 13-14, at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena, Wheeler, Texas. The rodeo, which is sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans Horse Club, is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday at the time of the rodeo.

Entries are now being taken at the Wheeler County Extension office, Box 448, Wheeler (806-826-5243). Books will close at noon Tuesday, August 10 and no late entries will be accepted. For entry blanks or other information, contact Don King, CEA.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Charlie Plummer of Elk City, Oklahoma. Buckles will be awarded for first place in each event except pre-school and and buckles will be awarded for all-around in each division.

Clois Hanner, chairman of the rodeo committee has announced the following age classification and events:

Pre-school (under 1st grade) stick horse, barrel race, boot scramble, goat ribbon race, sack race.

School age-9: barrel race, calf riding, pole bending, flag race.

Boys 10-13: Steer riding, breadaway roping, ribbon roping, barrel race and calf daubing; Girls 10-13: Flag race, calf daubing, walking lead, barrel race and pole bending.

Boys 14-19: Calf roping, ribbon roping, bull riding, bare back riding and rescue race. Girls 14-19: rescue race, calf daubing, goat tying, barrel race and pole bending.

Tickets for the rodeo are \$1.00 for adults and \$.50 for children if purchased from a 4-H member in advance of the rodeo. Tickets will be \$.25 higher at the gate.

Wheeler County 4-H members are also selling tickets for a 11 inch Sony television to be given away the last night of the rodeo. These tickets are \$1.00 each.

Rodeo Queen Contestants Must Enter By Aug. 10

A Rodeo Queen's Contest will be held in conjunction with Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo August 13-14.

The contest is open to girls who are Wheeler County residents and 19 years of age and younger, according to Paula Parker, Queen's Contest chairman.

Each girl should have a sponsor. The sponsor is required to

pay \$2.50 to cover the cost of the contestants banner which will contain the sponsors name.

Contestants will be judged on horsemanship and appearance.

The Wheeler County Home Demonstration Clubs are sponsoring a Life Saving Training Meeting as a part of their August monthly meeting. The meeting is open to the public and will take place August 9th at 7:00 p.m. at the Production Credit Meeting Room in Wheeler.

The training will be taught by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Chandler of Briscoe. They have 24 hours of CPR (coronary, pulmonary respiration) training from the American Heart Association to enable them to teach this life saving information.

Mr. and Mrs. Chandler will cover life saving methods used to aid drowning, heart attacks and electrocution cases.

A person never knows when this type of training will be needed. It could be essential to the life of those you love.

Thirty-two individuals will participate from each community in the six events and one marathon. Adults from Wheeler, Briscoe, Allison, Kelton and Mobeetie have been recruited to take part in the program and represent Wheeler.

TIME: 5 minutes

With staggered teams (to increase spectator view) each team will have one filler, one man lying on his back, with a 64 oz. Dr. Pepper bottle on his forehead, and 4 runners. At the start, the filler will pour colored water (green for Shamrock, red for Wellington, and black for Wheeler) into the pie pans which each runner is equipped with. The runner must run 15 yards, over a bale of hay, then 20 yards, and crawl under a hurdle, then 15 more yards where he must pour the water into the bottle attached to his team member's head. He cannot touch the bottle while pouring with his hands or pie pan. When his pan is empty, he will return to the starting point. The second member will start when the first one has gotten over the bale of hay.

Winners will be the one with the most water in the bottle.

"Almost Anything Goes"

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50 yards long. First team member will pass greased basketball between legs to second team member. Second team member will pass over his head to third member. Third member then passes ball between legs to fourth, and so forth. After first member passes ball to second, the first member will go to rear of line to receive pass from eighth member. Second member will go to rear of line after his pass, and so forth.

No moving backwards to gain ground while passing ball. Ball must pass from hand to hand; no rolling of ball, etc. When ball is lost, member losing the ball must recover it and pass as he is supposed to. First team to cover 50 yards wins.

GREASED POLE RIDE

TEAM: 3 member team from each town (2 men and 1 woman)
The woman must ride a greased pole carried by two men from the 35 yard line to the opposite 35 yard line. She must carry an object (to be determined) in one of her hands. The team must stop and get set up again if the woman falls off or if she drops the object. The first team to cross the line wins.

BARREL ROLL

TIME: 4 member team from each town
The event will take place between the 40 yard lines. One team member will stand on top of the barrel and roll it with his feet. The other team member rides inside the barrel. They start at the 40 yard line and roll to the 50. At the 50, the two team members switch places and proceed to the opposite 40 yardline. At the far-side 40 yardline, two more team members take over the barrel and repeat the procedure back to the original 40. The first team to cross the line wins.

FILLER EVENT

PANCAKE FLIP RACE

TEAM: 8 member team from each town
Two members must flip a pancake back and forth between their skillets at least three times within ten yards. They must be moving while the flips are completed. At the ten yard mark, they pass their skillets on to two other team members, who repeat the procedure. The process is repeated two more times for a 40 yard event.

The filler event will be used only if time permits.

Record Water Use

Wheeler citizens are using water at a record rate. The city of Wheeler billed 13,550,000 gallons of water for the period June 20 through July 20.

The previous month, also a record, the city billed 9,071,000 gallons.

The 13 1/2 million billed does not include water hauled from water meter at city office, and fire department.

The increased use of water shows Wheeler's need to update its water system and add a new source of water.

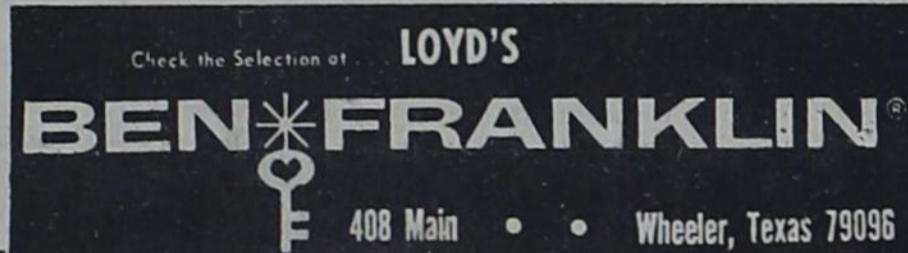

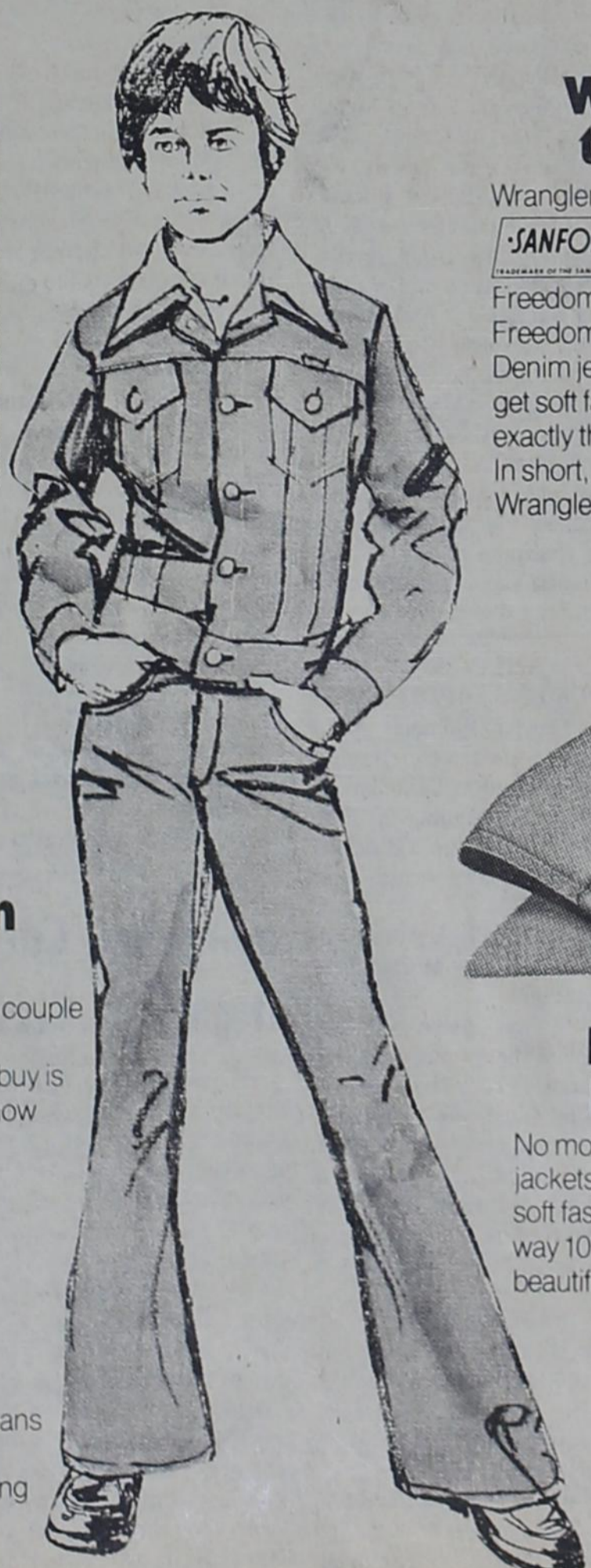

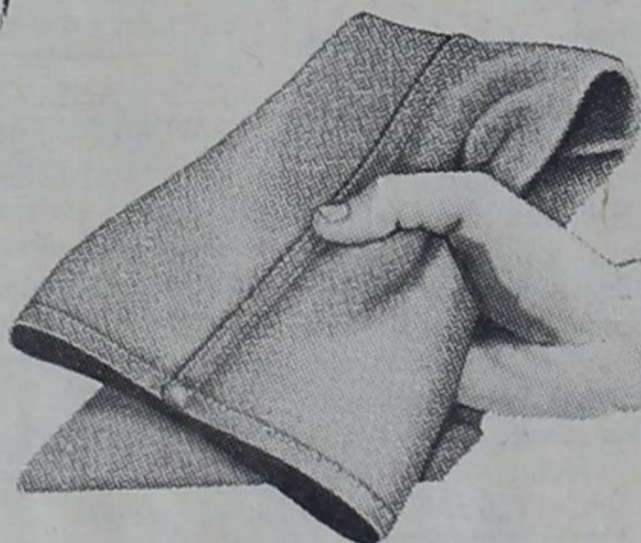

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Local Teachers Attend Meeting

Miss Suzanne Brock and Mrs. Ruth Wiley, teachers of vocational homemaking education in the Wheeler School, participated in the State Inservice Conference for Vocational Homemaking Teachers held at the Dallas Hilton Hotel, Dallas, July 27-30.

Thirteen concurrent sessions on Wednesday provided an opportunity for the teachers to learn new teaching techniques and for an in-depth study of areas of instruction relevant to today's lifestyles. The sessions included such topics as Child Abuse, Perinatal Care, Community Involvement, Nutrition, Discipline, and Creative Methods for Helping People Learn. According to Billie Chapman, Executive Director of the Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association of Texas, the in-service training in these today's—world topics keeps vocational homemaking teachers at the top of the list of the state's best informed educators.

Special workshops were held to explore the unique needs of teachers of Adults, Home Economics Cooperative Education, Pre-employment Laboratory Programs, Coordinated Vocational-Academic Programs, and Home Economics for the Handicapped. Exhibits of the latest equipment and teaching materials were open Monday through Wednesday to teachers attending the state meeting.

The Awards Banquet of the Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association Wednesday evening honored the Outstanding Administrator in the state and,

for the first time, the Vocational Homemaking Teacher of the Year. Also receiving awards for tenure were 84 teachers of vocational homemaking education totalling 1725 years of service to Texas school children.

More than 2800 teachers attended the week-long meetings, said Mrs. Virginia Alders, Nat-cogdoches, president of VHTAT.

Top O' Texas Uses Computer

Computerization has finally invaded the last strong hold of the Old West, the sport of rodeo. The computerized program, which has been in operation five months is known as the "Central Entry Office", and is located in Fort Collins, Colorado. This new plan will be in operation for this year's Top o' Texas Rodeo, August 4-7. The "Central Entry Office" accepts and processes entries for all professional PRCA Rodeos in the United States. The events it services are the five standard rodeo events, and the G.R.A. barrel race.

The method "Central Entry" uses to accept the PRCA entries is a bank of toll-free WATS lines manned by a staff of specially trained operators and entry clerks. PRCA members, permit holders and G.R.A. members call one of the toll-free lines (800-525-5000) and are greeted by an operator who logs their name, membership or permit number, the rodeo they wish to enter, and if a trade-out rodeo, the performance they prefer to compete in.

At entry closing time, the stock contractor is contacted and is informed as to the number of entries in each event. The contractor then makes the decision as to the number of contestants to compete in each performance, the individual animals for each performance, and the slack times if necessary.

All of this information is entered into a computer, and the machine sets up the program according to rules and regulations set forth by the PRCA.

All local entries with a Pampa address, not members of PRCA or G.R.A., will enter at the local rodeo office in the Chamber of Commerce on July 29 and 30 until 5:00 p.m. daily.

When local entries have closed, the Pampa office will call "Central Entry" giving the names and events of all local amateur contestants. Locals will be told to call the toll-free number the next day and they will be notified when they will compete.

For further information requiring the new entry procedure local contestants may call the rodeo office in the Chamber of Commerce - 669-3241.

Performances will be held Wednesday thru Saturday nights August 4-7, with Elra Beutler and Son, of Elk City, Oklahoma, furnishing the stock. Tickets will go on sale in the rodeo office on Monday, August 2.

GRAZING PLAN Management

In proper management of grass a grazing plan is very important. A grazing plan is a planned approach plant use so as to obtain the most livestock production and conservation of the plants. A grazing plan should start with inventory of the forage. This should be done to have a starting point for the amount of forage that can be safely taken. Next a management plan should be developed. This plan includes the number of livestock that will harvest the forage. It should include what pastures will be grazed, how long they will be grazed and the time of year the forage will be harvested from these pastures. The grazing plan should also have a plan to use in case of a drought. This plan should have a time to evaluate forage and livestock condition. If forage is low or cattle condition bad then the plan should have actions which can be taken to keep from damaging the forage plants. A yearlong plan for sound management can result if proper planning goes into a grazing plan. The Soil Conservation Service working through the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District are ready to help in any areas of a grazing plan. Please call or come by our office in Wheeler.

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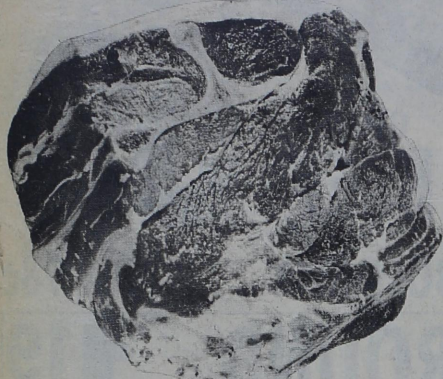
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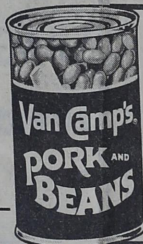
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
