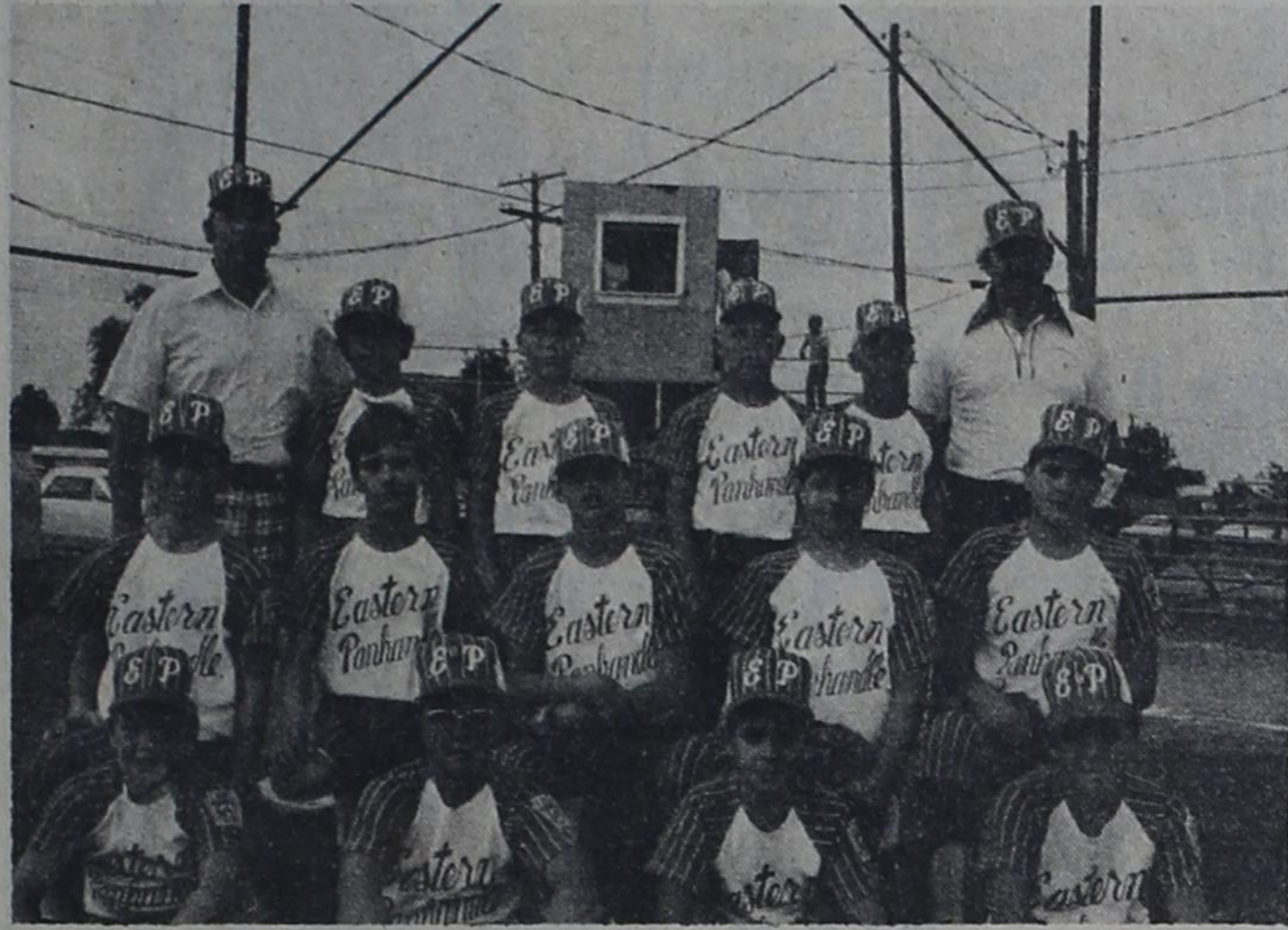

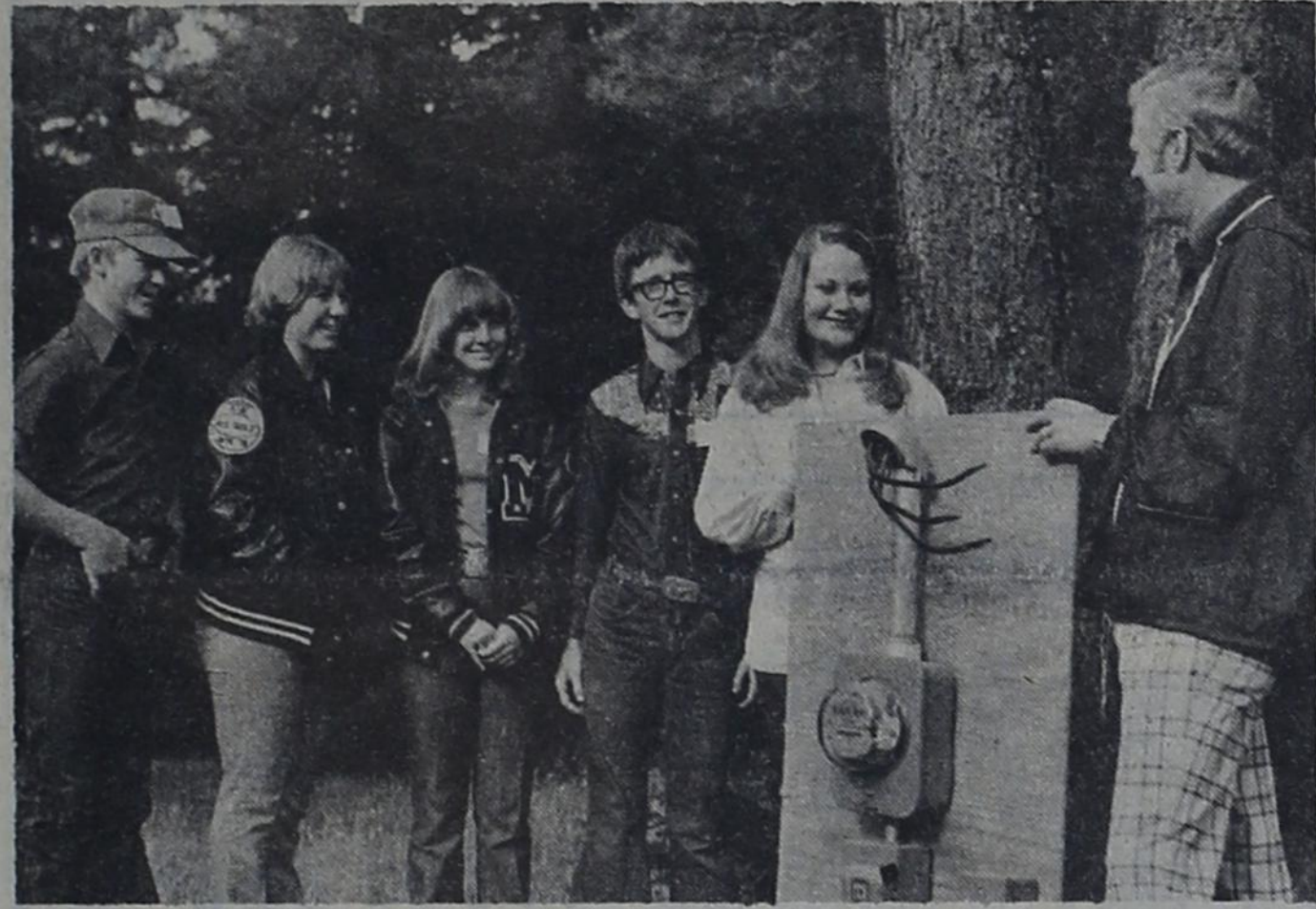
### ALL-STARS

## City Council Discusses Streets, Fire Truck, Water, Insur.

The Wheeler City Council met Monday evening, July 19. Mayor Pro-tem Bill Owen called the meeting to order and Charles Wagner led the council in prayer. Minutes of the previous meetings were read, corrected and approved.

Jerry Hefley reported on the activities of the Water and Sewer Department.

A report on the Police Department was given by Keith Miller. Richard Wallace presented a statement of disbursements and went over the report with the council.

The council voted to take bids for the seal-coating of several

blocks of paving. The project will cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000 and is necessary to preserve the paved streets.

Neil Rogers, representing the Wheeler Fire Department, reported on the specifications for a fire truck. The council voted to take bids for the truck which is to replace the Red Firetruck which will soon be 30 years old. A new truck at the present time is estimated to cost \$40,000 as compared to \$17,000 in 1971.

Thurman Rives of Rives Insurance met with the council to discuss coverage of the city buildings. He proposed the city

place all the structures under a multi-perial plan which would provide better coverage. The council decided to follow suggestion.

The council voted to purchase a plaque to be placed on the city flag pole giving recognition to Natural Gas Pipeline of America. The company donated the pole and erected same. A larger flag is to be purchased also.

Attorney M. Kent Sims met with the council to discuss the proposed water contract with Masters and Kenady.

Bills were reviewed and passed for payment.

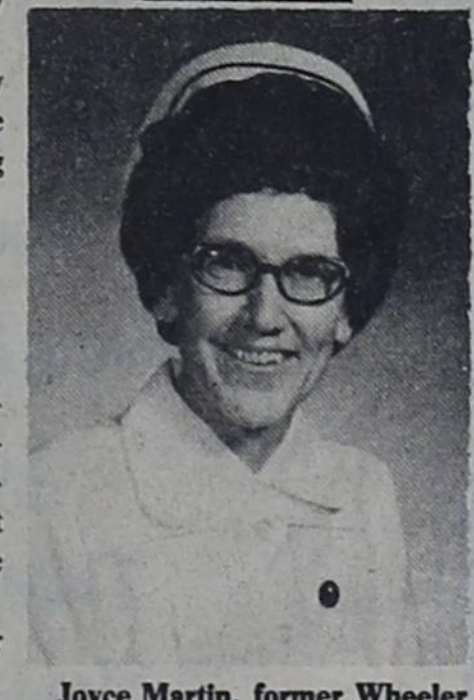
## Rites Tuesday For Ode Pike

Services were Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. in Marble Falls at the Clemment Fuperal Chapel.

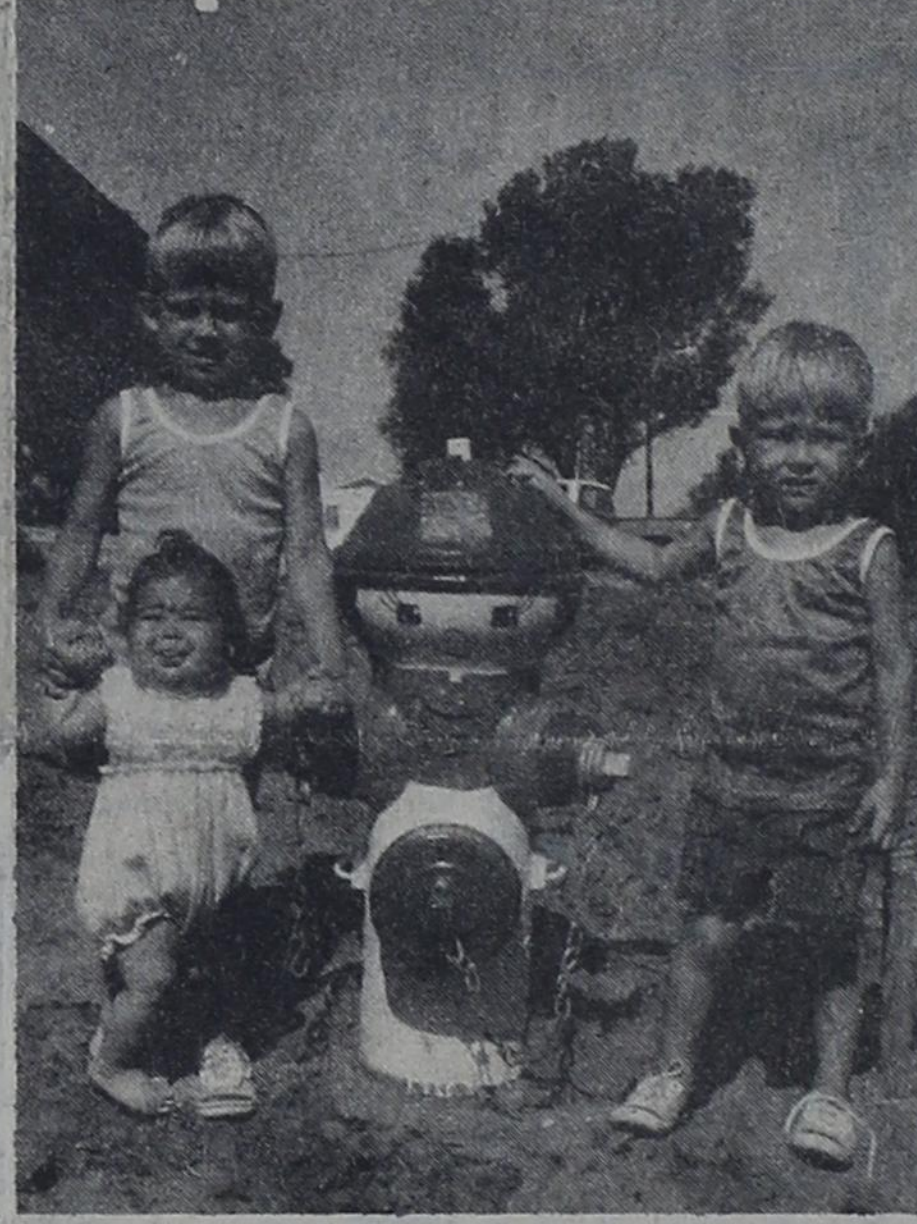

## WHEELER COUNTY 4-H DRESS REVUE JULY 30

The 1976 Wheeler County 4-H Dress Revue will be held Friday, July 30th in the Wheeler Courthouse District Courtroom. The judging will begin at 1:00p.m. and the public revue will be at 4:30 p.m. The theme for the 1976 Dress Revue is "BLOOMING FASHIONS FOR A FABULOUS SUMMER."

The divisions for the Dress Revue are as follows: Pre 4-H - Not age 9 by January 1, 1976; Junior 1 - Ages 9-11; Junior 2 - Ages 12-13; Senior - Ages 14-19.

All those entering will receive a ribbon; with special awards presented to the first place in each division. The special awards are being presented by the Wheeler County Home Demonstration Council. There will also be an award for the Best Model in each division.

The first place winners in the Junior 1, Junior 2, and Senior divisions will enter the District I Dress Revue to be held August 12th in Amarillo.

Rules for the 1976 Dress Revue are as follows:

- Must turn in a complete 4-H Dress Revue Record Book.

- All garments must be constructed during current clothing project except for accessories.

- A blouse or shirt can be considered as accessory and it may be purchased. It will be judged only for appropriateness as an accessory.

- Must tell the agent or judges if the complete garment was not made by the contestant.

- Recycled garments are eligible - recycling consists of constructing a new garment out of 1 or more outdated or otherwise unwearable garments in which the fabric is still in excellent condition.

Each participant will be judged in 3 areas:

1. The Outfit and the Person -- 50 points
2. Construction -- 50 points
3. Record -- 25 points

The public is cordially invited to attend the public fashion revue that will begin at 4:30 p.m. Fashions will be modeled and awards presented at this time. A tea sponsored by the Briscoe Home Demonstration Club will follow the revue.

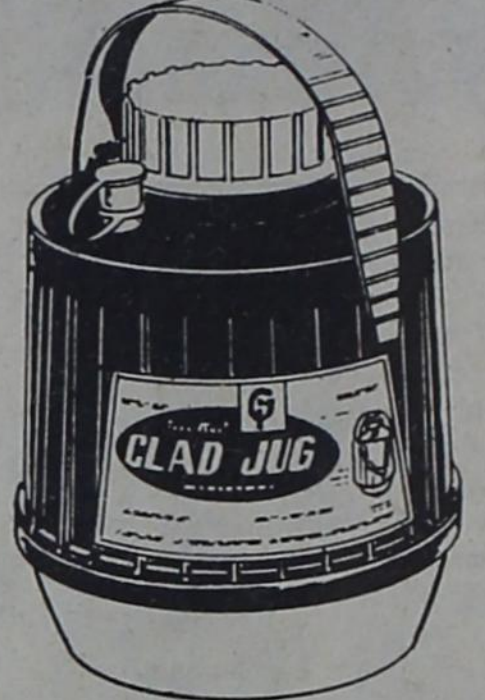

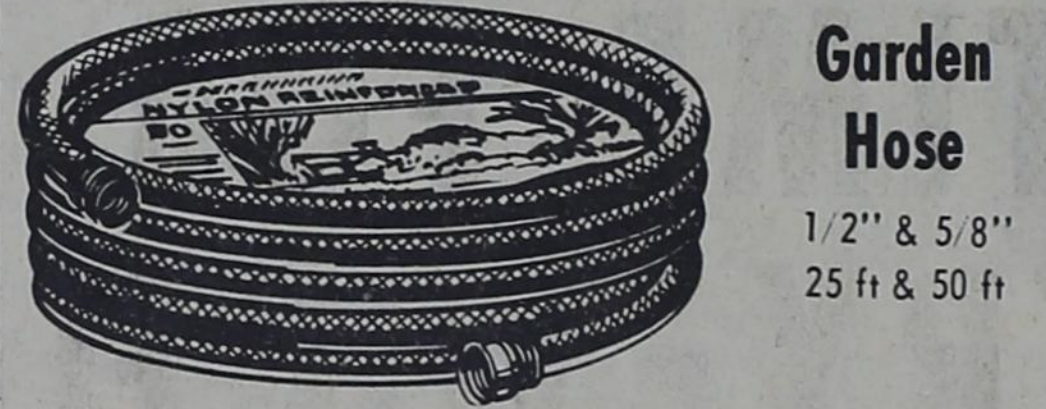

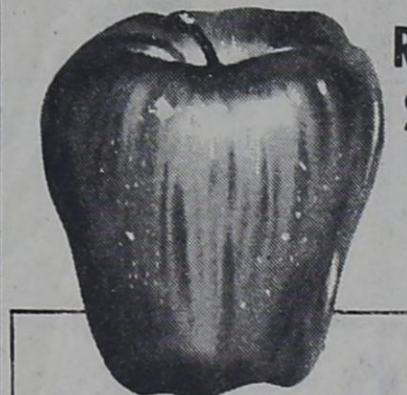
