...Lumber has scheduled a paint sale for next week. For their advertisement in Wheeler Times.

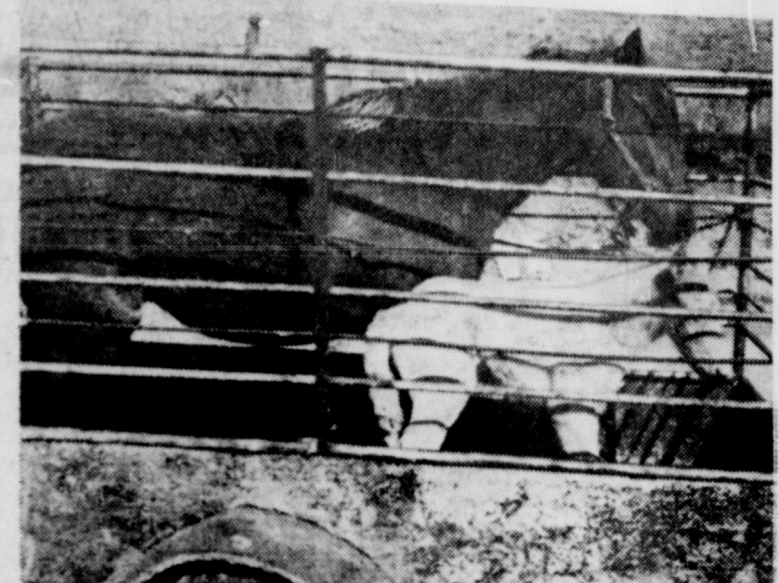

...The Chamber of Commerce float decorated by members of the Shamrock Club and won third in the Sayre parade.



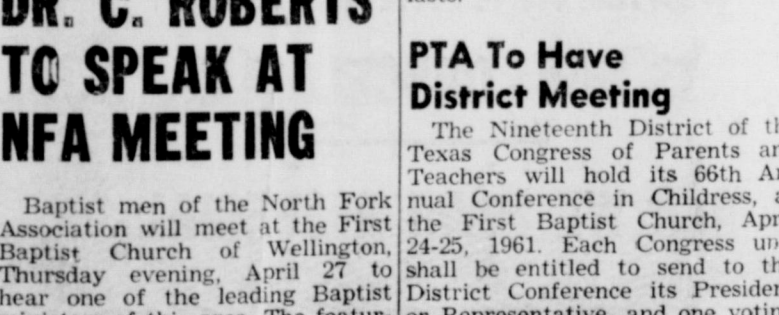

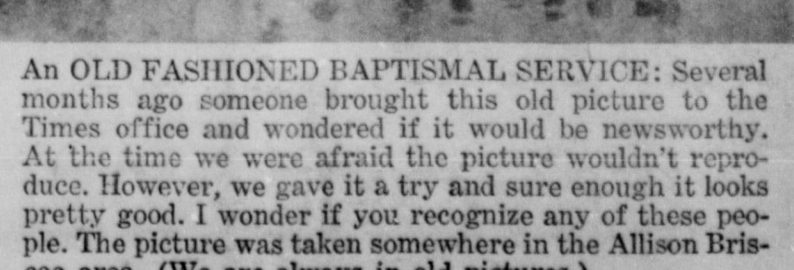

APHID DAMAGE IS SEVERE

County Agent, Bryan W. Swaim, reports severe damage from aphids in all wheat, barley, alfalfa and oats over the county.
 First indications is the plants will stop growing, several days later spots will start turning light green, then yellow and in severe infestations will kill the plants.
 Spraying with parathion at the rate of 1 and one half pints per acre has been fairly general over the county. Three planes have been working in the county this past week and are spraying crops for \$1.85 to \$1.95 per acre. Swaim said counts should be made on the crops prior to spraying and counts are made on the following basis. Mark off one foot down a row, brush the aphids from the plant onto the ground and count them. However, Swaim said very few fields in this county would not run enough to pay, to spray according to the grain insect control guide. If 100 or more are present in the

larger grain or 25 or more present in a linear foot of the younger grain, they are counted as damaging numbers. When a build up of

aphids of 100 or more are present considerable damage may result in five to ten days.
 Swaim, said parathion used in controlling these aphids is poison and should be treated as such. This spray should not be breather and respirators should be used if one is around crops being sprayed. Swaim also advised all ranchers and farmers to keep a close watch on their cattle to prevent them from getting out and grazing on land that had been sprayed.

U.S. Farmers Deserve Our Thanks

One thing essential to overall farm program development is recognition by the urban public of agriculture's outstanding accomplishment. In his recent farm message to the Congress, President Kennedy referred to the production job this way: "In no other country, and at no other time in the history of our own farm economy, have so many people been so well provided with such abundance and variety at such low real cost."

These efforts of our farmers have not always elicited praise. Until recently, American agriculture has been depicted as a sick industry, a burden on the taxpayers, a symbol of failure. What colossal nonsense! If our agriculture is a "failure," I am sure Khrushchev and Mao wish that their own agricultures will "fail" and the sooner the better.

Don't forget that most foreign visitors to this country are eager to visit our supermarkets. I can understand that. It is overwhelming to see fruits and vegetables stretching off into the distance—mountains of canned, and packaged foods on every hand—meats, poultry, dairy products, bakery products, and other items for sale in wide variety. I wonder, sometimes, what visitors from the Iron Curtain countries really think about our system of government and the accomplishments we have made under it.

Yes, farmers have done much to keep our standard of living high. But let's not forget that agriculture is our largest industry. There are 12 times as many people in agriculture as the steel industry—and 9 times as many as there are in the automobile industry. Farming furnishes employment to more people than are in the steel, automobile, public utility, and transportation industry combined.

These figures only begin to tell the story. In many small agricultural communities in Minnesota, Iowa, Georgia, Texas, and other States, it is axiomatic that "as agriculture goes, so goes the prosperity of the area."

As I say, we have tended to overlook all this in recent years. I hope we can alter that tendency. Our farmers deserve a better "press" than they have been getting.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — Sometime between now and August 31, the Texas Legislature must come to a showdown, die, back-to-the-wall decision on a big new money-raising bill.

Only way they can survive, said one, is to be able to say, "Look, I can't like this bill either. But what can we do... close the schools?"

In this climate, the House postponed floor action on the general sales tax measure by Reps. John Allen of Longview and Forrest Harding of San Angelo. Gov. Price Daniel attacked the bill as "obnoxious and inequitable," hitting everything "from the cradle to the grave."

Governor Daniel urged compromise through a "package" bill. Ingredients for the package, he said, might be gotten from Rep. George Henson's omnibus tax bill and Rep. Ben Atwell's selective sales tax measure.

Hinson's bill would hit in many areas — watches, jewelry, power tools and machinery, construction materials, natural gas, restaurant meals, non-essential beverages, etc.

Atwell's bill is akin to a general sales tax except that it names the hundreds of items rather than making a blanket provision.

Senate Cool To Tax — with less than building than bubbling enthusiasm, Senate State Affairs began hearings on the first tax bill sent over by the House.

It is Rep. Charles Ballman's "loophole bill" designed to raise some \$43,000,000 toward retiring an expected \$63,000,000 deficit in general revenue fund.

Senators listened with seemingly sympathy to witness who criticized the bill's provision for a revised franchise tax formula and a gift tax. They listened, too, to a lengthy pro-sales tax discussion by Tom Sealy of Midland, chairman of the Citizens for a Sales Tax group.

Under the Ballman bill's board caption, the Senate could add extensively to its revenue-raising features, but most observers doubt the Senate will be eager to seize that initiative at this stage.

Campaign Limit Killed—A bill to limit campaign expenditures to \$25,000 in a race for the U.S. senate or congressman at large was killed by the House, 83-to-50.

Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin was sponsor of the bill which passed the Senate.

Supporter of the measure said that as things are "a rich man can buy his way into office." Opponents said the limit was unrealistic and that a newcomer to politics could never become known with such restrictions on a state-wide race.

Insurance Change Founders — Sen. Grady Hazlewood's bill to set ground rules for the state's merit rating auto insurance has had at least a temporary set-back.

Senate voted 16 to 13 to take up the bill. However, a two-thirds majority is needed to begin floor action.

Prior to this action, the State Board of Insurance announced extensive changes in the rating plan, effective August 1. Such violations as running a red light or stop sign, illegal passing or turning, negligent collision and breaking of drivers license restrictions were removed from the list of actions causing drivers to pay higher insurance rates.

Senator Hazlewood was not satisfied with the changes. He criticized the removal of red light running from the list and the keeping of penalties for speeding, no matter how slight.

Freight Rate Bill Passed—A bill to simplify rate setting for railroads and truckers was passed on second reading by the House.

Under present law, the Railroad Commission has to pass on every rate change request, no matter how trivial. Under the proposed measure, the rail or truck line would publish the proposed new rate and if no one objected, it would go into effect. If there were objections, the Railroad Commission would call a hearing and decide the matter.

Consolidation Payments Okayed — A bill designed to encourage consolidation of school districts received final Senate passage.

It provides that common school districts which consolidate into one will continue to receive, for 10 years, the same amount of state aid they would have received if they had not merged.

Sen. Thomas Creighton of Mineral Wells is sponsor. He said it would promote better schools and, in the long run, economy.

Jefferson Report "Blows In" — Release of the house General Investigating Committee's report on its study of vice in Jefferson County blew the lid off a long-smoldering controversy.

Report accused Atty. Gen. Will Wilson of failing to follow up vigorously on reports to him of hourish racketeering in the Beaumont-Port Arthur area.

It also criticized Liquor Control Board Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr., for merely denoting an agent accused of failing to stop

liquor law violations in clubs in Jefferson County. House committee studied last year and was technically dissolved at the end of this session, but the report was delayed.

Wilson hotly denied he failed or refused to take within the power and office. He said the report was "politically motivated" and that he was chairman of the committee.

Meanwhile, the House wearily, perhaps, passed a bill that would set and Senate investigation law. Better, they establish such committees when special circumstances seem to warrant.

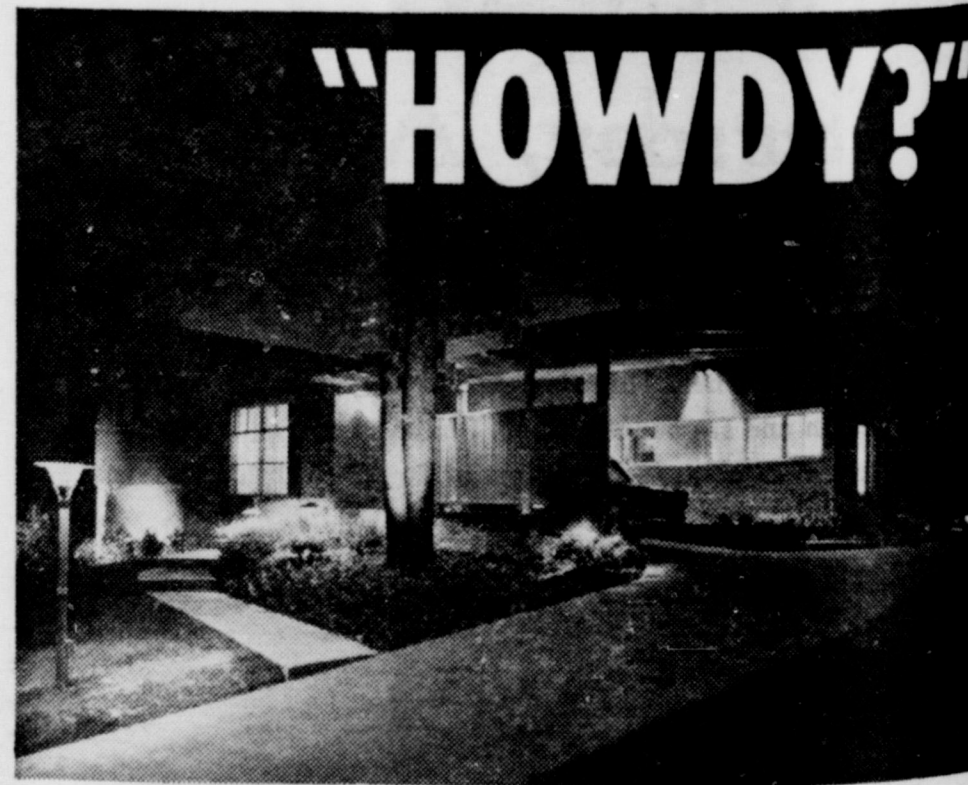

Texas Gets 84% of March of Dimes Funds



THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIPPLING goes forward on many fronts with funds raised through the March of Dimes. The scientist in the laboratory seeks answers with the slides under a powerful microscope. NEW YORK, N. Y.—The state of Texas has been the principal beneficiary in the allocation of March of Dimes funds raised in the state over the past 23 years, it was disclosed today in a financial summary prepared by The National Founda-

tion. More than 84 cents of every dollar from Texas' March of Dimes has been put to use in aiding the state's disease victims and in research and education projects conducted by Texas institutions. Of the remaining 16 per cent accruing to the national headquarters, a large portion also has come back to Texas in shipments of polio vaccine and gamma globulin and in other nationwide services conducted by The National Foundation.

The summary covers the period since the first March of Dimes was held in January,

1938, and compares the net total of funds raised in the state with amounts made available to Texas through September 30, 1960. In this period, Texas chapters of the March of Dimes organization raised a net total of \$28,255,310.30 at an average fund-raising cost of less than 7 per cent. Of this amount, \$20,878,742.57 has been available to the county chapters in carrying out their extensive patient aid programs, including advances of \$8,592,351.71 from the national office to meet local emergency situations.

In addition, 65 grants totaling \$2,946,584.11 have been made in support of research and professional education projects at Texas institutions. Principal beneficiaries of these grants have been: Baylor University, \$1,748,928.28; Jefferson Davis Hospital, \$654,797.54; University of Texas, \$332,781.57 and the Texas Institute for Rehabilitation and Research, \$162,179.85. The latter institution also has benefited to the extent of \$1,514,672.42 from

those grants made to Baylor University and Jefferson Davis Hospital.

Over and above the 84 per cent used by institutions and county chapters in the state, The National Foundation has financed within the state projects such as the historic field trials which proved the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine, epidemiological studies and scholarship and fellowship grants to Texas residents. National headquarters' expenditures for the vaccine trials in Texas amounted to \$359,726.07. In addition, the national office has sent into Texas \$291,718.84 worth of Salk vaccine and 654,924 cc's of gamma globulin in support of its polio prevention programs.

Two years ago, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis changed its name to The National Foundation in expanding its areas of interest beyond polio to include birth defects and arthritis, using the scientific knowledge and experience gained in the fight against polio.

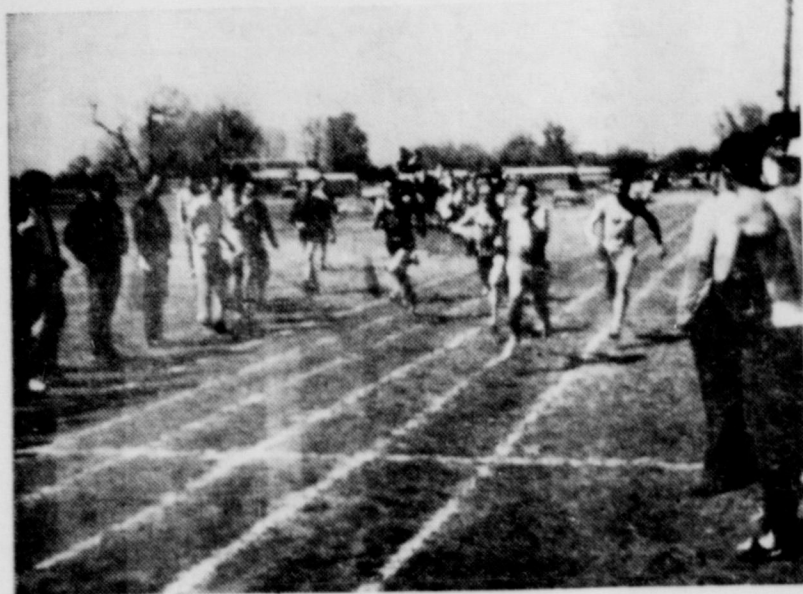

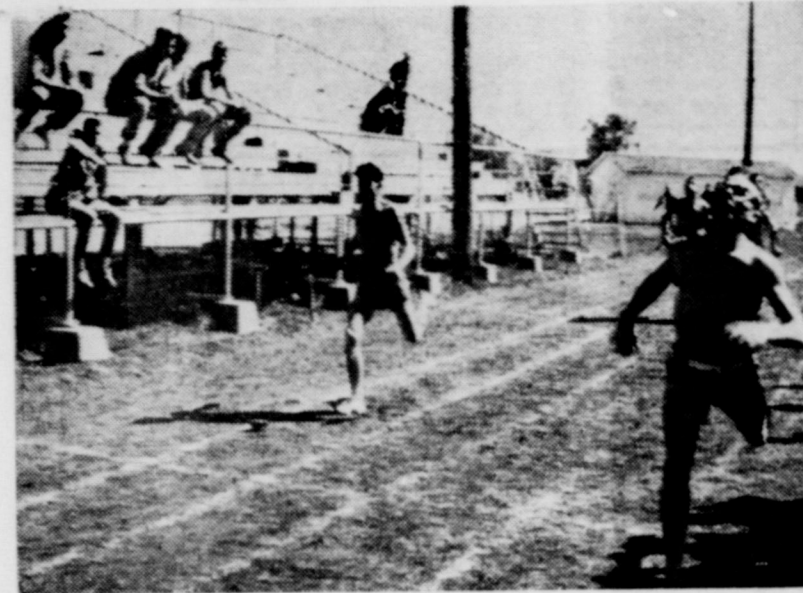

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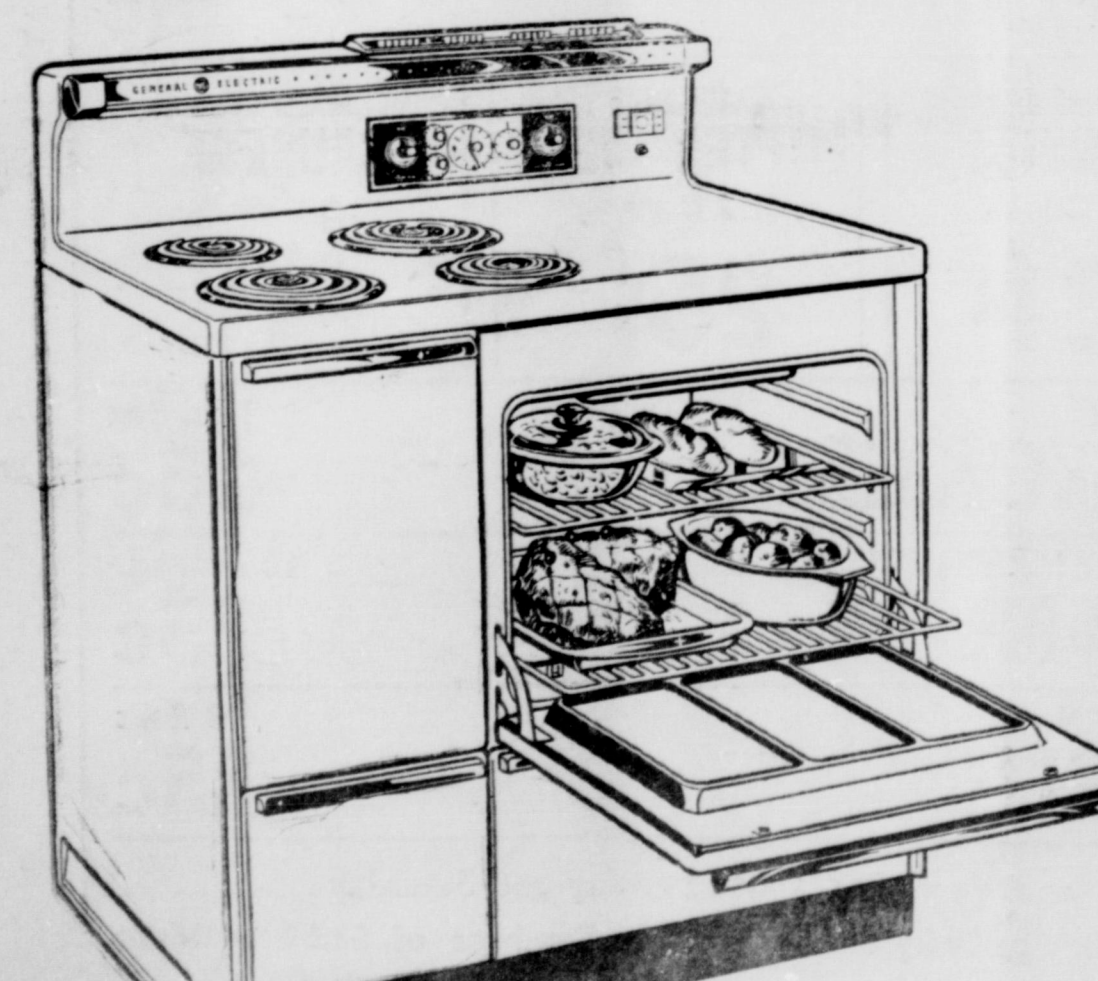
