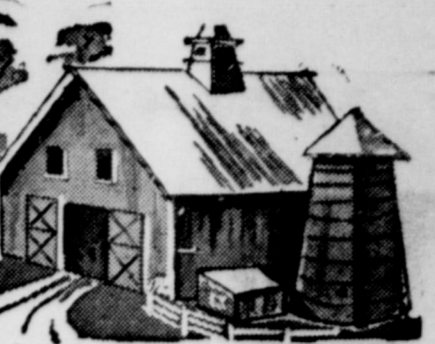

RY LEVITT GO TO STATE

Levitt, 17-year-old son of Mrs. Carl Levitt of Wheeler, has been selected to attend the State in Austin, June 4-5. Burton, secretary of the West-Passons American Post, announced this week.

State is a program of the American Legion, Department of Education, for the purpose of training the young men of the local region.

Levitt is selected by the high school and Legion officials on the basis of scholarship, character, leadership ability, and ability to get along with students. Sections are made up of the following percentage: Leadership, 50 per cent; character and integrity, 25 per cent; and scholarship 25 per cent.

State is a plan for training the functional aspects of citizenship. Its purpose is to teach the young men today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government.

The program, originated in Illinois in 1934, has been adopted by the National Organization of the American Legion and is now in operation in 45 states.

The entire program is non-partisan. The objective is to educate the youth in the duties, privileges, and responsibilities of American citizenship.

3 Rural Accidents Investigated During April In County

The Highway Patrol investigated three rural accidents in Wheeler County during the month of April, according to Sergeant E. G. Albers Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for a property damage of \$2,800. This brings the total for 1961 in this county to two killed, 11 injured and a property damage of \$17,575.

"A driver who learns and complies with traffic laws can never prevent as many accidents as a driver who learns and complies with both traffic and defensive driving procedures," the sergeant stated. A traffic law describes what a driver must do or not do. Procedure describes ways in which a driver can comply with the law or do something extra that will increase his safety and prevent suggestion.

"For example, the law says that no person shall park a vehicle upon the paved or main-traveled part of the highway. A driver complies with this law on a rural highway when his car barely clears pavement. Procedure, in this instance when possible a reasonable would require the driver to park a greater distance from the pavement," the sergeant explained.

Accreditation REPORT FROM KELTON SCHOOL

(Editor's Note: The accreditation team of Noel Higgins, Walter Labay and Clemon Montgomery visited the Kelton school on April 4. This is the first time in 6 years that Kelton has been re-moved from the deficiency list. They are now fully accredited, according to Superintendent C. L. Lamb.)

The Kelton Independent School District serves pupils from a 132 square mile area of northwest County.

Patrons voted last August to become an independent school district. The assessed valuation of taxable property has been increased from \$685,184 to \$968,363 since the accreditation visit last year. The tax rate is now .2 per \$100 evaluation. It was increased from .190 to \$2 this year. The tax rate is divided to provide \$150 for maintenance and operation and 50 cents for retirement of a bonded indebtedness of \$44,000.

The instruction staff consisted of eight classroom teachers, and one vocational homemaker teacher. The superintendent teaches two classes this year. The school has the services of a school nurse one day per week and a cooperative music teacher two days per week. The salaries of 2 1/2 teacher-units are paid from local funds.

All teachers were certified for the area in which they were teaching; one teacher who had an emergency teaching permit.

The school is to be commended for its physical plant, and for educational improvements made since the 1960 accreditation visit. Specific improvements made to correct deficiencies reported last year (Continued on Page 8, No. 1)

ATTENTION WEST TEXAS EXES

Dear Exes and Friends of WT:

If you have never seen the window, make a point of visiting the library the next time you are on the campus. We are proud of it, and hope to show Mr. Tschtl our appreciation by a successful campaign of stamp-gathering.

Enclosed is a brief outline of the history and description of the window.

A project unique in art and library annals is a feature in the Library of West Texas State College. Mr. Hans Tschtl, Professor of Art at the University of New Mexico and one of America's lead-

ing experts in stained glass work, installed in August, 1936, a 1500 (you count them) pane stained glass window in the 10 by 16 foot project was Mr. Chris Gikas, former University of New Mexico art student and now Instructor in Art at WT.

The window is located at a stair leading in line with the Library's main entrance so that a person entering the building looks up the marble staircase and the perspective of the abstract design. Constructed in 32 sections, the window is a conception of tones typical of the colorful Southwest. "We hope to have made use of an abstract design so that it has special meaning for this area and served a functional as well as aesthetic purpose within this particular building," Tschtl said.

And certainly it has done just that to the thousands of visitors since its installation. The viewer's imagination is permitted to run rampant—not only in the window itself but on every marbled wall, floor, stairway and glass partition in the building, especially in the afternoon with the western sun streaming through. Some have labeled the masterpiece sunshines; others books. Still others see persons, underwater scenes, landscapes, or just three dimensional design. Regardless of the motivation it produces, all who view the dazzling arrangement are impressed.

Publicity for the Library with the project is immeasurable. The building is adjacent to the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum which annually attracts 100,000 persons. Talks and lectures concerning the window have brought other organizations to the building. Educationally, it is the example of stained glass for children of the area to view. Alumni of the college are becoming aware of the extension services of the Library through the window approach.

Termed a labor of love, the artists created and placed the window with no compensation for their hours of work because they were interested in presenting a window of the kind to the Panhandle area to show what stained glass can be. Though currently valued at \$10,000, only the cost of the actual materials in construction is being paid the donors. A W.T. Fund, backed by the Ex-Students Organization, has been established to pay for the materials.

In the meantime, the aesthetic value of the project continues to grow, becoming a part of each person entering the library building.
