Mrs. Howell, ill of cancer for several months, died of cancer at 5:45 a.m. Friday, June 23 at Levelland Hospital.  
A second funeral service was conducted at the Baptist Church of Chillicothe Sunday, with burial in Chillicothe cemetery.  
Mrs. Howell had been a resident of Levelland for several years before moving to Andrews in September of 1960, where her husband was employed as advertising manager of the Andrews County News. The following article was taken from the Levelland Daily Sun News and was written by Orlin Brewer.  
This writer, personally, is closer to the second death to hit our town this week, that of Mrs. J. C. Howell, wife of our fellow worker here at the Levelland Daily Sun News for several years.  
Annie Mae was ill for long months prior to her death Friday morning, a victim of dread cancer. She was claimed at the very peak of usefulness of her life, a mother still rearing her children—much loved and desperately needed in this capacity.  
Those of us who stood helplessly by have been deeply touched by this loss, aware that words cannot comfort. There can be little comfort to this immediate family and friends that a cure for cancer may be on its way—maybe in a year or two, or a decade.  
As with the many victims of polo over the years, either maimed or dead, there will be the knowledge only that it come too late. Neither words nor logic can explain this.

## Troy Jones Admitted To Rehabilitation Center At Warm Springs

Troy Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Lee Jones, R-1 Wheeler, was admitted to the Texas Rehabilitation Center, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, on June 19.

At the Center, he will have a program of rehabilitation treatments prescribed for him by the medical director, a specialist in physical medicine and rehabilitation.  
The medical program at TRC is made up of physical therapy, occupational therapy, clinical psychology, speech therapy, 24-hour rehabilitation nursing, and recreational therapy. These are prescribed as needed for the individual patient.  
In rehabilitation at the Center, the entire person is considered. Church services are offered, there is a school for children, and entertainment programs are held regularly. The goal is maximum rehabilitation—physically, socially, and emotionally—so the person can live and work to the best of his abilities.  
TRC is a non profit, non-sectarian hospital which assures needed care to Texans of all ages who have been disabled by many kinds of accidents and diseases. About 55 percent of the operating budget must come from contributions of Texas citizens.

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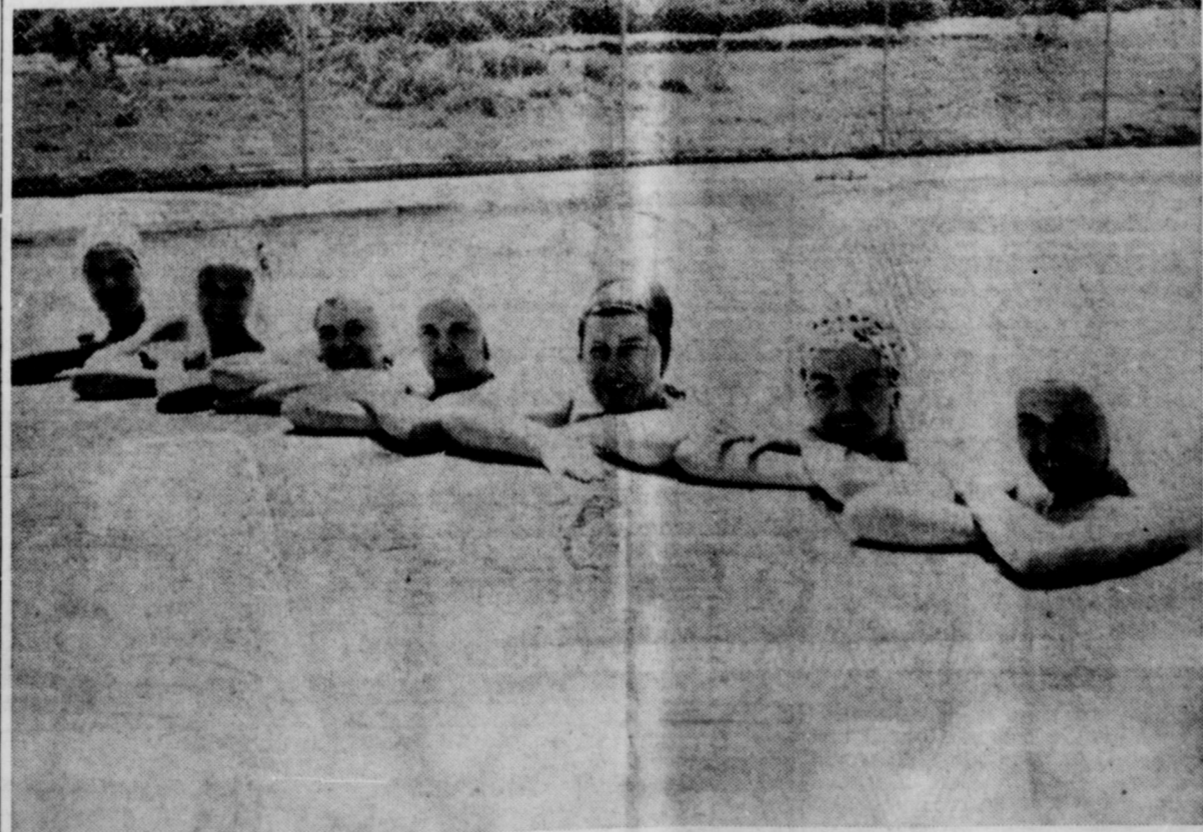

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin, Tex. — State Capitol is having a relatively quiet period—somewhat like the "eye" of a hurricane.

Legislators are at home, and Gov. Price Daniel has gone to Hawaii for the National Governor's Conference. Officially, the "time-out" ends July 10 when the special tax session begins.

But despite the lull, sharp gusts of differing opinion are still blowing. Before leaving, Gov. Daniel issued a parting blast at lobbyists in particular and critics of his anti-sales tax stand in general. He is thinking of asking for tighter job-

by control measurements, particularly in regard to reporting of money spent to influence legislation. He also accused opponents of his tax plan of being unwilling to compromise.

Lawmakers are having their say before the Daniel-appointed committee to study tax measures. Sen. Wardlow Lane, sponsor of the state-passed sales tax bill took a dim view of the "compromise" talk. Legislature compromised on taxes in 1959, he reminded, and the state government ended up more deeply in debt.

As to lobby control, Sen. Lane

said the Legislature had already passed the measure that the governor had said would do the job. In general, Sen. Lane urged a stop to politicking and get on the job approach.

**New Laws Completed** — Before leaving for Hawaii, Gov. Daniel signed scores of bills into law, vetoed a few, and otherwise cleared the decks from the 57th regular session.

He signed a bill which will allow the University of Houston to become fully state-supported in the fall of 1963. This bill was the capstone of the month-long filibuster in the Senate.

He let become law, without his signature, a measure known as the Carling Brewery bill, also highly controversial. It was sought by the Carling Brewery which plans to build a \$29,999,000 plant in Fort Worth. Under the bill, a brewery may continue to operate in an area even if it is voted dry. By not signing it, the governor demonstrated his lack of enthusiasm.

Altogether the Legislature passed 549 bills in the regular session. Only 14 were vetoed by the governor.

**School Bus Prices Probed**—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has launched inquiry into the prices being paid by the state for school buses.

Wilson announced courts of inquiry to be held in Austin, Dallas, and perhaps in San Antonio. He said investigation had been under way for six weeks and had revealed that Texas was paying from 10 to 25 per cent more for school buses than other states. He said there was no evidence of identical bids, but that he felt there was a strong possibility of "rigged bidding."

**Parent Liability Upheld** — In a recent case, the Supreme Court refused to change a lower court decision that the law holding parents liable up to \$300 for damage caused by their children is constitutional.

Challenging the law was a father whose 15-year-old son had stolen and wrecked a car. Three courts upheld the constitutionality of the law and the father's responsibility.

It holds parents liable for "malicious and willful" destruction of property by children between 10 and 18 years of age.

**Insurance Hike Forecast**—Higher auto insurance premiums are predicted by officials of the State Board of Insurance.

Board has the matter under advisement after a public hearing. New rates, if set, will go into effect Aug. 1.

**Gas Tax Rollings Asked**—Probability of a strong push for a gas tax in the coming special session was indicated by Gov. Daniel's request for opinions for Atty. Gen. Will Wilson on the constitutionality of two such proposals.

One is a proposal by Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston which would require the holders of contracts for dedicated gas reserves to guarantee the state a tax of at least one cent on each 1,000 cubic feet of gas produced.

Another by Rep. George Hinson of Mineola, is a rewrite of the severance beneficiary tax passed in 1956 and since held unconstitutional by the courts. Gov. Daniel has said that the 1956 bill would have stood up in court if it had been enacted as he recommended.

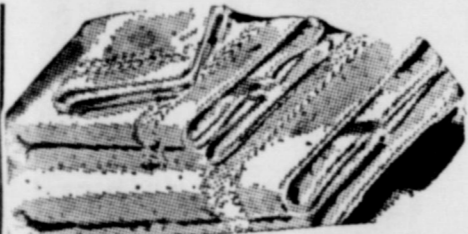

The chapel also houses a museum of Lee battlefield and family mementoes and a valuable art collection including original portraits of Washington, Madison and Lafayette. Here, too, is the famous Recumbent Statue of Lee by Edward Valentine and Lee's personal office. Henry Ford II, president of the fund, said, "Our trustees believe it to be most important to maintain the Lee Chapel as a priceless spiritual and historic possession for the South and for the nation."

## GRASSHOPPERS AND COTTON APHIDS ON THE BUILD UP

Grasshoppers and cotton aphids are building up in the county according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent. The grasshoppers are confined to a small area now and are much easier controlled than they will be after they scatter from their hatching beds. Now, spraying this small area with one of the following: Toxaphene, 1 to 2 quarts per acre; Heptachlor, 1 to 2 pints per acre; Dieldrin, 1 to 1 1/3 pints per acre or Aldrin, 1 to 1 1/2 pints per acre should give guide for Controlling Insects published by the Texas Extension Service.

Cotton Aphids (plant lice) are building up and causing cotton seedlings to stop growth. These insects are small green bugs found on the under side of the cotton leaf and suck sap from the leaf causing a stunting of the plant and severe cases honeydew, which is a silver color on the plant leaf. First appearance of plant aphids in cot-

ton is the cupping of the leaves. When a majority of the leaves of the plants show damage, spraying is about the only alternative. Cotton Aphids may be controlled with one of the following sprays according to the Texas Insect Guide: Parathion, 1 to 1 1/2 pints per acre; Demeton, 1/2 to 1 pint per acre or Malathion, 1 to 1 1/2 pints per acre.

The cloudy and humid weather we have had lately is ideal for a build up and aphids can set the cotton plant growth back two or four weeks if allowed to build up in damaging numbers according to the county agent.

The agent said cotton boll weevils have overwintered in windbreaks in the county and are numerous around cottonwood windbreaks. Therefore, farmers probably will have trouble with boll weevils this year and should be on the watch for them at a later date or even now they might check

their windbreaks around their farms. A spray machine is a small investment compared with the value of a cotton crop. Farmers might check now on the availability of purchasing a spraying machine.

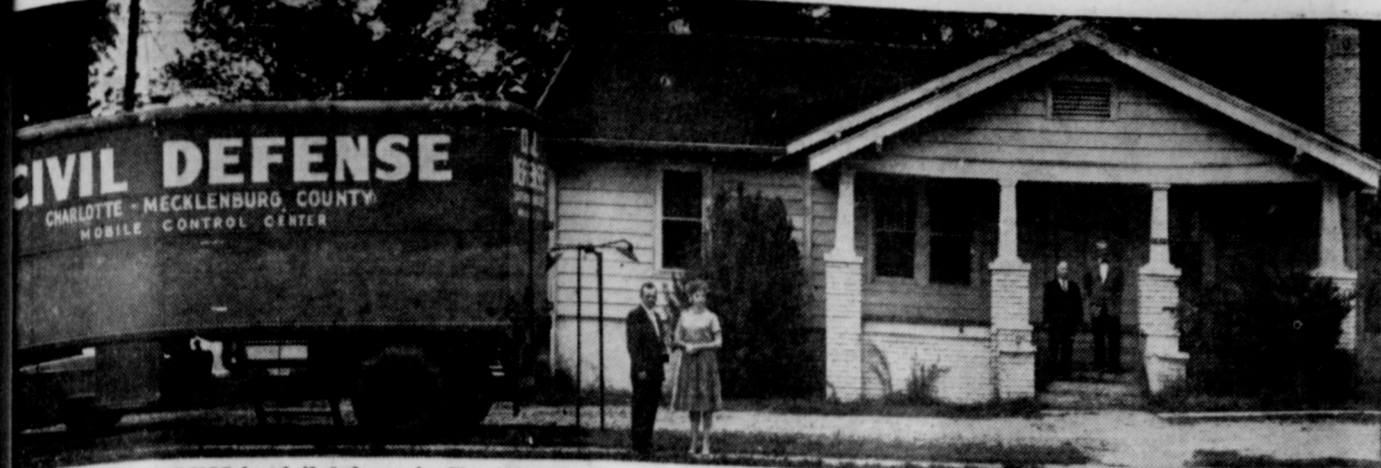

## NEW LAW AIDS C.D. BUILDUP

New muscle for understaffed State and local civil defense agencies is now resulting from a Federal program to match 50-50 with States or localities the expenses of additional civil defense personnel.

This new program, authorized by Public Law 85-606, provides \$5,000,000 in the current fiscal year for the hiring of additional State and local civil defense personnel and to meet added expenses such as office rental, furniture, necessary equipment and official travel. This is the first time Federal funds have supplemented State or local civil defense salary or administrative expenses. States and localities have requested funds for 3,633 employees under this program.

FRANK B. ELLIS, Director of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, who administers the shared-cost program, stresses that the funds must be used to expand State and local civil defense capabilities and that hiring must be on a merit basis. Ellis declares: "We cannot maintain a status quo in civil emergency plan-

ning in the face of tensions that now beset the world. Civil defense at the local level must expand to keep pace with our national need to strengthen our resistance to aggression and measure up to the President's expressed demand for maximum effectiveness in civil emergency operations."

A typical example of how Public Law 606 is helping our States is that of North Carolina. Under its director, Major General Edward F. Griffin, the North Carolina Civil Defense Agency has hired 21 professional and clerical people to strengthen the State's readiness for emergency action. Hitherto its staff of 11 persons was hard-pressed to maintain a basic minimum of readiness for emergency preparedness.

THE STATE, which was allocated \$113,000 by ODCM, passed on \$53,040 of its allotment to local civil defense organizations for the hiring of an additional 39 persons. The bulk of these are clerical workers, whose shortage in the past often has hobbled the executive staff with routine but necessary tasks.

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Stubble mulch farming is known as farming with as much crop residues on top of the soil as possible. This is sometimes known as trash farming. All tillage operations are performed to leave crop residues on top of the soil the year round, planting the next crop in the stubble. This gives protection to the young seedling, adds organic matter to the soil by the decaying of the crop residues and gives better stands due to maintaining moisture close to the surface. It also serves another purpose which most of us are able to visualize. This being protection of our valuable soil against wind and water erosion. Wind and water erosion is our most common loss, either muddy water running across a field or dust in the air we breathe.

Stubble mulch farming can aid this situation a great deal. The crop residues on top of the soil tends to obstruct the movement of water, giving it more time to penetrate the soil and leaves a cover to keep the small soil particles from blowing during high winds.

On the Rolling Plains as well as High Plains country, where a mechanical practice such as terraces are needed to aid in the control of water erosion, stubble mulch farming fits into the farming operation and greatly aids the control of water erosion.

Some of the types of equipment used in stubble mulch tillage are large sweeps, rod weeds, blade type implements, cultivators, and close spaced sweeps.

We should not need any encouragement to save our soil from eroding, because our country was first known for its farming. Control of erosion should be enough reason for leaving our crop residues on the surface of the soil. We know our land cannot be farmed when it is up in the air, as it was in the 1930's, or washing down our streams when we have rain. No one wants to admit that this soil belongs to him, whether it is in the air or going down stream with the water.

Stubble mulch farming is not an inconvenience but a soil and water saver. It will fit into any cropping system and be very useful. In the event of a dry year and crop residues are not produced, a tillage operation leaving the surface rough or in a cloddy condition will aid in preventing wind and water erosion. Now is the time to think about saving your soil. Call on your Soil Conservation District Supervisors for assistance or see your local Soil Conservation technicians. They will be happy to assist you in carrying out a sound conservation plan on your farm.

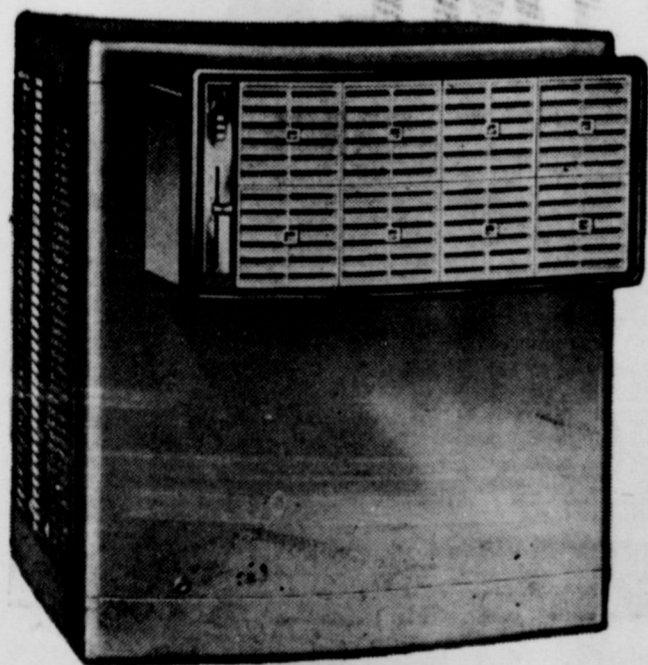

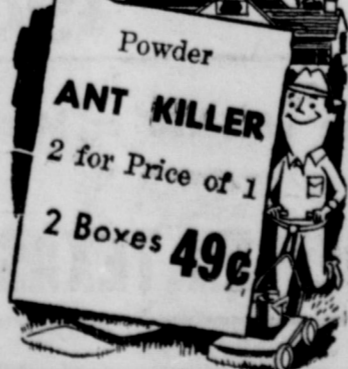

This is the first time that the wife of a Japanese premier has accompanied him on an official visit to a foreign country — an indication of the new status of Japanese women. Mr. Ikeda's visit to the U.S. is for discussions with President Kennedy and other governmental leaders on matters of mutual interest and concern.

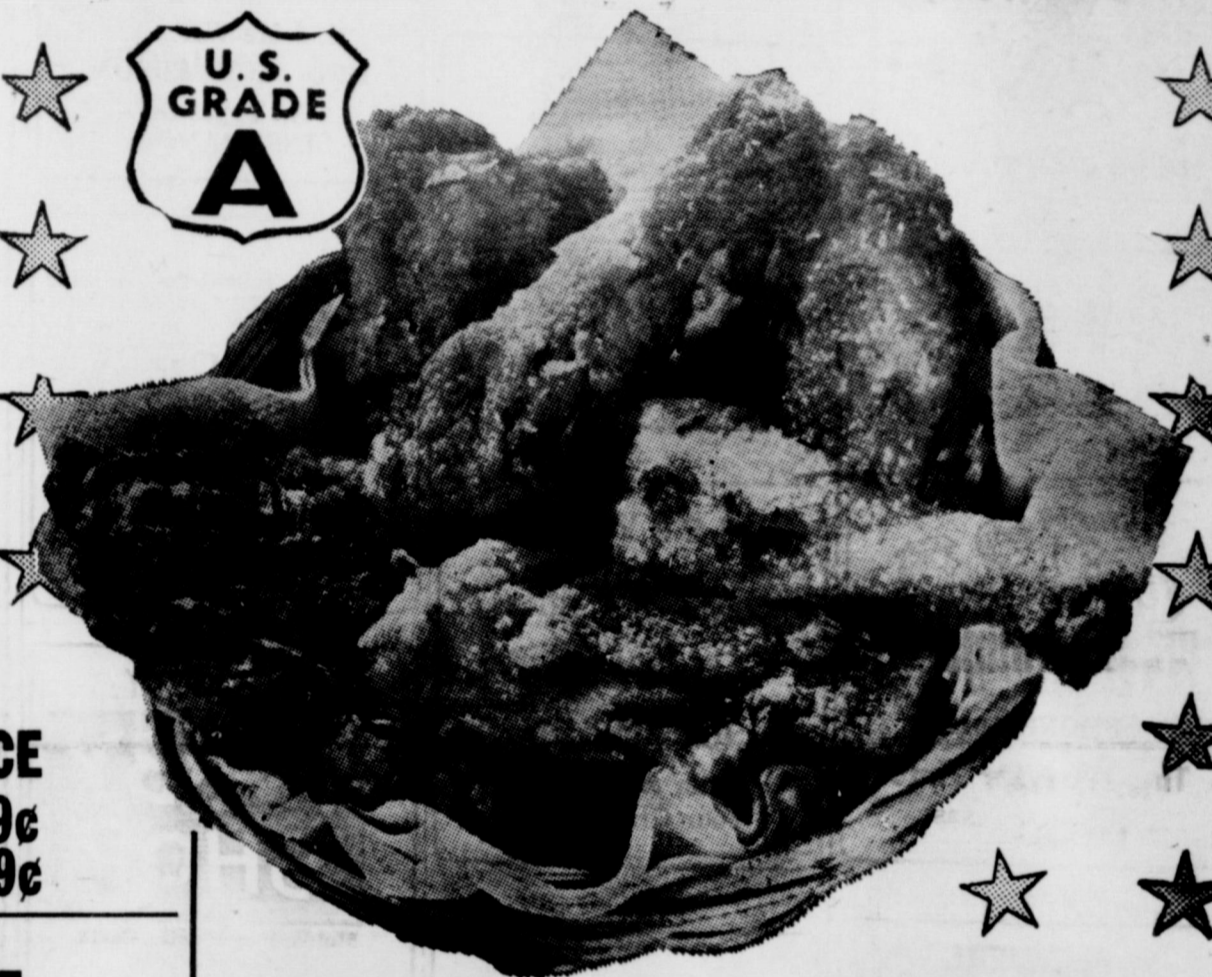
