PROGRESS

I am a Democratic Candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the fifth in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

Texas receives more Federal Aid per capita than any other State in our nation. Only New York and California receive more total dollars in Federal Aid than does Texas.

In Texas 90% of our Federal Aid goes to highway construction and our State Welfare Program. I am for receiving these Federal Aids. Our Defense Highways must be constructed to accommodate military weapons during time of war. Our Federal Government is responsible for the defense of this country. Therefore, their specifications must be met. Our State Welfare Program and the acceptance of Federal Aid to this program is provided in amendments to our Texas Constitution.

A vigorous economy in this State must be encouraged. We have relied on a colony type economy in this State by placing emphasis on exporting our raw materials. We must encourage the converting of these raw materials into the finished product within our State and export the finished product. We must encourage major development of our deep water ports and provide for a vigorous export trade in our finished products and our surplus raw materials.

We must develop an economy based on a solid foundation which will weather any storm. Many of you will say that we have a good economy now. Let's assume world peace and total disarmament are obtained and our military establishments, defense plants and all dependent industry suddenly stopped. Our present good life would collapse overnight. We need to rely upon solid economics and every attempt at that goal should be encouraged by our State Government.

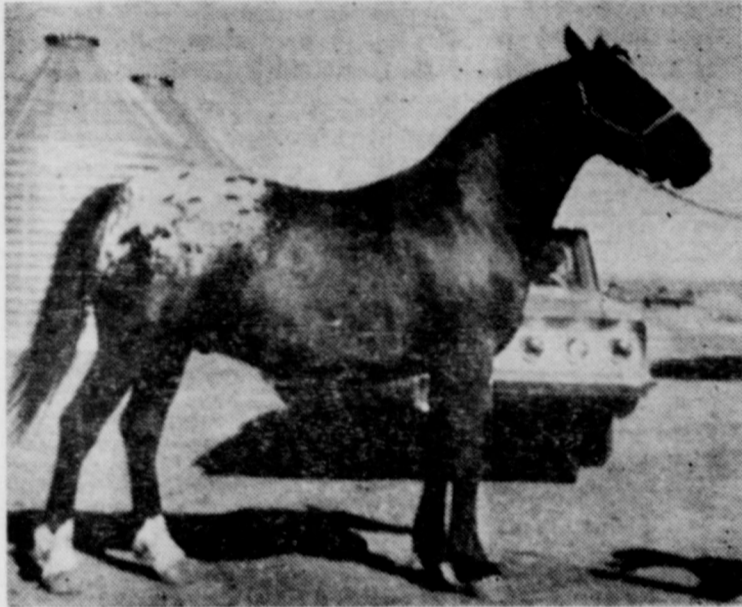

WATERWAYS

There are many farms and ranches in this area that have large gullies that are taking away valuable top soil. In many instances this can be corrected by means of a grassed waterway. In most cases it will not be a very big job or take very much money to stop this type of erosion.

A large amount of water that is concentrated in one small area will soon wash a ditch in a field that cannot be crossed with farm equipment. When this same amount of water is spread over a flat bottom waterway that has good vegetation and the velocity is slowed, no damage is done.

Someone will say that they do not want to waste enough of their good soil to construct a waterway. In many cases it will not take very many acres, and what it does take, need not be wasted. After a waterway is well established with vegetation it will not hurt it to cut it for hay or graze it, as long as it is not over used. In fact to maintain a waterway in good condition, it is recommended that it be grazed or mowed for hay.

If you have an erosion problem of this nature you can receive cost-share assistance through the ASCS office or through the Great Plains program. You can also receive technical help from the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service that assist the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District with soil erosion problems of this county.

**Feed Grain Program
Should Be Studied**

"Wheeler County farmers should study how participation in the 1962 Feed Grain Program will affect their net farm income," says County Agent Bryan Swaim.

Swaim can now provide budget, corn, grain sorghum and spring barley. Farmers can use these forms in estimating net income if they participate or don't participate in the program.

By comparing these estimates, Swaim says, farmers will have a better basis for making their decision.

Under provisions of the program, farmers will receive payments for diverting to conservation use 20 to 40 percent of their feed grain acreages. In addition, feed grain crops raised on remaining land will be eligible for price supports.

So farmers have several alternatives on extent of participation. Each will have a different effect their net income, Agent Swaim points out.

Copies of the budget form are available at the county agent's office. Swaim says he will be glad to assist farmers in use of the form in considering the alternative choices.

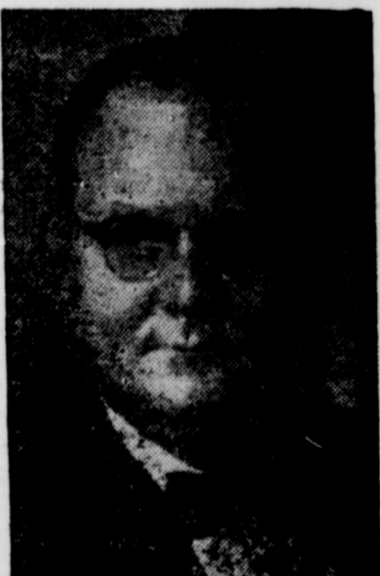

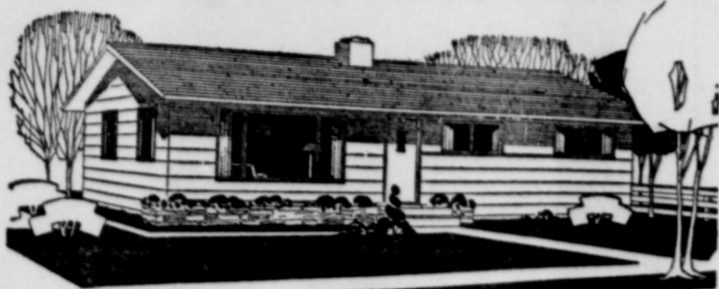
