Mr. Lancaster and McCasland have agreed to have their names placed on the ballots. ROBBERS TAKE \$900.00 FROM MOBEETIE BANK

Band robbers pried their way into the First State Bank at Mobeetie Tuesday night and made off with over \$900.00 in silver. After an investigation Wednesday by law enforcement officers from Gray and Wheeler Counties, three Bank robbers pried their way into the bank. It seemed to be their opinion that the job was done by professionals, inasmuch as certain types of tools were used to punch in the vault locks after combinations were knocked off.

Cotton Ridgeway, assistant cashier discovered the robbery at 7:20 a.m. Wednesday when he opened the bank. Ridgeway notified the other bank officials, and summoned Sheriff Bus Dorman. Deputy Sheriff John Topper of Shamrock, D. L. Day, Deputy Sheriff of Pampa, Texas Ranger, Bill Hensley worked with FBI Agents and Sheriff Bus Dorman at the scene of the crime Wednesday obtaining finger prints. Late Wednesday Sheriff Bus Dorman said there were definite leads as to the robbers' trail after leaving Mobeetie.

Henry Flanagan, bank president, reported that the robbers did not break into the main vault which contained the bank's heaviest deposits of currency.

The two vaults were battered open with what appeared to be a small sledge hammer, according to Sheriff Bus Dorman. The combinations were knocked off and the pins were punched in allowing the robbers to open the doors of the records vault and the lock-box vault.

A spokesman for the bank said it had been determined that \$907.70 had been taken from the records vault in rolls made up of nickels, dimes, quarters and half-dollars. Papers which had been taken from the lock-boxes, had been scattered over the floor.

Sheriff Dorman stated that Mrs. Earl Williams reported Wednesday afternoon that some rings were missing from their lock-box. Mrs. Williams had been keeping some diamond rings and old wedding bands, family keepsakes, in their lock-box.

According to Sheriff Bus Dorman the robbers also stole a 45 calibre pistol and a 28 calibre snub-nose from the records vault.

DANIELS SIGNS DIST.-CO. CLERK BILL INTO LAW

State Representative Grainger McIlhenny received a telegram from Governor Daniels over the weekend informing him that he, the governor, had signed Senate Bill No. 66.

The pre-existing law on this subject called for automatic joining of the offices of county and district clerk when the county population became less than 8,000. The change of S. B. 66 is to authorize the County Commissioners Court, where it believes an election is needed, to call an election to determine if these offices are to be joint or separate. If no election is called or if a majority vote is against the separate office issue, then the two offices will still be joined under the provision of S. B. 66.

S. B.66 specifies that such election must be called at least 30 days before the primary election and that at least 20 days notice in newspapers must be given before the election is held.

A special session of the commissioners court met Wednesday morning and after one hour decided to hold an election on March 24 to determine whether or not the offices will be combined.

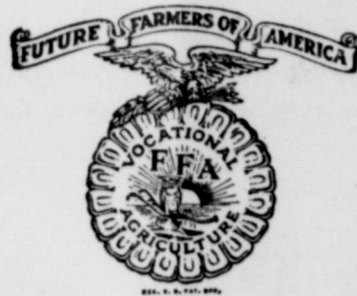
Mr. Wilks and his wife, Kathryn have two children, Kathy, age 4, and Jeff age 2.

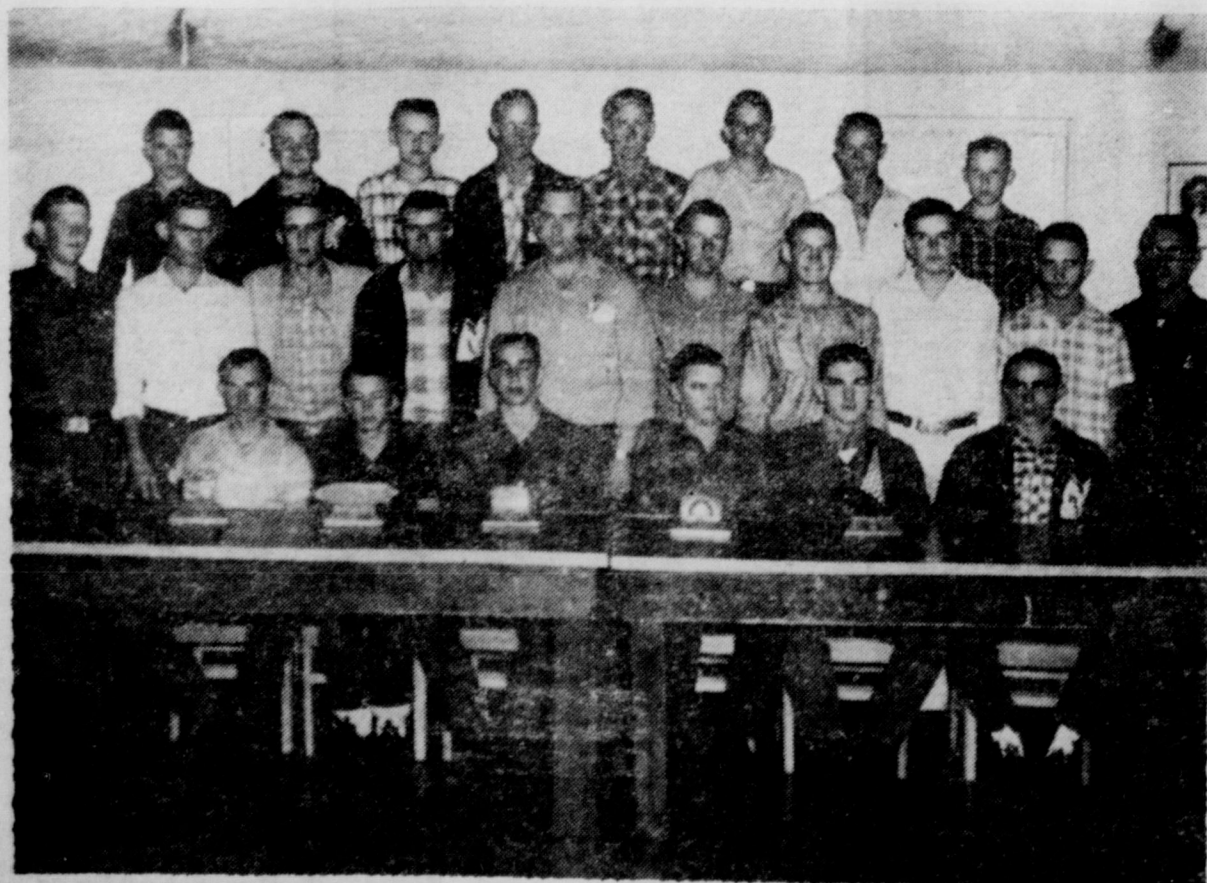

Mrs. Edwards had just returned home with her father, Scott Helton, who had surgery recently in an Amarillo hospital.

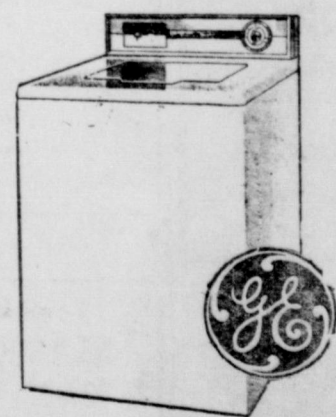
Progressive Study Club Has Cook Review

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BUREAU EBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO 35, ILLINOIS



"FOUR KINDS OF MEN"

According to St. Paul's inspired epistles, the human race is divided into four categories.

1. "The natural man," i.e., the fallen son of Adam, as he is, without God. Of him the apostle says: "The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God; for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned" (I Cor 2:14).

This is not intended as a rebuke. It is a simple statement of fact. Mere intellectual acumen is no guarantee of spiritual understanding.

2. "The 'babe in Christ.'" When a person sees himself as a sinner and trusts Christ as his Savior, he is "born again" and becomes a "babe in Christ" But babes can and should grow, so these are exhorted: "As newborn babes desire the pure milk of the Word, that ye may grow thereby" (I Pet. 2:2).

3. The carnal Christian, is one who, though perhaps a Christian for years, has not grown, due to indifference and neglect of the Word of God. He still has to be treated as a babe in Christ. The Corinthian believers were examples of this. Paul had to write them: "I . . . could not speak unto you as unto spiritual but as unto carnal, even as unto babes in Christ. I have fed you with milk, and not with meat; for hitherto ye were not able to bear (digest) it, neither yet now are ye able" (I Cor. 3:1,2). Everybody loves a baby, but the joy that fills the hearts of loving, parents turns to bitterest sorrow if their babe fails to grow.

4. The spiritual Christian, is one who, through prayerful study of the Word of God has grown to spiritual maturity. He is no longer merely a child of God; he is a "man of God." We should all "desire the pure milk of the Word that we may grow thereby—"That we henceforth be no longer children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine" (Eph. 4:15). Let us then heed St. Peter's inspired exhortation: "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ" (II Pet. 3:18).

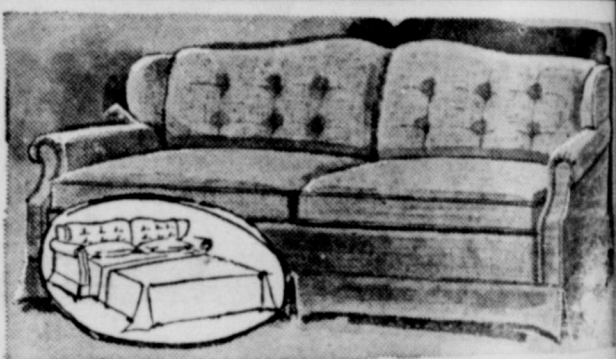

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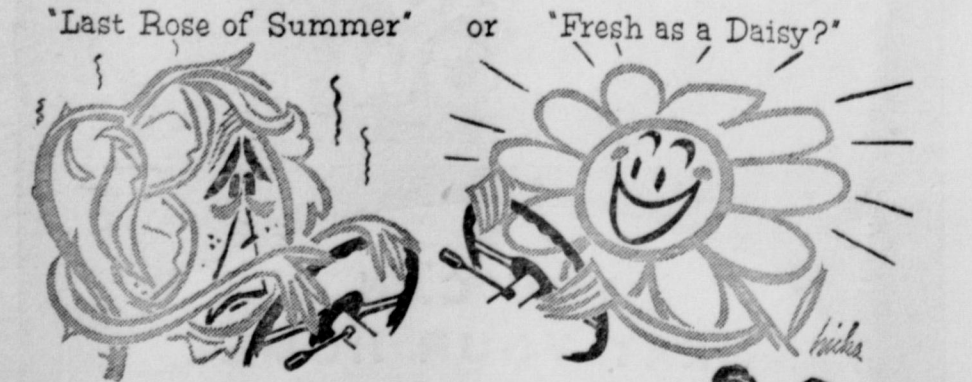

ALL ABOUT YOUR SCHOOL

This week brings us to our first six-weeks period for this, the second semester of 1961-62 school year. Everyone should be setting aside adequate time in which to study, review, and prepare for these tests. The school year is rapidly passing by and we, the pupils, parents and teachers need to work together in order to improve our children's grade marks.

We are very proud of our many improvements during the past two and one-half years and justly so. It seems to me, however, that now is the time to take a good look at our future long-term needs. To do this we would need to ask some questions.

Are our school facilities, buildings and equipment adequate? If not, how much of a program of new building and equipment do we need, say for a period of ten to fifteen years?

In the event we decide that the improvements are vital to our future, how much would they cost? How would we raise the money, by a bond issue or some other method. If so, what would the tax rate be?

There are two other ways of operating a school, and I, as your administrator, believe that the best way is to use to the best advantage what we now have, and to continue adding to it. The other way is to merely plan for the present, with no thought as to future needs.

Think about our Elementary Building, completed, I think, in 1928. How could it be modernized? By removing the second story, and building new ground floor rooms? Do we need a new band room, in relation to take care of the noise? How about our cafeteria? Are we satisfied with that building? Does our high school need more rooms added? Should we modernize it by putting tile on all the floors, re-decorating the rooms, re-doing the windows?

I have asked all these thought-provoking questions in order that we, your school board and I, may have the benefit of your thinking on these very important plans for the future education of our most precious gift, our children. We will expand these ideas in the near future.

Texas Public Schools Week is coming soon, March 5-10. Make your plans now to visit your school during that time, especially the Open House and Program, on Monday, March 5 at 7:30 p.m.

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AXE LAID UNTO THE ROOT

Those of us who have gone out into the woods with an axe to prepare timber land for cultivation can well understand the significance of "an axe laid unto the root of the tree". For, upon the "laying of the axe to the root of the tree", the tree becomes disconnected with its ability to experience photosynthesis and therefore produce no more leaves, twigs, or acorns—it is separated (or dead) in its condition of having been parted with its roots.

"There came a man sent from God, whose name was John." John 1:6 saying, "And now also the axe is laid unto the root of the trees; therefore every tree which bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire." Matt 3:10. When we begin to realize that John was in the wilderness preaching—not chopping wood—we begin to realize from his terminology what God set out to accomplish through preaching. God has been able through all his messengers (John included) to get to the very root of man's problems, as well as the very source of man's words and actions.

Oftentimes, such a procedure of going back to the beginning (roots) or bottom of any religious subject or idea, is termed as a RADICAL approach. Since the earliest meaning of the term RADICAL suggests, "of, pertaining to, or proceeding from, the root, original; fundamental; reaching to center or ultimate source" (Webster), YOU AND I SHOULD NOT FLINCH WHEN WE ARE LABELLED AS RADICAL, when we attempt to conduct our speech and life as first century Christians who were being taught by Christ through the apostles. Jesus, himself, was RADICAL in His teachings, for he said, "Because of the hardness of your heart Moses permitted . . . but from the beginning it was not so." Matt 19:8.

Nineteen centuries stand between the first and twentieth century man. You and I would do well to remember that the first century Christian "continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and prayers." Acts 2:42. You and I would be most wise to measure our life, preaching, worship etc. by that of the first century Christian who was led by the Savior through the Apostles when He had already ascended back to Heaven from his earthly visit. (See the historical book of ACTS for sermons, inspired record of worship etc. of the apostles and first century Christians.)

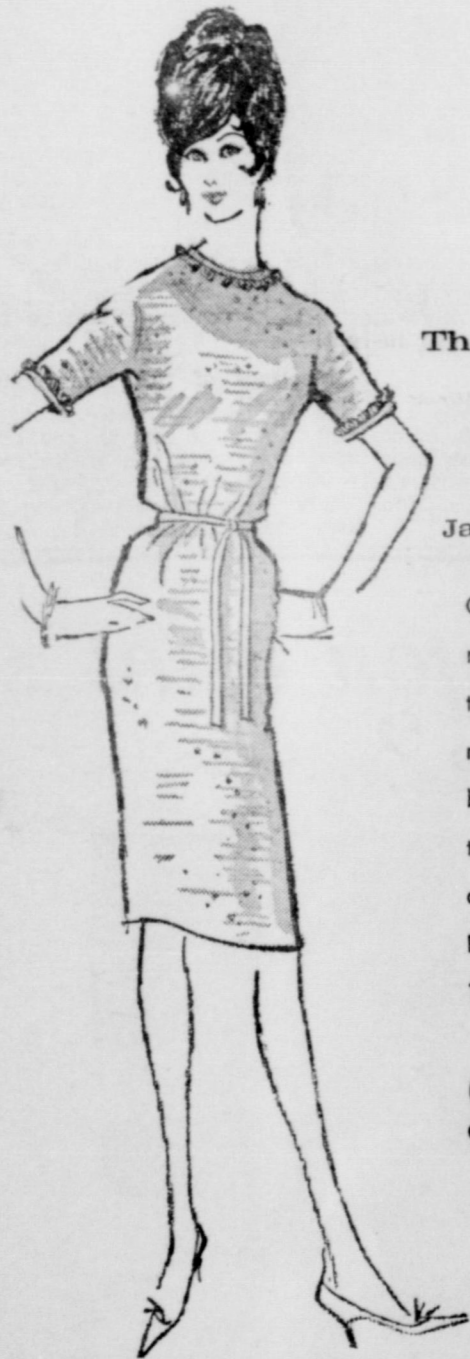

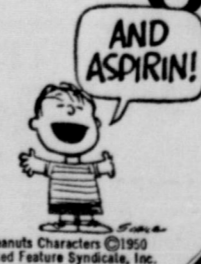
