## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin, Tex. — Amid the sound and fury of the tax battle in the Legislature, Texans—new to the idea of far-reaching sales taxes—could be heard trying to get to the bottom of things by calculating their effect upon such things as baby's diapers.

The key to many discussions, both in the Legislative chambers and in the Capitol corridors, was the term "outer wearing apparel," to be exempt from sales taxes. It seemed simple enough at first when the proposal was to exempt such articles costing less than \$10, the intention being to exempt work clothes, but many a question popped up when the tax writers went into details and spelled out that this exemption would not include accessories like "cuff links, belts, ties, scarves, billfolds, hand bags, canes, unattached buttons, ornamental jewelry of any type, bathing suits, sleeping garments, bathrobes, lingerie, negligees and lounging pajamas."

Clearly, baby's diapers are outer wearing apparel. But, do they remain in that status when covered with rubber or plastic pants? Nobody could readily answer the question. That was something to be decided later.

And what about bathing suits? These certainly are not undergarments—except of course, when worn under street clothes. And who ever wears anything "outer" than a bathrobe?

Then there was the more serious talk about the definition of work clothes. The exemption was confined to those made of cotton, twill, poplin, denim, and chambray. Suppose, somebody questioned, a man ran across a pair of blue denims with nylon knees?

And why, a white collar worker asked, shouldn't his wool trousers be exempt, too, since he works in them?

During the Sales Tax debate, Senator Wardlow Lane of Center quipped, "I'm personally not for any kind of tax . . . just like I'm not for pneumonia, death or anything else bad . . ."

**Attorney General Rules**—An Attorney General's opinion holds that the state's admission tax does not apply to tickets to baseball, football and basketball games, but is applicable to horse races, dog races, motorcycle races, auto races, dance halls, night clubs, skating rinks, "and any and all like places

of amusement, contests and exhibitions."

**State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert**, who asked for the ruling, was advised that horse races are subject to the tax because they are specifically mentioned in the tax law, while baseball, football and basketball games are not.

**Referendum On Horse Race Betting Sought**—Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio, who got nowhere with his bill to legalize horse race gambling in Texas and another calling for statewide referendum on the question, doesn't plan to give up.

Representative Berry said petitions are being circulated by members of the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association asking support of a Democratic party referendum from 10 per cent of the qualified voters in Texas. He estimated 155,000 signatures will be necessary to cause the State Democratic Executive Committee to submit the proposition to the voters in the first Democratic primary election next May.

The petition, he said, calls for submission of a constitutional amendment to the electorate.

**Historic Document On Water Problem**—"If Texans cannot change the weather, they can at least through sound, farsighted planning, conserve and develop water resources to supply their needs."

So said the State Board of Water Engineers as it turned in to Gov. Price Daniel the state's first comprehensive, projected plan for meeting the industrial, municipal and other water needs in 1980.

Governor Daniel termed the 200-page document, which envisions the construction of 45 new reservoirs over the state, "one of the great things in the life of our state."

The board made the observation that the people of Texas have not yet been "aroused to the dire consequences of inaction or to the consequences of building projects which at best provide for only small increases in water needs. . . . In relation to long term future needs in many areas, water is the least abundant of Texas' important natural resources; certainly it is the most indispensable."

The board said that through proper development, Texas has adequate water to meet the municipal and industrial needs in 1980 and sustain agriculture and other uses.

A significant statement in the report was to the effect that such a program as outlined "appears to be within the financial capability of the state and local interests, with federal participation in projects containing flood control."

In short, the so-called "Master Plan" for development of the state's most crucial problems.

**Attack On "Softness" Launched**—Physical education teachers from over the state at a meeting in Austin have come up with a plan to turn talk into action and do something about physical fitness in the schools.

The plan includes 15 minutes of strenuous body exercise in physical education periods; teaching the right way to walk, sit, climb, pull, push and all the other ways the body obeys the laws of physics; teaching games and sports people can use throughout their life including tennis, golf and swimming and other popular sports; teaching the history of games; fitting activities such as folk dancing into social studies; emphasizing sportsmanship a part of social behavior; accomplishing social control through release of tension in athletics; and promoting a favorable attitude toward physical activity both as children and as adults.

**Bus Rates Go Up**—Bus travel in Texas is costing the operators more and so it will be costing the passengers more. No one objected at a hearing which resulted in a general hike of five per cent in bus fares rates approved by the State Railroad Commission.

Operators testified expenses increased 8.9 per cent in 1960 over 1959, against a revenue increase of only 4.6 per cent. The last time bus fares were increased was in 1958.

The increase will be in effect no later than September 1. There were some exceptions to the general five per cent increase, such as an approved boost of 10 per cent for Texas bus lines operating Galveston-Beaumont and Fort Arthur-High Island, and a 10 per cent increase for Texas Electric Bus Lines.

**Governor For A Day**—One of the nicer traditions in Texas politics is that which permits the man who is third in line to the Governorship officially to take over the reins of state government for a day.

By custom, the Governor and Lieutenant Governor absent themselves from the state for a twenty-four hour period so that the Senator who has been elected by his colleagues as President Pro-Tempore of the Senate can step into the Governor's chair.

## Changes In Social Security Law Provides For More Money

"Recent changes in the Social Security Law mean that a beneficiary, generally speaking, can now get more in combined earnings and benefits than he could previously," Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said today.

Beneficiaries who earn over \$1200 will lose one dollar of benefits for each two dollars of earnings between \$1200 and \$1700, and a dollar of benefits for each dollar of earnings over \$1700. Except that they are eligible for social security benefits for any month in which they do not earn over \$100 in wages and have not worked in their own business.

"After age 72, there is no restriction on a person's earnings, although the limits apply to all months before the 72nd birthday," Geldon said.

If you or anyone in your family is receiving old age and survivors insurance and expect to earn over \$1200 during the year, it is important to notify the Social Security Office promptly of such earnings in order to avoid receiving an overpayment. All such overpayments must be repaid.

"This applies to all people receiving social security benefits," Geldon said, "including wives, widows and dependent children under 18 as well as the retired person."

## Cappleman Is F-HA State Director

Lester J. Cappleman of Ladonia, has been appointed State Director for the Farmers Home Administration in Texas. His headquarters are in Dallas. He assumed his duties July 18, 1961.

Mr. Cappleman has returned to the position he held with the Agency for approximately eight years prior to April in 1954. Since that time he has been managing his farm near Ladonia producing livestock, cotton, and alfalfa.

Born in Oklahoma in 1902 when it was known as Indian Territory, Mr. Cappleman attended public schools at Honey Grove, Texas and the Texas A&M College where he majored in agronomy and animal husbandry.

From 1924 to 1934 he farmed in Fannin County.

From 1934 forward, including his eight years as Farmers Home Administration's State Director, Mr. Cappleman worked in the field of supervised credit and related services for family-type farms. He joined the Resettlement Administration at Amarillo after a year with the Federal Relief Administration at Sherman, Texas.

From Amarillo, his work took him to Dallas in 1936 where he served first as loan officer in Resettlement Administration and later as Assistant Regional Director for that Agency's successor, the Farm Security Administration.

In 1941 he transferred to Surplus Marketing Administration as Regional Director, then was in similar positions with Agricultural Marketing, Food Distribution, and War Food Administration, all at Dallas. He became State Director for Farmers Home Administration in 1946.

As State Director, he will have charge of the agency's agricultural credit and farm management program serving farmers in all areas of the state through 126 county offices.

## TEXAS SCHOOL POLICY

By Lee Barry

In the beginning Texas history reveals many brave and valuable soldiers who had had little or no schooling. Most of the leaders were scholars of varied accomplishments. The leaders seemed to sense a need for an educational system.

Merabeau M. Lamar, the second president of the Republic is often referred to as the father of Texas education. He said "A cultivated mind is the guardian genius of a democracy. When guided and controlled by virtue the mind is the noblest attribute of man." He urged that land from the public domain be set aside to establish primary schools and colleges, so that every child in Texas might have an educational opportunity. Many thought that private and church schools would suffice, but more and more people believed that there should be a system of public education. A small beginning was made under the Republic but little was accomplished.

Governor Elisha M. Pease urged the passage of a bill providing \$2,000,000 worth of bonds be set aside as a permanent school fund. The first payment was, 1854, sixty two cents per child. The next year payment was \$1.50. At this time there were very few people in Texas, they were widely scattered. Less than twenty towns had as many as 1,000 population. Any school that could be set up was necessarily financially poor and a fair and just way to distribute state aid was on a per capita basis.

Population and industrial investment have concentrated in certain localities and towns and cities have come into existence. Wealth sometimes increased more rapidly than did the population, schools became larger and more wealthy. The progress and development of industry especially petroleum, has made a few districts fabulously rich. Other rural districts are nearly as poor as they were one hundred years ago. Texas did not then have an adequate school program. Texas has never had an adequate (Rural school) program. If a rural child lives near a city and can adopt city ways which are different from rural life, by sacrificing parental influence and welshing on duties and obligations at home might have full participation in a city school program.

I think the greatest school need in Texas is an adequate program for the child living in a poor district. I think the per capita payment is silly, unjust and wasteful. The Hale-Akin committee missed the boat on both counts. No recommendation on either. They ask for more money for all districts. Some districts are so poor they cannot offer so much as the minimum required by the State, even with the foundation program. Money is the least need of other districts. There are thousands of Texas

children receiving less than the state promised minimum program while large sums are wasted, through the per capita payment, to districts that use the operating funds to hire extra teachers, buy uniforms, musical instruments, and pay bonus teacher salaries. There is nothing wrong with a bonus salary if the district has the money. It is deadweight for the state to furnish even part of the money for one district to rob another district of a good teacher.

The legislature, the state board, the education agency and the supporting cast some or all of you are responsible for the continuation of this condition. If you are interested in public schools then do what you can to improve the distribution of state finances and add a rural program. Texas educational system will be improved.

Texas is infested with a large number of self appointed educational leaders who could try to level a piece of ground by taking dirt from low places and putting it in high places. To improve the Texas educational program apply the assistance where it is needed. Taking money from the poor and giving it to the rich spells discontent in any language.

Consolidation can, and has been, over done. Many children see the school bus coming with the lights on then through the window of the same bus, the same child watches the sun go down. If you say this is alright then that is an experience you have never had. Class education in a public school is worse than no school at all. Any school program that does not provide for the thousands of rural children is a failure from the beginning.

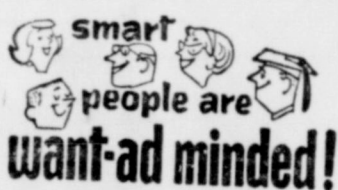
#### Violet Attends 4-H Council Workshop

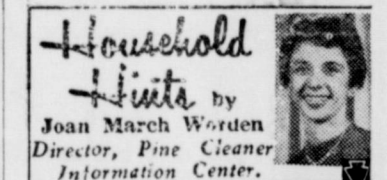

**Household Hints** by Joan March Worden, Director, Pine Cleaner Information Center.

As everyone must know by now, outdoor cookery which sweeps the country like an epidemic from now until snow flies is largely a man's job. It's also, supposedly, his joy. For men, outdoor cooking is:

1. Fun (he can show off at the grill)
2. Rewarding (he gets compliments on his genius as a chef)
3. A creative outlet (he can try new sauces — usually "invented" from his wife's cookbook — and new combination of foods.)

However, we think it is time someone pointed out what outdoor cookery is for the wife (or girl friend). For women, outdoor cooking is:

1. Fun (she can watch her man work — at least for a while)
2. Rewarding (she won't have to vacuum the dining room if the guests are scattering their crumbs on the patio or backyard)
3. A mess (she's the one who has to clean up afterward — and that grill which is her man's keyboard of tricks can, at clean-up time, be her sour note.)

If item three weren't such a problem, items one and two on milady's list would have a better chance. So, here's a hint for the frenzied frau of an outdoor barbecuer: You become a barbecue by latching onto a bottle of pine cleaner and as soon as the grill cools, put it to soak in a pine cleaner "bath".

If it's too big to immerse, soak a sponge in full-strength pine cleaner and lean the grill up against the barbecue pit, or put it flat on the grass. This way the nasty residue of a lovely evening — a grease-and-food-caked grill — can be dissolved away, while you continue to join in the fun. You can then complete the job by swishing clear hot water over the grill and wiping off with a sponge.

The only better system we can think of is to put the pine cleaner, the sponge and other clean-up materials in your man's hand, after he drops the barbecue tools and before he starts telling everyone how he's been slaving away over a hot stove. # SWEETWATER PHILOSOPHER TAKES LOOK AT NEW RUSSIAN CAMPAIGN PROMISES, DISCOVERS SOME FLAWS

(Editor's Note: The Sweetwater Philosopher on his Shimmy grass farm on Sweetwater examines the latest Russian promises this week, without much enthusiasm.)

Dear editor:  
From what little I know about it, I've always understood a Russian dictator didn't have to run for office, he just stayed in as long as his aim was accurate, but judging by the campaign promises Mr. Khrushchev put out a few days ago, he must be having a little trouble on the home front.  
According to the promises I read in a copy of a newspaper which fell out of a bread truck which got off the highway for some reason and came near my place, the Russians, by 1980, if not sooner or later, will have free housing, free food, free gas, free transportation.  
I have examined these promises carefully, and as an expert in listening to campaign promises a lot of offener than benefiting from them, I can detect several flaws.  
For example, is this free food going to be cooked or raw, and what will it consist of? How long will you have to stand in line to get it? Who's going to raise it? I've got free food already, if I want to work hard enough to raise it, but that's not my notion of free. Also, is this gas they're talking

about cooking and heating gas, or car gas? If it's car gas, that's just like a politician. What's free gas worth if you haven't got a car to use it in? And if the gas is free, who're they going to get to stick around a filling station to pump it out for you and check your oil and water? Seems to me everybody'd be cruising.  
And also, how many hours a day will you have to work, whether you feel like it or not, to pay for this free housing they're going to furnish?  
After they get all this free food, free housing, free gas and free transportation, who's going to decide how much you have to work, where you have to work, when you have to work, to produce it?  
If you live in the South Sea Islands, I understand, you can get free food if you can live on coconuts and bananas, but I doubt if Russian climate is suited for those kinds of crops, consequently someone is going to have to grow it, and even if somebody furnished me a free tractor and free gas and fixed all the flats, there'd be times when I just didn't care about going up one row and down another, even if Mr. Khrushchev himself was standing at the turn-row with a basket of free food for me.  
As I understand it, Russia is promising to abolish everything except work. That system will never suit me.

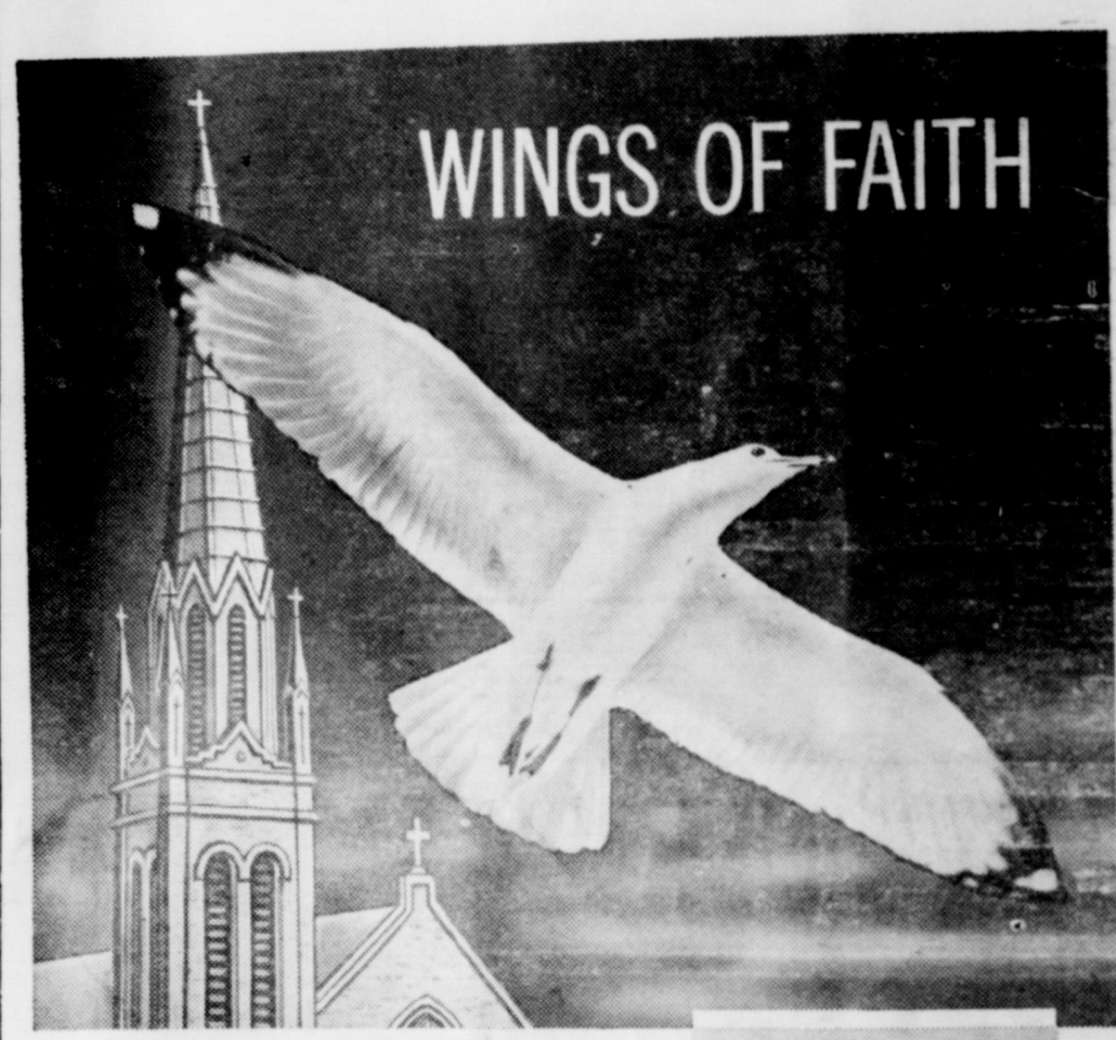

### LOOKING FOR A HOME

The Boll Weevil may have been looking for a home when he came to Wheeler County. If so he has found his desire as he has set up house keeping in the Cotton Fields according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent. Fields are running 2 to 36 percent infestation and the Texas Cotton Insect Control Guide says spraying should start when the infestation count runs 15 to 25 percent. Two or more applications of insecticides are required to control weevils and should be applied at 3 to 5 day intervals according to the infestation. Swaim said 5 day intervals should be ample of time at the present.

Insecticides recommended by the Extension Entomologist are as follows: Toxaphene—D.D.T., (4 lbs. 2 lbs.), 1 1/2 to 2 quarts, per acre. Malathion (5 lbs.) plus D.D.T., (2 lbs., 1 to 1 1/2 qts. X 2 to 3 qts. Sevin (85% W.P.), (4 lbs. X 2 lbs.) 1 1/2 to 2 qts. per acre. Swaim said other controls are recommended the use of a hydramethylnon poison such as Toxaphene, D.D.T.—2-1 spray as it is dangerous to use and should be used with all precautions.

Swaim said it will probably at least 3 sprayings of 2 of Toxaphene and D.D.T. at 5 day intervals and this should control of both the Fleahopper and Boll Weevil. That is the two ton insects doing the damage at the present time.
