FLOOD CONTROL PROGRAM WILL NEED AREA BACKING

SWEETWATER PROJECT PLAN IS EXPLAINED

The importance of the Sweetwater watershed upstream flood control project was emphasized Monday noon by Eli Baker, Wheeler County Soil Conservation Service work unit conservationist, in a talk before the local Kiwanis Club.

Baker told Kiwanians that he hoped they and others in this area will be favorable to the proposed Sweetwater project because of the vital need for conservation measures to save valuable farm and ranch lands from erosion.

The Sweetwater project will be located in three counties in two states—Wheeler and Gray in Texas and Beckham in Oklahoma.

Baker spoke at the Kiwanis luncheon on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

The department, he explained, was set up to improve the lot of the farmer, and as a result it has brought a better standard of living to all persons in the United States.

"We don't want to tell you how to run your farm," Baker said, "we want to help you."

Technical Assistance The Soil Conservation Service offers technical assistance to farmers by showing them the best methods for saving their land.

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District was formed in 1933, and three of the five men originally chosen as supervisors still hold those positions, Baker said they serve without pay.

The SCS was established as a branch of the Department of Agriculture in the 1930's, the speaker added, as a result of the drought and dust storms.

Baker, head of the SCS office in Wheeler, reported during his talk that Bill Brooks of Spearman expected to join his staff here soon. Brooks, until recently assigned to the Gray County SCS office in Pampa, will replace George Taylor here.

Brooks and his wife and three children are in the process now of locating suitable housing before moving to Wheeler.

Search Made For Fruit, Nut Seedlings Texas is cooperating with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and other southern states in a program to locate outstanding fruit and nut seedlings or varieties which consistently produce large quantities of high quality fruit and nuts, according to Bryan Swaim, Wheeler County agent.

Swaim said the two primary reasons for this program are: (1) to locate seedlings or varieties of fruits and nuts which may be suitable for naming and release, (2) to locate plants suitable for use in present breeding programs which are designed to produce varieties adaptable to the southern portion of the coastal states.

Swaim said the main interest is in obtaining seedlings or unknown varieties; however there is also interest in old high yielding pair and apple trees of standard varieties.

Swaim advised 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters interested in the program to contact the game warden, Carl Carter or Dick DeArment, serving the area for details on the program.

To be eligible, the application for birds must be for a club or chapter project; the club must have available as much as 160 acres upon which to carry out their habitat improvement work and the land must be pledged for a period of at least three years.

Swaim said the property will be inspected by a game warden or conservation officer to determine (Continued on Page 8, No. 4)

Without exception, all our Achievement Tests, Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests, National Educational Development Tests, and the National Merit Tests have consistently shown the Language Arts to be the weakest. This fact should not be used as an indictment of anyone—pupils, teachers, parents, schools or anyone else; but rather as an indicator as to where our efforts should be directed. It seems to me that while our vacation is on, pupils could and should be encouraged to read widely, to add to their vocabulary and to strengthen their ability to comprehend. Parents, insist on your children reading the daily newspaper, good magazines and good fiction. They need this quiet time each day in order for their bodies to relax and to rest so that they can grow not only physically but mentally, morally, socially and spiritually. As I have said to you many times, the love of good reading is a primary requirement for an educated person.

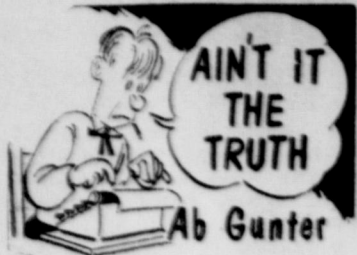

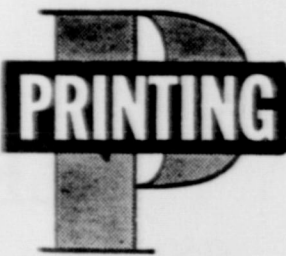

CONSERVATION NEWS

The recent good rains which fell in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District showed our need for more good waterways. Almost no terraces broke where there was a good waterway for them to empty into. Where terraces do not break, water does not cut gullies across the fields. A well grassed waterway is the back bone of a good system of graded terraces. Waterways need to be constructed and vegetated before terraces are constructed to empty to them. This will usually mean that the waterway would have to be built a year ahead of the terraces.

Government cost share can be obtained for the development of waterways. For further information, see one of the technicians at your local Soil Conservation Service office.

Safe Drinking Water May Be Needed

There have been many instances when we need to have safe drinking water in our homes and none was available. One sure way to meet other emergencies is to have a supply of canned water. In emergency cases, you can use any clean water with all the safe drinking water necessary for your family. Following are some conditions for canning emergency water for your family jars.

Sterilize the jars. Pour water into the hot jars until full. Seal with two pieces (Venting takes two pieces used). Process pint and quart glass jars on No. 2 and cans for 15 minutes at 10 lb. pressure. Allow pressure to return to zero. Open jars and remove the jars and water from drafts. In many places canned water can be purchased in terms of canned water lots, 4 1/2 oz. cans per case. Each should be plenty. If it is home canned, 2 or 3 are sufficient. Keeping the water in condition is not difficult. It may be renewed, and it is hand used on camping picnics.

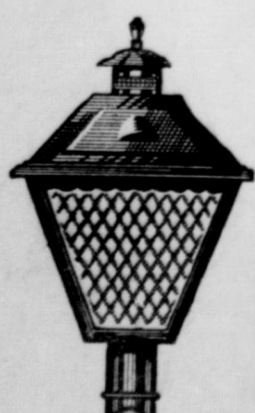

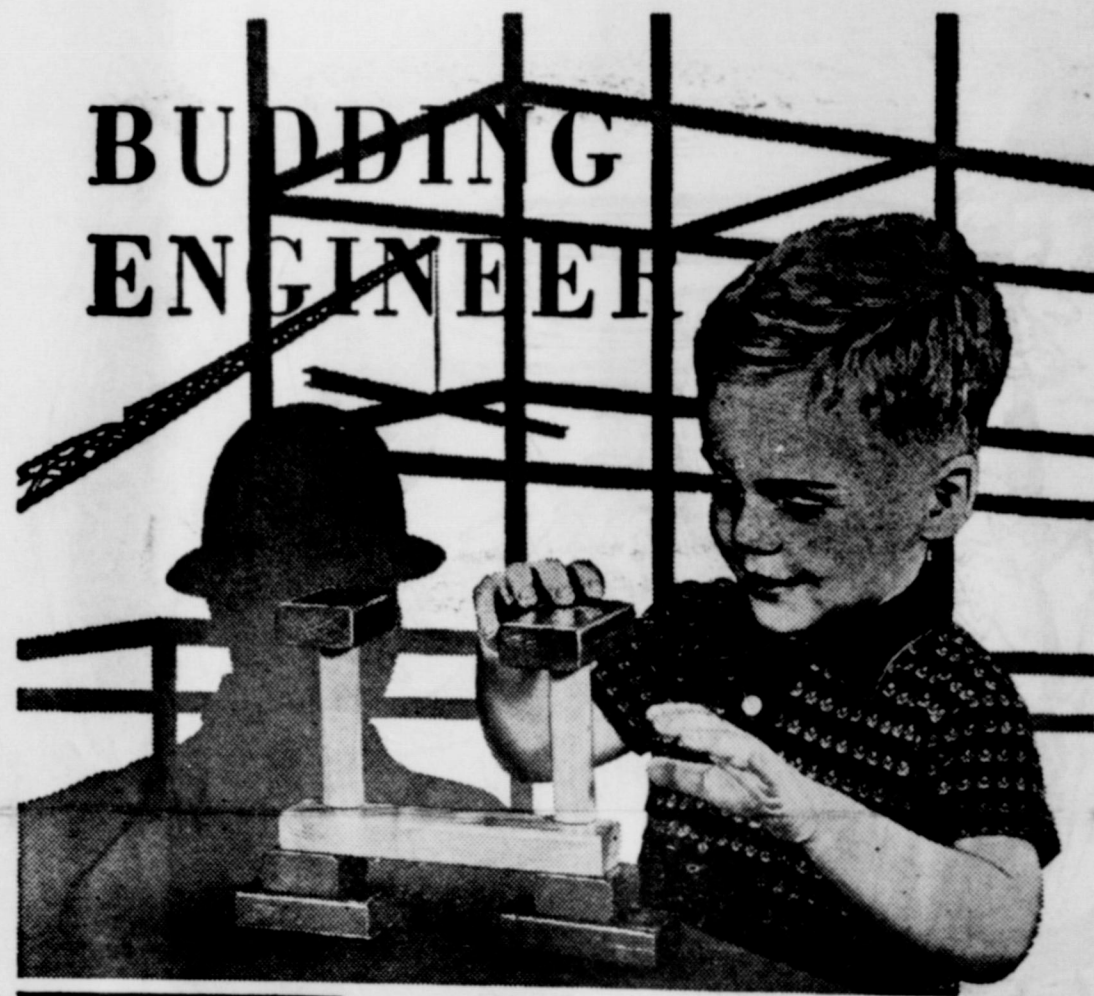

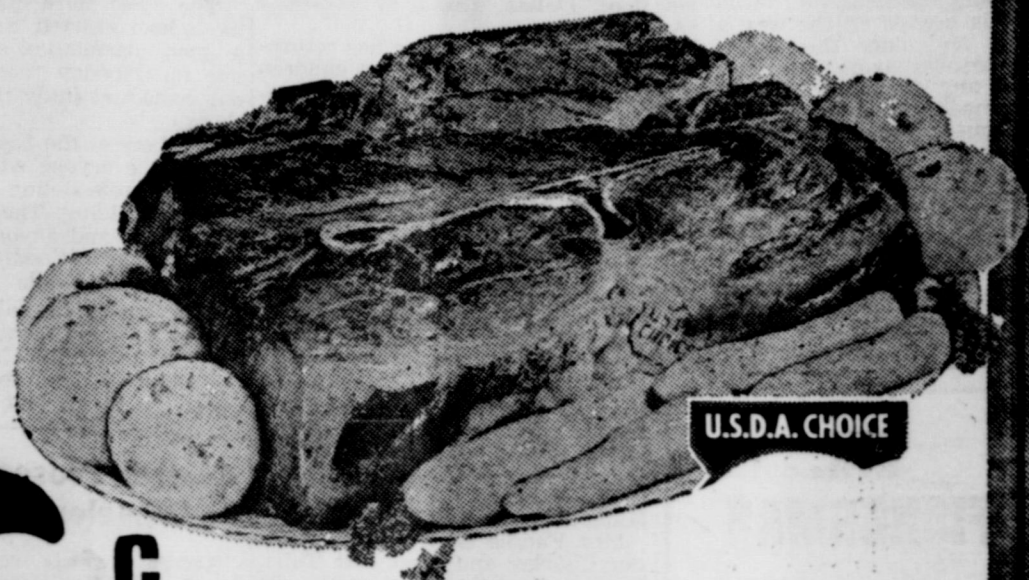

COTTON PLANTIN' TIME IS HERE

This last week cotton planting has been the order of the day. The great tractors have been pulling four listers and planting four rows at a time, in some cases. Other tractors that are not quite so new have three rows and some farmers are still using the two row listers. I can see the advantage of a four row lister. One man can do twice as much work with it as he can with a two row. Since hired labor is so high it is really a money saving device for big farmers.

However, there might be some advantage in using a two row. The first cost of the machine, and the added cost of operation and repairs must be considered. Then the two row man might come out ahead in some cases. Like the one row, two mule power farmer of Arkansas. I visited with one of those boys one day, and I ask him about using a tractor.

He said, "No, I get along better with my mules. My neighbor up here has a tractor, and one day he cut all his hay with his tractor and mowing machine. Then that night it rained, and he lost all of it. I cut just a little at a time with my mules and mower, and put up what I cut. I saved all my hay."

The two row farmer might, on occasion, save a lot of money by not getting through planting so quickly when the big rain comes and he has to plant over.

Then if he can get along with older equipment that is paid for he will not have so much interest to pay on that new tractor note.

What I said there sure is old fashioned. Today it is popular to live in style, in comfort, and in debt.
