WHY HAVE A BAND IN OUR SCHOOL?

The recent advent of the scientific age has demonstrated a lack of adaptability and failings of our present educational system. Not only do some of our students lack a fundamental knowledge of the basic 3 "R's", but too many have failed to grasp the meaning of a fourth "R" for "responsibility". This is where a band program makes one of the greatest contributions to education, teaching the true definition of its element of responsibility. The successful band program has proven itself as one of the mediums most successful in developing this trait individually and collectively.

A program attaining any degree of success earns such a position only through the complete cooperation and assumption of responsibility by all of the persons associated with it, including the instructor, the administrator, the parent, the individuals in the community, and the student. Accordingly, the student, noting the acceptance of responsibility by all those involved, receives the meaning of its importance first hand in our way of life. A band student's responsibility is the assumption of a moral obligation to himself and all others with whom he is associated. The success of the band is dependent on the fulfillment of this duty by each and every member of the organization.

The school band is unique in our education structure. It performs many duties which no other group does or is able to do. It not only affords its student-members opportunities for individual & group advancement co-ordinately, but it also serves as a source of unity and pride for the entire student body. The school band teaches discrimination of quality, ideals and standards, a sense of responsibility and dependability, and above all it teaches the true meaning of goals through its efforts to attain a sense of perfection in every one of its undertakings.

Our program has been categorized by some persons as a superfluous adjunct to our curriculum. Fortunately, those who believe so are not too populous. A program which develops skills to the degree of the instrumental music program and which offers so many benefits as a result of this development cannot be so classified.

Farmer and his wife, Opal, reside fifteen miles northwest of Wheeler on their 960 acre farm. Raising livestock and wheat are the principal undertakings on the Hefley farm.

Since the beginning of the agricultural farm program in this county, Farmer has been serving on committees and has aided in any possible way to further agriculture. As a member of the Farm Bureau, he was instrumental in obtaining the television translator system and is still serving on the TV committee. Farmer is a Soil Conservation District Supervisor and a member of the Church of Christ.

Farmer was married to Opal Higdon in 1926 and they have two sons, Richard and Jack, both of Gruver and four grandsons. To those that are personally acquainted with Farmer he needs no introduction; to those that do not know him, there are insufficient terms to describe his delightful sense of humor! It is with intense joy that Farmer jokes with those associated with him. In fact, his wife still finds it difficult to determine when he is serious or joking! Farmer enjoys the association of other people and it is his belief that friends are the most treasured possessions a man can have.

MUSTANGS WIN OVER MOBEETIE LOSE BRISCOE

The Rampaging Mustangs and Mustangettes got revenge for earlier losses Tuesday night as they downed Mobeetie 58-44 and 72-68 respectively.

Ruby Barton racked up forty-seven points as the Mustangettes took a hard fought victory after leading 16-12, 34-29 and 56-48 at the quarters. Lucille Bradshaw chipped in with sixteen counters while Annie Riley had nine. Anna Gudgeal scored thirty-six while Mary Gudgeal had twenty-six for the losers.

Mendall Hunter, Bobby Treadwell, and Randy Callan hit a combined forty-four points to lead the Mustangs to their first victory of the season. Wheeler led 26-18 at half-time, but the Hornets gained a 36-36 tie at the end of three quarters. However, the fired-up Mustangs, eager to get on the victory wagon and inspired by the addition of Treadwell and James Henderson to their roster, were ready to settle for nothing less than a 58-44 win.

Gene Coward scored nineteen points for the Hornets while Garland Lancaster hit fourteen.

Hunter flipped the nets for seventeen. Treadwell had fourteen, Callan made thirteen, J. Hefley scored eight, and Monroe Page, Bill Green and James Henderson hit two each for the Mustangs.

The double win over the Hornets came on the heels of a double loss to the Broncos as the Broncos took the girls' game 57-47 and the boys' 59-44. Lucille Bradshaw of Wheeler and Briscoe's Charlene Fulkus shared scoring honors with twenty-two each. Close behind was Sherry Douthit of Briscoe with twenty-one and Mustangette Ruby Barton with twenty.

Jim Helton hit sixteen points in leading the Broncos to a 59-44 win after holding a 34-24 half-time advantage. Mendall Hunter and Randy Callan took top scoring honors for the Mustangs with eleven, followed by Monroe Page's ten, Dunky Porter with nine and Bill Green with three.

The Wheeler Cagers travel to Kelton Friday night for a tangle with the Kelton Lions. The Allison teams will invade the local gym Tuesday night. Game time is 7:00 p.m.

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

OUR RESPONSIBILITY TO THE BIBLE

There are four passages in the New Testament where adjectives are used to describe "the Word of God" and where we are informed of our responsibility toward it as such.

For example, in James 1:21 it is called the "engrafted" or "implanted" Word, and as such we are advised to "receive" it with "meekness" since it is "able to save your souls." The Word of God, indeed, does have a way of getting down underneath, of getting "under our skins" so to speak. It is not merely sown, it is planted into men's hearts and often makes them miserable as it convicts them of sin and of their need of salvation through Christ. When it does this, says the apostle: "receive" it "with meekness" for it is "able to save your souls."

Then, in Titus 1:9 it is called "the faithful Word," and as such we are urged to "hold it fast." "God is not a man, that He should lie, or the son of man, that He should repent." We can count on His Word and act upon it.

Next, in Philippians 2:16 it is called "The Word of Life," and as such we are to "hold it forth." The Word of God alone has power to regenerate and give spiritual life. St. Peter says that believers are "born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever" (1 Pet. 1:23). Thus we should "hold forth" to lost men as their only hope of eternal life.

Finally, in II Tim. 2:15 it is called "the Word of Truth" and as such we are told to "rightly divide it." If we fail to rightly divide it we can change it into error, for God has not always dealt the same with mankind. Abel had to bring an animal sacrifice for salvation (Heb. 11:4). The children of Israel were told to "keep" the law "indeed" to find acceptance with God (Ex. 19:5, 6). But later Paul declared: "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:5).

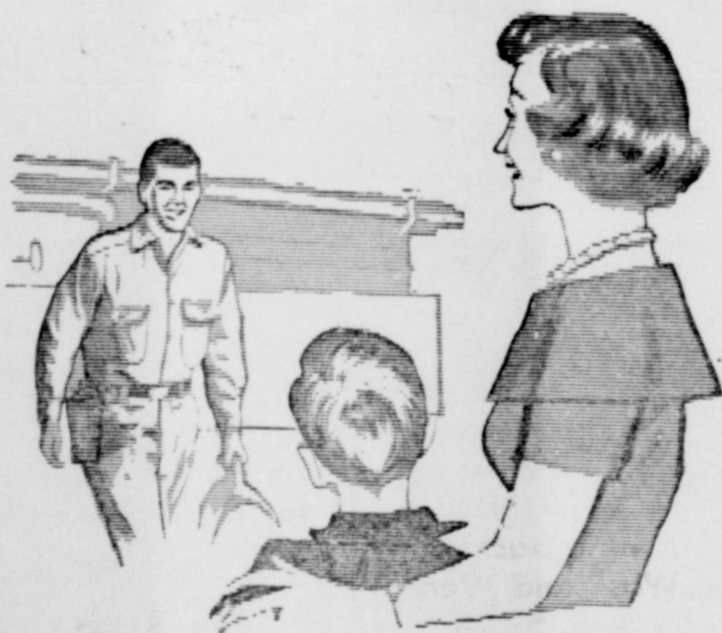

In making the announcement, Mrs. Sivage said contributions to the 1962 New March of Dimes would enable the National Foundation to finance research aimed at prevention and cure of crippling birth defects and arthritis, while also providing patient aid for victims of these diseases.

And we still have an obligation to help paralytic polio patients who are not otherwise aided, she added.

The importance of the problem can be seen from the fact that 250,000 of our children are born each year with a significant birth defect and 11,000,000 Americans suffer from arthritis or rheumatic disease.

I join with the new area chairman in expressing our confidence that the people of Wheeler County will not let down the victims of these diseases. We know your dimes will do it again, Mrs. Sivage stated.

"In our county we still have a number of patients that are in need of help, such as braces repairs to iron lungs and hospitalization.

This costs much money. For instance, a brace for one of our patients cost \$270.50; repairs to an iron lung amounted to \$66.31; hospitalization with therapy \$35.00 per day.

Thus far, we have been able to say YES to every request, for help. I know you would want that every crippled child be provided with the facilities that would enable him to walk. If these needs are met, you must respond to the March of Dimes. I know you will not fail. Harry Wofford, chapter chairman said.

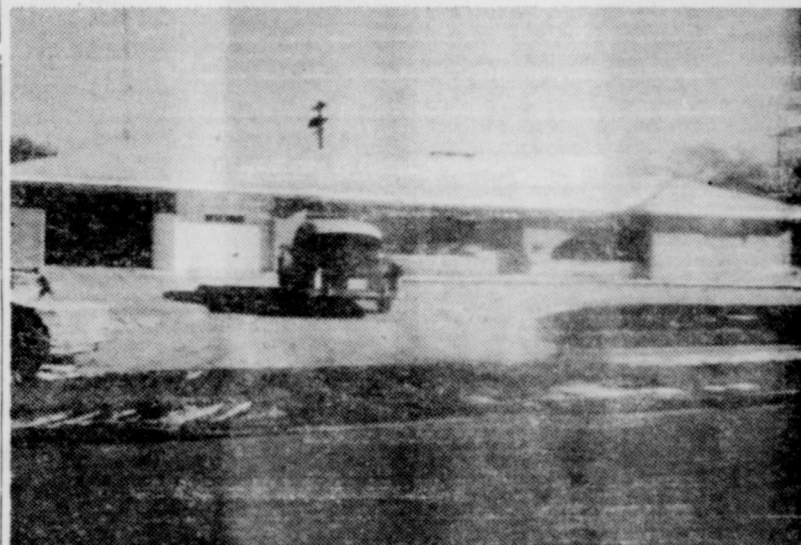

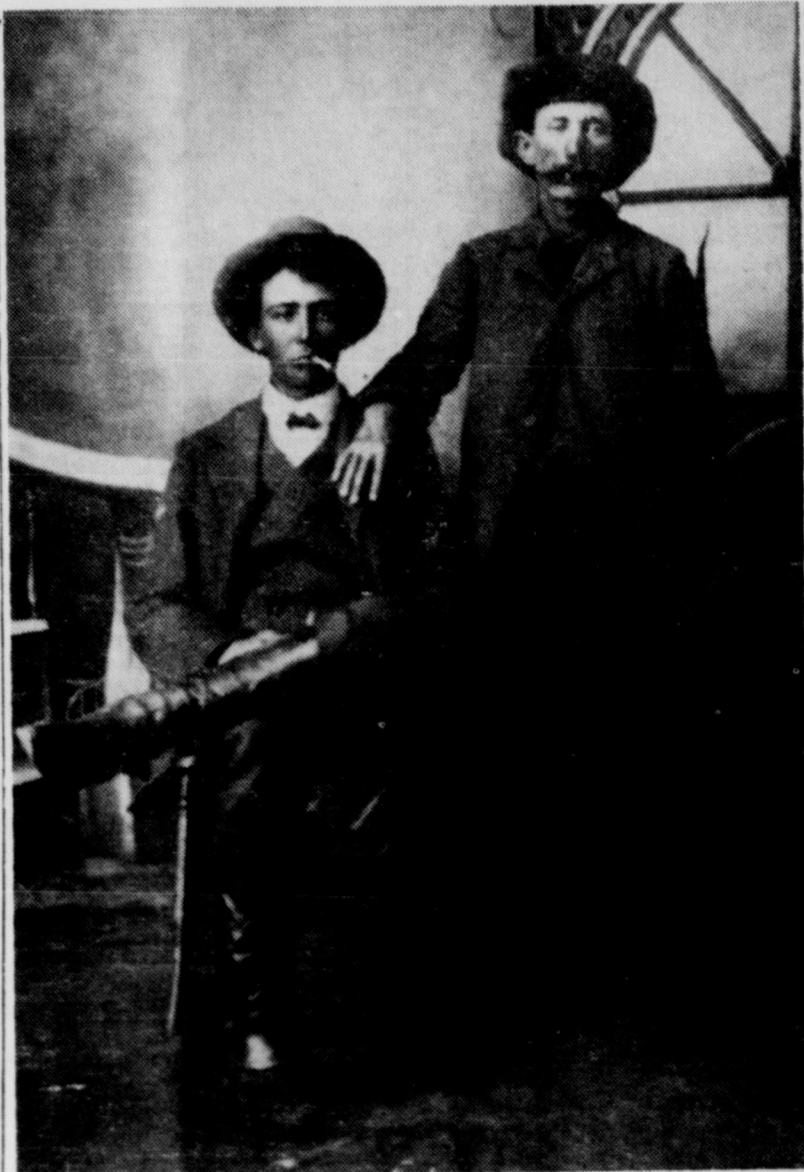

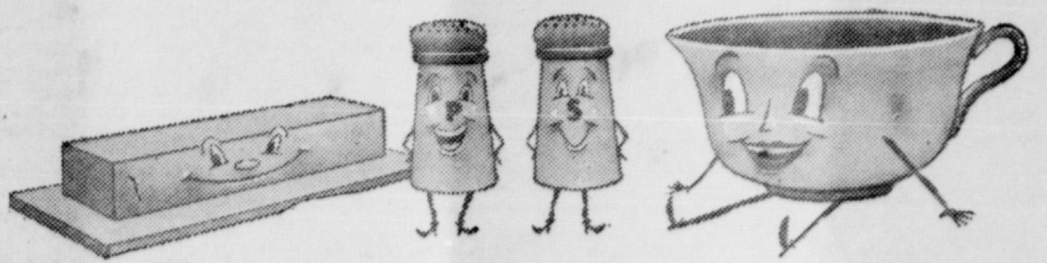
