This is a very kind generous deed which is typical of the fine people of Wheeler. On the other hand John Lewis is a very deserving person with a severe case of bad luck running with him for the past few months.

The Lewis Service Station was closed down when John entered the hospital the first time about October 20, 1961, after he suffered a heart attack. His son, Henry, and wife, Susie, along with friends tried to keep the station open. However, Henry had the misfortune of breaking his pelvis and is confined to his bed for an indefinite period of time. As a result of this it has virtually paralyzed the operation of the station although friends have still been aiding when possible.

In 1942 when John went out of business he had \$3000.00 in charge tickets. John Lewis is the type of person that has never felt the need of sending monthly statements to his creditees. So if you are among the ones that know you have an unpaid bill this would be a mighty good time to drop by and pay up. A person with this much trust in his fellow man certainly isn't going to be let down.

Friends have volunteered to operate the Lewis Station Saturday and will be selling gas and oil and doing wash and grease jobs.

What are we as parents building? Gary Moore tells this story of a by stander asking some construction workers what they were doing. "Laying bricks," snarled the first. "Making five bucks an hour," growls another. "Building a Cathedral", beams the last.

Whereupon grips Moore, "The last had to be fired because he was supposed to be building a gas station."

Are we satisfied to just be laying bricks, so to speak, in the way we are bringing up our children. Just by feeding and clothing them, providing them with the bare essentials of life.

Are we just making five dollars an hour, so they may have the

most flashy home, clothing and cars. Or are we building a Cathedral by providing them with all the things they need, love of God, love of parents, home and their fellow man, love of country?

Are we preparing them to meet the challenge they must face in the coming generation.

This is a time of change. A transition period so to speak. Not only in America but in the whole world. Almost daily we read of student uprisings or youth movements to show the world that youth wants change. They want something better than their parents have had. Better government, better living conditions, a place in the sun so to speak. They see what a mess the other genera-

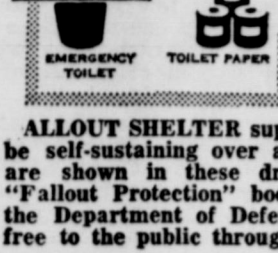

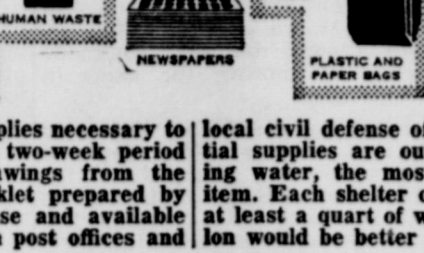

Ft. Elliott Study Club History

On January 9, 1931, the following ladies sponsored the first Women's Club in Mobeetie: Mmes. Elliott, Beene, E. E. Johnston, Hunt and Miss Marjorie Whittaker. Miss Whittaker acted as chairman for the group. Twenty seven ladies were present and the club was organized. Miss Whittaker appointed the necessary committees. Mrs. Beene was elected president. Mrs. Frank Walker secretary. The club was to be known as the "Women's Civic Club".

We were federated in March of that year and Mrs. Walker was elected to attend the annual Federated Club Convention at Memphis, Tex. Miss Whittaker presented the club with the first book, the beginning of our club library. This book, "Colorado's Children" by J. Frank Doby is among the many in our library today.

Mrs. Walker gave a report in April of her trip to Memphis and donated \$1.00 to start a library fund. \$4.00 more was added that day. Club adjourned in May for the summer. We failed to meet again in the fall so on January 20, 1932, Mrs. Walker invited us to meet at her ranch home East of Mobeetie. New officers were elected, by-laws were revised and the membership limited to 25.

With the resignation of several and moving away of others, we now have Mrs. Willard Godwin, Mrs. Jess Patterson and Mrs. Love and others as new members. In 1932, besides our regular

food sales and raised money in various ways to help in several civic projects. Blue velvet curtains were purchased for the grade school auditorium. The Red Velvet curtains in the gym were taken down and demoted then stored for the summer. New books and play ground equipment for grade school were bought and the club sponsored a High School choral club with Mrs. Nowlin as leader.

We held a reception for the teachers in September. In October we put on another play and in December sponsored an Operetta to raise funds for the library.

Red Cross work and distribution of clothing for the needy was now under the supervision of the club. We held a musical tea in the home of Mrs. Nowlin. Funds from this and the Operetta were used to improve the dressing rooms in the gym.

In June, Mrs. Beene read an article "History of Mobeetie" by Mildred Morris—a seventh grade pupil. This article was published in the Mobeetie News, May 15, 1933. During this year we made money to improve the stage in the gym.

September 1934 the club held its first meeting of the Fall and the name was changed to the "Blue Bonnet Study Club" but we still helped in Civic projects. We were no longer a Federated Club. A silver tea was held in the home of Mrs. Flanagan in connection with a shower for the Home Ec

room. The money was used to buy a china service for 12. Many useful gifts were also received at the shower. In November we sponsored a Father-Son Banquet and bought two sets of silver in tarnish proof boxes.

An interesting article in the Mobeetie News for the March 1935 meeting "Little Larue Flanagan" gave two readings and then she and little George B. Dunn gave a cute dialogue.

On September 16, 1936 a Tea honoring the school faculty was held in the home of Mrs. Elliott. Mrs. Hugh Cypser, a native of Australia, was guest speaker.

Each year from 1939 to 1943 we sponsored a banquet. Money was used to benefit the school by serving a bowl of hot soup and milk to the school children. A member of the club assisted by other Mothers was present every day. We also assisted the business men with filling Christmas sacks for the children of the community.

The next few years, war years, we had only one meeting a month but we met each week with the other women of the town to do Red Cross work.

Later as tires and gas were available we invited the "Wednesday Study Club" of Wheeler as guests for a book review by Mrs. Hol E. Waggoner of Pampa. Mrs. Bristow was hostess for this meeting.

Our club dues were now raised from \$2.00 to \$2.50. October 21, 1948 Miss Laura V. Hammer visited our club and gave a very interesting talk on Texas Writers.

Mrs. Millie Porter of Wheeler, presented our club with one of her books, "Memory Cups".

Through the thirty years of our club life we have truly been blessed, not only to have talented people from near-by towns and foreign countries to visit us and bring their inspiring stories and movies, but in our own circle we have many that have given their time and talents for our enjoyment. Many of our members have brought interesting book reviews. Mrs. Fleta Godwin has the distinction of not only giving more reviews than any other member, but of reviewing her own book, "The Gal Wagon".

In 1959, Mrs. Agnes Morgan as president presented small silver servers to Mesdames E. E. Johnston, John Dunn, Henry Flanagan and Willard Godwin, the four who had been members more than 25 years.

In May, 1959, the name was changed to the "Ft. Elliott Study Club".

HE PASSED NOT BY

Even we in the twentieth century are appealed to more than is expressible by the illustration of question, "Who is my neighbor?" to the Master as he responds to the as described by Luke in chapter 10, verse 30 thru 37. "A certain man was going down to Jericho from Jerusalem and fell among robbers, who stripped him of his clothes, and belongings, and beat him, and went their way leaving him half dead . . ."

Whether or not this man was at the wrong place at the wrong time, or whether he had been in this circumstance before, or whether he was a Jew or Gentile, or even whether this man was saint or sinned Jesus does not indicate whatsoever. Not only was this man the object of the extraordinary fruits of the kind, oversized heart of the man of Samar who did help him, but was THE OPPORTUNITY afforded any man who passed along the road who really wanted to show love for God by bestowing the fruits of such love on a man of the earth. This "pot of gold" opportunity was available for priest, levite, or Samaritan (clergy, layman or the un-churched).

I do not wonder that Jesus omitted the details of the man's occasion for being on the road, or even any indication whether this man had had previous difficulty as this. For Jesus, Himself, paid not His all-important visit to earth for crusifixion for any particular portion of the human race" . . . both of Jews and Gentiles they are all under sin, as it is written, "There is none righteous, no, not one; . . ." Whether I am less or more wicked than others, CHRIST DIED FOR ME. We are all sinners.

In illustrating neighborliness, the Master used not the priest nor the levite. Whether or not each of them felt that they had helped many other such men or even whether or not this man had been the object of their gifts and perhaps had been ungrateful, the Master does not say.

I'm glad that such details were not given so that we may not be blinded by the Devil and conclude that when we have helped once or when the assisted one does not respond with such expression of gratitude as we think fitting, that we would in turn feel that "we have done our part." "For if you love those who love you, what reward can you have? Do not even the tax collectors do that?" (see Matt. 5:43-47).

After PASSING NOT BY on the outside of the road, as did the priest, Levite, the man of Samaritan not only saw him and let him pass, he moved—as no doubt the preacher and layman were moved too, but HERE ARRANGED HIS SCHEDULE and made time to STOP.

Though much time and strength was necessary for applying medication to the wound, wrapping it, and placing the man on the only beast on the scene, and further the next center, the man of Samaritan still hadn't completely produced the last crop of fruit from his compassionate heart. Said he to the inn keeper, "I'll take care of what ever you need to buy or use to properly care for this man." "He that despoth his neighbor sins; but he that hath pity on him, happy is he . . . He that is glad at clamity shall not be unpunished . . . He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto Jehovah and his good deed will he pay him again." Pro. 14:21; 17: 5, 19:17.
