The brown wheat mite is also in large numbers and causing probably more damage than the greenbug at the present time. The brown mite is very small, has long front legs and is most destructive in dry cool weather. The same spray used on the green bug also controls the mite, the county agent reported.

Cecil Martin received 66 votes in Tuesday's special run-off election to win a position on the Wheeler city council. Martin defeated Dorsey Hutchins, who polled 43 votes, in the special balloting made necessary when the two men tied in the April 5 election. The candidates were vying for a one-year unexpired term on the council. The new councilman-elect will take his seat on the city's governing board at the regular meeting of the council Thursday, May 3 at 7 p.m. Council meetings are held in the city office. A total of 110 votes were cast in Tuesday's election, compared with 54 in the April 5 balloting. Incumbent W. D. Mitchell had been re-elected to a two-year term in the first election, along with Luther Parks, who was seeking a councilman's position for the first time. Mayor Thomas Daughtry was unopposed and won election to a new term. These men will join Bill Chapman and Adrain Risner on the board. Parks succeeds James Verden. Each of the councilmen serves as head of a city government department, appointed to the positions by the mayor. Risner is in charge of the street department; Chapman, water department; Parks, equipment and motor power; Martin, parks and sanitation, and Mitchell, fire department.

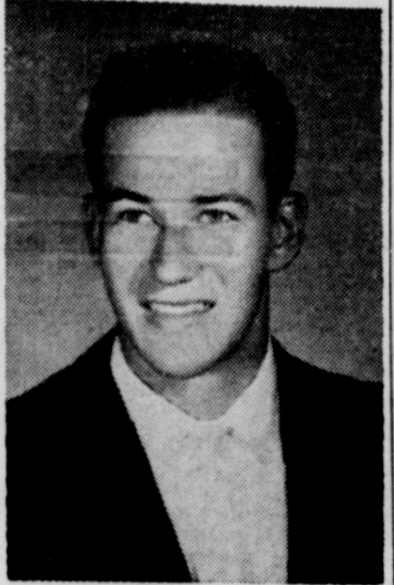

He and his associates, wearing silk stocking masks, engaged in a running gun battle with the truck's guards and Buffalo Police, and a machine gun bullet, allegedly fired by Newman, seriously wounded a guard. Two bandits were quickly apprehended but Newman remains at large.

A complaint, filed before a U.S. Commissioner of Buffalo, New York, on August 5, 1955, charges Newman with fleeing the State of New York to avoid prosecution for robbery.

Heavily armed, with a violent temper, Newman has previously been convicted for theft of Government property, interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, petty larceny, and burglary.

He is a white American, reportedly born on October 3, 1928, at Brooklyn, New York, who is 5'8" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds, has blond hair, blue eyes, a medium build, and medium complexion.

He has scars near his right eye, on the back of his right hand and on the center of his left cheek. A birthmark appears on his upper left arm and a mole on his left index finger. Tattoos include the name "Donny" and a heart on the outside of his right forearm, and the number "13" within a dotted circle on the back of his left hand. He has worked as a bricklayer, clerk, construction worker, counterman, and laborer.

As expected in a rapidly changing agriculture, new products such as soil conditioners continue to appear on the market. Jim Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, The Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock, states some may have merit while others are of questionable value, or may be entirely worthless. Such materials are sometimes greatly overpriced. Benefits to be derived from their use may be stated in vague or misleading terms and statements may be based on mere opinion or pure fancy.

Valentine further states it is always hazardous to purchase a material that bears no guarantee as to its formulation. By not stating what is in the product the seller is in no way liable, and existing laws such as those governing fertilizers have no jurisdiction over the manufacturer or seller.

The primary soil conditioner for this area is organic matter and if your soil contains a modest one percent organic matter this is equal to 20,000 lbs. per surface six inches. We have no known bacteria deficiency, and it is estimated that there are 400 to 500 lbs. of live bacteria in an acre furrow slice of soil. The population rises and falls depending on the amount of residue returned, moisture, and temperature.

Contrary to some claims made for conditioners there is no known practical procedure for changing soil texture since texture refers to the size of the individual soil particles. Structure of clay soils can be improved by the addition of certain materials but the cost may run as high as \$400.00 per acre.

Valentine concludes by saying its your money—consider the products carefully before buying and do not expect them to substitute for the plant food elements commonly obtained thru commercial fertilizers.

Live, enjoy life, and be happy.

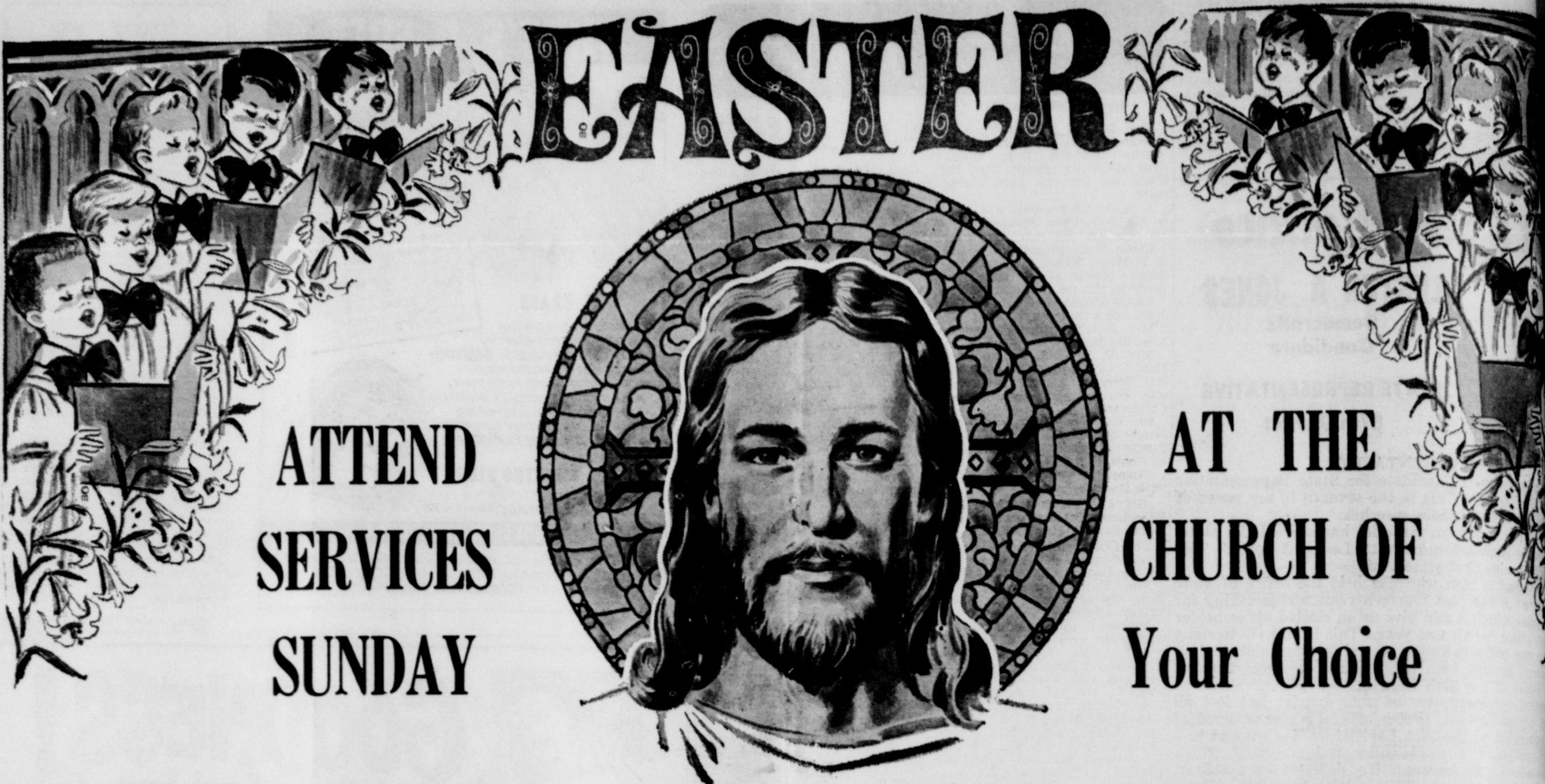

She also knows that a teen age daughter may suddenly acquire an uncanny ability to sense, and to tiptoe out of sight and hearing, when the words kitchen, canning and cooking are about to be spoken. But at twenty, she'll be right back in the kitchen, feeling at ease because she will recall much of what she learned and observed when helping was fun.

Just what can a six year old do other than get in the way? Many things! Peel peas, snap beans, roll cookies, squeeze grapes to separate skins from pulp, and run fruit for sauce or butter through a colander or food mill.

When she is three or four years old, she will take pride in doing the whole butter making job on her own. This simple, but flavorful recipe will be one she'll cherish in those future years.

Peach Butter

A wholesome, delicious, inexpensive and easy-to-make spread for toast and other hot breads.
8 cups peach pulp 1/2 teaspoon salt
6 cups light brown sugar 1 teaspoon pure vanilla

Wash, scald, drain, pit and peel ripe peaches. Put peaches into kettle with 2 or 3 cracked pits; if needed to start cooking, add about 1/4 cup water. Cook peaches until soft; put them through colander or food mill. Measure peach pulp, add sugar and salt and boil until thick. Add vanilla. Pour boiling hot butter to within 1/4 inch of top of pint or half pint fruit jars. Put lid on jar; screw band tight.
