1 teaspoon pure vanilla

Wash, scald, drain, pit and peel ripe peaches. Put peaches into kettle with 2 or 3 cracked pits; if needed to start cooking, add about ¼ cup water. Cook peaches until soft; put them through colander or food mill. Measure peach pulp, add sugar and salt and boil until thick. Add vanilla. Pour boiling hot butter to within ¼ inch of top of pint or half pint fruit jars. Put lid on jar; screw band tight.
