The McLean Tigers will invade Wheeler Friday night at 8:00 P.M. at Nicholson Field. The Tigers have one win under their belt; they beat Shamrock this past week -- to -- Wheeler dropped their opener to Canadian 8-6.

The McLean Team, favored to win their district will be trying for their second win Friday night on the much improved Nicholson field.

In the play last Friday night, the Canadian Wildcats outtaught the Wheeler Mustangs at Nicholson Field and posted an 8-6 victory.

The teams were well matched and thrilled about 500 enthusiastic spectators.

Throughout the play the Wildcats and the Mustangs were stalemated near the middle of the field

with the exception of the three touchdowns.

Late in the first quarter Wheeler halfback G. C. Baker, scored with a 6-yard dash to put his team in the lead.

The third quarter saw Canadian quarterback Rush Snyder, Jr., score from the Wheeler 15-yard line. Conversion was good, sending the Wildcats ahead for the remainder of the game.

The Quarterback Club members have been actively supporting their local team for many years, however, during the past three years, fans have found new improvements in the stadium almost weekly.

Harrison Hall, president of the Quarterback Club, has spearheaded numerous improvements. Harrison is of course the last to take credit for the improvements and he is quick to point out that the fans are the ones to be given credit for the progress being made.

During the last year or two, new lighting has been installed, new bleachers erected, a new lighted scoreboard has been purchased, the field has been leveled and re-worked, a press box built, now the club is putting up a new cyclone fence all around the playing field.

Their next project is concession stand, they hope to have the concrete block structure completed in time for the Shamrock game.

Part of the money for these projects, almost \$5,000 has been spent on the field in the last three years, comes from the sale of reserve seats. Harrison reported that approximately 30 reserve seats were still available. They sell for \$5.00 each.

## VANPOOL - BURTON TO SPONSOR PUNT, PASS AND KICK CONTEST

An opportunity for Wheeler area boys to compete in a football punting, passing and place-kicking contest, with trips to National Football League games among the prizes, was announced today by Pete Burton, Partner of Vanpool-Burton Motors.

Mr. Burton said the Wheeler area competition is part of a nationwide program sponsored by Ford Division of Ford Motor Company in cooperation with the National Football League. Known as "P.P.&K." — Punt, Pass and Kick — the competition will culminate with all-expense trips by five national winners and their families to the National Football League Championship game, and an official reception at the White House.

Selection of the National Champions will be made as a result of televised competition at a home game of each of the 4 National Football League teams.

The Wheeler P.P.&K. competition is open to grade school boys aged six through 10, and will be held early in October. Registration for the event will be at Van-

pool-Burton in Wheeler from Aug. 28 through September 25. There is no cost, but entrants must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Each entrant will receive a P.P.&K. badge, an instruction book written by NFL stars Johnny Unitas, Yale Lary and Paul Hornung, and an official 1961 NFL Guidebook.

After the Wheeler competition is held, the scores of the most skillful punters, passers and place-kickers — one in each age group — will be compared with scores of boys in the other competitions held in the area covered by telecasts of the Dallas Cowboys.

The top five boys in this region and their fathers will then be given an all-expense trip to see a home game of the Dallas Cowboys and the boys will punt, pass and kick at the stadium either just before the game starts, or during half-time.

The five top winners in the Wheeler contest, whether or not they qualify for the national eliminations, will receive National

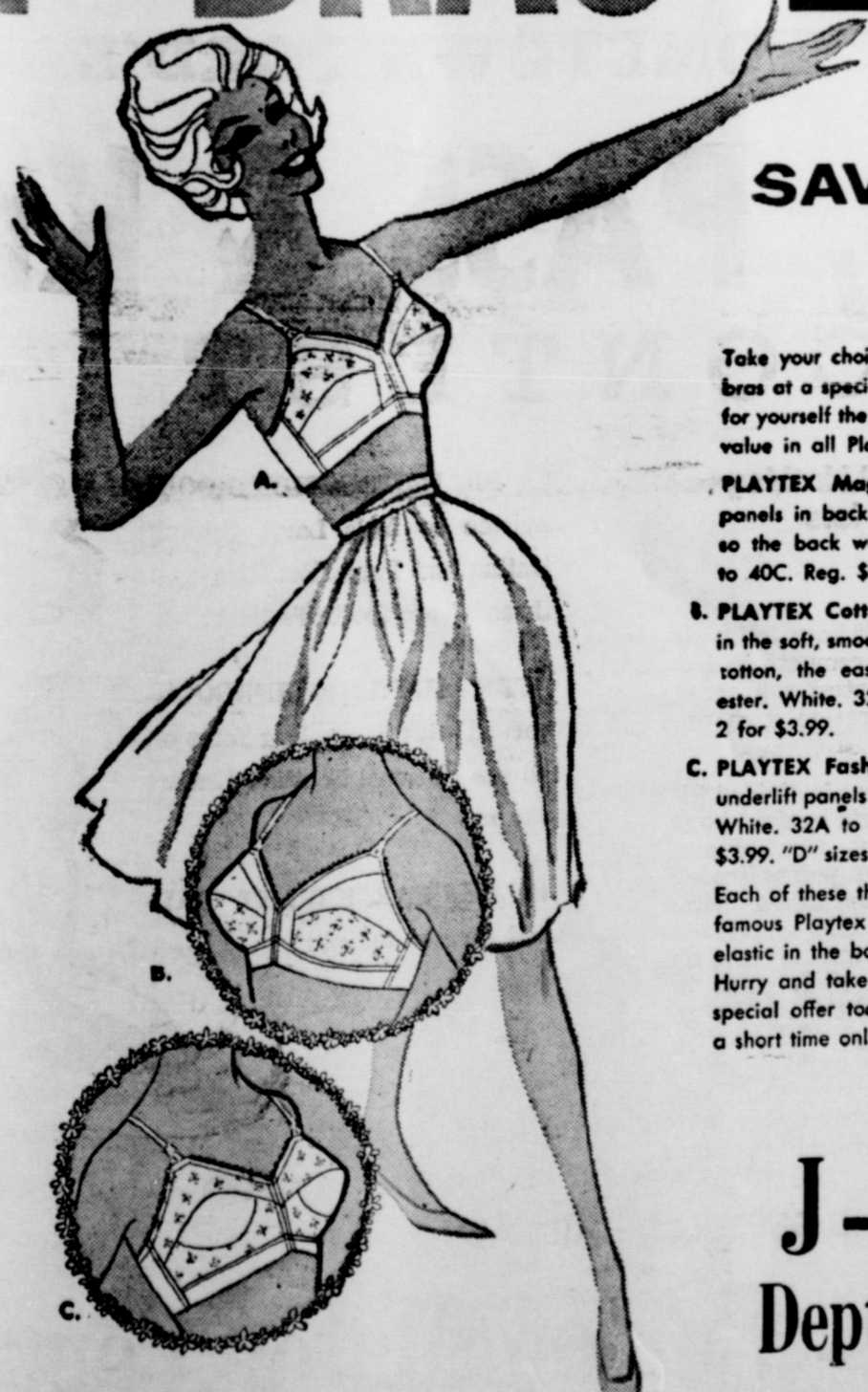

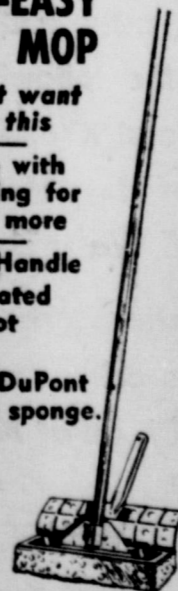

**WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS**

"WATERWAYS" By Doug Bartosh, SCS Engineer

It has been said that "Waterways are not for the easily discouraged." Possibly this is definitely true that grassed waterways are not for the land owner that likes gullies, or that likes to keep every foot of his land clean even though it is washing away.

A grassed waterway will not solve every gully or washing problem. To work efficiently it must be used in conjunction with other conservation measures such as terraces and diversions and good farming methods. When used with these measures it will do its part in solving these problems.

A grassed waterway is a vegetated watercourse designed to handle runoff water with a minimum of erosion. Waterways are used to carry outside water safely across cultivated fields or as outlets for terraces and diversions.

It may be shaped to a certain width and depth or it may be a natural depression. Either way they help to prevent gullies. A well vegetated and maintained waterway is pleasing to the eye as well as being a soil and land saver, while a gully is an eyesore and a land washer.

Waterways may be vegetated with any adapted perennial grass, such as buffalo grass, sideoats grama and twitchgrass. In some cases bermuda grass and Johnson grass are satisfactory. It is sometimes hard to get vegetation established in a waterway and it may take several years to get a satisfactory cover. This is why it is said that waterways are not for the easily discouraged. Once established, the waterways are worth all the money, time and effort expended on them.

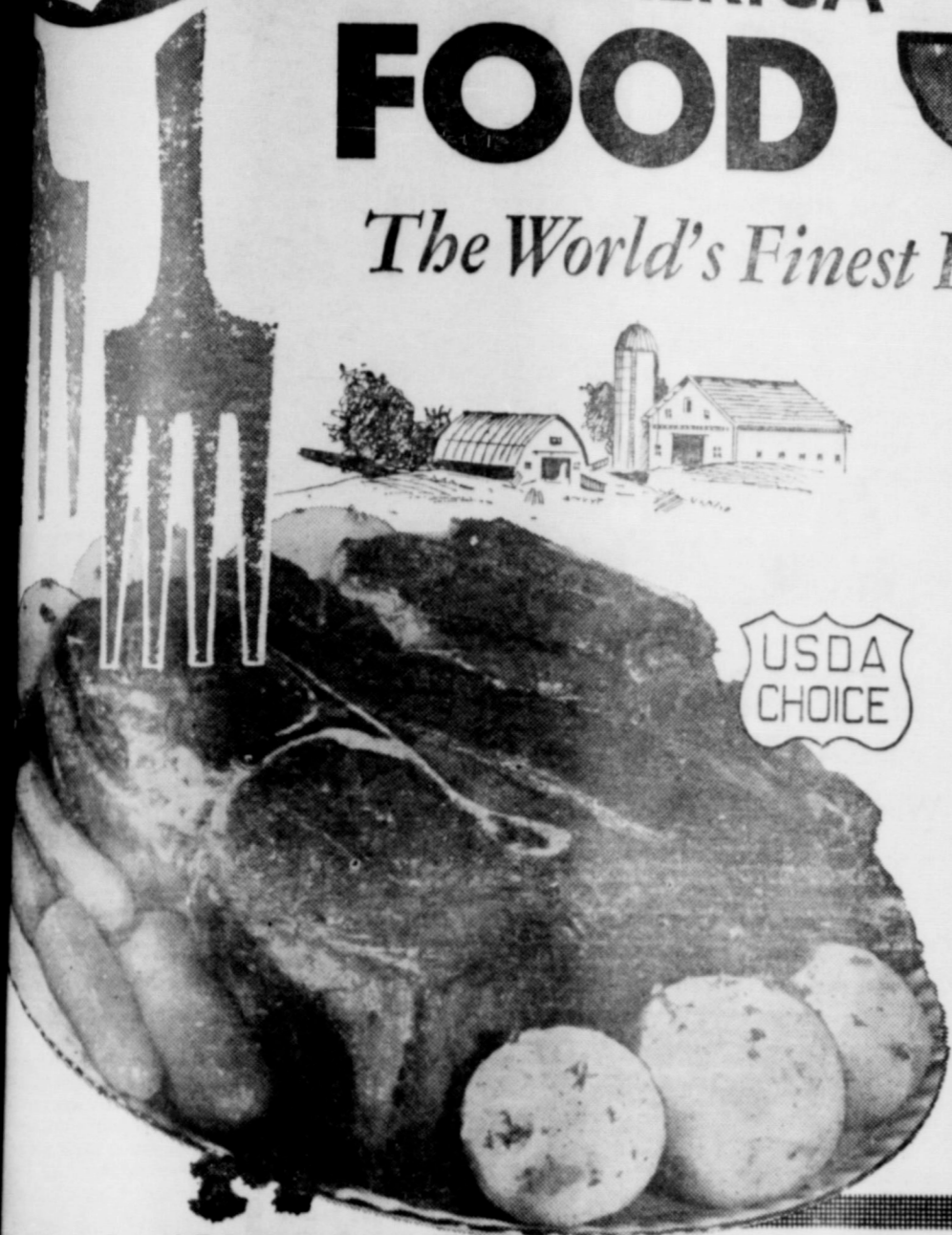
