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PARADE & BARBECUE TODAY KICK OFF RODEO CELEBRATION

Everything in readiness for today's opening of the annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo.

Kicking off the three-day celebration will be a parade at 4 p.m. today in which several riding clubs will participate.

Then the scene of activity shifts at 6 p.m. to the rodeo grounds, where the annual barbecue supper, free to all—is scheduled before the opening performance of the rodeo.

Hundreds of persons each year attend the barbecue, sponsored by the local Riding Club and Wheeler business firms and individuals.

John Barr of Wheeler, known as the "barbecue king of the Panhandle," has already started preparing the meal.

The rodeo is to be held nightly through Saturday at 8 p.m. and the popular Kid Pony Show is set for 7 p.m. the final day of the festivities.

Rodeo producer is Charley Plummer of Elk City, Okla.

Top rodeo performers have entered the various events, which include bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bulldogging, bull riding, calf roping and ladies barrel race.

Added prize money is being offered in the bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bulldogging and bull riding events.

Rodeo admission will be \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Headquarters for the rodeo is the Wheeler Gin, and entries close at 3 p.m. today. The entry fee for each event is \$15.

Meri Lindsay and his Jubilee Band will play for the rodeo dance, sponsored by the American Legion post, each night during the rodeo. Dance time will be from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

SAFETY WEEK PROCLAIMED

WHEREAS accidents result in disabling injuries and often death to many farm residents each year; and

WHEREAS those farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly effect the economic well-being and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state and nation; and

WHEREAS all our citizens are concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities; and

WHEREAS the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have designated the period of July 22-28, 1962, as FARM SAFETY WEEK; and

WHEREAS a vigorous farm accident-prevention education program will be conducted during this week by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau with the theme "Family Safety—At Work and Play"; and

WHEREAS records show a notable and steady decline in the number and rate of accidents among farm people as a direct result of such worthwhile safety education programs;

NOW THEREFORE I, G. W. Hefley, County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby designate the week of July 22-28, 1962, as FARM SAFETY WEEK and urge all farm families, persons, and organizations allied with agriculture to join in strong concerted effort to reduce the number of farm, home, and highway accidents.

SWEETWATER CREEK DAM IS UNDER STUDY

Meeting in Shamrock Planned Monday To Discuss Proposals

Representatives of Wheeler have been invited to attend a Red River Authority of Texas meeting next Monday in Shamrock to discuss the possibility of constructing a major dam on Sweetwater Creek.

Harry Frye of Shamrock, a director of the authority, said the day-long session will begin at 9 a.m. at the Wrangler Restaurant and continue until 4 p.m.

Frye reported that impounding of water on Sweetwater creek to form a reservoir for municipal water supply and other important water conservation measures are to be aired at the meeting.

A noon luncheon will honor out-of-town visitors, city officials of Wheeler and Shamrock, civic leaders and members of the Wheeler County commissioners court.

Preliminary Report

A preliminary report on plans for the major reservoir for commercial and recreational use will be given by Marvin Nichols, Fort Worth water engineer.

Flea Hoppers Are Found in Cotton

Flea hoppers in damaging numbers have been found in Wheeler County cotton fields, and every farmer should check his young cotton immediately, County Agent Bryan Swaim said Wednesday.

Swaim said that spraying is needed if as many as 15 to 35 flea hoppers are found per 100 terminals.

He invited farmers to pick up free bulletins explaining the insect at the county agent's office. Spraying of some fields started Wednesday in the Twitty area.

Allison Woman Hurt In Auto Accident

Two Allison residents and two from Stinnett escaped serious injury recently when the car in which they were riding overturned near Okemah, Okla.

Mr. and Mrs. Lester Levitt of Allison and Wesley and Dewey Gibson of Stinnett were enroute to their old hometowns, Palmyra, Mo., and Clay City, Ill., when the accident occurred.

They were traveling in a new Oldsmobile, driven by Wesley Gibson, when traffic slowed quickly. Gibson applied the brakes, causing the car to spin and blow the two left tires.

The vehicle came to rest upside down in a ditch, with occupants pinned beneath. Levitt was finally able to open a door and the four escaped.

Mrs. Levitt sustained minor injuries, and the others were unhurt. Negro men who witnessed the mishap helped turn the car back onto its wheels.

The group then proceeded on a short trip through Arkansas before returning to their homes.

Treasurer Injured In Two-Car Collision

Farm Safety Week Ahead

County Judge G. W. Hefley has officially proclaimed July 22-28, 1962, as "Farm Safety Week" in Wheeler County, according to John Daberry, president of the local county Farm Bureau.

President Kennedy and Gov. Daniel have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that farm people are faced with many accident hazards. He stated that farming is one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

Daberry said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday—reverence for life; Mon-

day—safety begins at home; Tuesday—agricultural chemicals; Wednesday—prevent falls; Thursday—rural highway safety; Friday—farm machinery; Saturday—recreation safety.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau is cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau's farm safety department in its efforts to promote Farm Safety Week all across the state.

County Farm Bureaus are becoming increasingly active in safety work, President Daberry said. This includes cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau safety department to stage safe-driving demonstrations in high schools and by participating in the fire extinguisher and auto safety seat belts

project.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin (Special) — That "Safe driver insurance plan" with its penalty points for traffic law violations and accidents goes out the window Aug. 1.

State Board of Insurance bowed to legislators' demands that it be greatly modified. But board members felt it would be better to scrap the whole thing, and try to work out some other plan for later adoption.

Most Texans will find that the abandonment of the merit rating plan will cost them money. This despite the fact that insured Texas car-owners taken as a whole will pay \$10,000,000 less for car insurance in the coming year than they did this year.

However—two-thirds of the car owners—those who have been getting 20 per cent discounts because they have had no accidents or reported traffic convictions—will pay the full rates in the year ahead. The other one-third—those who have been paying as much as 100 per cent extra because of bad driving records—will save substantially. They will pay the same rates as everyone else.

One factor in the decision to drop the plan was concern by members of the board and the insurance industry—over the increasing number of car owners who just were doing without insurance. Board members felt that to increase the penalties, which would have been necessary to maintain the 20 per cent discount for the "safe drivers" would drive even more people into un-insurance. This would have made the safe driving insurance plan even more out of balance financially.

Because auto insurance rates are set by counties, and by types of care and the age group of drivers, it is not possible to say just what effect the rates will have. Local insurance agents soon will have the information.

School's Allotment Cut — State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert advised the Texas Board of Education that the available school year should be \$197,058,604. The revenue is reaped from ad valorem taxes, poll taxes, interest or securities the school fund owns, motor fuel taxes, omnibus taxes and other revenue.

Board deducted \$8,737,536 to finance cost of purchasing and handling textbooks, and divided the balance between Texas' 2,387,234 children of school age.

So, the public schools will get \$78.50 per child next year; \$2 less for each than they were allotted in 1961.

While the 21-member board was on the subject of money, it passed a \$59,877,843 education budget for 1963, and offered State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar a \$4,000 annual raise through federal funds.

Edgar "declined the honor," saying he felt his three assistants are more entitled to supplements since they are directly concerned

with administering federal programs.

So, raises from \$11,000 to \$13,500 were voted for L. R. Graham, assistant commissioner of administration; Lee J. Wilborn, assistant commissioner for instruction and M. A. Browning, assistant commissioner for vocational education.

Then the board agreed to ask the 58th Legislature to raise Edgar's salary of \$18,500 a year to \$24,000 when it convenes in January.

Cream of the Crop—A preliminary glance at the Texas Education Agency's survey of 80,000 teachers revealed that the state's public schools system is getting the "cream of the crop" of high school graduates. Study Chairman, R. W. Byram of Austin said that new teachers came from the top 25 per cent of their graduating classes.

But the distribution of education specialists seems to be uneven: All teaching colleges in the state graduated a total of only 80 language teachers last year, and only 12 per cent of those who took mathematics education degrees plan to teach, so schools will suffer shortages in those areas.

On the other hand, there's an estimated surplus of English and history teachers—almost all the college graduates who majored in those two subjects plan to teach.

"Expatriots" on way to Dakotas — Spindletop V. Spindletops and their children, Pays and Gushie—a quartet of "geologist" prairie dogs—took a long trip to Bismark, N. D., where they'll take up residence at the Dakota Zoo.

The prairie dogs were a gift of Acting Gov. Culp Krueger, who decided to uphold the honor of Texas prairie dogs by sending four of the best he could find, after the zoo's president, Chris Dahl, asked for some.

Krueger assured the zoo that "these prize prairie dogs will feel at home and will dig right in and endeavor to be worthy of their Texas heritage," in a letter claiming the animals have built-in advanced seismographic training which should help in North Dakota oilfield explorations.

Junior College Costs Jumps — Texas taxpayers are having to pay more and more to educate youngsters who attend the state's 32 public junior colleges, according to a report from State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

In the year ending August, 1961, they spent \$223.67 apiece on 23,150 full-time student equivalents, but the per capita cost leaped \$42.91 to an average of \$266.58 for each of 26,075 student equivalents—a total of \$6,951,000.

Although 37,175 full and part-time students are actually enrolled in the state schools, the legislature bases its appropriations on the total number of semester hours taken divided by 15, a full-time course load.

Biggest share of the current appropriation for almost \$7,000,000 went to San Antonio Junior College, which got \$775,750 for its 3,323 student equivalents. Clarendon Junior College, which has 113 student equivalents, was 32nd on the list with .58 per cent share of \$40,600.

"Tain't True" — Railroad Commission Chairman William J. Murray, Jr., surprised Capitol newsmen this week by issuing a denial of rumors about the East Texas Oil Field scandal before he even was asked about them.

He introduced, and then denied, a rumor that the Railroad Commission has provided the major oil companies with damageable evidence against independent operators through inclination tests, but said Attorney General Will Wilson has "changed the rules" by accepting contributions for directional tests from the big oil firms, and providing information for them.

Murray also refuted rumors that some crooked-hole operators were under his protection. He admitted that he has friends among those under investigation, but stated he had granted no favors: "I swear that I have treated them alike—Independents and majors—and will continue to do so," he added. He further stated that he has not accepted money for campaign expenses in any of the political races he's run since his 1947 appointment to the commission.

Regarding a year-long delay in investigating illegal well deviations in East Texas, Murray moaned, "Why didn't I suspect it earlier? I had too much faith in my fellow man."

Business Better than Ever — The seasonal adjusted index of Texas business activity rose to a new all-time high of 137.1% in May, reported Dr. Francis B. May, statistician for the University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research.

High score reflects a seven per cent increase over April this year and a 12 percent increase over May, 1961 according to Dr. May. He considers the sharp rise a potent reminder that the recovery from the 1960 recession has not yet spent its force.

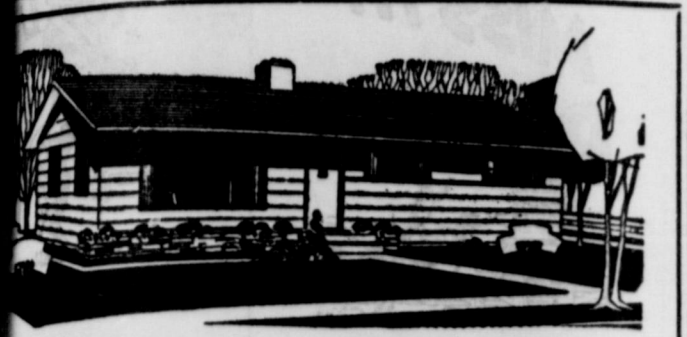

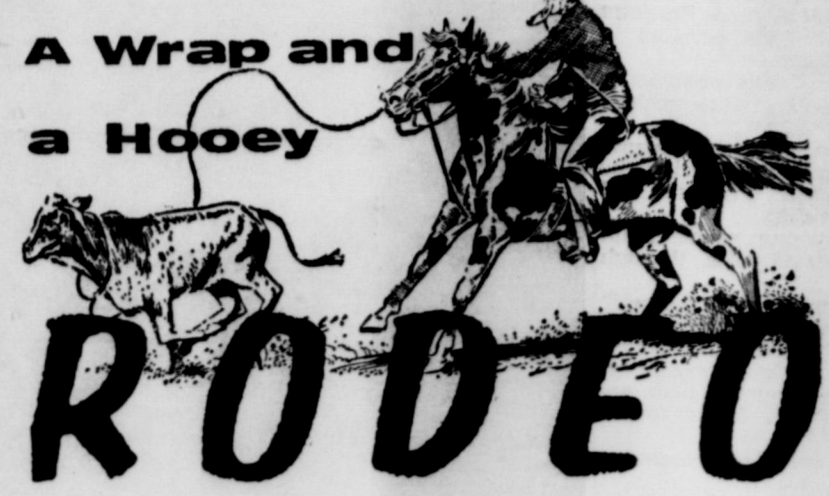

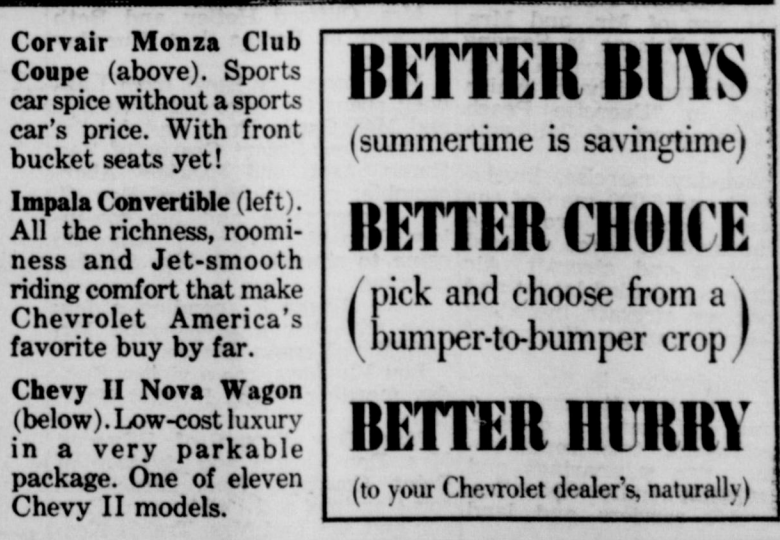

The County Dress Revue will be Tuesday, July 17, at Wheeler in the County Council room. The dresses and record books are due at 9 a.m. for judging. The revue will be at 2 p.m. All persons interested are invited to attend. The girls are asked to claim their dresses by number and be dressed by 1:45 p.m.

The County Dress Revue is the local participation in the State and National 4-H Awards Program in clothing for girls enrolled in County 4-H Clubs.

The purpose of this program is to help each 4-H girl to achieve the following:

1. To develop leadership talents and to work toward achieving the broad objectives of character and effective citizenship.

2. To help young people build self confidence and poise, through developing:

(a) Understanding of "herself" in order that she may select and make clothing which is becoming and expressive of her personality.

(b) Skills necessary to plan, select, and construct for different occasions.

(c) Ability to select becoming accessories.

(d) Appreciation and skill in making the most of her personal self.

(e) Ability to use time, energy, and money wisely.

3. To make and model a garment that is elegant in her wardrobe and one that can be worn proudly.

4. To develop grace, poise, good posture and the habits of good grooming.

Each 4-H girl participating in the clothing program under an adult leader becomes better fitted to fill her place in a changing society, if she has applied herself to the rules necessary for participation.

There are various awards offered for her efforts. The Simplicity Pattern Company and the Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association sponsor the Dress Revue Program in the State. In the county one medal will be awarded by them to the upper 10% of those participating in the revue. Sixteen or more must participate in the county before two awards may be given.

However, if there are local or county firms or individuals interested in providing a medal or medals in behalf of the 4-H girls who enter, they may do so. These medals would be awarded on the same merits as those awarded by state donors.

Any 4-H girl enrolled during the current year in a clothing program may participate in the county dress revue. She must be in Unit I, II, III, or IV of the clothing series offered by the subject matter leader in her club. There will be a junior and a senior division in the county. There may be five classifications for the senior division: a school dress, sports, dressy, street, and travel or a party (special occasion dress) classification. All members who are between the ages of 14 and 20 on January 1, 1962 may enter the senior division.

The junior division in the county will be classified as to the number of years participating in the clothing program and the type of garment made.

Gary Puryear Serves On Attack Carrier

Gary D. Puryear, Navy airman apprentice, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Puryear of Briscoe is serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Bon Homme Richard, which participated in "Exercise Peach Tree" off the coast of California recently.

REPORT FROM CONGRESS

By REP. WALTER ROGERS
To the People of the 18th District:

SUBSIDIES

A review of history would reveal that the government has been engaged in the subsidy-granting business for a long, long time. In the early days of this country, between 1827 and 1866, the government granted 6,340,339 acres of public land to private interests for the purpose of encouraging canal building and river improvement; and, in addition thereto, granted free certain rights-of-way, granted rights-of-way, of course, were most valuable. The government at that time also made contributions by direct appropriations, stock subscriptions, and loans and private canal companies. Between 1850 and 1871 some 183 million acres of Federal and State lands were granted to railroads. Millions of dollars have been assigned by the Federal government to ocean and development of the money invested by the private corporation. In the early days the subsidy mechanism was intended to be employed for the purpose of expanding transportation, encouraging foreign trade, fostering domestic industrial development, and so forth. However, since the turn of the century, subsidies and subsidy-like programs have multiplied to such an extent that their impact is felt by virtually all elements in the nation's economic structure. Probably the most publicized and widely advertised of government programs seems to be the agriculture program. However, it would be very well for those who are interested in the subsidy programs to take a look at the entire picture. The last compilation on the subject indicates government subsidies to business running well over \$1 billion per year; subsidies to labor running well over \$300 million per year; and subsidies to homeowners and tenants running some \$40 million per year. These subsidies consist of everything from shipbuilding differential subsidies to accelerated tax amortization, to highway construction, to negotiating government contracts, to free services furnished by many of the boards and bureaus to credit guaranties and direct loan programs, to airport grants, school lunch programs, and on and on. It seems that there is some kind of subsidy for every segment of our economy. These subsidies have been expanded primarily due to demands of the people who are receiving them that they be increased plus the demands of those who are not receiving subsidies that they be included in the handout. The primary reason that they have not been reduced is that everyone is most anxious to have the other fellow's subsidy cut and his own increased.

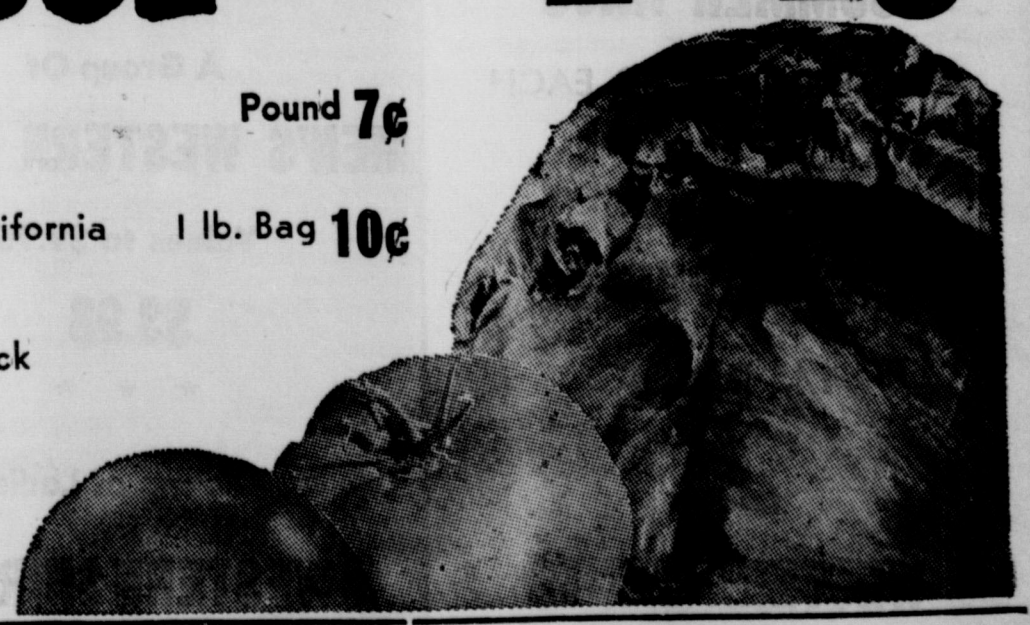

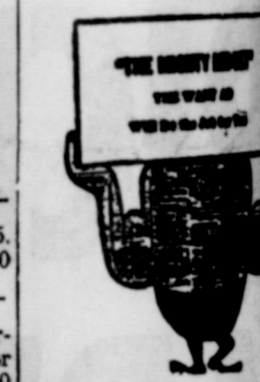
