PRIMARY ELECTION MAY 5th

Voters Have Wide Choice of Candidates

Democratic Party voters have a wide field of candidates to choose from when they go to the polls Saturday for the primary election.

Voting will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 7 p.m. in the usual polling places.

A. B. Crump, Wheeler County Democratic chairman, said voters will be required to show their poll tax receipt before being permitted to cast ballots.

COUNTY 4-H'ERS ENTER CONTEST HELD AT CANYON

Five senior teams from Wheeler County entered the District 1 4-H elimination contest Saturday in Canyon.

Four of these teams won top honors and will be eligible to enter state competition along with the grass judging team which won the honor at the earlier date.

Those placing will go to College Station for the State 4-H Round-up, June 5-7, representing the District there are as follows:

In Wheeler, the Wheeler ballot box will be in the high school gymnasium while the Stanley box is to be in the courthouse.

Crump urged all eligible voters to cast their ballots early.

At the close of the voting, returns from the county, district, precinct and state races will be posted as received on a large tabulation board at the courthouse.

Voters will be faced with a host of state candidates, but few local and district races.

Of major interest is the state representative's campaign, with three Democrats competing for the right to go to the Texas Legislature from the 87th District.

Granger McIlhany of Wheeler is the incumbent representative, and he is opposed by George W. Terry of McLean and Lester A. Jones of Pampa.

The winner will enter the general election next November against the Republican nominee — either Warren Fatheree or Johnny Wills, both of Pampa.

Three men also are in the race for county commissioner for Precinct 2. They are Incumbent O. W. Pendleton, R. D. Mason and Tom Puryear.

Other county officials are unopposed for re-election. They include:

Grass judging team—Mike Goad and Terry McCasland of Wheeler Cloverleaf 4-H Club and Collie Donaldson and Kelly Miller of Allison Snappers 4-H Club.

Share the Fun Festival—Barry Clark, Linda Featy and Marsha Lee of Wheeler Cloverleaf 4-H Club, accompanied by Donna Ford.

Soil and water and range conservation demonstration — Phillis Pakan, Lela 4-H Club.

Poultry marketing demonstration—Estelle Fillingim and Mozelle Fillingim, Wheeler Cloverleaf 4-H Club.

Public Speaking—Senior boys, Billy Don Rives of Shamrock 4-H Club.

Farm and home safety demonstration—Mike Shannon and Weldon Beasley, Shamrock 4-H Club.

The senior farm and ranch management team, Vivian Newsome and Mike Aderholt of the Allison Snappers 4-H Club, received third place. This was the first time this team has ever entered a demonstration.

G. W. Hefley, county judge; Harry Wofford, clerk; Rena Savage, district clerk; George A. Weems, superintendent of public schools; Palmer Sivage, treasurer, and A. B. Crump, county Democratic chairman.

Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo is opposed for re-election as senator from the 31st District by Charles L. Ballman of Borger.

District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich is unopposed for another term. Congressman Walter Rogers has no Democratic opponent in his bid for re-election.

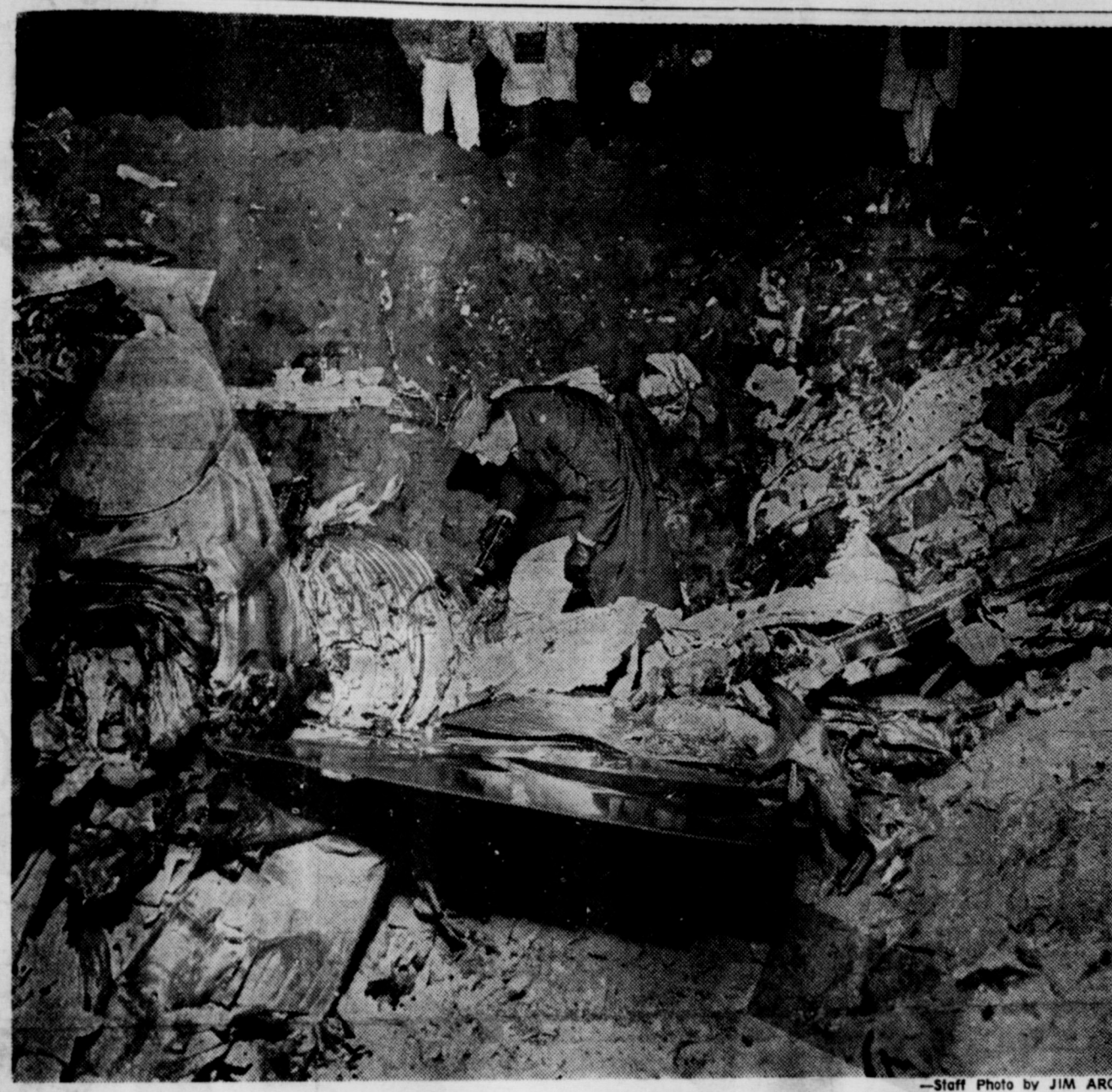
Briscoe Man Hurt In Auto Accident

The Need For Conservation Plans

If you are a farmer or rancher, you know that your farm or ranch is in some way different from any other farm or ranch. In fact more than likely it is not alike on any two fields or pastures on your own farm or ranch. And, I am sure you don't operate your farm or ranch in exactly the same manner as your neighbor. Your tools and equipment aren't exactly the same; you don't grow exactly the same kinds and amounts of crops and graze the same kind and number of livestock each year.

In some way, however, you are probably like all other farmers and ranchers, you continually make plans about how to operate your farm or ranch. You either rely on memory and keep your plan in your head or you write them down. I am sure the latter always proves to be the best policy, because so many times these plans that we once had in our minds fail to materialize.

You plan the kinds and amounts of crops to grow each year, which livestock to keep or sell, and hundreds of other details. Also, you probably do a lot of thinking and planning about how to produce more efficiently and provide a more stable economic income for yourself and your family.

The conservation needs of your farm or ranch are also different from others, and when you plan your operations to make better use of the soil, water, and plants on your farm or ranch, you are, in fact, making a conservation plan.

To make such a plan, you need a good understanding with basic facts about the soil, water and plants. With this information, you can decide how to manage your land resources according to their needs for conservation protection and improvement, and also how to best use your land within its potential capability.

There are two Soil Conservation Service technicians here in the Wheeler Soil Conservation Dist. with headquarters in Wheeler, Tex., who can and will give you technical assistance in helping you develop a conservation plan for your farm or ranch. These technicians have maps of your farm or ranch and show soil types, slopes, degree of erosion. These maps will also provide information concerning land that is best suited for irrigation or dryland cultivation, as well as land that should be used as pasture or range. The information from these maps should become a basis for your conservation planning decisions.

A good sound house or building was not built without a set of good blue prints, including a firm foundation; likewise, your conservation

plan should be based on a good understanding of basic facts about your land that is available thru the Soil Conservation Service. A conservation plan based upon this kind of foundation will make a better and more productive farm or ranch for you.

First, you need to make your plan in accordance with the basic facts obtained from your soils inventory. Then you need to decide how and when these changes, if any, in your operations can be best performed. For example, if your land needs structural conservation practices, when do you plan to construct them, and also, do you wish to receive cost-sharing assistance for applying the practices?

If you have an irrigation farm, plans may need to be made for irrigation pipelines, land leveling, and possibly some new cropping system, or even a complete change in your irrigation system to get better use of your irrigation water.

If you are a rancher you may want to install windmills and other livestock watering devices, as well as fences to get an even distribution of grazing from your livestock per acre.

More than a million farmers and ranchers in soil conservation districts throughout the fifty states and Porto Rico are carrying out soil and water conservation plans. All these people prepare their soil and water conservation plans in much the same manner as I have discussed here. These plans cover over 340 million acres, and prac-

Kiwanis Club Is Formed in Mexico

Kiwanis International has just established its first club outside the United States and Canada, according to Gordon Stiles, president of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club. Suggestions For Housecleaning

With the coming of spring comes an annual project for homemakers: spring housecleaning. Chances are that the floors are in for a good scrubbing. Here are some suggestions for floor care from Mrs. O. W. Nowlin, Wheeler County Home Demonstration Agent.

To remove old wax, follow the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service suggestion for using rags moistened with turpentine or other paint thinner.

A final rinse with soap and water will be necessary, but do this

quickly so the water won't have time to reach the wood or turn shellac coating white. Floors will last longer if they are waxed regularly. This should be done every four to six months. If there are children in the home, there will probably be a need to touch up some spots often. Even ink stains can be removed from wood flooring, if you know how. Just bleach them with exalig acid or some other commercial wood bleach.

The rubber marks, caused by tennis shoes and hard rubber

heels, may be removed with naphtha or paint thinner. If there is grease from the car or droppings from your vacuum cleaner motor on the floor, there is not much that can be done about it except to sand off all the stained area.

On other badly stained areas—such as places where the water has stood for some time, sanding also may be required.

After the stain has been removed, the next step is to patch the area with sealer and buff with a pad of steel wool.

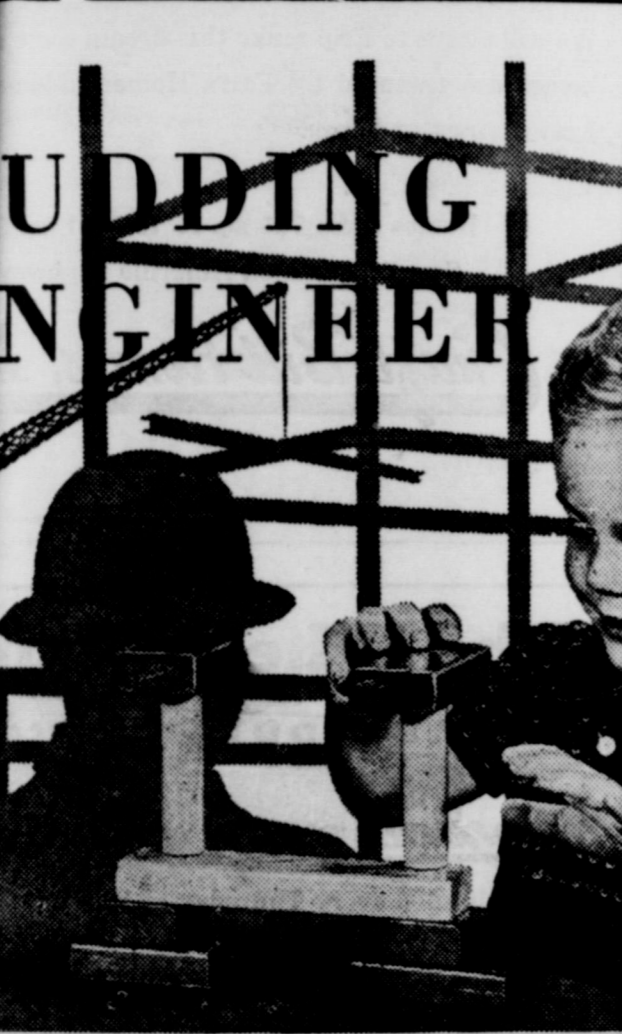

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New Herbicide Given Tests

A concentrated research effort at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station since 1957 has proven the feasibility of a new pre-emergence herbicide for weed control in sorghum, states Dr. A. F. Wiese, agronomist.

This herbicide will be called Propazine, and in 1962 will be available for use in sorghum fields being produced for seed. As yet, USDA label clearance has not been obtained for use on sorghum to be produced for feed. It is anticipated that complete label clearance will be obtained by the 1963 sorghum season.

The chemical composition of the herbicide is 2-chloro-4,6-bis-(isopropylamino)-s-triazine, a very close relative of simazine and atrazine which are successful pre-emergence herbicides in corn. Propazine may be applied in bands over the drill row or broadcast over the entire field. Broadcast ap-

lications will eliminate the need for cultivation during the entire growing season.

Because propazine is not toxic to cotton, particularly useful to farmers who have grass weed problems that cannot be controlled with applications of 2-4-D.

The availability of propazine to farmers is the end result of intensive herbicide evaluation program at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station over the past four years. During that time approximately 25 chemicals were tested for possible pre-emergence herbicides in sorghum, but some of them have proved as effective as propazine.

Yields from the 1958, 1959 and 1960 test plots at the Experiment Station were 6,150, 6,440 and 3,460 pounds per acre, respectively, for normal cultivation; propazine applied broadcast at 2 pounds per acre, and propazine applied broad-

cast at 4 pounds per acre. Crab grass control in the plots with 2 pounds per acre of propazine was equivalent to that obtained from normal cultivation.

Because of favorable results in 1958 and 1959, more extensive testing of the herbicide was conducted in 1960 and 1961. In 1961 a 10 acre conservation bench on the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station was treated with propazine at the rate of 1/2 pound per acre in a 10-inch band over 40-inch rows of sorghum. This was equivalent to two pounds per acre broadcast. This treatment gave outstanding control of pigweed, even though over six inches of rain fell during the first two weeks following planting and the area was too wet for cultivation until August 1.

One cultivation eliminated the weeds in the middle and this bench level area was the cleanest field of sorghum on the Experiment Station.

During the 1960, trials were conducted also on the Frank Zierer, Jr., farm west of Hereford, the Tom Woodward farm at Plainview and on the H. H. Miller farm at Dawn.

On these farms, two pounds per acre of propazine applied broadcast gave outstanding weed control for the entire section without reducing yields of sorghum. However, grass weeds were not as easily controlled as pigweed. Sorghum yields were reduced when the herbicide was applied at rates over four pounds per acre.

In 1961, band and broadcast applications of propazine were applied to one acre plots at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station and at the Douglas DeGee farm near Lockney, Texas at rates equivalent to one, two, and three pounds per treated acre. Pigweed was controlled all year by the one pound per acre application of propazine.

The average yields from the two fields for a cultivated check and propazine at one, 2 and 3 pounds per acre applied broadcast were 6,960, 7,270, 6,810 and 6,760 pounds per acre, respectively. One other three acre test field at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station, two 10-inch rows of sorghum were planted dry on top of 40-inch lister beds, treated with propazine and watered to germinate the seed and activate the chemical.

This field remained weed free without cultivation for the entire season and yielded approximately 8,300 pounds per acre.

Propazine is a wettable powder and must be applied in 25 to 40 gallons of water per acre. Considerable agitation is required or the material will settle to the

bottom of the spray tank. On a four row rig this can be accomplished with the return from a medium size pump with a capacity of approximately 10 gallons per minute.

Propazine is absorbed through the roots and kills young weeds by inhibiting photosynthesis. Consequently, propazine must be applied to the soil immediately after planting in order that the subsequent rain can leach it into the root zone.

If rainfall occurs before chemical application, weeds may germinate and grow through the propazine on the soil surface. It is suggested that sorghum seed producers interested in trying propazine in 1962 do so on a limited basis in order to familiarize themselves with the use of the chemical.

The successful use of propazine depends on proper calibration of the sprayer. Consequently, farmers should get their sprayers in running order a week or two before the sorghum planting season.

Additional information about propazine or calibration of sprayers can be obtained from your county agent or the Southwestern Great Plains Field station, Bushland, Texas.

(Editor's note — The following is an essay written by a seventh grade student of Mrs. Harold Nash)

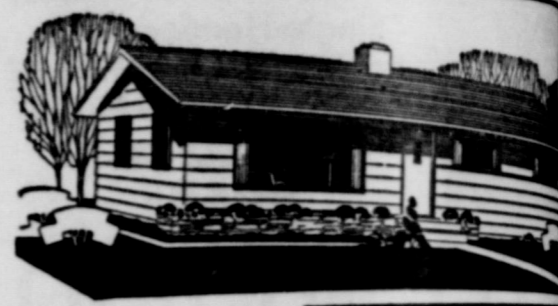
"What Texas Means to Me"

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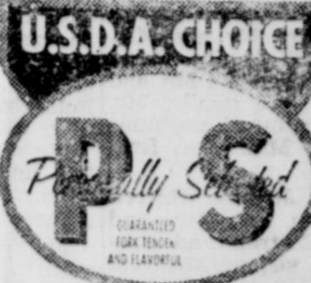
