## Canadian Is Site Of Season Opener

The lid pops off the 1962 football season Friday night, when Grady Burnett's Wheeler High School Mustangs travel to Canadian for their annual bout with the Wildcats.

Kickoff time will be 8 p.m. and many Mustang fans are expected to make the trip north.

Little information is available on the Wildcats here, but they are expected to be tough competitors in football this year.

Burnett announced Wednesday that Richard Wallace, 150-pound sophomore, has been handed the starting assignment at quarter back for the Mustangs, as the locals completed workouts for the season-opener.

The coach will choose between four players for the other backfield positions—Dunky Porter, 165 sophomore; Mendel Hunter, 165 junior; Don Burks, 150, sophomore; and Terry Vanpool, 150, sophomore.

In the line will be: Left end—Randy Callan, 150 senior.

Left tackle—Charles Willard, 220, senior.

Left guard—Danny Dorman, 170, freshman.

Center—Jimmy Jamison, 180, sophomore.

Right Guard—Ray Owens, 165, senior.

Right tackle—Neil Rogers, 190, junior.

Right end—Kent Sims, 165, junior.

In a way, Friday's game will mark homecoming for Coach Burnett, who was head coach at Canadian for a number of years before moving to Vega in 1961.

And he wants to make it a successful return—with a victory for Wheeler.

The Mustangs play before the homefolks here the first time next week, when they face Mansion, Okla., on Friday night. Then they host Erick, Okla., the following Friday and face Sunray here on Sept. 28.

At this meeting the board reviewed and paid all bills. They agreed to contribute \$25.00 as requested by the state board for the preparation of a book on Conservation. It is hoped that this effort will eventually lead to the teaching of conservation in all schools.

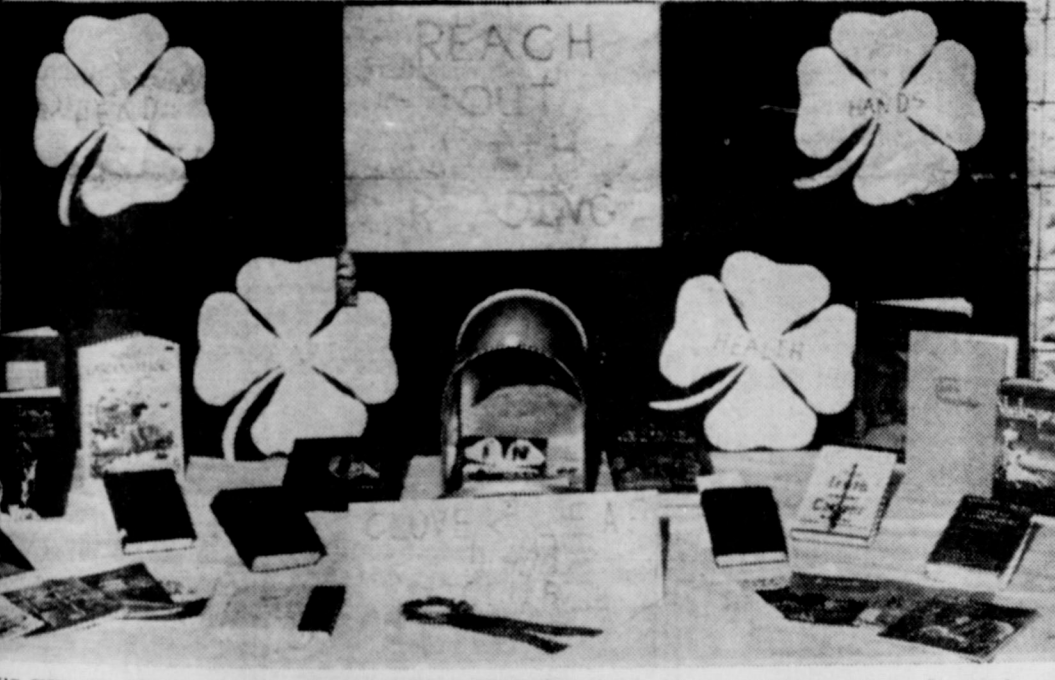
Preparation was made for the election of a supervisor from subdivision 4. This subdivision takes in the northwest part of the county and is currently represented by Farmer Hefley, who is doing a good job. This election will be at 8:00 p.m. All landowners in that area please mark on your calendar and look for more news on it later in the month.

Other business was a discussion on the status of the Sweetwater Creek watershed. Bill Brooks reported that a tentative date of October 23, 24, 25, had been proposed for the feasibility determination for Sweetwater Creek. We will know for sure after that whether we have a watershed program or not.

The other item of business was the review and approval of soil conservation plans on the farm of Leon Bullard and Mrs. S. T. Richardson. These farmers are preparing Great Plains contracts to facilitate the completion of needed conservation work.

Conservation practices last week applied were a well and tuk on R. A. Nichols. This was cost shared through the Great Plains program. Eli Baker reported that he

## Seventh Largest Class School Enrollment 15 Over Last Year

Enrollment in Wheeler High School and Elementary School shows an increase of 15 for the 1962-63 term over last year, according to Supt. Arling Cordell.

Cordell reported Wednesday that a total of 252 students are attending elementary school and 103 are in high school.

The enrollment figures, he said, "show that our school is growing steadily. This encourages us greatly, since our whole financial picture changes with our growth."

Seventh graders hold the distinction of being the largest class in the Wheeler school system, with a total of 44. The fifth grade, with 18, is smallest.

Enrollment by grades included: First, 35; second, 27; third, 26; fourth, 29; fifth, 18; sixth, 33; seventh, 44; eighth, 40; ninth, 26; 10th, 29; 11th, 29; 12th, 19.

The superintendent expressed his appreciation to parents attending the assemblies opening the school term, adding: "We hope you will continue to have an active interest in the welfare of your children, in your school and in your community."

He encouraged all parents to attend the first P-TA meeting Monday evening.

"This is a fine opportunity for getting acquainted with everyone," Cordell said. "No other organization that I am familiar with has done so much for the public schools of our state and of the nation."

Cordell reported that teachers, pupils and parents "seem to have a real contagious enthusiasm for school this year. Let's all work together to keep it that way."

"It seems to me that education is about 90 per cent hard work and about 10 per cent comes from inspiration. That is where we as teachers and you as parents function the best, in providing the inspiration."

"I know of no better way to do this than to be constantly interested in and aware of our pupils' needs. Let them know we are with them in their efforts to improve themselves, insist upon their reading widely, studying everyday, all ways being prepared and they will not disappoint us."

### It's the Law in TEXAS

#### OPINION TESTIMONY

In court all lawyers ask all witnesses except expert witnesses to report their observation, not opinions. It is for the judge and the jury—not the fact witness—to make inferences as to guilt or liability from the facts.

On the other hand, only "experts" can give the court their opinions. Aren't most people expert in some things? Most people are qualified to give opinions on such everyday things as speed, time, sound, and the like. Sometimes where impressions are hard to talk in terms of opinions about such things as the force of a blow, distance of a sound, the amount of light, the degree of cold or heat, weight, size, faith, temper, fear.

We can express the opinion that Jones "looks like the man" who did a crime, or that his footfalls or his voice were those of Jones. Courts will admit such evidence. So too, one can testify about his friends' sanity or handwriting and sometimes your own motives.

But most often the court must rely on certain skilled persons like physicians or engineers for "expert opinions" especially in complex or technical cases.

Problems in using experts: They may not agree. They may give opinions on the "ultimate" fact which the jury itself must decide (the extent of injuries, who is the father, what caused the explosion.)

Do the experts here invade the jury's province?

As a rule, no. Before a court will let the expert testify he must show his special knowledge, say, in science, art, trade. Even so, the judge and jury decide issues of the trial, not the experts alone.

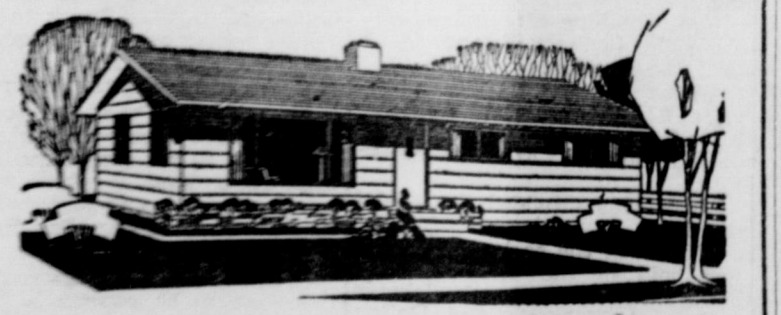

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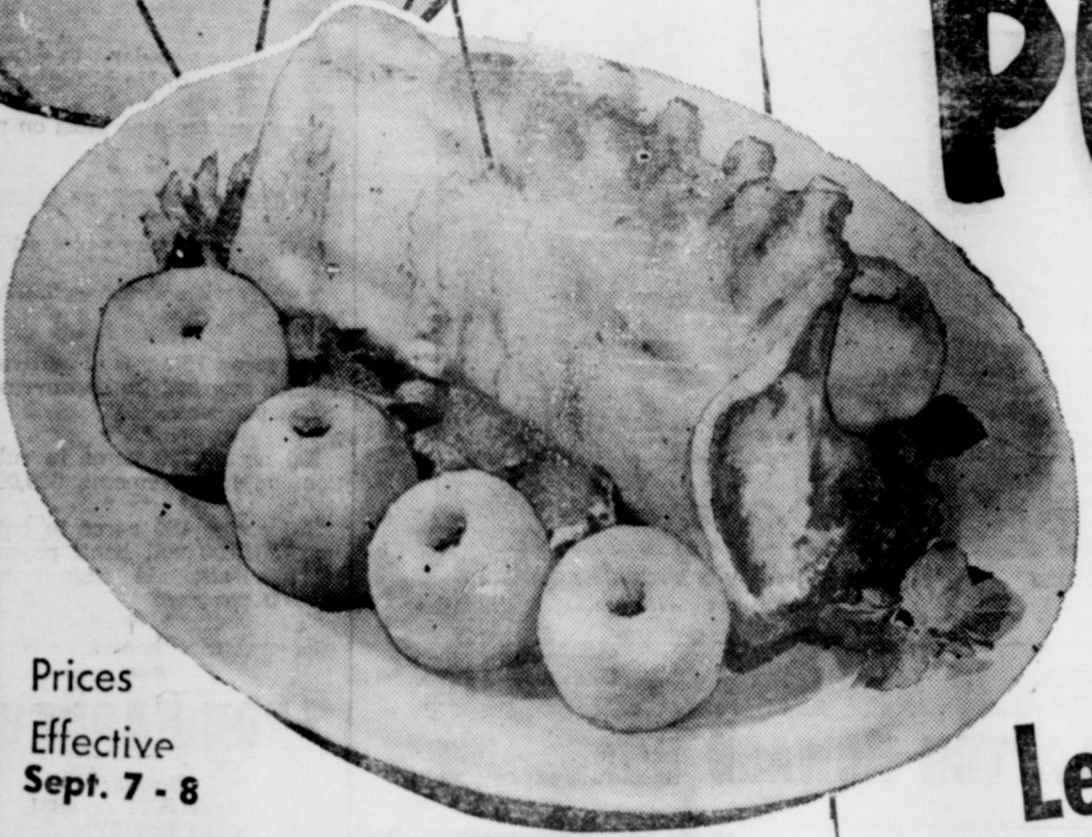

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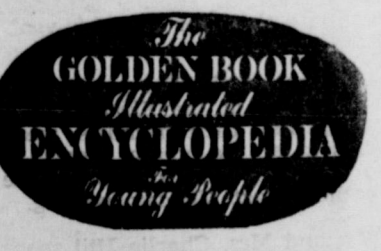

### Many Eligible For Social Security Have Not Yet Applied

There are a number of eligible persons 65 years old and older in the Golden Spread who have not yet applied for their social security payments, according to Hal Geldon, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

Many persons have not applied because they are still working. However, since last year it has been possible for many older people to collect their full or partial retirement benefits even though they still work.

Under the changed law, Geldon said, those eligible for social security payments may earn up to \$1,200 a year and still receive all benefits checks for the year.

If earning are over \$1,200, the new rules frequently permit the payment of some social security benefits. The amount payable depends on how much over \$1,200 a person earns and on the amount he would normally receive from social security each month.

Persons who want to figure out how much they may receive in social security benefits even though they are working are invited to contact the Amarillo Social Security office, 1006 Adams Street, for more information. Geldon stated

# County Agent's Notes

By CHARLES D. JACKSON

Farmers are reminded that they have until September 30th, to submit claims for federal gas tax refunds. The refund may be received for all gasoline used for agricultural purposes on a farm or ranch. Claims should include fuel used by the operator himself or by custom operators working for him. However, fuel used in vehicles on roads and highways is not eligible for refund.

The claims for federal refund must be made from July 1 to Sept. 30 on gasoline used between July 1 of 1961 and June 30 of 1962. The procedure is simple and all farmers who filed claims last year will receive Form 2240 in the mail this year. Farmers who didn't file last year may obtain the forms from their county agent or from the Internal Revenue Service. A copy of Publication 308 of the Internal Revenue Service may be of help to the applicant.

The federal gas tax refund should not be confused with the state refund which is for a shorter period of only six months. This refund involves a more complicated process and additional information should be obtained from the state Department of Revenue in Austin.

Any points that are uncertain should be checked on before the claim is filed and that farmers should keep their records to verify claims submitted.

A properly adjusted cotton picker will harvest an extra \$10 per bale, according to extension cotton ginning and merchandizing specialists. Here are some suggestions for more efficient operation given by the specialist. Doffers, or stripper bars, should be adjusted to remove all the cotton each time. The spindle should not touch the doffer and can best be adjusted by letting it barely touch and then backing off until light can barely be seen between the doffer and the spindle.

Moisture pads should be adjusted so that they touch the entire picking surface of the spindle in order to keep the spindle clean of plant and leaf juices. Poor moisture pad adjustment allow the spindles to gum up, thus causing poor doffing, staining and soiling the lint and lower grades.

Using too much water makes cotton more difficult to gin and can cause lower grades. The use of excess water causes mud and trash to collect in the picker unit and stains cotton. Adjust the moisture pad properly and then use barely enough water to clean the spindles.

Two important things to remember are (1) Doffers and moisture pads should be adjusted to be changed as field conditions change. (2) Use only plain water at the rate of two gallons per ball to clean the spindles. Oil is not recommended for picked spindles.

Method of making these necessary cotton picker adjustments are described in your operators manual and should be followed.
