Keep Insect Watch, Suggestion to Farmers

County Agent Charles D. Jackson this week suggested that farmers keep a close watch on their cotton fields to discover insects before any major damage occurs.

Jackson reported that "quite a few weevils and bollworms" have appeared in Kelton area fields recently, and urged regular inspection of the young plants.

He said that several farmers have already started spraying to eliminate the insects.

Also appearing in damaging numbers in Wheeler County fields have been fleahoppers and aphids.

Dr. Anderson Department Head

Dr. John Q. Anderson, a native of Wheeler, has been named head of the Texas A and M department of English. Dr. Frank W. R. Hubert, dean of arts and sciences, announced this week.

He has been a member of the A and M faculty since 1953.

An English professor noted for his research and writings in the field of American folklore, Dr. Anderson will assume his new academic post Sept. 1.

He succeeds Dr. Stewart S. Morgan, English department head since 1952, who is retiring to modified teaching duties. Dr. Morgan has been on the Texas A and M faculty since 1921.

"Dr. Anderson effectively combines the two essential qualities for academic leadership in college and universities circles; Dean Hubert said. "His teaching record is outstanding. In 1961 he received a Distinguished Service Award for Teaching upon the selection by a college-wide faculty committee.

"His contributions to the field of scholarship are already noteworthy and his work stands as an inspiration to all of us. He is a real pace-setter for scholarship and effectiveness."

Dr. Anderson earned his bachelor's degree in 1939 at Oklahoma State. He received his master's degree at Louisiana State University in 1948 and his doctor of philosophy at the University of North Carolina in 1952.

He joined the Texas A. and M. faculty in 1953.

Dr. Anderson is author of three books. They are: "Louisiana Swamp Doctor: The Life and Writings of Henry Clay Lewis;" "Brokenburn: The Journal of Kate Stone, 1861-68;" and "A Texas Surgeon in the C.S.A."

He is the author of more than 25 articles in numerous university quarterly and folklore publications. He currently has three books in progress dealing with Texas and Louisiana folklore.

His contributions also include tape recording folk songs for the archives of the Texas Folklore Society, the archives of Folk Music, Indiana University and Texas folk songs for the Library of Congress archives of folk music.

He is a member of the Modern Language Association, South Central Modern Language Association, South-Central Modern Language Association, the College of College Teachers of English and a number of folklore societies.

Prior to joining the Texas A and M faculty, he taught at the University of North Carolina and McNeese State College in Louisiana.

During World War II, he enlisted in the Army, later was commissioned in the Adjutant General Corps and saw service in England, France and Germany.

He is married to the former Lorraine Epps of Ruston, La.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON IN THE GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 63 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to acquire, repair or replace buildings and improved equipment same, for hospital care for the indigent within the district of the county or counties, providing that the indigent shall assume responsibility for providing and hospital care for its inhabitants and assume the liability incurred by the county or counties for hospital care prior to the creation of the district, if same are located within its boundaries, and a portion of such indebtedness upon the then last approved general laws of the State of Texas and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$0.75) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bond and indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district."

"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

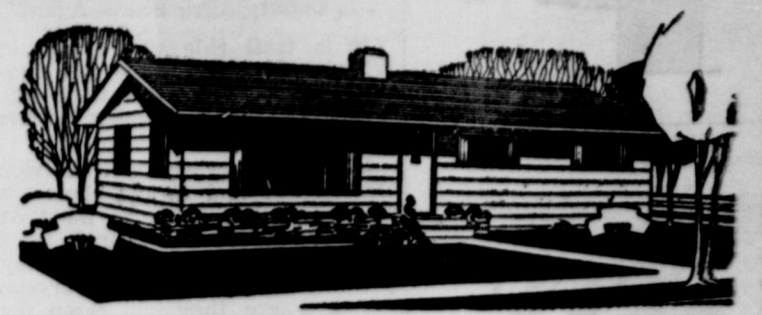

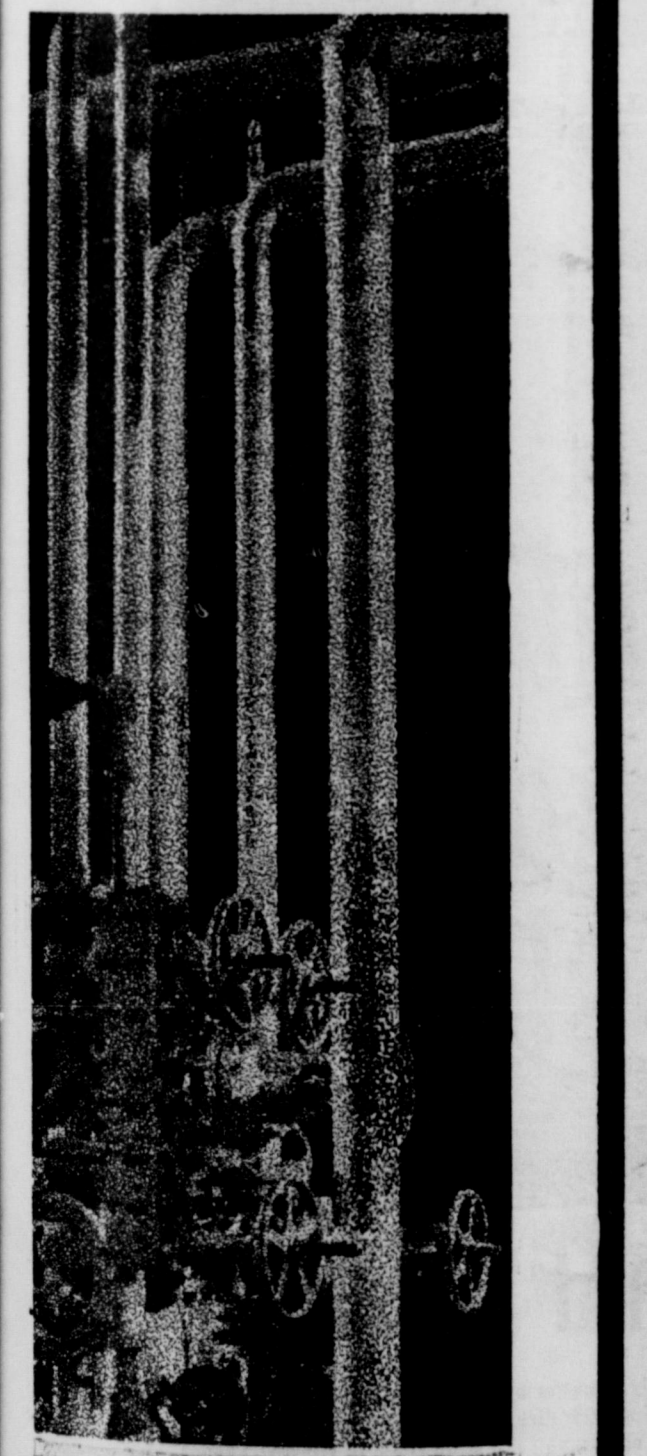

OVERDONE SUN WORSHIPPERS COULD LEAD TO TROUBLE

It will arouse the wrath of sun worshippers, but this must be said: The healthful effects of a suntan aren't worth the time and trouble it takes to get one. After all, a sunburn—like any other burn—is a manifestation of a skin injury. True, a sensible bask in the sun makes a fine mental pick-me-up, and there is no denying the supple appeal of a tawny lifeguard. But to overdo it can lead to trouble. In fact it can kill you. More than one person has succumbed to prolonged and unaccustomed exposure to the sun.

Even the best overexposure can mean two or three miserable days when a mere shirt or blouse is torture, and a friendly pat on the back can end in murder.

The medical term for sunburn is "erythema solaris." It's the ultra violet rays, it is possible to get burned even on overcast days in mid-summer.

Some people are physically unable to tan. Known medically as "heliphobes," they could spend the entire summer on Padre Island, and all they'd get would be blisters on their blisters. The reason their skins lack the pigment necessary to produce the tan tint they never had a tan and they never will, so they ought never attempt one. Each new exposure will only mean a new burn.

Assuming you are the type who can tan a "heliphilic," that is—the well-known rule about doing it by progressively longer exposure times is valid and should be followed.

Sunshine is a source of Vitamin D, as most people know. What is apparently misunderstood is that ordinarily people can get all the D vitamin they need through routine activities such as hanging out in the family wash, mowing the lawn or walking to the store.

For persons suffering from pellagra, lung tuberculosis, high blood pressure or hyperthyroid sunlight may be definitely harmful.

In case you have wondered about the source of freckles, here's the answer: The color of everyone's skin is determined by the amount of pigment in skin cells. Dark-complexioned people have considerable, blondes very little, and albinos none at all.

Under microscope the pigment in skin cells looks like tiny flecks of brown paint. Sometimes, especially in children it is manufactured unevenly and collects in the spots we know as freckles.

Ultra-violet rays can be filtered, fortunately, by smearing a thin film of olive oil over exposed skin. So if you're heliphilic, and if you just have to have that golden sheen this summer, it might pay you to try it.

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PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, renumbering said Section, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled as to read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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Recipe

FOR PERFECT FRIED CHICKEN EVERYTIME

1 cup pancake mix
 3/4 teaspoon salt
 3/4 cup water
 1 2-to 2 1/2-pound ready-to-cook frying chicken

Combine pancake mix, salt, and water. Beat for 2 minutes. Dip the chicken in batter; drain well on rack. Lower chicken into deep kettle of hot fat (350 degrees). Then regulate heat so chicken fries at 300 to 325 degrees. Cook until tender (about 10 minutes). Drain on absorbent paper. Keep hot in heavy, heated pan until served. Makes 4 servings.

Note: If chicken is larger than 2 1/4 pounds, precook it first; dip into batter; fry until golden brown.

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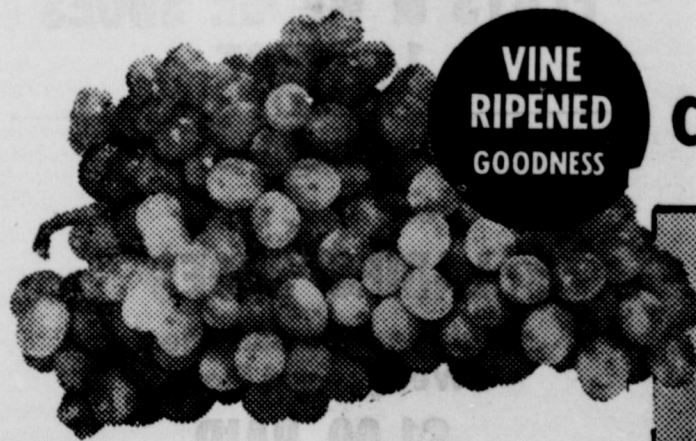
