CLAUDE DOWNED 14-6; FOOTBALL SEASON SUCCESS

Coach Grady Burnett's Wheeler Mustangs rode over their last obstacle, the Claude Mustangs, last Friday night 14-6, and are co-champions of District 5B with the Groom Tigers.

It was a cold night at Nicholson Field but the fans were warmed by the knowledge that a victory would send the scrapping Mustangs into the bi-district playoff and they were not disappointed.

The Mustangs set about their job the first time they got the pig-hide and scored with 6:44 remaining in the initial quarter. The touchdown and extra point proved to be enough for the margin of victory but the fans were kept in suspense by another group of Mustangs of the Claude variety.

Wheeler took advantage of the brisk north wind and set up their touchdown with a 44 yard pass from Porter to Callan. Callan had worked behind the Claude defense but had to stop for the pass and this enabled the defenders to overhaul him on the Claude 19. Hunter went to the 5 on the first play but a penalty moved them back to the 10 yard line. Three plays later, Richard Wallace sneaked over from the 1. Hunter scored the two pointer with a hard drive over his right tackle and the board read 8-0 in favor of Wheeler.

The closest the Claude offense could penetrate into Mustang territory in the first half was to the Wheeler 35 yard line but there the Mustangs rose up and took over on downs. Wheeler threatened late in the half and the clock ran out with (Continued on Page 8, No. 1)

CoC WILL AWARD LIGHTING PRIZES

The organization supporting the Sweetwater Creek Watershed met Monday night, November 19, in the courthouse at Wheeler to make additional plans for the future of the watershed program.

Gordon Stiles, chairman of the steering committee presided. Representatives were present from the commissioners courts of Wheeler and Gray Counties, the Soil Conservation Districts of Wheeler and Gray counties, members of the steering committees from Wheeler and Beckham county, Okla. the Chamber of Commerce of Wheeler SCS representatives were present from Sayre, Oklahoma, Wheeler and Pampa.

Mr. Stiles reviewed the progress the Watershed had made to date. He also stressed the need for each farm or ranch within the watershed area to have a conservation plan developed. Each farmer or rancher, who does not have a conservation plan should contact a supervisor of their Soil Conservation District or one of the local SCS men, who will assist with the plan.

It was decided that the next step would be for the sponsoring organization to prepare a letter of interest to grant easements for the construction of the flood prevention structures and/or store flood water. These letters will be presented to landowners having the possibility of a flood prevention structure (dam) on their place. They will be required to indicate their attitude by this letter of intent. These letters will be distributed by the sponsoring organizations, the local interested people.

The next step is to get the watershed planned. This will be done by a crew of technicians with the Soil Conservation Service. It is not now known how long it will be before their planning can be done. It may be within 2 to 5 years. The group thought that the sooner it could be started, the better. Mr. Stiles warned that the most dangerous thing facing the program is that, it may take a while, local people will lose interest and forget about it. Mayor Daughtry does not think this is likely since there will be continuing shortage of water during the critical summer months.

He stated that the watershed committee met recently and decided to contact farmers and ranchers located on the creek and tributaries to determine how many will be willing to have dams on their place. 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MOBEETIE MAN TELLS OF CRASH

Some prayed a two-year old boy slept, clutched tightly in his mother's arms. Others got sick, all were scared, but nobody panicked.

That is how the passengers aboard Northwest Orient Airlines Flight 293 a military charter, reacted during the 45 minutes prior the time they learned the plane would have to ditch until the aircraft hit the water in Sitka Harbour.

Dennis Dale Corcoran, son of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Corcoran of Mobeetie, was among the passengers.

Arriving at Elmendorf Air Force Base from Japan aboard a chartered plane Capt. Russel Dugas, and his wife told of their actions during those critical minutes. "We saw the children were properly protected, covered our heads with blankets and coats", the captain said. To his wife he added: "And then we prayed."

At the same time Mrs. Dugas explained that there was little time to think about what was happening everyone was so busy, we were briefed at all times. Everyone was assisting everyone else so you never felt anybody would be hurt, we all had confidence.

The Douglas two year old son slept during those critical minutes, waking only when they "threw him into the raft".

Pvt. Ronald Land said he sat there scared after the announcement the plane was going down in the water, and another airman commented "If I said I wasn't scared I'd be lying".

"We put life vests on and when the emergency instructions came we put our heads down for the hit, so nobody got hurt."

In the minutes preceding the actual ditching everything was silent. Woodward told how the military men used to taking orders and acting in emergency helped the stewardesses get the rafts to exits and out of the plane and then helped the women and small children into the rafts. They (the military) were also the last to leave the plane, they made close inspection of the aircraft before getting into rafts.

The ditching was so adept that the plane stayed afloat 22 minutes while those aboard calmly got into 23 man life rafts.

"Apparently there was no panic," said Jim Jajua who reached the scene before the plane sank. It looked like the pilot did a beautiful job. The top of the wings were just starting to be awash when I got there. The nose went down first and when the tail went over it headed straight for the bottom just like a big whale going down.

Dale wrote his parents and wife that it was a frightening experience but that he was alright.

Dale's wife, the former Carol Childress and son, Jeffery Dale, are living with her parents in Wheeler while Dale is stationed in Alaska.

Mrs. Dale Dyson underwent surgery last week and she is doing fine.

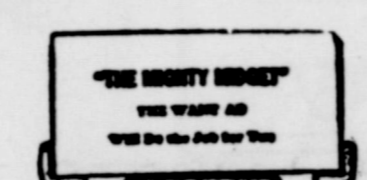

LOANS ARE OFFERED TO ELDERLY COUPLES TO BUILD OR IMPROVE

Mr. L. J. Chapman, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, advised the local County Supervisor, Mr. John L. Manning, that recent legislation amends Title V of the Housing Act of 1949 by adding new provisions which authorize loans and grants for moderate cost housing and related facilities in rural areas. It liberalizes some regulations on rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration and sets up new direct and insured loan programs.

This new legislation will be administered in Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts County by USDA's Farmers Home Administration. Rural housing loans are made by this agency to farmers and other families living in rural areas who need improved housing and cannot qualify for credit from other sources.

Our new provision will give those people, who are 62 years of age or over, special advantages under the earlier loan program. First they can buy previously-occupied existing housing as well as improve their homes. Second, they can finance the cost of the building site as well as the dwelling with the loan proceeds; other families must own the land on which to build the homes before they can apply for a loan. Third, co-signers may be used by elderly applicants who are deficient in repayment ability. Like rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration, these direct loans will bear interest at the rate of 4 percent and may be repaid over a period not exceeding 33 years.

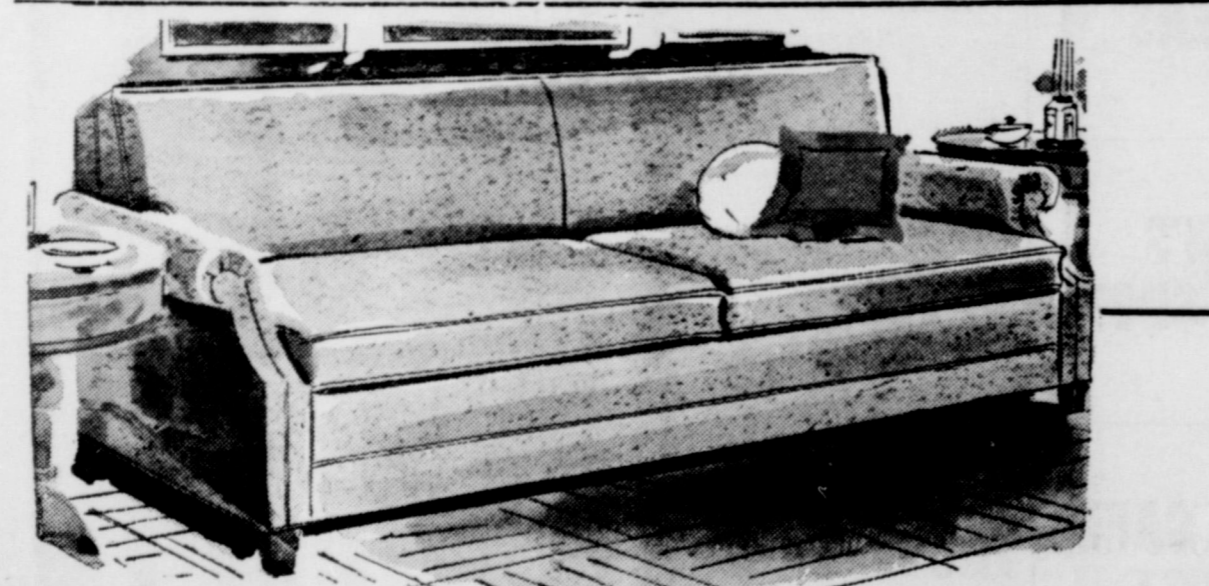

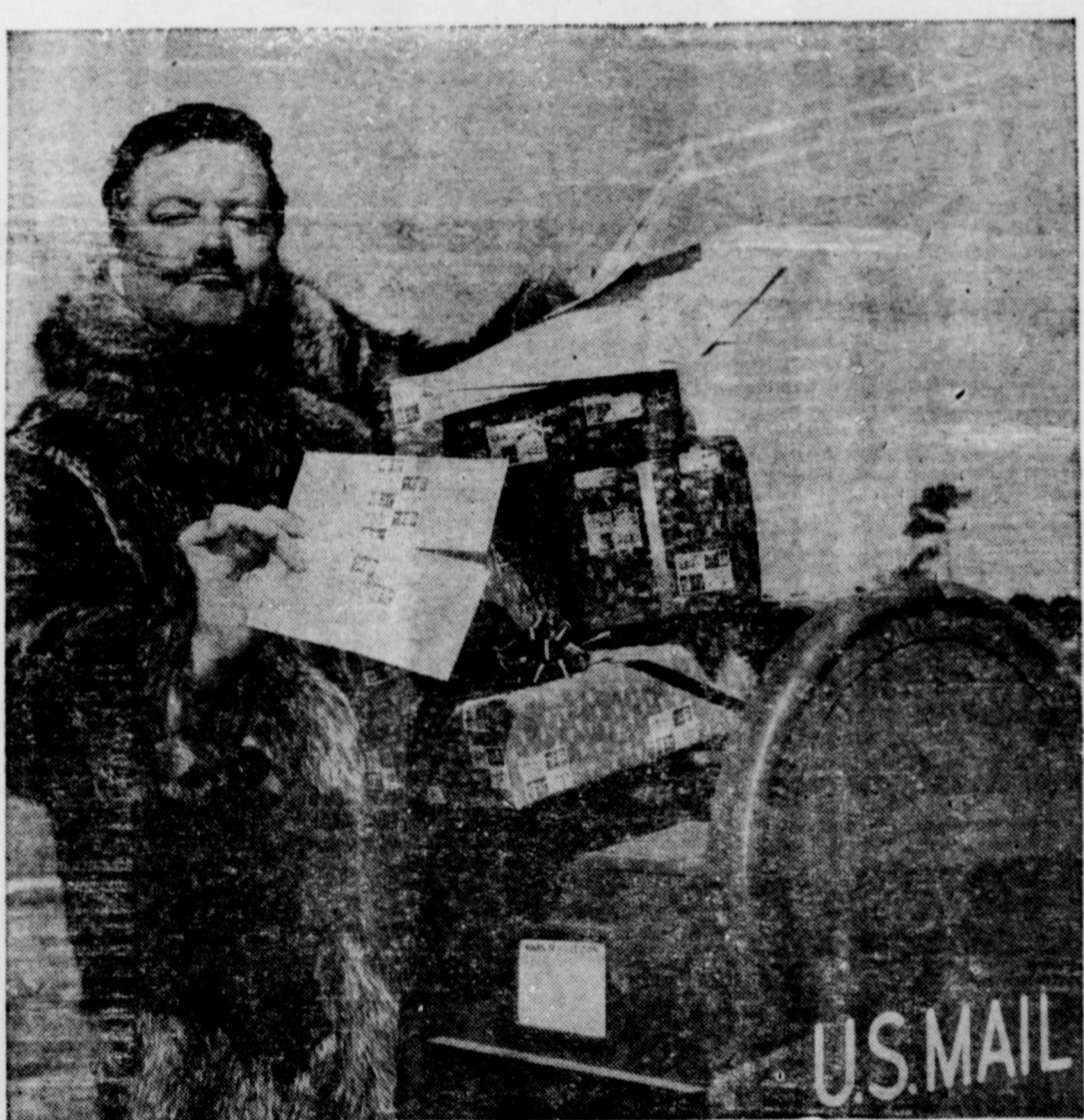

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AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

The million dollar snow that we have had during the past several days should help moisture wise as well as slow the effects of wheat rust. Leaf and stem rusts are showing up in many wheat fields in the country. The rust is causing more damage than is usually seen by growers. The rusts cause the leaves of the infested wheat plants to die, and hence, a loss in forage production.

Three years of research on rust resistant small grain varieties by Texas A&M College shows that resistant varieties will produce from 2,000 to 4,000 pounds of high quality forage per acre, as contrasted with a forage yield of 1,000 to 1,500 pounds an acre for susceptible varieties.

Leaf rust spores on wheat will live through the winter in most areas of Texas. However, in the northern part of the state such as here in the Panhandle rusts will be drastically reduced by cold weather. The quantity of rust which overwinters in South Texas is one of the factors that determines how

much rust will develop on the wheat crop a following year. Rust spores produced in this area during the spring months is blown northward into the main wheat belt. However, rust epidemics develop come favorable for disease development when weather conditions become.

Leaf and stem rusts weaken the wheat plants and cause heavy forage losses as well as causing the plant to lose water. Thus, the plant makes use of soil moisture. Root growth of the diseased plants is reduced and this, combined with the water losses, makes the plant more susceptible to winter killing and cold weather.

Livestock grazing rusted wheat will suffer no ill effects since the forage is good feed. Why let rusts cut the grazing value of small grains by a third when the problem can be largely eliminated through the growing of rust resistant varieties?

Ponca and Quannah are the two recommended varieties for rust resistance and they have proven very hardy in this section of the state.

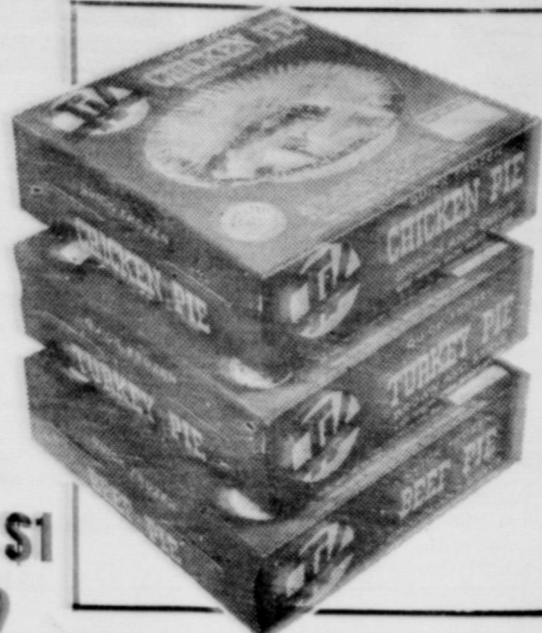

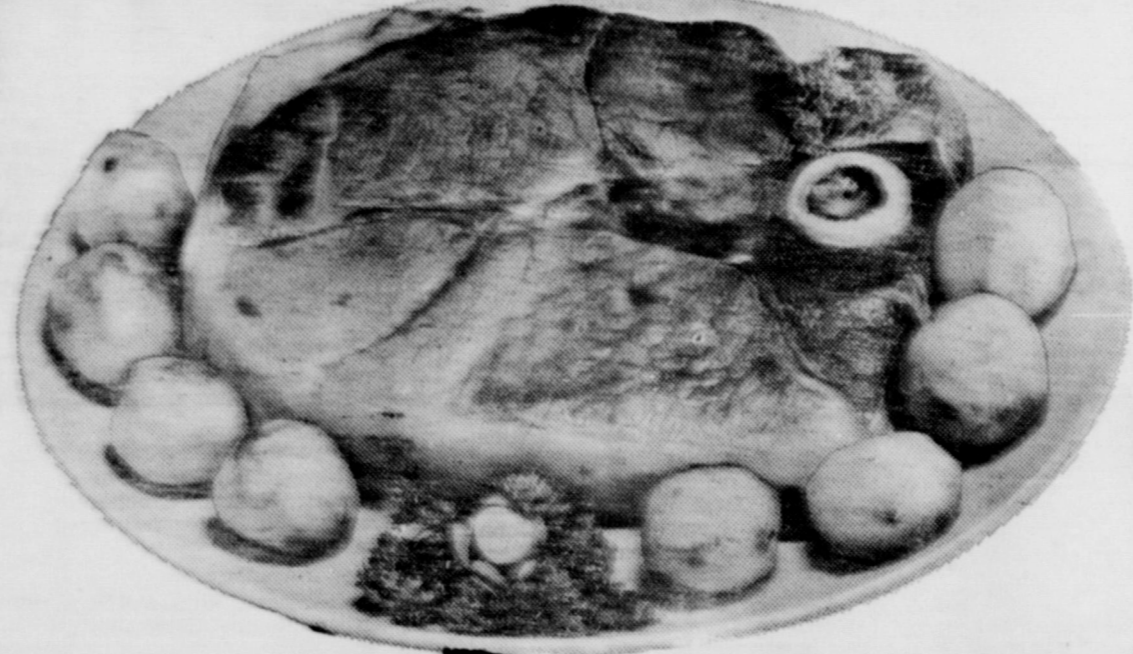
