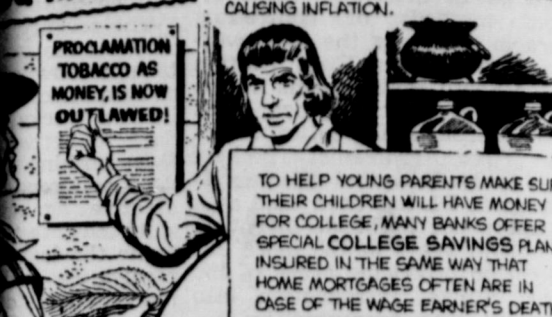

**Clinton - Sherman Base to Observe Armed Forces Day**

Clinton - Sherman AFB, Okla. (Special) — A B-52 Stratofortress and KC-135 Stratotanker will be among the many displays at Clinton-Sherman Air Force Base on Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 20.

The base is located between Clinton and Elk City, Okla.

The massive B-52, an eight-jet bomber, travels faster than 650 miles per hour at altitudes higher than 50,000 feet. With a fuel capacity greater than that of three railroad tank cars, the bomber has an unrefueled range of about 6,000 miles.

Using air-to-air refueling, the B-52 is limited only by the endurance of its crew.

The "heavyweight" bomber which weighs 400,000 pounds, 48 feet high and 156 feet long with a wing span of 185 feet.

The KC-135 air refueling tanker, powered by four turbojet engines, is capable of speeds above 550 miles per hour and operates at altitudes above 42,000 feet.

With all aerial refueling equipment located on the lower deck of the air craft, the upper deck is clear for cargo or troop-carrying services. The tanker can carry 80 passengers or 25 tons of cargo, or a combination of both.

This year's Armed Forces Day, beginning at 9 a.m. and lasting till 3 p.m., will feature flyovers of T-33's from Amarillo AFB, F-100's from Cannon AFB, N.M., and a B-52 and KC-135 from Clinton-Sherman.

There will be displays of engines, missiles, aircraft and demonstrations in fire fighting, judo, and sentry dog shows.

Pre Emergence Herbicide Available For Cotton

Studies to determine more efficient methods of controlling weeds in cotton at the Southwest Great Plains Field Station and on South Plains farms has resulted in a pre-emergence weed control herbicide for cotton states A. F. Wiese, Agronomist. The herbicide is trademarked Karmex DL. Karmex DL has been used as a pre-emergence herbicide in cotton for several years in the more humid cotton producing areas of the United States. Introduction into this area was prompted by rapidly rising labor costs and a series of wet years which intensified weed control problems in cotton. In an intensive testing program on a total of 12 farms in the past 2 years, Karmex DL proved superior to many other herbicides tested.

Preliminary results in 1960 indicated that Karmex DL would control weeds satisfactorily if rain occurred shortly after application of the herbicide. In 1961 applications were made to a total of 8 farms. On 3 of these farms, where weeds were quite abundant, rainfall occurred shortly after application and weed control was excellent. On these farms hoe time was reduced to a minimum in that practically no weeds were in the bands treated with Karmex DL. On a fourth farm, fair weed control was obtained. However, rain did not occur until after two weeks following application of the herbicide. Weeds were very severe on this farm and hoe time on the untreated portion of the field was ten hours. Where Karmex DL was applied to a 10-inch band, hoe time was reduced to 5 hours per acre. On 3 other farms weed control was excellent. However, there were practically no weeds in the untreated portions of the fields where farmers had used normal rotary hoeing and cultivation procedures. Consequently, the application of the Karmex DL was not profitable for farmers. In one field, Karmex DL was applied where there were very deep lister furrows. It was never evident that any application of herbicide had been made. It was surmised that as the lister furrows were filled, the herbicide was covered and rendered ineffective. The results on the 8 farms indicated that Karmex DL will be profitable on fields that have a history of weediness and if rainfall occurs shortly after application of the herbicide.

In order to reduce the amount of testing time required to fully evaluate the potential value of Karmex DL in the area, rainfall records were analyzed. Rainfall records from Amarillo, Lubbock, Big Spring and Wichita Falls indicate that the most occurs in May. In view of the fact that abundant rainfall causes weed germination, the most serious weed control problems will occur shortly after

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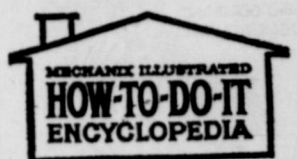
