LAKE FINSTERWALD OPENS FRIDAY LARGE CROWD EXPECTED



Fishermen from all over the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle are expected to be present for the official public opening of Lake Finsterwald Friday, March 29.

Lake Finsterwald, one of the Gageby Creek Watershed Protection structures, is located 12 miles north of Wheeler on Hy. 83. The lake can also be reached by going seven miles east New Mobeetie on Farm Road 1046 and 1 1/2 miles north on Hy. 83. A sign will appear on the east side of the highway at the place to turn.

Covering 97 acres of surface, the lake is filled to capacity with 503

acre feet of water. The dam is approximately 2000 feet long and the deepest water measures between 25-30 feet.

Work on the dam was completed in the fall of 1960 and was stocked with a supply of Red Ear Perch, some 50,000 Bass and 10,000 Channel Cat in the spring of 1961. Some fish have been added since that time.

The lake is located on property belonging to Milton Finsterwald, Mrs. Clara Holmes, Albuquerque, N. M., and Mrs. Betty Dobbs of Houston. These owners are to be con-

graduated on their decision to make this lake open to the public rather than accepting the offer of a large sum of money for a lease on the lake.

A 24-hour fishing permit can be purchased with a bag limit of 5 Bass, 10 Red Ear and 5 Channel Cat. No fishing will be allowed without a permit.

The opening of Lake Finsterwald is being boosted by business men in Wheeler as you will note elsewhere in the Times.

So grab a pole and meet your friends at Lake Finsterwald.

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BEARD TO SPEAK TO LOCAL GROUP

Young Kenneth Beard, a four-year Evangelist in the Italy field, will be in Wheeler, as guest of the local congregation of the Church of Christ, Saturday and Sunday, March 30 and 31.

Not only will Evangelist Beard preach at the 11 a.m. worship hour, but will also address and meet the city-wide and area special 2:30 p.m. gathering. Fellowship with him and his wife will also be enjoyed during a "old fashioned dinner-spread" following the morning worship period.

The Beard family first arrived in Italy Feb. 7, 1959; they have since on leave in the United States since Sept. 5, 1962. During this time they have been traveling extensively informing the brotherhood of the progress and needs existing in Italy.

During the four year tenure of the Beards in Italy, a majority of their effort has been centered in Padova Italy, a city of 200,000, located only 24 miles west of Venice.

The Beards have been close friends and laborers with the Frabms for several years. The following statement was issued by Frabms concerning Beard's visit: "We here at Wheeler are most unusually privileged to have such men of zeal and spiritual stamina as the Beards to visit in our midst and to give us greater insight into the blessings and difficulties of spreading the 'Seed of the Kingdom' in virgin territories. Any one familiar with Italy's history can have some idea of the type of opposition which one will encounter as the 'Bible only' is proclaimed to a nation of people so hungry for it. Each person becoming acquainted with the Beards will be most severely challenged in a spiritual way to more willingly sacrifice our Lord may have in store for him."

Every person in the entire area is most cordially invited to become acquainted with the Beards during the 11 o'clock hour; the dinner-spread; and the afternoon period of Fellowship together.

HERBERT SIVAGE SERVICES HELD IN NEW MEXICO

James Herbert Sivage, 50, son of Mrs. Annie Sivage and brother of Mrs. P. A. Martin of Wheeler, passed away in Portales, N.M., March 17 following a long illness.

The funeral services were conducted March 19 at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church with Rev. Bruce Sandlin of Las Cruces, officiating. Rev. Standlin is a former pastor of the University Baptist Church in Portales, of which Mr. Sivage was a member. He was assisted by Rev. Elliott Smith, present pastor of the University Church. Burial was in the Rest Lawn Cemetery.

"Herb" Sivage was born July 4, 1912 in Erath County, Texas. His family moved to Wheeler County in 1922 and he attended school at Briscoe. He moved to Portales in 1934 after his graduation and he attended Eastern New Mexico Junior College from 1935-1937.

He was married to Miss Viola Hill of Duncan, Okla., in Denver City, Texas, June 3, 1939. They lived on farms there and at Enochs, Texas, until 1950 when they moved to Portales and continued farming.

Sivage was on the ASC committee and a member of the Fair Board, where he had supervised the swine division for years.

He was the first president of the Exceptional Children's Development Society in Portales.

Survivors include his wife and his children, Richard, Wayne and Nancy of the home, another son, David of Portales, and a grandson, David Michael Sivage; his mother, Annie Sivage, Wheeler; a brother, L. V. Sivage, Mobeetie and sisters, Mrs. A. E. Hunt, Pecos, N.M., Mrs. P. A. Martin, Wheeler, and O. H. Johnson, Franklin, La.

It was Mr. Sivage's request that memorials be made to the Society for the Development of Exceptional Children.

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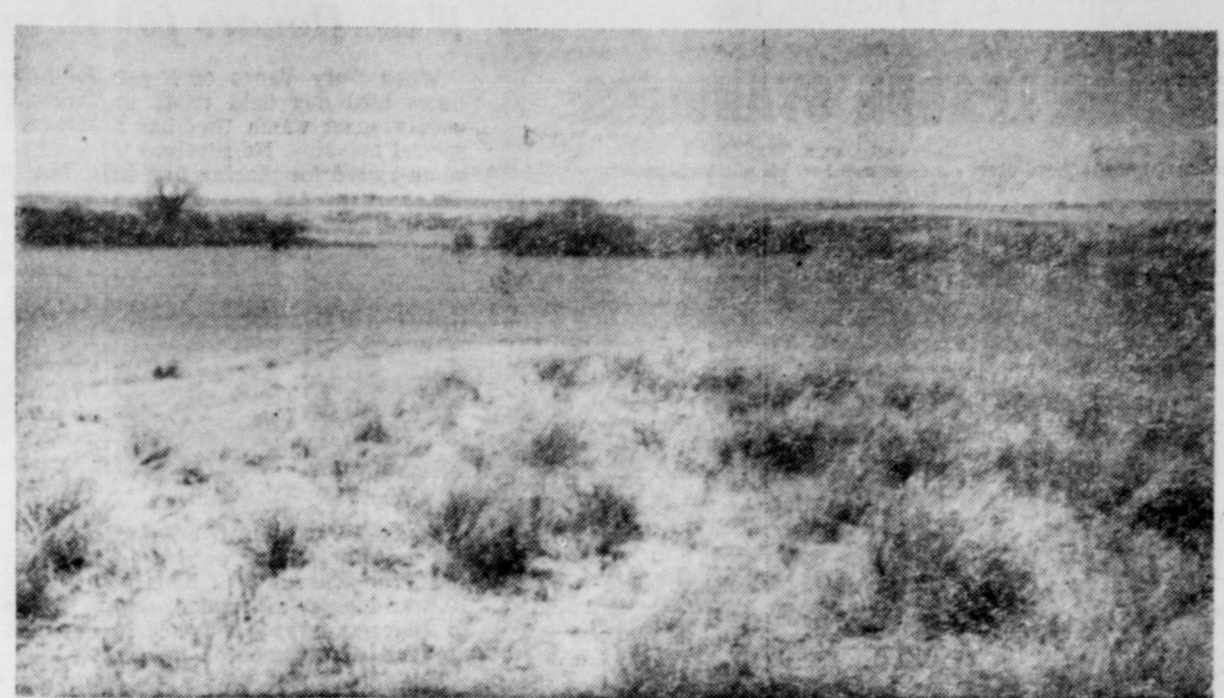

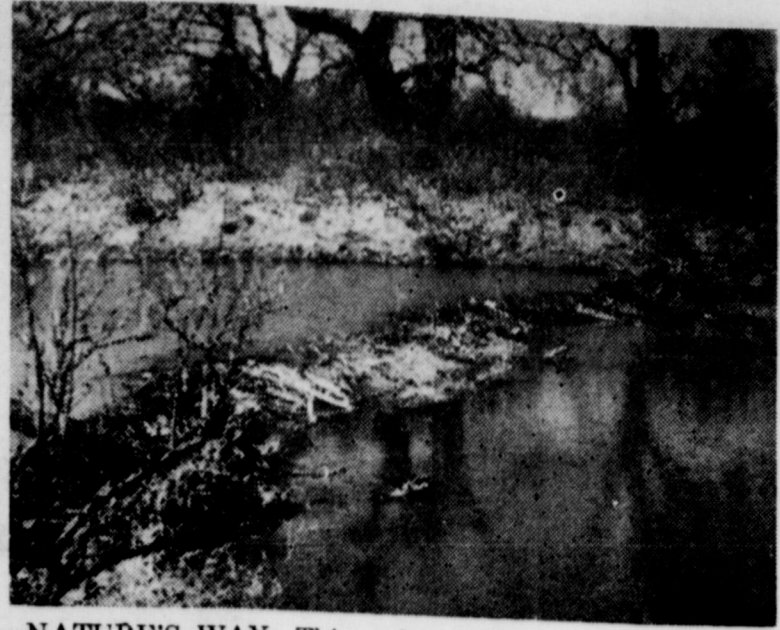

OPPORTUNITIES OF WATERSHED

By Duane Barthe
This discussion will be directed toward the opportunities of the local watershed structures for Municipal and Recreational purposes in addition to their primary purpose, flood prevention. These structures could also be used for irrigation, industrial and wildlife development. Wheeler has indicated definite interest in developing municipal water as a part of the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Project. Some of the provisions of the present law for Municipal Water are:

1. The Farm Home Administration can make a loan to the city up to 30 percent of the total cost of the structure for anticipated water supplies. For Example: If the estimated cost of the structure is \$80,000, the city could obtain a loan of \$24,000. Interest rate will be less than 3%—the rate the government borrows its money.
2. No payments are required if water is not used during the first 10 years.
3. If water is not used for more than 10 years, the local people will be required to start paying interest at the end of 10 years.
4. The entire loan must be repaid during the expected life of the structure, but in any event, it must be paid off within fifty years from the date of first use of the water. The City will be responsible for:
 1. Securing Consultative Engineering Services to:
 - a. Determine need for Municipal water (amount).
 - b. Determine yield potential at proposed site.
 - c. Evaluate storage needs for adequate water supply.
 - d. Determine quality of the water.
 - e. Advise if the site will hold water.
 - f. Estimate benefits of the city.
 - g. Help obtain State permit from Texas Water Commission.
 - h. Collaborate with Soil Conservation Service on principal spillway design. (The service will work with your Engineer to provide all the information possible.
 2. The City will be expected to pay only the increase in cost over what the Service would normally be out in constructing the structure for flood prevention. Since the emergency spillways, coring and foundation drains will be a part of the original design, the increased earth fill. There might be a small increase cost of the concrete riser since it would be

**WHEELER COUNTY
Soil Conservation
News . . .**

The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District has several farm programs to assist farmers and ranchers do soil and water conservation. The Extension Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration and the Soil Conservation Service are all active in assisting the people. The Soil Conservation Service administers a special program known as the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a cost share program to assist farmer and ranchers apply complete land treatment to their operating unit. It's treatment of the land according to a plan developed by the farmer, or rancher, with assistance by Soil Conservation technicians assisting the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. This plan states when and to what extent the producer wants to do his conservation practices. The Soil Conservation Service pays a percent of cost share assistance according to the producer's plan. Cost share assistance for grass seeding and waterways is 80 percent. Terraces, Diversions, Windbreaks and erosion control dams have 70 percent cost share.

Livestock water, brush control and fences have 50 percent share payments.

The ASCS has diverted acre and other cost share practices such as deep plowing and bindweed control that are cost share programs. Farmers Home Administration assist with loans to the producers for those participating in their program. The Extension Service assists with research recommendations.

The producer may schedule his work from 3 to a ten year period. He modifies his plan whenever he finds that changes are needed. The cost share payments are based on current average costs for the area in which the producer lives.

There have been about 85 Great Plains plans developed at Wheeler. have completed their plans. New plans are being developed each week with new cooperators.

YOUR FAIR SHARE

Most Texans, we believe, are fair minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil and gas production, when two or more land owners are involved.

As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

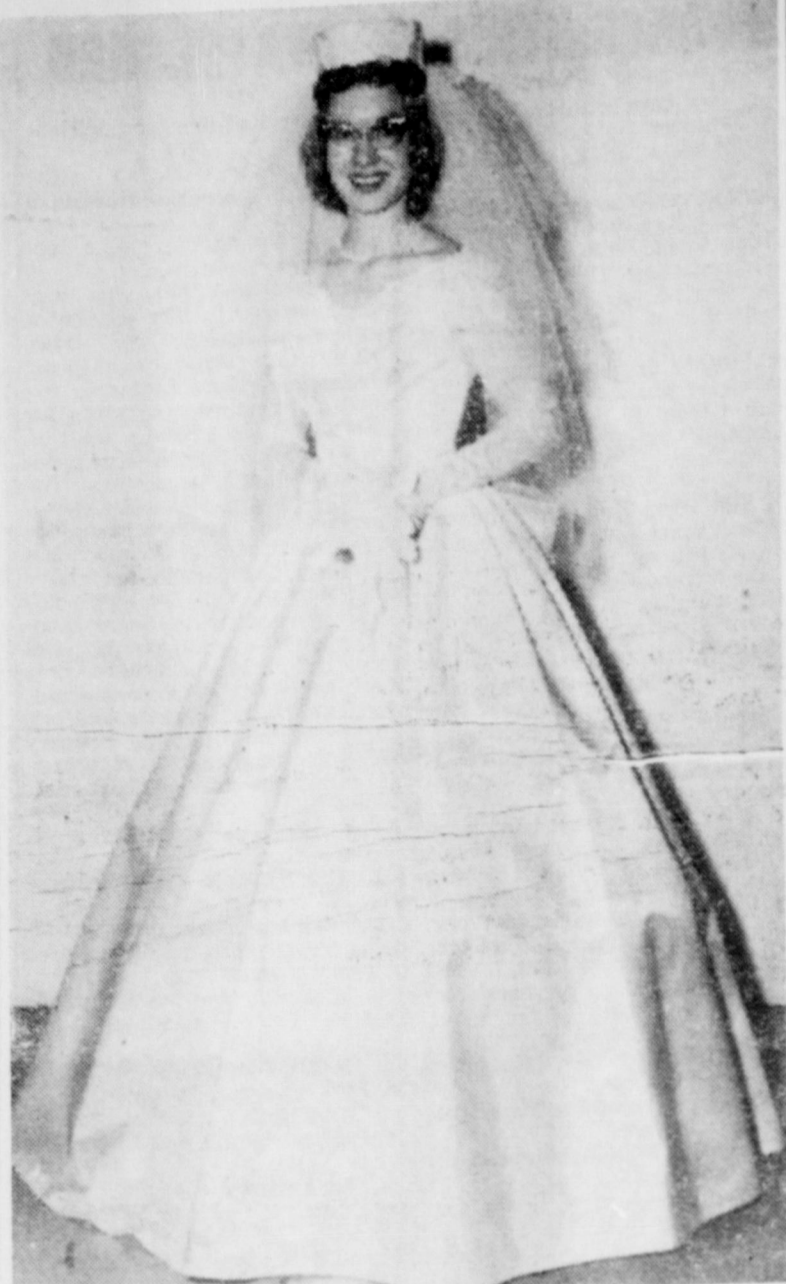
People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature. HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE.
