THIS IS THE LAW IN REGARD TO THE COUNTY AND DISTRICT CLERK

Quite a number of people have asked why the office of county and district clerk has been combined. Guy Harden, county attorney for Wheeler County, looks over the law for the Times and the following is an exact quotation from that law.

"Revised Civil Statutes of Texas" Article 1903 — Joint Clerk

"In counties having a population of less than eight thousand persons, according to the preceding federal census, only one clerk shall be elected. He shall take the oath and give the bond required of clerks of both the district and county courts, and shall have the powers and perform the duties of such clerks respectively. Const. art. 5, sec 20; Acts 1879, P. 47; Acts 1927, 40th Leg., p 73, ch 49 *1."

Anyone with any questions should contact the county attorney.

LAST WEEK'S WHO-ZIT WAS W. E. BURKE

THE LIVING AND THE DEAD

There are two seas in Palestine. One is fresh water, and a great deal of life thrives in and around it. Fish abound in it. Splashes of green adorn its banks. Trees spread their branches over it, and stretch out their thirsty roots to dip of its healing water. Along its shore children play. Men build their houses near it, and birds their nests, and every kind of life is happier because it is there.

This sea is fed by the River Jordan which flows on into the other sea. Here is no splash of fish, no fluttering leaf, no song of birds, no children's laughter. Travelers choose another route, unless on urgent business. The air hangs above its waters, and neither man nor beast nor fowl will drink. It is completely devoid of life.

The difference in the two bodies of water is not their source, because the Jordan empties the same good water into both. There are no significant differences in the soil nor the country round about. The difference is that the Sea of Galilee receives—but does not keep—the Jordan waters. For every drop that flows into it, another drop flows out. The giving and receiving go on in equal measure. The other sea hoards its income jealously. Every drop it gets, it keeps. The Sea of Galilee gives and lives. The other sea receives, but gives nothing. It is named the Dead Sea.

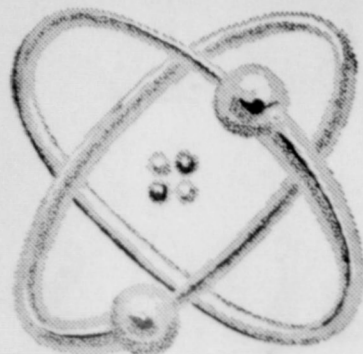

"AN OLD FASHIONED DOCTRINE"

How many there are whose hearts would be thrilled if they understood the old fashioned Bible doctrine of sanctification!

Sanctification is not a negative matter; don't do this and don't do that. It is rather the positive truth that God wants us for Himself as a sacred possession, much as a bridegroom considers his bride his very own in a special, sacred way.

Bible sanctification is a two-fold truth, affecting both our standing before God and our Spiritual state. In one sense every true believer in Christ has already been sanctified, or consecrated to God, by the operation of the Holy Spirit. Thus we read:

"... God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation, through sanctification of the spirit..." (II Thes. 2:13). "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through sanctification of the spirit..." (I Pet. 1:2).

This has nothing to do with our conduct. God did it. Sanctification begins with Him. Thus Paul could write to even the careless Corinthian believers and say: "Ye are sanctified" (I Cor. 6:11; of Acts 20:32; 22:18). This phase of sanctification is based on the redemptive work of Christ in our behalf for Heb. 10:10 says: "We are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once or all."

But now God would have us appreciate this act and conduct ourselves accordingly, consecrating ourselves ever more completely to Him. This is practical, progressive sanctification. "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification" (I Thes. 4:3). Hence Paul's benediction: "The very God of peace sanctify you wholly" (I Thes. 5:23), and his exhortation to Timothy to be "a vessel unto honor, sanctified, and meet (it) for the Master's use" (II Tim. 2:21).

How can believers be more wholly sanctified to God in their practical experience? By studying and meditating on His Word. Our Lord prayed: "Sanctify them through Thy truth: Thy Word is truth" (John 17:17) and Paul declares that "Christ loved the Church and gave Himself for it that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word" (Eph. 5:25,26).

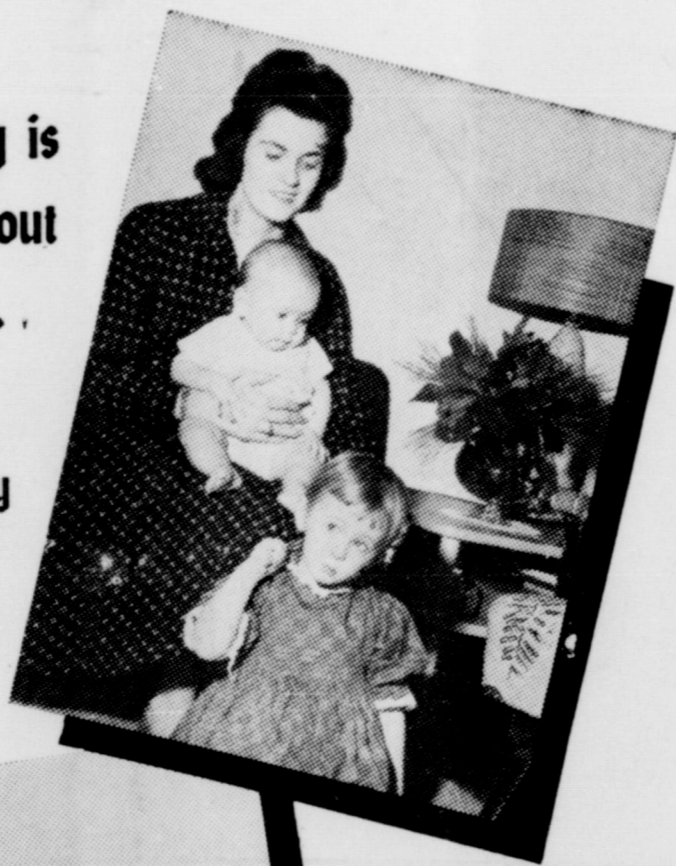

Persons On Social Security To File Reports

Persons who receive social security checks and who earn over \$1200 in 1961 are required to file an earnings report with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1962 according to Hal Geldon, Manager.

Some people confuse the income tax return with this special earnings report, Geldon said. The filing of an income tax return does not relieve social security beneficiaries of the responsibility of filing the annual report with the Social Security Administration.

Most beneficiaries who have some checks for 1961 will get a notice about the report in the mail. The report is necessary so that the Administration can determine if beneficiaries have received all of the payments to which they were entitled in 1961. Persons who have previously filed for benefits, but have never received any because they were working and making too much money also need to file the report. Some of these people as a result of filing the report, discover they are entitled to receive some payments that they have not received.

Geldon stated that most people are able to file their report and mail it into the Social Security Administration without any assistance.

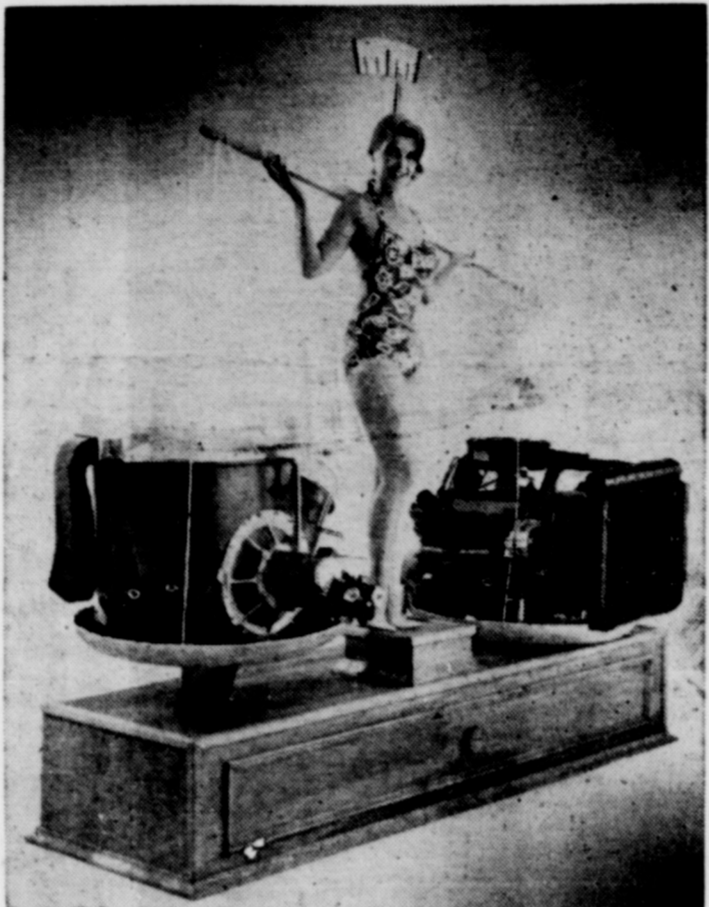

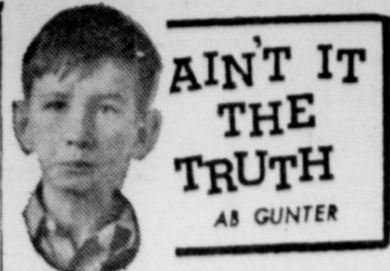
Members are good riders and plan to be active in parades and pivot setting.

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Another "blow season" is here. Freezing and thawing has loosened the top soil and left it in condition to blow unless there is enough cover on the land to hold it. Crop residues or growing crops are the best remedy for wind erosion. On those farms where there is not enough stalks to hold the land, some emergency tillage will be needed to prevent blowing.

Land that has enough stalks should be left unplowed until around April 15. There is already good moisture in the soil and there is nothing to be gained from plowing up good cover until there is a crop of weeds ready to kill.

The supervisors of the Wheeler Soil Conservation District are proud of the work that the farmers ave done. By the use of grass seeding, cover crops, stubble mulch farming, and the use of crop residues, wind erosion has been cut to a very small fraction of what it used to be. The ultimate goal, of course, is to stop all blowing of soil.

Blowing does not appear to damage some fields too much at first glance. What you cannot see is that the finer parts of the soil, including much of the fertility and organic material have been completely removed. Everytime a field blows it will take more fertilizer to keep up the yield.
