Lack Of Water In Winter Hurts Livestock

Livestock men in Wheeler County can put more beef pounds on cattle by giving them water to drink during cold weather. Milk production also drops with the temperature because cattle simply do not get water. Swine seem to go into hibernation without water in cold weather. Poultry men know egg production drops quick when hens go without water.
The farmer or rancher can have water for his stock even in cold weather storms. One of the easiest ways is to weight a 55 gallon barrel down in the stock tank. Have the top cut out and simply build a wood fire inside of the barrel. This will quickly melt the ice around the outside of the barrel. Commercial tank heaters are on the market and range in price from 20 to 70 dollars. Most farmers with shop equipment can build a simple tank heater. One method I saw in Iowa was for a simple bucket built into a trough with a light bulb under the bucket for the heat. They reported it had only frozen once.
Used motor oil, scrap wood, gasoline and butane are the most common materials to heat water for stock in winter. Experiment stations report, stock hurt quicker for water than they do for feed during cold weather.

CAN'T ALLOW THE RAILROADS TO GO LIKE THE HORSE AND BUGGY

Railroads to go like the horse and buggy? This can't be allowed. The handicap that is holding back the railroads down here is the fact that they are not to be allowed to receive the same benefits as the other carriers. The principal sufferers in this tax revenue Wheeler County receives are the railroads. The other areas school receive from one of our railroads the highway department receives from one of our railroads. This is another source of revenue to offset it. This will be a greater burden on the railroads than the corporate income tax. The Wheeler and Denver School Tax is almost equal to the Wheeler County Tax. 3,100 dollars each, and the Wheeler County Tax is a greater sum, or amount. Other industries are exempt from the Wheeler Tax with common carriers. This tax revenue will be increased on others. It is a burden to reduce a rate through channels. The railroads do not want to burden the government which is

and out of states as well. The Texas railroad commission will not allow this fast store door delivery to the Ft Worth & Denver railroad. The railroads of the USA say that this next congress will decide the fate of all railroads in the U.S.A., that is whether the large truck lines will be able to operate, thereby stripping the states, schools and highways of the corporation tax money, this tax Texas schools cannot survive and hold its low rating it now is placed into, there is very few states lower than Texas rating, if we lose this tax money the rating cannot be raised. This is a very grave period for the railroads in Texas & other states as well. The railroads have come to the position compared to a new Business that starts with low capital, thereby having to have a larger profit because his business is smaller. The railroad can adjust their rates for the benefit of the consumer if the rigid restrictions are relaxed in line with other common carriers.

WHAT'S GOD DOING?

The distress and confusion which prevails all about us does not upset the instructed believer in the Word of God. He understands the divine plan and knows just what God is doing. He does not expect peace on earth while the Prince of Peace remains a royal Exile. He has no illusions about this age, or about what can be accomplished therein for God calls it "this present evil age" (Gal. 1:4).

The instructed believer knows too why God does not intervene and why Christ remains a voluntary Exile from His own world. He reads in the Bible how God "gave up" the nations, even His own chosen nation, "that He might have mercy upon all" (Rom. 11:32). "This present evil age," then, is also "the age of grace." HLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Operation Death which began Saturday ends at midnight New Day, is the most urgent business of the Governor's office today.

Price Daniel has written each sheriff and chief of police asking each law officer to help make the State's highways safer for drivers during the 10-day season.

Price Daniel said the anti-holiday toll of 88 holiday traffic deaths is the lowest estimate ever stated "it pinpoints the cause of recent years in reducing traffic tragedies during year-end holiday. However, more lives can be saved this year if the people obey the laws of the highway safely.

Price Daniel said the Texas Press, newspapers, the Texas Press, radio, broadcasters and billboards are cooperating in a campaign, urging Texans to take

individual responsibility for traffic safety, and asking drivers to keep headlights burning during the daylight hours as a reminder that safe and legal driving is the best way to avoid holiday crashes.

Banks Still Balk — Most Texas banks balked at the Legislative committee's request that they make their dormant accounts public.

Five of the 38 banks subpoenaed to appear before the committee filled out questionnaires by deadline time. Twenty-two banks were represented at the hearing. Eleven failed to show up.

Houston's City National Bank attorney Raybourne Thompson, speaking on behalf of all 22 banks present, and two others, requested that the committee get an opinion from the Attorney General as to whether it has the power to force testimony "that would destroy banker-depositors confidence."

Thompson said if the committee refused, the banks would testify "under protest."

Committee had sent questionnaires to 469 national banks in Texas. Only 66 gave some or all information about the number of dormant accounts they hold and the amounts in these accounts.

Out of 536 state banks queried by the committee, only 100 furnished the information.

Prime reason for the specially called session by Gov. Price Daniel is the enactment of laws to force banks to locate the owners or heirs of unclaimed depositories.

Governor Daniel feels that little effort is being made by the banks to find the rightful owners. He says that more than \$3,000,000 is being held unlawfully by the financial institutions. Some banks are even levying charges against the accounts even though the accounts are inactive, he reports.

Few, if any of the banks, have ever advertised to find the rightful owners.

Governor Daniel feels that the banks should exert effort possible to locate the owners, including advertising or turning the funds over to the state for the protection of the depositors. Such steps have been taken in a number of other states.

Motion arises from a suit filed by United Gas, which is contracted to supply gas for San Antonio until April 1, when Alamo Gas is scheduled to take over.

Judge Roberts has said the case was out of his court's jurisdiction. Railroad Commission rule that it has no jurisdiction in the dispute. The Attorney General also ruled that:

1. Failure to possess a valid poll tax does not disqualify a juror in any criminal case.
2. It is unconstitutional for a court to authorize a sheriff to destroy property seized from arrested persons in county jail, even if property is unclaimed for 90 days.
3. State Education Commission has the right to audit state funds in county administration & school transportation funds.

Hopeful Sign — Texas Commission on Alcoholism reports good results in its six-year-old program of rehabilitation for alcoholics in state hospitals, and progress with prison system inmates. But it is still concerned about the estimated 250,000 drinkers in Texas who need treatment.

Commission says 2,334 patients were treated for alcoholism in six state hospitals during fiscal 1961.

Improvement after six months from date of discharge was reported by about 500 out of 1,600 patients released last year.

In less than 18 months, the number of alcoholics participating in prison rehabilitation programs has grown from 8,000 to 3,000.

Commission now lists councils on alcoholism in 29 Texas cities, working to educate the public to recognize alcoholism as a disease. Their attempts are aimed at the 250,000 ailing alcoholics and their families — as well as the 4,000,000 Texans who use alcohol.

The Business at Hand — The Attorney General's assistants have been busy writing opinions on everything from a major gas company dispute to a matter of land will to the Baptist General Convention.

The Attorney General intervened in a case in the 43rd District Court at Parker County, making a motion to set aside a default judgment voiding conveyance of 1,000 acres of land to the Baptist General Convention.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stocks, Sr. will the land in Parker and Hood Counties to the Baptists in 1955, but their son John Stocks alleges his parents were not legally competent at the time.

Wilson made his motion under a statute which said the Attorney General may be made a party to any suit to annul or impair any charitable trust.

As representative of the Texas Railroad Commission ruled that in San Antonio, the City of Public Service Board and Alamo Gas Supply Company, the Attorney General filed a motion with the Supreme Court asking it to compel 126th District Judge Jack Roberts of Austin to enter judgment in San Antonio's gas contract dispute.

Mothers-to-be Must Diet Properly, March of Dimes Research Shows

No doubt many a healthy young mother-to-be has wondered why her doctor puts so much emphasis on proper diet during pregnancy—especially if she's never been ill a day in her life, and she has a yen for wholesome foods.

But there's good reason for it. More and more it's becoming evident that for the sake of her child a pregnant woman must have a diet adequate in vitamins and minerals, particularly in the early stages of the baby's development.

The reason lies in the dread words: birth defects.

Until about 20 years ago, scientists generally went along with the idea that birth defects in higher animals—and that includes man—were due for the most part to heredity. So if a baby had picked out the right ancestors, he had a better than good chance of coming into the world perfectly normal, and sound of mind and limb.

Complex Factors Involved

Today, however, doctors know the story is not that simple. An increasing number of studies have shown that a wide variety of factors play a part in the birth picture. If a mother gets either too much or too little of such vital substances as hormones, oxygen, minerals or vitamins during certain stages of her pregnancy, the baby may fail to survive, or may be born malformed.

Under a research grant from The National Foundation-March of Dimes, Dr. Marjorie Nelson at the University of California has been trying to determine just how the absence of a vitamin or mineral may interfere with normal prenatal development.

She has found that in rats the absence of even a single one of certain important minerals or vitamins during early pregnancy can produce drastic effects.

Apparently nature has set up a delicate balance which a mother's body must maintain. If this balance is upset even for a relatively short time, permanent damage may result to the offspring.

In her San Francisco laboratory Dr. Nelson has demonstrated that even a temporary deficiency of a vitamin such as folic acid during early pregnancy can cause birth abnormalities in these young laboratory animals. The defects may range from the relatively minor to the very severe which include brain damage, displacement of intestinal organs, cleft palate or serious malformations of the heart and eyes.

Timing Is Critical

When Dr. Nelson puts the normal pregnant animals on such a folic acid-deficient diet during the second week of their pregnancy, at least 80 per cent of the embryos die or are malformed. However, if she carries out the same experiment about a week earlier or a week later, the young appear to suffer no adverse effects, thus underlining the importance of proper diet at the critical stages of pregnancy. In a woman, the comparable period of pregnancy extends primarily from the second to the eighth week of the baby's development.

Radioactivity Used

Dr. Nelson has also obtained a high incidence of skeletal defects in young rats when the

mother animal's diet was deficient in the mineral manganese. She is extending these studies with support from The National Foundation-March of Dimes using radioactive material in the diet to trace what goes wrong inside embryonic cells to hinder their normal development.

According to Dr. Virginia Appgar, director of the division of congenital malformations of The National Foundation, "Dr. Nelson's project has a direct bearing on the question of birth defects in humans. It is definitely known, for example, that severe folic acid deficiency in a woman can lead to loss of a baby during early pregnancy."

And as Dr. Nelson has pointed out, equally significant, the congenital malformations in the young animals that survive are irreversible. No amount of vitamins given later in pregnancy can undo the damage once a deficiency has occurred during the critical period of pregnancy.

Clinics Are Established

Because of the increasing problem of birth defects—it is now estimated that significant malformations occur in one in every 16 babies born in this country—each year—the National Foundation-March of Dimes has recently established a number of Special Treatment and Clinical Study Centers for coping with this crucial medical question. The Birth Defects Treatment Centers are in Jackson, Miss.; Atlanta, Ga.; Seattle, Portland, Ore.; San Francisco; Little Rock, Ark.; Indianapolis; Morgantown, W. Va.; New York City; Baltimore; and Washington, D. C. These are supported on the local level by The National Foundation's chapters.

In addition, Birth Defects Clinical Study Centers are located in Oklahoma City; Nashville, Tenn.; and Columbus, Ohio. These Centers are maintained on a national level with March of Dimes funds which are being applied by The National Foundation to continue support and expansion of such Centers for the development of total medical care for youngsters afflicted with congenital defects.

CHAMPIONSHIP RODEO NOW IN PROGRESS

Denver — World championships, and a Glittering pile of \$57,500 prize money, at stake, the third annual National Finals Rodeo explodes into action next week in Dallas.

North America's top cowboys and bucking stock clash there in the state fairgrounds coliseum, for eight go-rounds, Dec. 27-Dec. 31, in what has been termed the classic contest of the rodeo year.

In the cowboy world, Finals qualification is an accolade of achievement. Only the season's fifteen high winners in the five standard rodeo events—saddle bronc bareback bronc and bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling—reach the title playoffs.

This year, nineteen states and two Canadian provinces are represented by the Finals roster of seventy-five contestants. To combat their competitive efforts are 228 rank broncs and bulls, screened from over 3,000 head in North America, the stars of twenty-seven rodeo bucking strings.

Title races, which are based on winnings, may be the hardest fought in the Finals history with only the calf roping crown already safe, in the hands of Idaho's Dean Oliver.

Oliver, for his fourth such world championship, has amassed \$26,351 with his lariat loops, an over \$11,000 bulge on his nearest rival, Glen Franklin of Hobe, N.M., before the Finals begin.

Some evidence of the upcoming title tussles can be seen in bull-riding standings where 1961's diadem could be donned by any of three cowboys, all of whom are less than \$750 apart in pre-Finals count.

A husky 24 year old Montana, Roy Rossen, of Groalus, leads with \$12,776, while Bob Wegner, Ponca City, Okla., is runner-up \$12,131 and the indestructible Preles Brown, of Lawton, Okla., third with \$12,029.

Brown, a jaunty 40 year old is having the best season in a twenty year career, having picked up an additional \$9,802 in the other events he enters.

A glance at statistics reveal only two 1960 champions, other than Oliver, in close-up contention for this year's titles. Defending saddle bronc titlist, Enoch Walker, Cody, Wyo., is in runner-up spot and Jack Buschbom, Moberge, S. D., is third in bareback bronc riding standings, for the crown he has worn three other seasons.

Seven Finalists qualified in two events, the remainder in one. One-third the '61 roster are newcomers to the playoffs while thirty-two contestants are back for the third consecutive year.

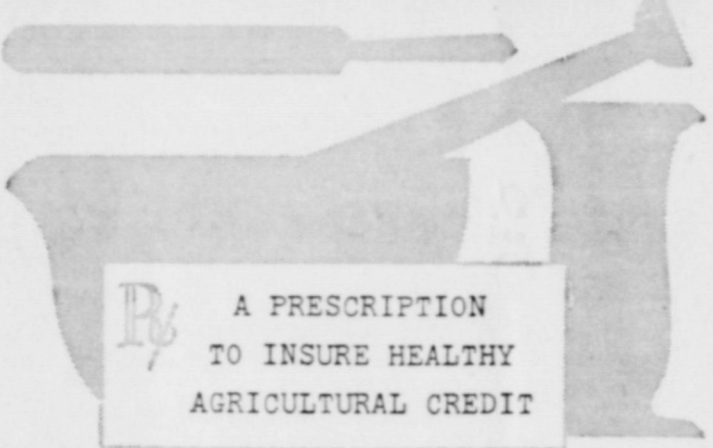
