STANDARD OF TEXAS TO DRILL IN WHEELER COUNTY

A 14,500 foot rank wildcat has been filed by the Standard Oil Co. of Texas in Wheeler County. Located one mile west of Mobeetie, the explorer is set as an Ellenburger test. It is in section 66, block, A-5, H&GN survey.

The project, company's No. 1 Grady W. Harris, et al, is approximately 12 miles southwest of the Shell Oil Co. No. 1-68 Hobart, Hemphill County Morrow gas discovery. The Standard test is also some seven miles of the Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 J. L. Bailey "A", Wheeler County test which was plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 11,010 feet on Oct. 14, 1953.

The wildcat will be drilled as a "tight" hole. It will be spudded this week.

Mr. Spots, tool pusher for the Laughlin Brothers Drilling Company of Tulsa, was in Wheeler Friday looking for houses and apartments for his crew. Approximately 15 men will be working on the rig.

HAVE YOU HEARD?

"... if ye have heard of the dispensation of the grace of God which is given me to you-ward..." (Eph. 3:2).

Could it be that those to whom Paul addressed his Ephesian letter had not yet heard that God had committed to him "the dispensation of grace"?

Next to the death and resurrection of Christ, the conversion of Paul and his commission to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" was the greatest event in history.

The apostles at Jerusalem had recognized the importance of Paul's part in the divine program. They themselves had at first been sent by Christ into "all the world," yet in Gal. 2:9 we find James, Peter and John publicly shaking hands with Paul in a solemn agreement that he should henceforth be the apostle to the nations.

Could it be that some twelve years later, when he wrote the Ephesian letter, there were any who professed the name of Christ who had not heard of Paul's special place in the program of God as the apostle of grace? Little wonder his words "if ye have heard" carry with them a touch of sarcasm and reproach.

It is possible, of course, that there were some among them, but recently brought into the church, who had not heard, but what seems almost impossible is that there should be even one believer at this late date who has not heard that after Christ and His Kingdom were rejected and the world was ripe for prophesied judgment to fall, God intervened, saving Saul, His chief enemy on earth, and sent him forth with "the good news of the grace of God."

This good news is based, of course, upon the fact that since Christ was the spotless Lamb of God, His death is accepted by God as full satisfaction for the sinner. Thus Paul, by divine inspiration, declares the believers are "justified freely by His (God's) grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." (Rom. 3:24).

WILDLIFE
Interest in wildlife increases every year during this season of the year. Hunting and fishing is enjoyed by most people. For some landowners, hunting and fishing permits provide additional income. The Wheeler County Soil Conservation District Supervisors are proud of our abundant variety of wildlife in this area. The supervisors feel that everyone should be aware of the need to protect the wildlife. Food and cover are the major needs for wildlife. Food from grain crops that are growing close to natural cover or water sources helps to attract the game birds and deer. Cover from crops and grass left undisturbed after harvest will give protection and food. Proper stocking rates on our rangeland will give better land use and provides food and cover for wildlife. The Great Plains Conservation Program has provisions for cost sharing for fencing and providing wildlife food and cover. Evergreen trees and fruit bearing trees such as mulberry and Russian Olive can be cost shared. Ragweeds, sunflowers, peas and millet overseeded on the wildlife areas make excellent cover and food. Protection from fire hazards is good management for wildlife. Good soil and water conservation practices and good hunting precautions are also good conservation for our wildlife. Let us all do our part.

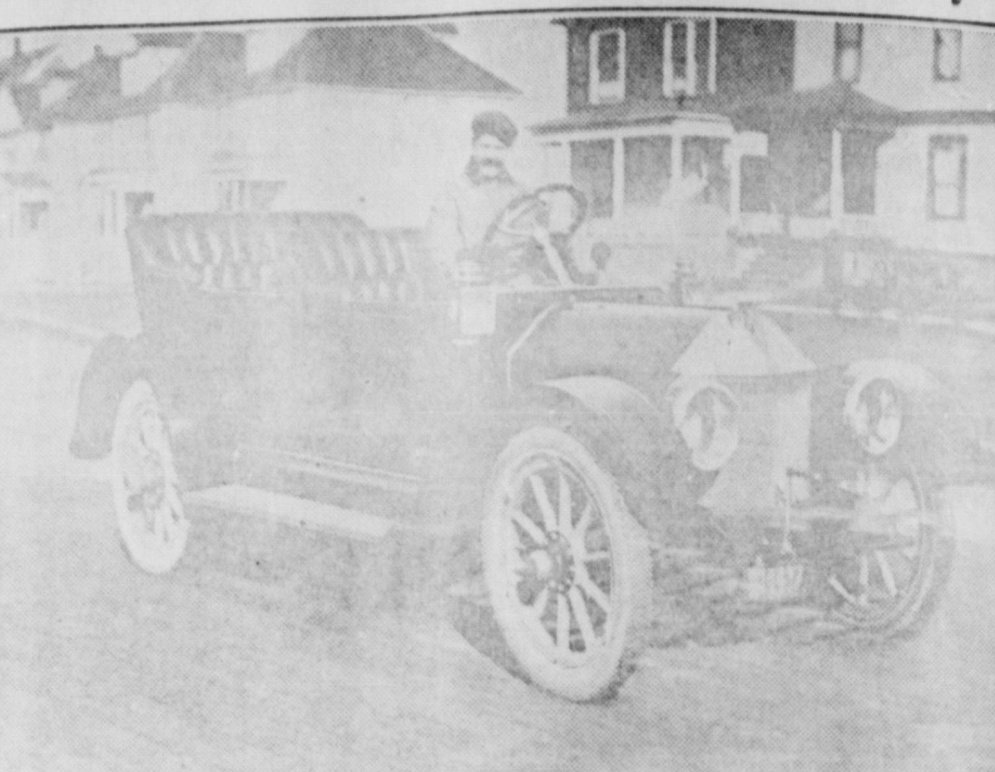

Turn of Card May Reveal Fate Of Young Birth Defects Victim

Johnny X from Tennessee is nine months old. His head is extremely large for the small body. He has water on the brain.

When his mother recently took Johnny to the Birth Defects Study Center at Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, Nashville, Tenn., for specialized treatment of this disease, known medically as hydrocephalus, their first appointment was with a doctor who had a most unusual assistant—an inanimate electronic sorter.

Dr. Robert E. Merrill, assistant director of the Birth Defects Study Center, a research unit financed by The National Foundation-March of Dimes, explained:

"This apparatus is something unique when applied to birth defects. It can be a lifesaver. It's an IBM machine, and its memory is many thousands of times more retentive than the proverbial elephant's. In effect, our mechanical robot here is going to interview Johnny and, although I'm Johnny's doctor, I'm really acting only as a sort of glorified office boy to the machine."

Using a device somewhat resembling a typewriter keyboard, Dr. Merrill began punching a rectangular oblong green card, measuring about 7" x 3". Each

perforation represented the mother's answer to one of a long list of questions. Her answers covered such data as Johnny's age and birthdate, mother's age at delivery, illnesses of mother during pregnancy, any stillbirths, any physical defects in husband or wife, Johnny's weight, his age when his head started to enlarge and head circumference.

Scores of other vital facts are fed into the machine that never forgets.

When the sorter finishes "interviewing" Johnny, the green card has recorded for all time and in capsule form the infant's past and present life, and his family background.

More significantly, the electronic device also faithfully remembers the case histories of hundreds of other Johnnys whose brain fluid is blocked as it is with this boy.

Dr. Merrill has only to run these cards through the high-speed sorter to compare these life histories with Johnny's.

Most important of all, for this youngster and his apprehensive parents, is that the sorter can help the doctor form a reasonably accurate idea of Johnny's immediate future; help him decide on the advisability of surgical insertion of a "shunt" or plastic tube to draw off the excess fluid into the blood stream; and indeed,

assist the physician in predicting the future course of the disease.

This is done by a study of past performances of other hydrocephalic infants whose medical circumstances closely resemble those of this baby. That data is available almost instantly—"in a minute fraction of the time," as Dr. Merrill says, "required to go through the records by hand."

This comparative diagnosis "can save a child's life," he adds. "At least one thing we now can have up-to-date to guide us, and guide us instantaneously, is our experience. In five minutes, usually, the sorter can give us information that helps us decide precisely what to do in Johnny's case—and what not to do."

Aside from the Birth Defects Study Center at Vanderbilt, The National Foundation-March of Dimes has financed similar centers at Children's Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, and at the University of Oklahoma Medical Center at Oklahoma City.

Eventually, when the experiment Dr. Merrill is conducting is completed, the study centers are expected to pool their records of hundreds of victims of significant birth defects for the benefit of all. Tragically, there are about 250,000 such infants born yearly in the United States.

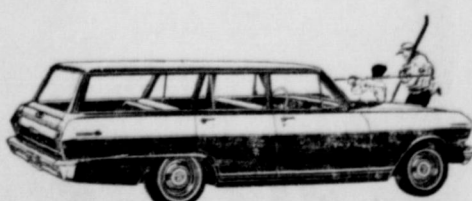

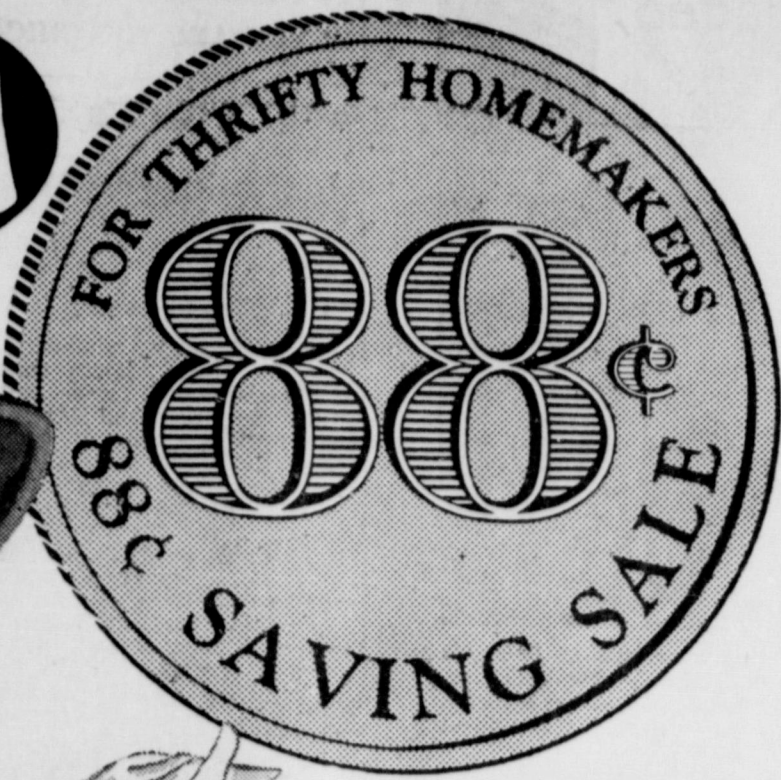

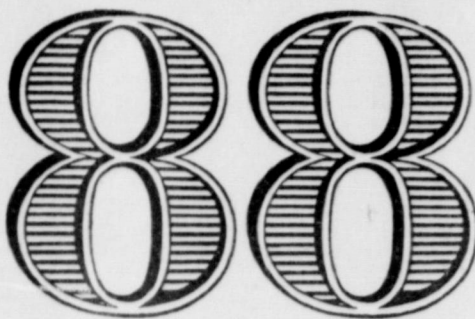

Women Scientists Vivaly Needed, March of Dimes Grantee Warns

Increasing numbers of young women must be encouraged to become medical research scientists. They are needed to make up the loss of men researchers who more and more are turning to electronics and other technical fields unrelated to the nation's health.

This is the view of Dr. Virginia Tennyson, a medical scientist herself, who sees the day near when there will be an acute and dangerous shortage of science laboratory talent unless hundreds of girls—now in high school or entering college—can be won over to science as a career.

Dr. Tennyson is an anatomist and electromicroscopist at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City. Under a National Foundation-March of Dimes grant, she is working today to determine what causes excess fluid in the brain of infants.

One of the major birth defects (hydrocephalus) with which thousands of babies are born every year in the United States.

This dread disease leads to gross enlargement of the head, wasting away of the brain, loss of mental powers—often death.

Dr. Tennyson has suggested that there is an advantage in having women in some laboratory studies.

"I think it fair to say that in some fields of scientific inquiry, women are better equipped by nature than are men. For instance, few will argue that women aren't more intuitive. In the laboratory, they are more inclined to respect a hunch, which is just another word for disciplined imagination and deduction. We women 'hunch' because we are determined to get a realistic answer.

"Then I also think," she said, "that women workers in science are inclined to be more patient than men researchers. Perhaps it's debatable, but I seem to find, too, that women are more likely to persevere, less prone to give up because of boredom and tedium."

Dr. Tennyson mentioned that The National Foundation offers

today post-doctoral fellowships to promising young individuals preparing for careers in science. In addition to offering aid to prospective research scientists, The National Foundation is taking steps to interest young persons in entering the allied health professions. Under this program, the health organization has awarded almost 1,300 scholarships (each worth \$2,000 if maintained for the full period of four years) in the fields of medicine, nursing, physical and occupational therapy, and medical social work.

The National Foundation offers 515 of these health scholarships each year to students in every state in the nation. Since Dr. Tennyson is dedicated to the serious task of determining the "why" of hydrocephalus, a person might conceive of her as a gruff-faced zealot, oblivious to all save laboratory test tubes, retorts and microscopes.

Instead, this slim, suburban-haired and blue-eyed scientist looks like nothing so much as a professional model or dancer, one endowed with humor. Her chief interests and training all relate to medical science, but when the occasion arises she can whip up the most epicurean croquet suzette one

would ever hope to taste. She is also a talented amateur artist.

Young women on the threshold of a science career, Dr. Tennyson advises, should realize that in some laboratories exceptional demands are made of them in ability and natural scientific talent. Inevitably, they represent competition with their male colleagues. She puts it this way:

"If a young woman enters a science career with a 'feminist' chip on her shoulder—with the attitude of demanding her rights—she will doubtless arouse hostility, and so will meet with hostility. But I have found that most professional people will accord you more than your 'rights' if you have ability. If you do have it, it will be recognized. Appreciation of it shouldn't be forced down your colleagues' throats."

For all her preoccupation with birth defects research, a field The National Foundation entered in 1958, Dr. Tennyson says she tries to lead a life of "dynamic equilibrium, the rule we find in all nature. I don't spend all of my time with rabbits and mice and peering into a microscope. Fact is, I have so much equilibrium I even go skiing."

1. As much as possible, you should set regular hours for rest and sleep on school nights. If homework interferes with sleep, let the school know.
2. Arrange for a good, unhurried breakfast. Try to see that meals supply all the essentials for proper growth and well-being.
3. If there are problems in hearing well or seeing well, arrange for an examination.
4. Start a library (paperbacks are alright) that belongs to the child alone. Discuss these books with him.
5. Accept, as parents, the fact of individual differences. Some people are verbal; others are not. Reading is not something that comes easily and naturally to all.
6. Have family reading times where each individual can read his selection to the others, and discuss it.
7. Provide in your home a time and a place for reading.
8. Set a good example by showing how much you enjoy your reading and profit from it.
9. Encourage your child in school by showing an interest in what is happening there. But don't expect an answer to, "Well, what did you learn today?" How would you like to have to answer that question very often?
