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In Thessalonica Paul reasoned out of the Script three sabbath days with men who were unwilling to vinced (Acts 17:1-9). The bigotry of these Thessalon only kept them in spiritual darkness, but it moved bitter opposition to the truth, so that they persecut and Silas and even followed them to Berea, stirring p against them.

Bigotry has the same effect today. Let us new our minds so as to keep error out, for in doing so we w shut new light out and close old errors in. Moreover, a small step from shutting out new light from God's engaging in bitter opposition to it.

The Athenians went to the other extreme. They terest in what was old and clamored only to hear new (Acts 17:21). Yet when Paul came to them with t news of the gospel of grace, some "mocked" while more polite, said: "We will hear thee again of this r and turned away (Verse 32).

The Athenian spirit too is still rife today. Many stantly giving up the old and looking for somethin sure that the latest fashions, the latest statistics latest advice must be the best.
