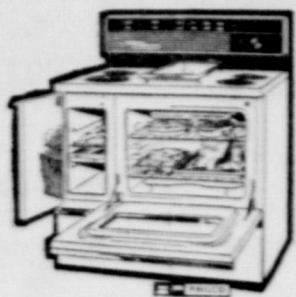

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

Reports that I have received from other areas of the state and over Wheeler County indicate that cotton farmers are in for a heavy infestation of cotton insects during the season.

We have presently been hit by a battery of vegetable webworms. These worms were found on F. M. Laris farm in the Magic City community on Clover. They were also found in Kenneth Franklin's young cotton in Wheeler and Norbert Schlegel cotton in Lela.

Webworms are general feeders on alfalfa, clovers, cowpeas, peas and similar crops. They also feed on several species of weeds especially pigweed.

The vegetable webworm in the most common webworm that attacks forage crops. The adult is buff with shadings and irregular markings of light and dark gray. It has a wing spread of about 3/4 inch. The moth is active primarily at night and is strongly attracted to lights. However, frequently it is noticeable in the field during the day, since when disturbed, it makes short flights of several yards and then lights in a hidden part of the foliage.

The larva is about 1 inch long, yellowish or greenish to almost black with a light stripe down the middle of the back. The presence of three dark spots forming a triangle on the side of each segment is a distinguishing characteristic of the larva.

The webworm passes the winter as a pupa or larva within a silk-lined all in the soil or under plants fed upon by the fall generation

THE MANNER OF HOLDING SAID election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as modified by the provisions of H.B. 330, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

A COPY of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as a proper and sufficient notice of such election.

NOTICE OF SAID ELECTION shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICT". Said Notice shall be posted in each of the election precincts and at the Courthouse door not less than thirty (30) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held and in addition said Notice shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of the election order in a newspaper of general circulation in said proposed District, once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks, the first publication to appear at least fourteen (14) days prior to the date established for the election.

It's Time To Start Canning For The County Fair

Wheeler County with prospects for a good production season for fruits and vegetables for 1963 could look with pride to exhibiting many of these at the Annual County Fair.

However, if a true picture of the County's productivity is exhibited, plans for doing so must begin now. It will take all those who produce the products and those who look ahead and preserve these food products by any of the modern methods. These foods can supplement the family food needs throughout the year and add to the enjoyment of the planning and preparation of more nutritive meals for many of the families in Wheeler County.

The County Fair offers an opportunity for women and girls to exhibit their food products they have prepared during the canning season. Under food preservation, there are four divisions:

1. Vegetables
2. Fruits and Juices
3. Jellies, Jams, Preserves, Marmalade and Honey
4. Pickles

If you need information on the latest methods for preparing these foods for your families use or for exhibiting in the fair, there is a number of good bulletins put out by USDA and Texas Agriculture Extension Service. These bulletins

may be picked up at your County Home Demonstration Agent's Office.
