Who May Take Life Saving
 Boys and girls who have reached the age of twelve and are not older than fifteen years, or who are students in the seventh to tenth school grade inclusive are eligible to take life saving instruction and qualify for Junior Life Saving certificate, provided they are in sound physical condition and have no physical handicap that would render them unable to perform any of the required skills.

To qualify for Senior certificate, persons are eligible who have passed their sixteenth birthday or who are students in or above the eleventh grade in school, and can meet the same physical qualifications as outlined above. Both groups, Junior and Senior must possess enough swimming ability. (Continued on Page 3, No. 3)

ONLY ONE HAS FILED FOR HOSPITAL TRUSTEE; AUGUST 8 IS DEADLINE

August 8, 1963 is the last day on which persons desiring to have their names placed on the ballot for the election of Hospital Directors may file to do so. So far, only one filing has been made and this was by Lester Leonard of Mobeetie.

Since the creation of the Proposed Hospital District in North Wheeler County was ratified by the voters by a large majority on Saturday, July 20, 1963, the next step will be to elect Directors for the District from the five school District areas involved. The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County has set August 12, 1963 as the date upon which they will order an election for directors, then the persons desiring to place their name on the ballot for election will be required to file by the end of the eighth (8th) day of August, 1963.

The Law creating the District reads as follows: "Any candidate desiring to be voted upon as a first director shall, no later than three (3) days prior to the day of passage of the Commissioners court order calling the election, present a petition to that court signed by such candidate and not less than

five (5) qualified voters residing in the candidate's voting precinct, requesting that his name be placed on the official ballot" End Quotation.

Since the order for the election will be issued on August 12, 1963 then to have three full days clear according to the law the Candidate will have to place his or her name in nomination on or before the eighth (8th) day of August.

Anyone who is 21 years of age, a qualified voter and owns property subject to taxation is eligible to be placed on the ballot for election as director of the Hospital District

The petition, once completed should be presented to the County Judge for acceptance by him. This will facilitate the placing of the person's name on the ballot.

Eligibility to pass the required eligibility tests indicated in the course outlines.

Junior and Senior Course (No Charge)

Eligibility — Persons who have passed their sixteenth birthday, or who are students in or above the eleventh grade in school, and are in sound physical condition.

Preliminary Requirements — Swimming test as follows:

1. Standing front dive, reasonably good form.
2. Swim 440 yards continuously, employing a hand-over-hand stroke (crawl, trudgen-crawl, double trudgen, trudgen); a side stroke using scissors stroke of the legs; swim on the back with inverted scissors or inverted breast stroke kick. These strokes may be alternated as desired but pupils should sustain each stroke when used for at least 20-24 yards. (This requirement may be shortened to 220 yards in pools of restricted area.)
3. Dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet and swim two body lengths under water.
4. Tread water one minute with hands beneath surface for use as auxiliary supports.
5. Float motionless or rest in a floating position with minimum movements of arms and legs for one minute.

Time requirement for Course: The course will require a minimum of at least 15 class hours, divided into two parts: a preparatory phase of 5 hours and a training phase of 10 hours. Examinations will require 2 additional hours, making a total for course and examination of 17 hours.
