Jars Full; Dry Extra Apricots

If your deep freeze is already bulging and your fruit jars are full, you may want to take advantage of the drying method for saving those nutritious apricots which are in such abundance in Wheeler County. Many requests have come to the extension office for this information.

Successful drying depends not only on the removal of water. Checking chemical changes is necessary if the product is to have a good appearance and flavor. Successful drying depends on three conditions: dryness of the air, temperature of the air, and circulation of the air.

Warm air absorbs the moisture more rapidly than does cool air. Wire trays made so they allow air to circulate under as well as over the product are more satisfactory.

If the temperature is too high in the first stages of drying, the surface of the product becomes overdried and delays the drying of the interior. If sun drying is used, begin the drying with the cut side of the fruit up. There is no control of temperature by the sun drying method. In using this method, use the wire trays covered top and bottom with a thin cloth such as cheese cloth to keep out dust & insects. Glass may be placed over the trays to intensify the sun's heat results in a quicker drying than the open sun-drying method.

You can control heat in the oven of your stove or use an electric dryer.

For apricots select the ripe fruit. Do not peel. Wash, cut in half and pit. Start at 125 degrees F gradually increasing to 165 degrees with the oven door open.

The fruit should be sulphured by placing 1 teaspoon of sulphur per pound of prepared fruit in a small piece of paper roll it loosely and twist the ends. Then place it in a pan. Place the pan below the tray of cut fruit so they will not come in direct contact with the burning sulphur. Light the paper, place a lid over the entire tray and let set two hours. Then spread on tray for drying—either the oven or sun-drying.

If the sulphur method cannot be used you may drop the pieces of fruit into a solution of two (2) teaspoons of vinegar and two (2) teaspoons of salt. Dissolve in one gallon of cold water and allow to stand 20 to 30 minutes, then spread on tray for drying—Oven method or sun-drying may be used.

Ballot Vote Recast Now July 16

Ballot voting on the creation of Wheeler County began July 16 and will continue through July 17.

Two methods: 1. Voting by mail. 2. Voting by ballot box. The clerk shall not mail a ballot unless the applicant has been postmarked from the county and the ballot is mailed to the election address outside the county.

Ballot desiring to vote shall make written sworn statement for an official ballot to the clerk of the county of Wheeler and the application signed by the elector. The elector can request a ballot for other than himself.

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IRS States That Sale Of Farm Is Taxable; Check

The sale of a farm is taxable, says Richard V. White, Administrative officer at the Pampa office of Internal Revenue. Mr. White points out that farmers must pay tax on any gain on the sale of their farm or other capital items, even though they may turn around and use the money to buy another farm or similar item.

In a letter to County Agricultural Agents, the District Director of Internal Revenue in Dallas asked the County Agents to help IRS correct the erroneous thinking. The tax man advised farmers to check the tax consequences before they sell, trade or swap. Mr. Charles D. Jackson, the local county agent, has pointed out that farmers can get a good general idea of taxes owned by reading the farmers tax guide furnished free by the Internal Revenue Service.

FROM THE OFFICE . . .

This week I discuss the wheat harvest with P. A. Martin of the Briscoe community and he seemed quite satisfied with his wheat yield and grade after the severe drought that we had during the critical stage of the wheat growing period in addition to the hard freezes that occurred during the winter. After diverting twenty per cent of his allotment to other use, Mr. Martin was left with 138 acres of wheat to plant and it was planted in Comanche. It was then fertilized with 100 pounds per acre of twenty-one per cent ammonium sulphate. The cost of adding this nitrogen was around \$3.50 per acre including the application cost. His average yield on the total acreage was 12 1/2 bushels per acre and all wheat ripened at the same time. No lodging occurred on any of his acreage and all the wheat graded No. 1 at a weight of 60-63 pounds per bushel. This wheat was also sold for \$0.08 per pound above government loan.
The wheat was grazed by the calves and yearlings at the normal stocking rate and it was grazed 40 days longer than most of the unfertilized wheat. This amounts to an additional profit since the wheat was leased out for grazing plus carrying the owners livestock which saved on his winter feed bill. With most dry land wheat yielding from five to nine bushels per acre, you can see where Mr. Martin's \$3.50 investment should return a \$5.00 or above profit per acre.
For another year, Mr. Martin is having his soil tested to see if there is a need for phosphate and if so, in what amount along with the nitrogen fertilizer.
Mr. Martin is now serving as chairman of the Crops Committee of the County Program Building Committee and he has been instrumental in planning the type of demonstrations that should be conducted in the county in connection with North West Texas Research Demonstration Program.

Drawers of Soc. Security Urged To Check Income

Social security beneficiaries who are still working should report any increase in their earnings that would change their estimated incomes for 1963, cautioned Hal Geldon, District Manager, Amarillo Social Security Office.
Beneficiaries who work and earn over \$1200 a year make an annual report of their estimated earnings for the coming year, Geldon explained. The amount of benefits withheld by the Social Security Administration is based on this estimate.
To avoid overpayment in social security benefits, any increase in earnings above the estimate should be reported to the social security promptly. If a beneficiary receives more in benefits than he should have, his checks may be suspended to make up for the overpayment, Geldon pointed out.
Revisions in the estimates may be made on post card forms furnished beneficiaries, or at any social security office.

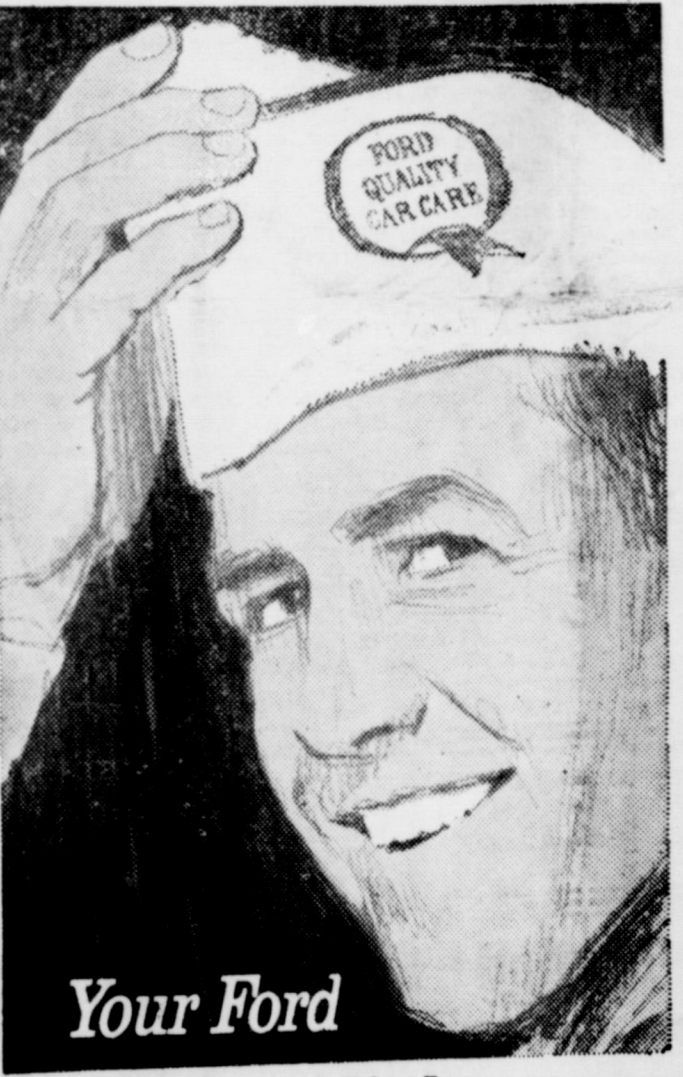

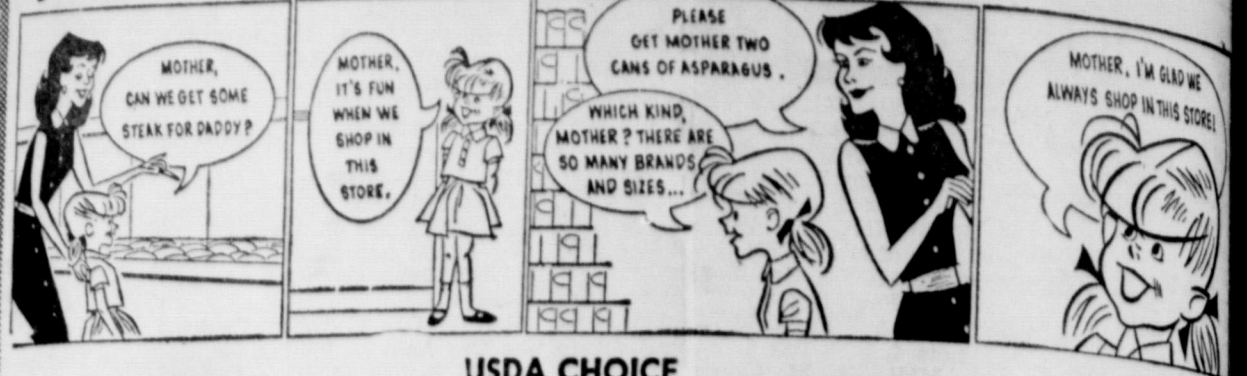
