WHEELER HOME COMING!

The Mustangs will play host to the Estellene team at 8 p.m. The Mustangs will be seeking their fifth victory of the campaign as the season reaches the midway point as it will be homecoming, the homecoming queen will be crowned at the game.

This was the fourth victory without a defeat for the hard hitting Mustangs and they went after this victory with vengeance, remembering the lone district defeat last year at the hands of the Panthers.

The Panthers were forced to punt following the opening rally of the night on the scoreboard. Wallace capped the drive with a 14 yard run off his right tackle and Snelgrooves added seven plays were needed and the Mustangs had their first kickoff and the Mustangs had the ball on their own 25. Only the extra points. The Panthers were not down however and came roaring back after recovering a Mustang fumble on the Follett 31. This was the only serious threat the Panthers were able to muster.

The Mustangs added three more touchdowns in the second period of play with Snelgrooves picking up two of them. A five play, 60 yard drive made the score 14-0 with Snelgrooves circling his right end for the last 20 yards. Porter got into the scoring with the extra points and the score rose 16-0. Jamie Moore recovered a fumble by Tobar on the ensuing kickoff and the Mustangs were back in the scoring business from the Panther 38. Snelgrooves capped this drive with a 7 yard scamper around his left side and added the two point

er around the other flank and the Mustangs had a 24 point bulge with 2:55 left in the half.

The Panthers gambled with time running out in the half and elected not to punt on fourth down and the gamble failed and Wheeler took over the Panther 20. The Mustangs threw only three passes all night and had one completion and the completion came on this drive. Snelgrooves picked up 2 and Hunter added 3 more to the 15. On third down, Wallace passed to Burks in the corner of the end zone, behind two Panther defenders and with Snelgrooves adding the two points, the Mustangs had a 32-0 lead at halftime.

The third quarter had barely begun when the lights flashed again for the Mustangs. On the second play from scrimmage, Hunter bolted over his right guard behind a fine block by Jamison and rambled 74 yards into paydirt. The remainder of the third period was played without a real threat by either team and Mustangs took a 38-0 lead going into the final quarter of play.

The Mustangs got the pigskin deep in Panther territory as the final stanza began when Follett again elected not to punt on fourth down. Six plays made the 30 yards to paydirt with Hunter making the final 7 on a power play over right guard. Porter hit right tackle for the extra points. Late in the contest, Follett was passing deep in their own end of the field trying to score and Hunter picked off one of the passes and ran it back 48 yards for the final Mustang touchdown.

Minutes later the game ended and the Mustangs had their first district win 52-0. All of the Mustangs played well in this contest but Coach Burnett was quick to give praise to Moore and Watson for their defensive play and a lot of credit was given to Richard Wallace for calling a good game.

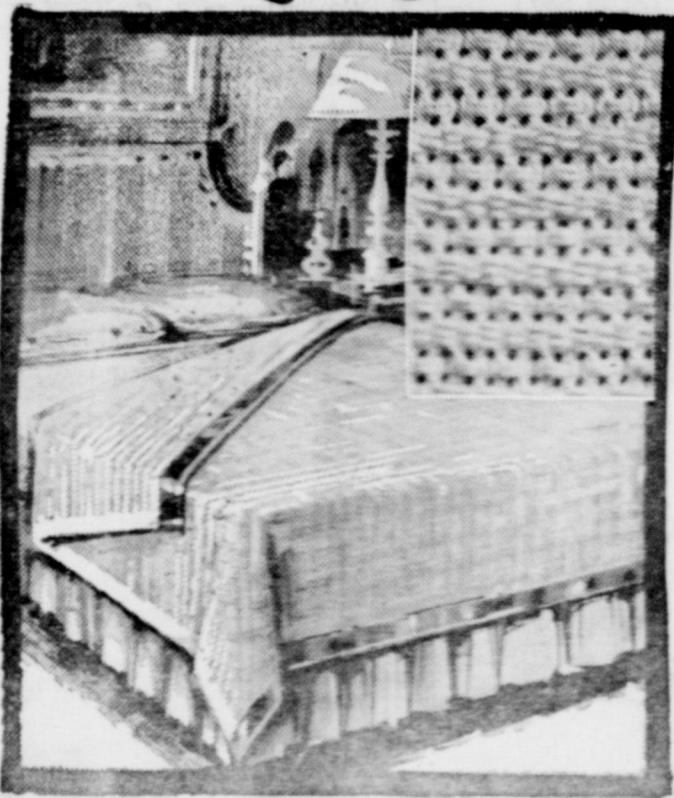

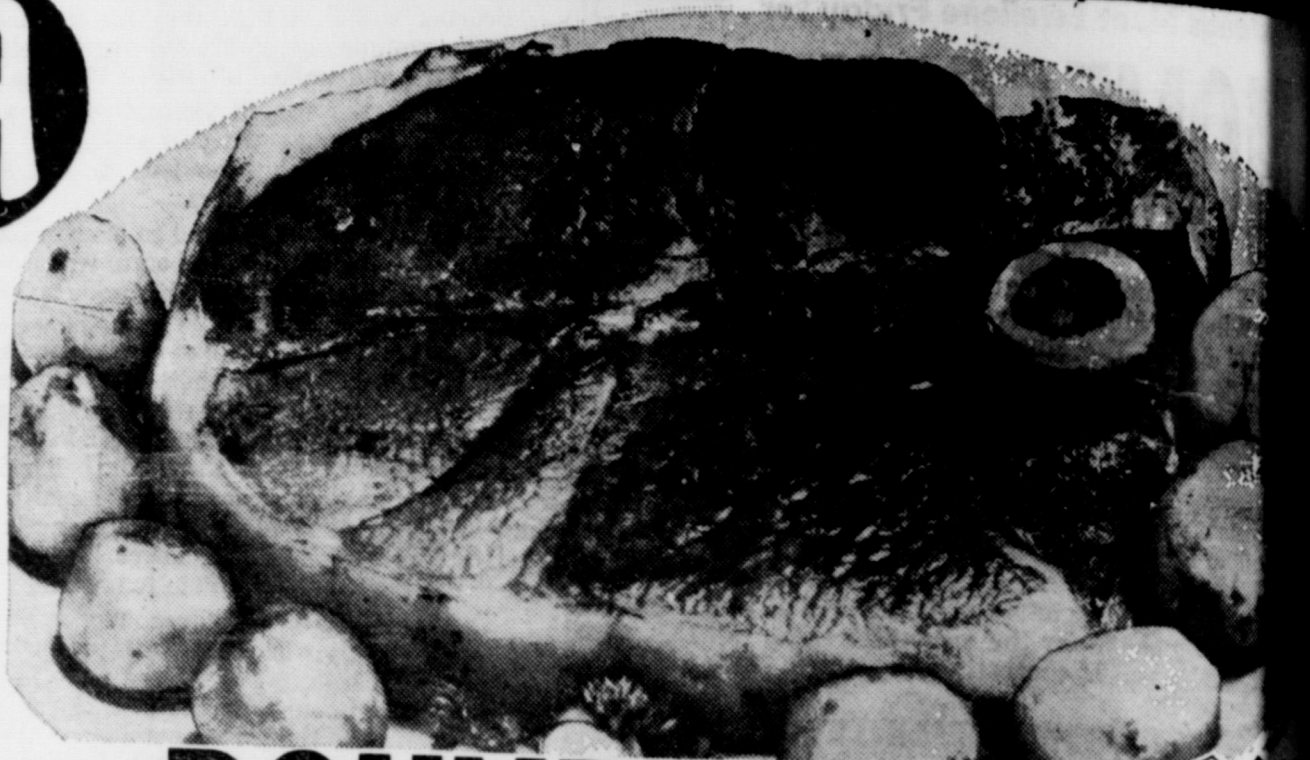

Soil Conservation Work Progresses in County

Conservation accomplishments over last week included the preliminary engineering work for some land leveling for border irrigation for E. Ray Miller and Wiley McCroy in the Gageby Creek country. This consisted of getting to be leveled on the determination some elevation spots over the area of how much cutting and filling of dirt would be needed.

Other conservation activities included the layout of terraces on Farmer Hefley Billy Hefley and J. H. Wilhoff is high. If you are being constructed to break up the concentration of run-off rainfall and either hold it on the land, or walk it off at a non-erosive rate.

Bill Brooks reports that a study made in 1958-59 by all Agricultural agencies revealed an operational need, at that time, of about 3,000 miles of terraces. These terraces are mostly sandy mixedland, mixed land and tight soils where the rainfall runoff is high. If you have this type of soil and there are signs of erosion, now is the time to control that erosion. Terraces are usually the answer. Do not forget to consider parallel terraces, especially if your land slope is uniform, and if you row at agencies revealed an overall guidance, avail yourself of the services provided by your Soil Conservation District, being the Soil Conservation Service, ASCS, Extension Service, or FHA. Any of these agencies can give you assistance at no charge to you. They were created for that purpose.

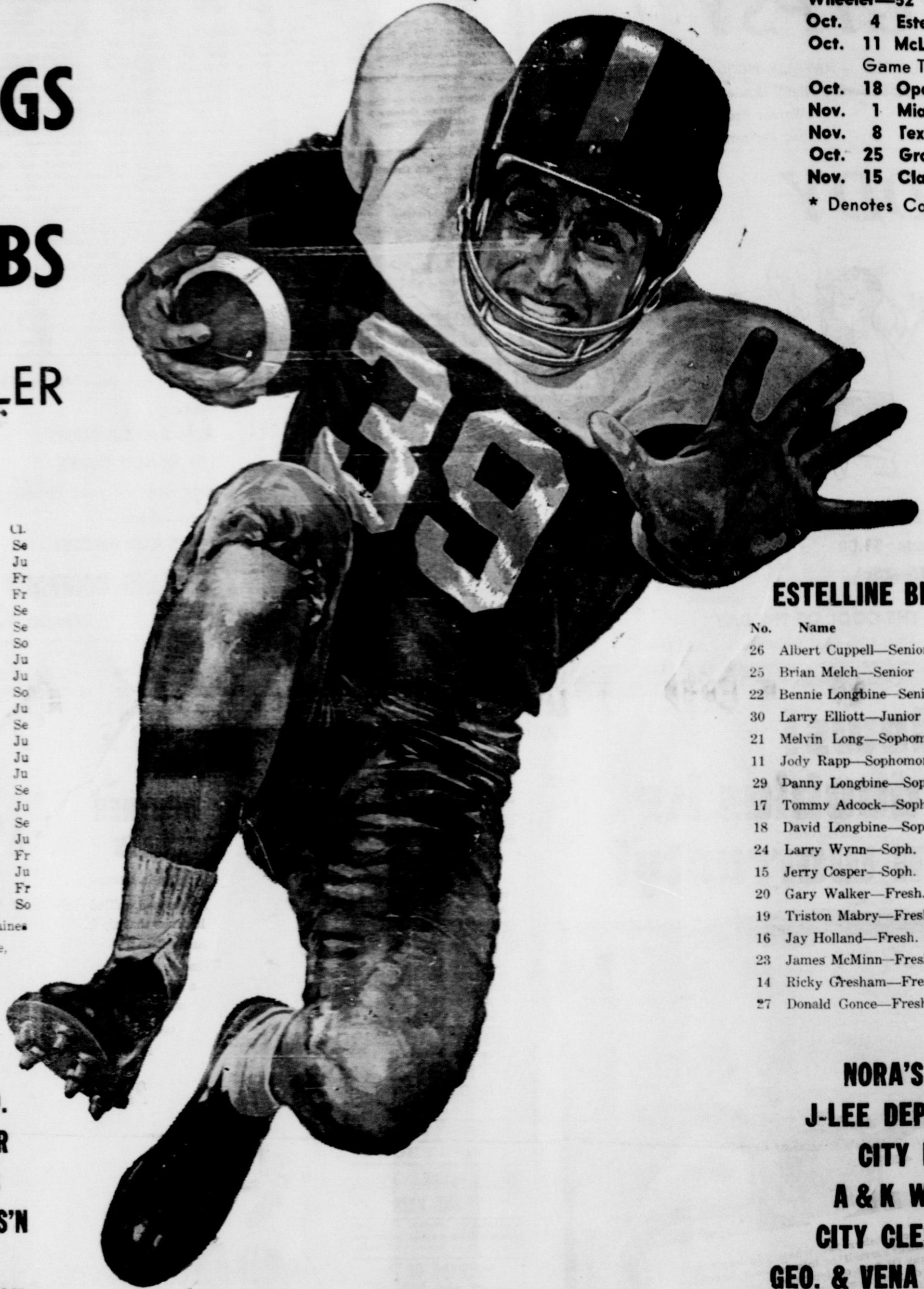

**FEWER AND BETTER EQUIPPED
EXPERIMENT STATIONS FOR AREA**

A new trend in agricultural research and education is taking shape in Texas reports County Agent Charles D. Jackson. The forecast is for fewer, but better equipped experiment stations and more close-to-home demonstration to test research findings locally, he added. Setting the pace for things to come is a unique organization of farmers, ranchers, businessmen civic groups and agricultural agencies called the Northwest Texas Research-Demonstration Program. Its activities are centered in a 3-county area of the Texas Panhandle.

The movement started in 1956 when Collingsworth and Hall County residents asked Texas A&M University to establish a local experiment station. No one questioned their need because the nearest research units were about 100 miles away where different climatic and soil conditions prevailed. "But A&M maintains 30 sub-stations and 9 field laboratories in addition to the main station at College Station and some officials felt we already were spread too thin," the agent said.

Instead it was decided to initiate an intensive series of on-the-farm research demonstrations to run a 3-year period. This eliminated the need for costly new facilities and additional technical personnel that a new substation would have required, Jackson explained. Sponsored jointly by the Extension Service and Experiment Station, the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program was formerly organized in 1957. Hall county joined the effort and the program got off the ground in March with the employment of Duane L. Scott, a young Collingsworth county farmer, as farm demonstration assistant.

The program operates within the framework of local program building committees, but everyone is in the act. Farmer-rancher advisory groups keep research scientists at Chillicothe, Lubbock and Bushland informed of problems that need attention and help select suitable demonstration sites to evaluate new developments for local use. USDA and state experiment station scientists, with the help of Extension subject matter specialists, design and layout on-the-farm test plots. Soil conservation districts provide many items of service equipment and 20 commercial firms joined together to provide needed seed, fertilizer and herbicides. Bankers service clubs, chamber of commerce, Farm Bureau, vocational agriculture teachers, county agents and local USDA personnel lend a helping hand.

Last year, 27 demonstrations were carried out on 23 cooperating farms. In them, farmers learned—and taught their neighbors—how to knock out bindweed and Johnson grass, control mesquite, lick the alfalfa aphid, use fertilizer efficiently and select the best hybrid seed varieties for efficient crop production.

The program has shown that A&M officials were on the right track in seeking a more efficient way to serve the people of Texas. Plans are now underway to select key locations representing major producing areas to develop them into well equipped, completely staffed research-extension centers, and expand on-the-farm research

demonstrations. No wholesale abandonment of field station is planned, the agent said. Some will close while others likely will be returned for out-field experiments and demonstrations. Technical personnel now at these stations will be used to strengthen staffs at the new research-extension centers.

"Our hats are off to the progressive people of Collingsworth, Wheeler and Hall Counties," says R. E. Patterson, A&M's dean of agriculture and Experiment Station director. This new approach which they have pioneered so successfully will make it possible for us to utilize funds, personnel and other resources far more effectively in the years to come."
