WHEELER SON WILL PLAY MUSTANGS TO PLAY MARY MOONSHOT AT MIAMI NEXT

The undefeated Mustang team will go into battle again this week as they meet the Miami Warriors at Miami on Friday night. The Mustang team will possibly be short three men. Don Burks will be out for certain with the mumps and two other players will see limited action due to injury and

The Mustangs have gone undefeated thus far and seek to keep the string going as they enter into play with the Warrior team. It is indicated that the Miami team plays from a variety of formations and may pose some difficulty in that respect. However, Coach Burnett seems confident of the team's ability and we expect the winning streak to continue.

The only teams thus far to score against the Wheeler Mustangs were Mangum and McLean. Mangum managed to have 6 points and the McLean team scored a touchdown and kicked the point for a 7 point score.

Mustang opponents have an average of a little over 2 points per game while Mustangs have averaged over 32 points. The total points made by the Wheeler team in 6 games is 192 points.

WHEELER CO. IS REPRESENTED AT STATE FAIR

Charles D. Jackson County Agri. Agent Wheeler County 4-H members brought more blue ribbons back to Wheeler County this year than they have in recent years. From the State Fair of Texas, six out of seven entries in the junior market steer show received blue ribbons. The blue ribbon is the highest award that is given in the market steer show. Each calf receiving blue ribbon graded choice or better on foot and the carcass was estimated by the judge to yield 48% or more of the carcass weight in boneless closely trimmed roast and steaks.

Four-H members receiving blue ribbons on their steers were Ken Fields, Janice Williams, Richard Williams and Randall Williams of Shamrock. Kelly Miller of Allison and Richard Meadows of Briscoe also received blue ribbons. David Yarborough of Shamrock received a red ribbon on his calf. The red ribbon steers had to grade choice also, but they were estimated to dress below 48% of carcass weight in boneless closely trimmed roast and steak.

In the Junior steer division Terry McCasland Angus entry placed third and Kenneth McCasland Hereford's entry placed tenth. Prices received for the calves were quite good this year in that the State Fair guaranteed the blue ribbon exhibitors thirty-five cents per pound for their entries and thirty-four cents for the red ribbon entries. Several calves sold for higher than the thirty-five cents. Richard Williams received forty cents per pound for his steer and Janice Williams received thirty-seven cents for her entry. They were purchased by Nat Williams, President of Southland Life Insurance Company who was representing the company. Randall Williams calf was bought by Tom Wilson for forty cents per pound. Texas A&M College purchased Kelly Miller's calf for thirty-five cents and Wyatt Food Store purchased Kenneth McCasland's entry for thirty cents.

Everyone that attended the fair seemed to enjoy all the exhibits at the State Fair and quite a number are making plans now for the 1964 fair. The exhibitors agreed that this was the best year that Wheeler County has had at the Dallas Fair in several years.

A Three Day Affair... SEVERAL ATTEND CONVENTION

Several members of the Soil Conservation District journeyed to McAllen, Texas last week to attend the Texas State Convention of Soil Conservation Districts. Attending the meeting were: Dusan Palkan, Chairman of Kellerville; B. A. Schlegel, vice chairman of Shamrock; Clarence Zybach, secretary of Briscoe; Farmer Healey of Wheeler; and Bill Brooks, WUC, SCS of Wheeler.

The group participated in a guided tour of the valley on the 9th in which they saw conservation work mostly on irrigated land; cropping systems and pasturing lands. That evening the convention members were entertained by Reynosa, Mexico High School Talent, Native dancers, songs, and a local square dance club.

On the tenth, the group heard speeches by state leaders and participated in committee meetings of groups divided by functions such as Great Plains Watershed, Conservation Research and others. These committees adapted resolutions to be presented at the general assembly.

On the 11th, the group members attended a lecture by Dr. Tyrus Timm, Economist with Texas A&M. Dr. Timm discussed the changing situation in agriculture as affecting conservation. A group of the delegates also toured Reynosa during the morning. After a successful convention meeting, the Wheeler group returned home.

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MYF WILL HAVE CROP DRIVE WED.

CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) is the Community Appeal of Church World Service, collecting farm commodities and cash to provide for overseas relief and rehabilitation through church overseas programs. CROP gifts are always put to use under church supervision and in cooperation with local social welfare groups. Distribution is made strictly on the basis of need without question of religion, race or creed.

Texas youth have come to identify CROP with Halloween and have made this "All Saints Eve" a time of Christian sharing. They turned to collecting for others rather than themselves and are doing their share in a Christian ministry of relief and rehabilitation to over half of the world's population.

Funds collected by the young people will be used to help meet the nutrition requirements of under-nourished people in many lands, for food as partial payment of wages for workers in self-help projects and for agricultural resource improvement for people who yearn to stand on their own feet. In some cases the funds will be used to assist in the local CROP county commodity appeal such as is conducted in several counties of the state.

In 1962, the youth of Texas collected \$55,085.00 for CROP and helped to provide 109,250,000 lbs. of government donated food overseas in addition to other shipments of food, fiber and self-help materials, valued at over a half-million dollars which were not otherwise available to the overseas programs of the churches.

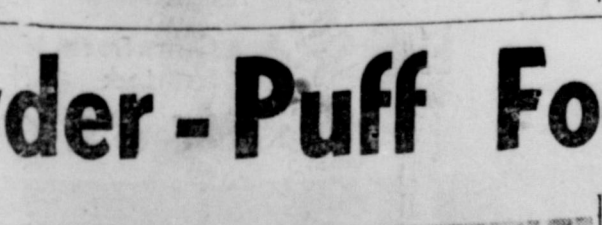

During the time of his stay here, elder Bean made a soil survey of the entire county and made a written report which may be seen at the library. The title of the publication is "Soil Survey of Wheeler County, Texas" and is published by the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Astronaut Bean's parents were both born in Michigan. His father was 24 and his mother, Francis Murphay Bean, was 25 at the time of Alan's birth. The couple were only temporary residents of Wheeler and shortly after Bean's birth, moved to Georgetown.

Astronaut Bean has evidently been interested for a long time in Art. During his stay in Maryland, Lt. Bean took several art courses from a college located in the city where they lived. He has made several paintings and models which gracefully adorn the walls of the Bean home.

Astronaut Bean will return to Texas in January when he will report to the Manned Spacecraft Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at Houston.

Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department Is Ready To Meet Area Emergencies

There is never a dull moment in the lives of the 21 men who compose the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department. At any time, day or night the alarm may sound, and usually does, calling them from work, play or sleep as the case may be to an urgency in the area. The department has been in existence for 16 years and has rendered untold service to the people of Wheeler and surrounding areas in the county and on occasions in the surrounding counties.

When the call is made to the fire department, Mr. C. B. Kirk presses the alarm button and the sound screams out at the station. The alarm is set to last for about two and one half minutes. By the time the alarm has stopped, at least one unit and usually all of the units have left the station on their way to the fire.

An example of the fast efficient work of the Department came

while we were interviewing Mr. R. J. Holt, Jr., concerning the department, a call came in and the alarm sounded. By the time we walked a block to the station, the alarm was pulling out while the time the alarm had stopped, the fire had been put out at Mr. Frank Caswell's home and the men were rolling up the hoses to put them back in the truck.

The fast efficient work of these men is not an accident. They meet two nights each month for regular meetings for inspection of equipment, training and study of various fire problems. This past Tuesday the men gathered and studied a problem in ventilation connected with fire fighting.

The Wheeler Fire Department has three units. An emergency truck carrying equipment and tools for most any emergency including that needed by the six man fire-saving team, smoke masks, a recharger, gloves, cutters and other electrical equipment needed in dealing with high voltage electric wires.

In addition to the emergency truck, there are two 1250 gal. trucks which carry the water and hose supplies, ladders and men. One of the trucks is equipped to pump 200 gal. of water per minute and the other pumps at the rate of 500 gallons per minute. All units are radio equipped for contact between the station and trucks or from truck to station.

The officers of the department are Fire-Chief, R. J. Holt, Jr.; Assistant Fire Chief, N. D. Ware, Jr.; and Sec-Treas., Roy Ford. Other men participating in the

Fire Chief Holt stated that the city has received a 25% good fire rates since the Department has been in existence, considering the amount of money that represents. That is a substantial benefit.

The people of Wheeler are proud of these men and the fine work the Wheeler Fire Department is doing to keep our community and area free of the dangers and loss to fire.

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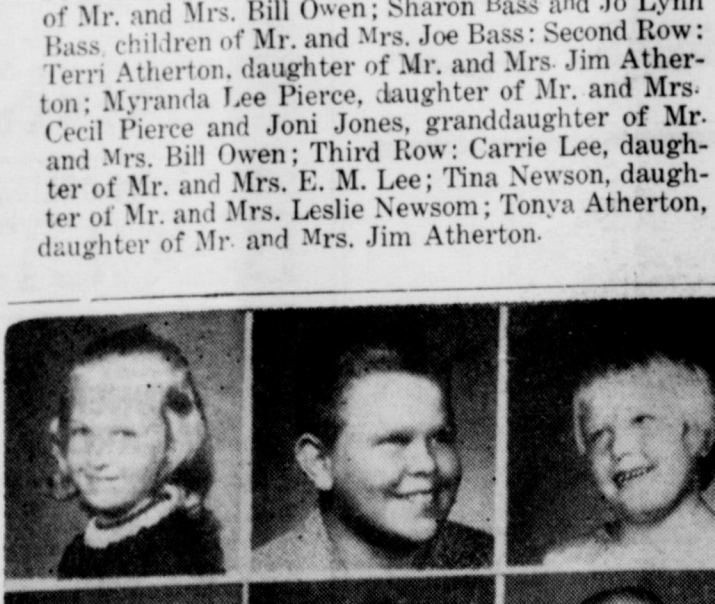
