TRAIL RIDE WILL BE HELD HERE

It is trail riding time again in Wheeler County for the 4-H Texans Riding Club. All the 4-H Horse Club members are invited to attend this annual event as well as any parents that care to ride. The group will meet at 2:30 P.M. at the Wheeler Riding Club arena and proceed to the Tom Puryear Ranch where they will camp for the night. Accompanying the group will be Mrs. Bus Freeman and the County Agent as well as several adult leaders.

Each member is encouraged to bring a flashlight, bed roll, canteen, horse feed and halter, raincoat and a picnic lunch for the evening meal. The breakfast will be furnished by the 4-H Riding Club and it will be served by the events and adult leaders. Games will be played Thursday night, and the parents are invited to participate and spend the night.

The ride will proceed back to Wheeler Friday morning and the group should arrive by noon.

Farmers and ranchers are reminded that claims for the Federal Gas Tax refund must be submitted before September 30.

This refund is on the four cents per gallon excise tax paid on gasoline and diesel fuel by operators on their farms during the period July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963. The refund has no connection with the claim for refunds sent to the State Comptroller's office. The gasoline tax on an operator's farm by a custom contractor is also eligible for the refund, but fuel used in highway travel is not.

The special postcard form 2243 is the proper one to use to submit fuel claims, and they have been mailed to operators who reported in 1962. New farmers and those who have not received the Form 2243, may obtain them from the office of the county extension agent or the area office of Internal Revenue Service.

Claims, are subject to audit, just as other reports submitted to the Internal Revenue Service, and records, should be kept to support refund claims. Just remember that the deadline for reporting claims is September 30.

I would like to remind all livestock producers to check their animals regularly for screwworms

and to be sure to send a sample to Mission if an infestation is found. Donley and Collingsworth Counties are the closest Counties that have had cases, thus far. Everyone must cooperate for this program to be successful.

The recommended materials for screwworm, fly and grub control are Co-Ral at 0.25 - 0.4 lb. of the 25% wettable powder in 50 Gal. water. Animals should be

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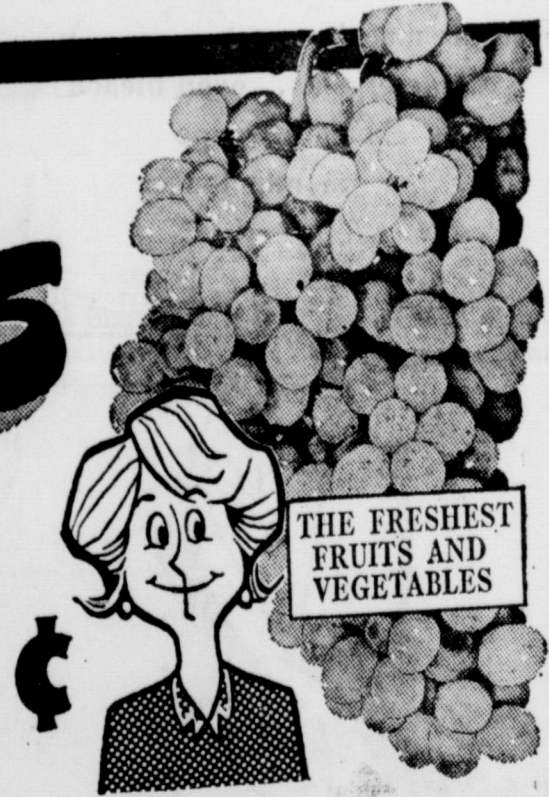

MCLEAN POEM AS IT APPEARED IN RECENT CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

The Congressional Record of July 11, 1963, carries the poem written by J. B. McLean of Moberly and a preface on page A 4341. It reads:

The last days of December rolled around that year in 1941. People were stirring into a panorama of activity. Even grandmothers went to work in some form of employment, helping in the essential cause.

News came in announcing occupation of territories, by the enemy, far from their homeland. Looking at the war map of the South Pacific it revealed they were bypassing the Philippines at this time.

This was at note of interest and inspired me to write a poem in tribute to a great patriot of our time; a man, who by valor and integrity, represented the United States of America in so vast an area, as to include the whole Oriental sphere of influence. And, to those people, he is comparable to a legend.

Now, if you will, let us turn back a page of time, go with me to that day in 1941 and pause a minute in history, with "That Man in the Philippines."

While war clouds hover
 From shore to shore
 From the straits of Dover
 To Singapore
 When the world at peace
 Is no more it seems,
 Think of that man in the
 Philippines

When the map of the World
 You have begun to scan,
 The sealanes of the enemy
 To new conquered land,
 You will see a detour
 Around Bataan
 You may wonder, well,
 What does that mean?
 It is because of that man in the
 Philippines.

The man in the ranks
 Fights and dies
 Verifying the decision
 That implies,
 Facing the foe
 And the shrapnel's sting
 Backing that man in the
 Philippines.

The guns at the forts
 When the bombs come o'er
 Belch defiance from Corregidor
 Returning to their base
 With demanded wings,
 Expressed due respect
 For that man in the Philippines.
 His determination to defend
 Caused the enemy to be wary,
 The failure to be crushed,
 An act of hara-kiri.
 Leaving the earthly battle
 For a spiritual scene.
 The ranking foe
 Gave up his regime, with a
 wealth
 Of admiration for that man in the
 Philippines.

What the future holds, all depends.
 Our cooperation let us send.
 Our wealth and resources let us spend
 Of our time and talent, there is no end.
 You men in the forces, I can see you grin.
 For it makes no difference where or when,
 You meet the enemy you are determined to win,
 And follow the scheme, of that man in the Philippines.

While battlegrounds were forming
 And bullets began to sing,
 The nations needed a man
 For command supreme.
 So it was nothing
 But a natural thing,
 To send for that man in the
 Philippines.

When the war clouds are gone
 And bombs no more rain,
 You will see an honored portrait
 In the hall of fame.
 If now you don't know,
 Do not bother,
 For that man is none other than
 Gen. Douglas MacArthur!

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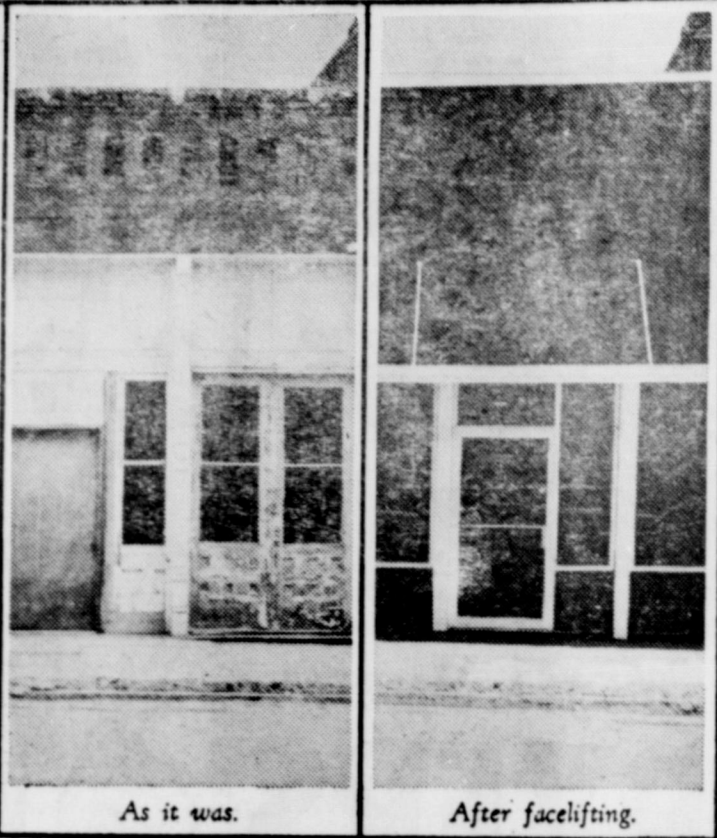

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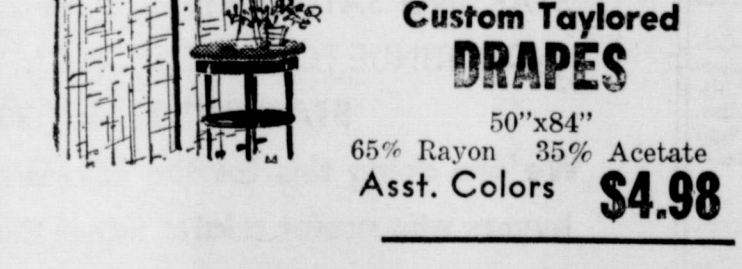

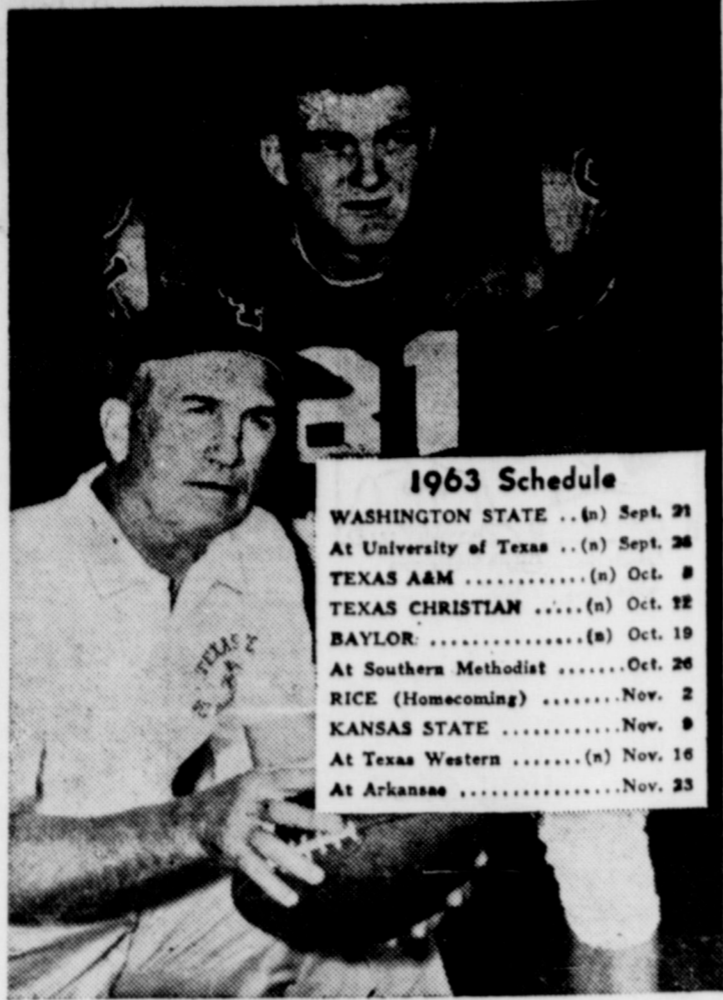

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be known as Article III, which reads as follows:

Section 1. The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinafter provided; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of state funds to each person assisted; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING FOR ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS TO THE (1) NEEDY AGED, (2) NEEDY INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY DISABLED, (3) NEEDY BLIND AND (4) NEEDY CHILDREN; AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS OUT OF STATE FUNDS FOR THE PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE GRANTS ON BEHALF OF SUCH RECIPIENTS; PROVIDING FOR THE ACCEPTANCE OF FUNDS FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING SUCH ASSISTANCE GRANTS; PROVIDING THAT THE AMOUNTS EXPENDED OUT OF STATE FUNDS ON BEHALF OF INDIVIDUAL RECIPIENTS SHALL NOT EXCEED THE AMOUNTS THAT ARE MATCHABLE OUT OF FEDERAL FUNDS; AND PROVIDING FURTHER THAT THE TOTAL AMOUNTS EXPENDED PER YEAR OUT OF STATE FUNDS FOR SUCH ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS SHALL NEVER EXCEED SIXTY MILLION DOLLARS (\$60,000,000)."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be known as Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection, (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of each political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the construction of such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as authorized by the political subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR THE ADDITION OF SUBSECTION (c) TO SECTION 62 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION, TO AUTHORIZE ALL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS WITHIN JEFFERSON COUNTY, TEXAS, TO ESTABLISH, AFTER APPROVAL OF ITS VOTERS, A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND COVERING ALL APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF SAID POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS."

"AGAINST THE ADDITION OF SUBSECTION (c) TO SECTION 62 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION, TO AUTHORIZE ALL POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS WITHIN JEFFERSON COUNTY, TEXAS, TO ESTABLISH, AFTER APPROVAL OF ITS VOTERS, A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND COVERING ALL APPOINTIVE OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF SAID POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1964, and appropriate notice of said proposed amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution of the State of Texas.

- and it is hereby found and determined that all of the territory in Commissioners Precincts 1 and 2 of the Wheeler County, Texas, as constituted January 1, 1963 (the area of the North Wheeler County Hospital District) is included in the area of the precincts hereinabove set forth and defined.
