Soil Conservation Dist. Discusses Boutiful Crop

Crop harvest is at its peak in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District. The yield of cotton and grass sorghum are quite a lot above average for this area. Reports are that the rangeland is better in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District than in any other part of the state. This is a compliment to the farmers and ranchers of this area.

There are several reasons for the good work being done. The crop variety and fertilizer test plots sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Service has been a big help. The support being given by Farmers Home Administration, Production Credit Association, Federal Land Bank and the local banks has made it possible for a lot of conservation work to be done. The rural standard of living is being much improved by the good source of farm credit. The technical service provided by the Soil Conservation Service and the cost share programs of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Great Plains Program is an incentive to do more soil improving work.

Gaddy Vis and Eus Walker at Wheeler have terracing under construction. They are using ASCS cost share assistance. R. D. Mills completed a pond last week thru the GP program. New Great Plains plans are being developed for Grainger McElhany Robert Seely, J. B. Bass, George Ross and Walker Ranch.

Basketball Season Gets A Good Start With The Shamrock Tournament

The Wheeler Girls Basketball team scored their first wins of the season over Shamrock. Fast moving square shooting teams opened the season by defeating the Shamrock teams by over 15 points each.

The Girls B team won their game by about 15 points and the A team won a 39-22 game.

Both boys and girls teams will venture to Shamrock again this weekend for the Shamrock Tournament. Friday afternoon at 1:30 the girls will play Shamrock girls. Cotton Harvesting Is Still In Full Swing

Cotton harvesting is well under way this week in the Wheeler and surrounding areas. The gins at Allison, Briscoe, Kelton, Twitty are running full steam ahead and are really putting the cotton thru the mills. The newly built gin at Wheeler reports that they have ginned to date 2,201 bales of cotton. The Kelton gin has put out over 1100 bales and still running strong. Other gins are running on a 24 hour schedule and really ginning the cotton.

"The crop this year seems to be well above that of last year and exceeds the expectations of most of the farmers in the area. Many are bringing in cotton that will run at least a bale to the acre and some have harvested in amounts exceeding a bale. We can truly be thankful for a bountiful harvest in cotton this year.

According to information received from Gordon Stiles, Chairman of the Steering Committee of the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Project, a trial is to be held next Monday morning, December 9 in District Judge Louis Goodrich's Court that will have far reaching influence on all residents of Wheeler.

This trial is to determine whether to release an injunction first issued to the Red River Authority of Texas, then suspended, to permit preliminary work to start to build a "big dam" across Sweetwater Creek east of Wheeler. Local ranchers and farmers owning land in the area to be affected have strongly objected to construction of this "big dam". They have retained counsel in the celebrated attorney, Gene Steed of Perryton to oppose any such construction.

Mr. Stiles stated that he had very little factual information on the "big dam", but understood that it was to hold about 60,000 acre-feet of water. He further stated that this would cover at least 6,000 acres of land if the water depth averaged 10 feet deep. The purpose of the dam, according to local information, is to provide water for the cities of Wheeler and Shamrock. It is not known what the cost of such a structure would be, but Mr. Stiles said that he had heard that the total cost of the completed project would run from six to 12 million dollars. Mr. Stiles stated that his first concern was that the "big dam" would not only cover up a very area of the choicest bottom land in the county, but also a number of homes and improvements that these land owners have spent a lifetime building up.

Speaking as Chairman of the Steering Committee of the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Flood Control Project, Stiles advises that this program consists of the building of numerous small dams located on the tributaries that feed into Sweetwater Creek to control flooding. He added that special attention was given in the preliminary survey to locate some of the "small dams" where they could provide water for the city of Wheeler.

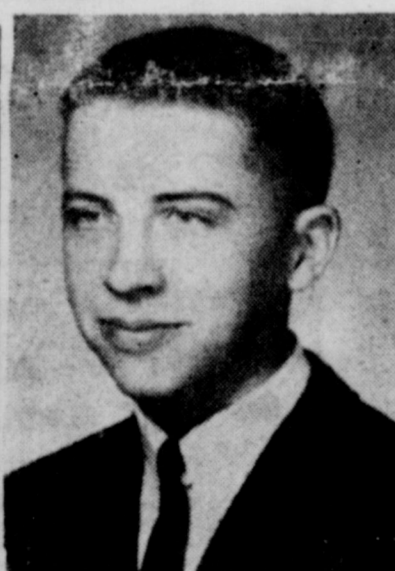

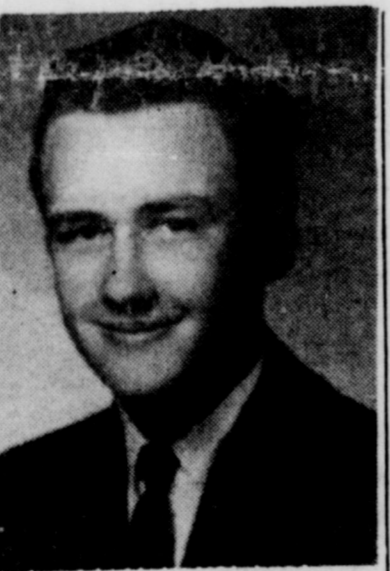
FOOTBALL HEROES FOR 1963
